

History of "Sportsmanship 1" All-Star Games

The "Sportsmanship 1" All-Star Basketball Games were conceived and initiated in 2000 by Norbert Baschnagel, former Clarion University full professor in the Health and Physical Education Department. Under his direction, the objectives of "Sportsmanship 1" were to recognize the outstanding seniors in the boys' and girls' Western Pennsylvania leagues and have them play one last time, raise money for the Clarion County YMCA, and present the Western Pennsylvania "Sportsmanship 1" Sportsperson of the year award to the person who emphasizes the true meaning of sportsmanship in our society.

To date, 800 exceptional senior girl and boy basketball players, coached by 152 coaches and officiated by 114 officials have participated in this event. Players are selected by the executive committee of 15 members, 4 male and female coaches from the four District 9 leagues, and 2 officials from District 9. The executive committee also supervises the logistics of this event.

To date, approximately \$164,476 in cash and product has been raised by the executive committee to benefit the Clarion County YMCA, Camp Coffman, and other nonprofit charities over the years including the Fitzgerald Ramp Fund and Clarion P.A.W.S.

<u>Criteria for "Sportsmanship 1" Sportsperson of the Year Award in Western PA:</u>

- Must demonstrate excellent consistency in the following character traits: sportsmanship, leadership, honesty, trust, integrity, empathy, self-control, mental toughness, courtesy, good manners, fairness, caring, respect, responsibility, and ability to apologize when necessary.
- Must be a five year resident of Western Pennsylvania.
- Must have completed five years as a player, coach, official, or administrator.
- Must have contributed five years of volunteer excellence in the community.
- Must have at least two letters of recommendation submitted to the executive committee.

"PERFECT 10" SHOOTING CONTEST

The reason we have this shooting contest is because the three (3) point shot has changed the basketball world and made the three (3) point shot very exciting and important for everyone who enjoys playing and watching basketball. It can turn around a game immediately. We also have one (1) free throw because free-throws, many times, determine the outcome of many close basketball games.

- Three, three (3) point shots = 9 pts
- One 1 free throw = 1 pt
- 9 pts + 1 pt = a perfect 10

The drill starts in the left hand corner at the 3 point line.

On the whistle, the player shoots a three (3) point shot.

He/She rebounds the make or miss and sprints to the top of key behind the three point line and shoots a three (3) point shot behind the three point line.

He/She rebounds the make or misses and sprints to the right hand corner behind the 3 point line and shoots a three point shot.

He/she rebounds the ball and then goes to the free throw line and shoots one (1) free throw. If you make all four (4) shots you automatically qualify for the finals of the "Perfect 10" shooting contest.


Klingensmith averaged 12 points per game and 2.5 rebounds per game for the Lions helping them to both the KSAC and District 9 Class 2A titles in 2023.



In collegiate wrestling, Robert "Bob" Bubb is one of a kind. In a career spanning 44 years, he has been a competitor, coach, and contributor of the highest caliber and character. Known by all as a man of integrity, his charismatic leadership continues to shape the sport of today.

After a successful high school prep career in his hometown of Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, he became a student-athlete at the University of Pittsburgh. Under the tutelage of Rex Peery, he garnered All-American status at the NCAA Division I tournament and was named "Most Valuable Wrestler" at the University of Pittsburgh.

Equipped with his degree and wrestling expertise, Bubb began his career as a high school teacher and coach. In the early days of his career, his trade mark style emerged. He demonstrated and demanded excellence of himself and his athletes. During his seven-year tenure, he coached 5 district champs, 1 regional champ & 1 state champion.

The next era of his career combined his love of wrestling and academia. As head wrestling coach & an award winning faculty member at Clarion University, he defied the odds against a small school building a program of national prominence. In 26 years, his teams amassed a record of 322-121-4, a 72.5 winning percentage. He coached 5 wrestlers to 7 individual NCAA Div. I titles (including two titles each for Hall of Famers Wade Schalles & Kurt Angle), 8 team finishes in the top 15 at the NCAA Div. I tournaments. In 1986, he was named the NCAA Division I Coach of the Year. When he retired in 1992, he had coached 27 NCAA Division I All-Americans, 29 Eastern Wrestling League champions & had joined the elite group of only four coaches in wrestling history to surpass the 300-win mark.

In addition to coaching & teaching, Bubb has served as a leader in the governance of wrestling. From 1995-99, he served as Executive Director of the National Wrestling Coaches Association. He also spent 20 years as the Secretary Rules Editor to the NCAA Wrestling Committee. He has been honored by 5 different Pennsylvania sport halls of fame including the NWHOF, PA chapter, and has been named Coach of the Year three times by the EWL, and twice by the PSAC.

In recognition of his unprecedented impact on the sport of wrestling, Robert "Bob" Bubb is honored as a Distinguished Member of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

I also find Coach Bubb to be very humble and unassuming. He would rather talk about 'you' than himself. When Coach Bubb retired, he had a career record of 322 wins – 121 losses and 4 ties. When Coach Bubb retired, he was only the 4th Division 1 Coach to reach 300 wins. His teams placed in the top 10 at NCAA Division 1 Nationals 4 times and in the top 25 a total of 16 times. That is an incredible achievement!

I could write a lot more about Coach Bubb's achievements and his high character. But I think I have made the point that he is an outstanding person and coach. A great honor was extended to him when he was inducted into The National Wrestling Hall of Fame of July 4, 2005 in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Coach Bubb was also honored in 1982 with "The Distinguished Faculty Award' for his work as a professor in the H.P.E. Department. I would also mention that Coach Bubb was elected into the Clarion Hall of Fame in 1998 and that the wrestling facility was dedicated to Coach Bubb on January 30, 2022."
