Vikings Triumph 52-49

ALEXANDRIA - Kevin Miles fired in 21 points and led his team in rebounds and assists last night as the Glendale Vikings clipped Juniata Valley 52-49 in the season-opener for both.

The Vikings, playing their first game under the direction of new coach Tom Terza, trailed 29-25 at the intermission before battling back to outscore the Hornets in each of the final two periods.

"I think it was a real good team effort," Terza said. "The starters all did a real good job and (Anthony) Bolto and (Bill) Vigne came off the bench when we got in foul trouble and they did a fine job, too.

"It was a very physical game," Terza added, explaining why a total of 51 foul shots were attempted. "They just quit playing football a week ago and as a result both teams were a little sloppy.

"Both teams made mistakes, but that's to be expected, I guess."

In addition to being "pleased with the play of our bench," Terza added that "Miles and (Jose) DeLorme did a real good job on the boards."

Although no rebounding stats were available, Miles led the team in that department.

Glendale also got double-figure scoring from Miles (21 points), Frank Tiesl (11) and Otis Laing (12).

The Viking JVs, under the coaching of Andy Bloom, won

48-43 but no high scorers were available.

Glendale will return to action next Wednesday at Curwensville.

Vikings Tumble Golden Tide 53-47

CURWENSVILLE — Playing at home means more in basketball than any other scholastic sport, so road victories are a must if a team is to be good.

And that's why Tom Terza, Glendale's rookie head coach, was beaming in the Patton Hall locker room last night.

"Naturally, we're pleased," he said after the Vikes defeated the Curwensville Golden Tide 53-47 in what was a nip-and-tuck non-league scrap the last 16 minutes.

"This is our second win away from home," continued the happy Viking mentor. "The kids still don't have the (shooting) touch yet. It's gonna take a while to get on their basketball shot to get that basketball intuition."

"But the kids hustled and were aggressive, and you can win if you do that even if you don't shoot real well."

Glendale, which makes its home debut Friday against Purchase Line, hit only 16 of 54 field goal tries for 30 per cent, but the Vikings cashed 21 of 38 free throws, including 13 of 17 in the second half when every attempt was made under pressure.

"I was impressed with Glendale's poise on the foul line," noted Ben Irwin after his 16th Tide squad had its record leveled at 1-1. "Glendale has a nicely-balanced team. Nobody in that first eight hurts them, and that's important."

Terza also had praise for his reserves. "The bench did a terrific job. (Anthony) Bolto and (Bill) Vigne came in under pressure and didn't lose their cool."

Bolto, in fact, did an outstanding job down the stretch, the little point guard accounting for eight of the Vikings' last 12 points.

His free throw with 5:33 left put the visitors in front to stay, and he gave his club a big lift moments later when he penetrated the heart of Curwensville's ozone for a peep.

Bolto wound up with 10 points, while Kevin Miles and Jose Delorme, a pair of quick, high-jumping frontliners led the Vikings with 16 and 14, respectively.

Chip Maderia, the recipient of some fine fast break passes from Rick and exhibiting a good jumper, topped the Tide with 16 points.

However, Curwensville was plagued by ballhandling and passing woes, turning over possession 32 times.

"I was just a little disappointed in our showing at times," said Irwin. "We were a little inconsistent."

"I think the intensity was there, but it seemed misdirected at times."

Glendale's pressure-on-the ball tactics keyed an early 7-2 spurt as the hosts were having difficulty getting off shots.

Vikes Frank Tiesi, who rebounded his own miss for an easy two and got a breakaway on a steal to trigger the fast start, and Stan Kimberly were coming out to meet the Tide guards as soon as they crossed the time line.

"Frank and Stan created those early turnovers, and our interior people did a good job anticipating and picking off the passes," Terza commented.

Each team had only two points in the last 4:45 of the first quarter, which ended with Glendale in front 11-6, but Delorme picked up the tempo for the Vikes with eight of their next 11 points as then pulled away to a 22-11 lead.

That came moments after Irwin ordered a fullcourt press.

"I wanted to see what would happen if we increased the tempo," he explained, "because we weren't staying with them walking the ball up the floor."

In two minutes and 12 seconds, Curwensville knotted the score, five players contributing points to the rally.

"It was a good move on his (Irwin's) part to press," commented Terza. "There is more than just one reason to press."

Glendale Tumbles Purchase Line 59-44

FLINTON First year Glendale cage boss Tom Terza is a firm believer that a team plays the way it practices.

And the Vikings had a good workout Thursday evening, with the emphasis on rebounding and scoring on short range jumpers that wouldn't go in for them in Wednesday's narrow victory at Curwensville.

Terza liked the results last night—a 59-44 win over Purchase Line for a 3-0 start, one of the best ever by a Glendale hardwood team.

"I thought Curwensville beat us on the boards, so I told 'em tonight I wanted them to be rebound conscious," explained Terza. "I wanted to give them (Purchase Line) one shot and I wanted us to get the second and third shots."

"They went out and did it."

Like early in the third quarter when Kevin Miles had a six-footer from the left baseline roll off the rim. Jose Delorme rebounded on the right side, but his shot also was too strong. Miles got it back and had his bank shot trickle off the front of the rim.

Jeff "Otis" Laing was there for the rebound and flipped the ball through the net for a field goal.

There weren't many missed shots that that trio didn't gobble up for the Vikings, who were clearly superior around the boards until the issue was settled.

A 12-2 scoring binge in the first five minutes of the second half did that nicely, expanding a 34-19 halftime spread to 46-21 and affording Terza the opportunity of getting some playing time for his reserves.

Glendale was shooting well over 40 percent by the time it

had that 25-point cushion.

"We were running the same break as at Curwensville, but tonight the ball was going in!" proclaimed Terza.

"We practice what we call our secondary break, four-on-three, three-on-two, and we teach 'em to swing the ball 'til we get an open 10 or 15-footer."

Laing was one reason the Viking offense was sharper. He was unstoppable along the base line with his short jumper and wound up with scoring laurels on 16 points.

Delorme netted 13 to go with 14 rebounds and Miles chipped in 10 points as the Vikings' front line outplayed the Red Dragons throughout.

Glendale hit 26 of 66 shots for 39.3 percent and was charged with 21 turnovers, only 10 of which came in the first half.

Purchase Line, led by John Fry's 12 points, six coming at the foul line, and Vaughn

Goodlin's 10, never did regain its first quarter shooting touch and finished with a poor 28.3 percent on 17 field goals in 60 attempts. The Dragons had 28 turnovers.

Coach Jim Klyap's team, 0-2 now, made it interesting for one quarter and had two-point leads on three occasions early in the non-league scrap.

Delorme's three-point play with 3:19 gone put the Vikes on top to stay at 9-8, and he had nine of his points by the first rest stop, with the score 21-16.

Purchase Line suffered through a horrendous second quarter, missing all 15 field goal tries and hitting only three of eight free throws.

Laing, meantime, carried the Glendale offense with four field goals on a drive, jumpers from both sides of the net and a rebound shot, and the Vikings pulled away at 34-19.

The lone spurt the Dragons could muster after intermission came late in the third quarter when seven consecutive points chopped the tally to 46-28, but Anthony Bolito ended the period with a running 20-footer to make it a 20-point margin.

Play was hotter-skelter in the final eight minutes with both coaches subbing freely.

Hot-Shooting Vikes Win

BARNESBORO — Superb shooting and tough defense added up to a crucial road win for the undefeated Glendale Vikings in their Moshannon Valley League South Section opener last night.

"It was the best over-all game we've played so far," coach Tom Terza said after the Vikes had corralled Northern Cambria's Colts 48-32.

"We were very unselfish, very patient on offense. We moved the ball well, and every one of our shots came within 15 feet of the basket. It was just a very good job on offense."

That patience Terza mentioned was one reason for the paucity of points in the game. Another was the Vikes' pressure tactics when the Colts had the ball, resulting in the hosts unable to reach double figures in any quarter.

Glendale, off to a 4-0 start in Terza's first season at the helm, led only 20-16 at halftime but widened the gap with a 17-point third quarter.

"Then I told the kids I didn't want them to break at all," commented Terza. "They did exactly what I asked them to do in that fourth quarter. I felt they passed up points on the break to do what I wanted—set up the offense."

Though it seems a little far-fetched, the Glendale stats had the winners making 18 of just 26 field goal tries for an unbelievable 70 percent.

"It was a super shooting night," Terza said.

"I was very, very pleased the kids were willing to sacrifice points for the good of the team."

Jeff "Otis" Laing scored 18 points and Kevin Miles 14 for Glendale, which was outbounded 24-21.

"Otis was fantastic from

the field. He was deadly with that baseline jumper and post jumper," lauded Terza. "Northern Cambria pressed us in the fourth quarter but, unfortunately for them, they picked Laing to foul and he was six-for-seven. He was very cool when he went to the line."

And Laing played only the last three quarters. Dan Garman got the starting nod because Laing suffered a pinched nerve in practice Monday night.

Terza credited Garman for a good effort in the first period.

The Vikings go on the road for the fourth time in five games to play Central Cambria on Friday.

Last night's test was a big one, though. "I felt we have to win on the road, especially in the league," pointed out Terza, "and Northern Cambria is going to be a factor in the final standings."

"I think it's a matter now of not getting complacent. The kids have got to keep hustling, keep playing team basketball."

In the JV game, Glendale won 33-30.

Viking Streak Ends

EBENSBURG -- Glendale saw its early-season, four-game winning streak come to an abrupt halt last evening as the Central Cambria Red Devils downed the Vikings 59-52 in a non-league scholastic basketball tussle.

The Vikings, coached by Tom Terza, were off to the school's best start in years by winning their first four games, but the Devils, playing on their home floor, used a fine all-around game by 6-4 center Ed Menie to dump the visitors.

Menie poured in 21 points and played a fine game in the pivot, according to Terza. His rebounding and blocked shots proved crucial as the game wore on.

The Vikings did not shoot as well as they have in recent outings, connecting 23 times from the floor but just six

times from the free throw line.

The Devils raced to a 15-8 first quarter lead as the Vikes committed numerous turnovers, and that was a key in Terza's eyes.

"We beat ourselves in the first quarter," commented the first-year coach. "They pressured us with a man-to-man and we lost our composure and had a lot of turnovers. That kind of set the tone for the game."

The Vikings fought back in the second stanza and trailed just 27-24 by halftime and early in the third quarter, the Vikes took the lead by four. That's when Menie stepped in.

"After we came back, this Menie took over for them," admitted Terza. "He started to hurt us on the boards, started blocking shots and began hitting his jumpers in the key. We were moving the ball well, but we weren't getting our shots off."

The Glendale offense consisted mainly of Jose Delorme and Otis Laing, each with 12 points. Frank Tiesi and Kevin Miles both

contributed eight points.

"Overall, we did hustle and did play well, but they were bigger physically and that hurt us," noted the Vike boss. "One thing that pleases me about these kids is that they never quit."

"I felt that we were taught a lesson; this will bring us back to earth," he continued. "We've got to look at our mistakes and work on them."

In addition to Menie, the Devils had double-figure scorers in Mark Davidson (12) and Ed Kmetz (10).

The Vikings will return to action Tuesday when they host Bellwood-Antis in a non-league scrap.

In the junior varsity game, the Vikings of Coach Andy Bloom came away with a 38-27 victory. Matt Blaschak canned 16 and Bill Tiesi added 11 for the winners.

FLINTON -- Despite an evening at the foul line that Glendale head basketball coach Tom Terza termed "horrendous", the Vikings got back on the win track with a hard-earned 56-52 verdict over Bellwood-Antis last evening.

The Vikes, coming off a tough loss to Central Cambria, missed 20 free throws last evening while connecting 14 times, a fact that did not make Terza very happy.

"I felt our foul shooting was horrendous," he noted. "It's something we're gonna have to work on. And I wasn't pleased at all with our defense. We were double-teaming the ball and leaving men open, especially this (tick) Webb kid. We just weren't picking up people away from the ball like we should have."

Webb incidently, scored 23 points for Galen Bickels's Devils, mostly on jump shots. He was the game's high scorer. Lance Roulick had 10 for Bellwood-Antis as well.

For all the negative aspects, the Vikings won their fifth game against a single loss by dumping the Devils and received good efforts from Kevin Miles, Jose Delorme, Otis Laing and Stan Kimberly to do it.

In the second half, however, the Viking senior played a dandy game, scoring 16 of his team-high 20 points to keep the Vikes on top.

Delorme scored 11 points and Laing canned 10 markers to help round out Glendale's offense.

The Vikes again shot well from the floor, hitting 21 of 43 attempts for an excellent 49 percent average. The Vikes also won the battle of the boards by a 36-30 margin.

"That loss to Central Cambria helped us in this game," noted Terza. "They played a man-to-man pressure defense and we worked hard on that in practice. Bellwood-Antis played an aggressive man-to-man and we played better against it. It was a very physical game."

The Vikings will return to action Friday evening when they travel to Purchase Line for another non-league tilt.

Glendale Tops Purchase Line

PURCHASE LINE — Glendale's basketball team owns the best record in The Progress-area and last night the Vikes added another victory to the ledger by holding off a stubborn Purchase Line quintet 43-36.

After building a 26-17 lead by the intermission the Vikes slipped under the Purchase Line pressure and midway through the final frame the Dragons pulled to within three points.

But that was as close as the homestanding Dragons got as the Vikes held on to win their sixth game in seven outings. Purchase Line, meanwhile, dropped to 0-6.

"Although the turnovers (15 for Glendale, 20 for the Dragons) don't indicate it," Vike mentor Tom Terza stated, "it was a sloppy ballgame.

"We've been working very hard on our break, but Purchase Line forced us to run a half-court offense and we didn't move the ball that well. We haven't worked on moving the ball like that very much, so I have to take some

of the blame for that," Terza explained.

Purchase Line mentor Jim Klyap, meanwhile, felt his team "is showing some improvement. Our kids are young, but I see us getting a little better with each game.

"Glendale is an outstanding team," the Dragon coach added, "and we've played enough good teams already this year."

When the Dragons began breathing fire on the Vikings in the late stages of the game, Terza felt his squad "kept its composure under the pressure. We did well at the foul line when we had to.

"I just hope it was one of those games you have to get out of your system," Terza, in his first season as head coach of the Vikes said. "We just seemed sluggish, but I figure it's nice to make a mistake and still win."

"Otis" Laing paced the winners' scoring attack with 19 points while Kevin Miles did the job for Glendale underneath with 11 of his team's rebounds.

For the Dragons the big guns were John Fry with 12 points and Vaughn Goodlin with 11.

Purchase Line outshot Glendale 41 percent (14-for-34) to 26 percent (15-for-57).

In the JV game the young Vikings won 67-25 as Bill Vesnesky fired in 17 points, Bill Tiesi canned 15 and Anthony Tiesi added 12.

Glendale will host Clearfield St. Francis on Tuesday while the Dragons entertain Harmony.

Slow Starting Vikes Dump Winless Ponies

FLINTON Despite a ragged start that found Glendale trailing 10-8 after one quarter, the Vikings eventually put it together to overcome the winless Clearfield St. Francis Ponies 63-34 last evening.

The hosting Vikes, who recently have been having trouble getting started, were slow out of the blocks again against their non-division Moshannon Valley League foe.

The Vikings snapped out of their first quarter slump early in the second period when head coach Tom Terza instructed his cagers to go to the press and the result was numerous turnovers and a

16-3 scoring spread that put Glendale on top 24-13 by halftime.

"We started very slowly and sluggishly," admitted Tom Terza, the first-year head coach of the Vikes. "St. Francis moved the ball very well on us and we were sluggish on the boards, too. We were getting just one shot and they were getting more than that.

"But we picked up the tempo a little in the second quarter," Terza continued. "We became more aggressive. Bill Vigne in particular. He forced some turnovers and hit a few key baskets for us. He gave us the spark when we needed it."

Vigne had a perfect six-for-six night from the floor for 12 points and he was joined in double figures by Jose Delorme with 17 and Jeff "Otis" Laing with 16. The lone scorer in double digits for St. Francis was Scott Adler with 18.

The Vikings began turning it on offensively in the second half with 18 points in the third quarter and 21 points in the last quarter while St. Francis, which has just seven men on the varsity, could muster just 21 points the entire half.

"As a team, we were much more aggressive in the second half," noted Terza. "We forced them to take their shots from a little farther out

than they wanted to and we moved the ball much better."

Terza went on by saying, "I think Clearfield St. Francis is a very well-coached team. They moved the ball well and had their kids in the right positions on the court." The Ponies are mentored by Gerard Miele.

Glendale outrebounded the visitors 34-25 and shot a very good 46 percent compared to St. Francis' 32 percent effort.

The Vikes will travel to West Branch for a big non-league showdown on Friday. Glendale is 7-1 while West Branch checks in at 3-3. St. Francis is off until the West Branch Boosters Tournament on Dec. 27-28 and will

play the host Warriors in the first round.

Vikes Streak Past Ponies

Clearfield St. Francis had shown signs of improvement since its 63-34 setback last month at Glendale so the Ponies naturally expected to give the visiting Vikings more of a workout this time around.

But instead the Vikes rebounded from a slow start to reel off 24 unanswered in the second half enroute to another lopsided victory over St. Francis, almost matching the Dec. 19 score with a 62-38 triumph.

After playing what its coach Tom Terza, who has his first Viking squad at 11-6, called "a real sloppy first half" Glendale broke the game wide open with a 26-4 scoring edge in the third quarter.

"We settled down in the second half," Terza said. "Kevin (Miles) and Jose (Delerme) did real good jobs on the boards, we got back to running our offensive patterns and Jose just did a super job on defense.

"We were sloppy in the first half," Terza added, "but part of that was due to St. Francis' pressure. They are quick and they use that quickness to make up for their height disadvantage. Their pressure had a lot to do with our problems. They just shut us off and forced us into taking bad shots."

Both teams had trouble finding any consistency throughout the first quarter, but the Vikes did show St. Francis what was in store, at least under the boards, when they picked five offensive rebounds off the boards.

By hammering away at the boards and cashing in on Delorme's eight-point, five-rebound start the Vikes jumped out to a 12-7 lead in the first period.

Glendale's only problem was shooting, the Vikes hit just 5-of-18 shots in the first eight minutes and 10-of-36 in the first half, but Terza explained that "it's always tough to play at St. Francis. I always have that fear that we'll shoot bad when we come here."

Other than an early 3-2 lead, Ron Kennedy had all three at the free throw line, St. Francis, which held Glendale to two points for the first four minutes of the game, was usually playing catch-up.

Bob Davis, who scored a team- and season-high nine points despite being in foul trouble for most of the game, did tie the score at 14-14 on a three-point play, but then the Vikes' balanced attack began paying off.

Miles, Delorme, Otis Laing, Bill Vigne and Anthony Bolto each fired in two points as Glendale pulled out to a 24-21 halftime lead.

Davis, playing a solid game inside, picked up his third foul minutes into the second period and his fourth personal midway through the third quarter, and he sat on the bench for the remainder of the period both times.

With 4:43 left in the third stanza Paul Tabone, St. Francis' high scorer entering last night's game, scored his first basket of the game to hold the Vikes' edge at three points, 28-25, but then Glendale took over.

Controlling the offensive boards (they had 10 rebounds under their own basket in the third period) the Vikes, who either scored off the caroms or were fouled taking the ball back to the hoop, outscored St. Francis 23-0 in the ensuing four-and-a-half minutes of the quarter.

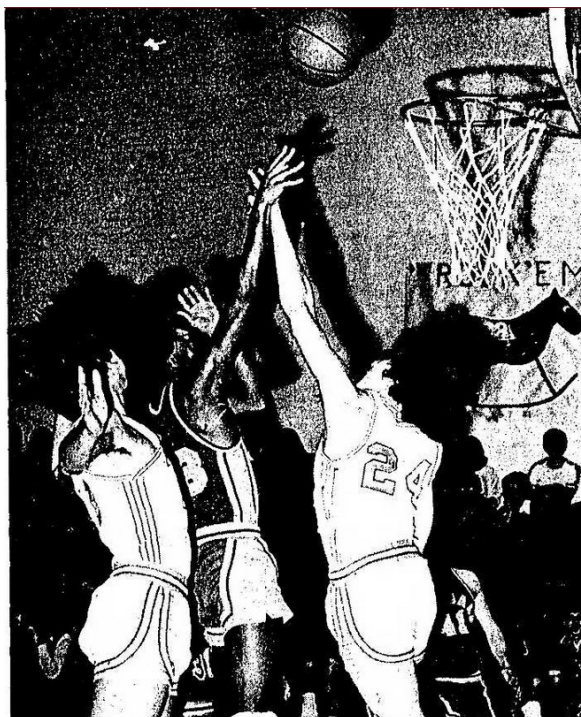

FLINTON — All's well that ends well, the saying goes, and that was the case with the West Branch basketball team last night.

The first half of the non-league scrap with Glendale was a struggle for the Warriors, but they perked up in time to outscore the home-standing Vikings 15-5 in the fourth quarter and pull out a 40-35 victory.

Tom Terza's Vikes have only one more game to get their ship righted after suffering their fourth consecutive setback and their seventh in the last nine games, the result an 11-10 log.

They close their regular season schedule with a makeup Moshannon Valley League South Section showdown against Harmony next Thursday.

The hosts jumped off to a 14-6 first quarter lead and maintained the advantage through the low-scoring second period for a 19-12 halftime advantage.

"It wasn't so much our shots weren't falling, we weren't even getting any shots," Williams explained the slow start by West Branch. "We turned the ball over nine times in the first quarter."

"I have to give them (Glendale) credit. Their pressure at midcourt was bothering us early. Then I told the guards to split their defensive point

man and dribble as far as they could. The pressure didn't bother us so much as our shot selection in the second quarter; that was terrible."

The Warriors chipped two points off the Vikes' edge in the third quarter and finally went in front for the first time, and for keeps, on Pat Coval's jumper that made the tally 32-30 early in the fourth quarter.

"Zelenky played extremely well when we needed him," said Williams. "He had seven rebounds and scored nine of his points in the second half. He hit two big foul shots and a clutch layup off a missed foul shot."

"(Stew) Kirk hit two foul shots and Coval hit two big ones, too."

Both coaches mentioned Warrior reserve Steve Kephart. Williams credited him for "two key buckets in the third quarter that kept us within striking range." Terza singled him out for "coming in and doing a good job."

The Glendale mentor was disappointed his club couldn't hold the lead, especially the way they had played defense.

"I thought the kids did a superb job on defense. According to our stats, West Branch took only 38 shots and that paints a pretty accurate picture."

Terza said his players might have been intimidated, to an extent, when their penetration on offense early on was met with a lot of contact but no foul calls.

"Perhaps they were thinking about that instead of just driving in that fourth

quarter. What happened early in the game might have been in the backs of their minds.

"I don't want to make that sound like that was the whole ball game, because it wasn't. I certainly don't want to take anything away from West Branch. They were down and could have folded, but they didn't. They came back and played well. They did what they had to do to win."

Glendale, led by Jeff "Otis" Laing's 10 points, made 16 of 62 field goal attempts for a dismal 25.8 percent, but that was one field goal more than West Branch had.

The Warriors shot 15-for-39 for 38.5 percent. They won the game at the foul line with a 10-3 advantage, getting 13 more charity tosses than the Vikes were accorded on their home floor, a stat that puzzled Terza.

Going with each team's stats, the Warriors had 37 rebounds, 12 each by Zelenky

The race for the mythical 1978-79 Progress-area basketball scoring crown was about as tight as it could be as Moshannon Valley's Greg Shawver wound up with a scant one-point (439-438) edge over Dave Kephart of the West Branch Warriors.

That's right, just one point! A missed free throw here, a blown layup there or a few more minutes of playing time and the outcome could have been a lot different, but both players were involved with playoff teams and individual point totals are supposed to come after the team's performance.

Shawver, who played in one more game than Kephart, trailed the West Branch senior by 12 points after each team finished its 22-game regular-season slate, but he made up ground in postseason play.

Mo Valley played a Moshannon Valley League tiebreaker and two District 6-A Playoff Tournament games and Shawver totaled 49 points in those three outings.

Kephart and the Warriors participated in a pair of District 6-A Playoff contests and the West Branch leaper canned 36 points.

With Mo Valley already finished the Warriors and Kephart still had a game with Williamsburg remaining, and Kephart entered that game needing just 19 points to tie Shawver and 20 points to earn the scoring title.

Kephart, bothered by fouls,

fired in 18 points to pull to within a point, but with just over two minutes remaining in the game he fouled out, for the first time this season, and the scoring title was still in Shawver's hands as the Warriors were ousted by the Blue Pirates.

While Shawver, the Knights' third all-time leading scorer, and Kephart were battling for the top position the Warriors' John Zelenky, who along with Kephart became the school's only 1,000-point scorers during the course of this past season, pulled into third with 385 points.

Mo Valley and West Branch dominated the scoring leaders with Shawver in first, Kephart in second, Zelenky in third and Mo Valley's Jerry Phillips in fourth with 361 points.

The fifth and sixth spots belonged to Clearfield teammates Rusty McCracken (360 points) and Ash Cassidy (353).

Cassidy, who played in one less game than McCracken, had a better per-game average than his teammate and both averaged more points-per-game than Phillips' 14.4 ppg.

Harmony's Paul Norris, who was seventh with 321 points, also averaged higher than Phillips with 15.3 ppg.

Rounding out the top ten were Joe Smith of Phillipsburg-Osceola with 321 points, Harmony's Pete Baumgartner with 283 points and Jose Delorme of Glendale with 278 points.

Three of this season's top ten scorers were also in the running last season. Zelenky was second with 454 points, Shawver fourth with 389 points and Kephart eighth with 339 tallies. Zelenky was third as a sophomore with 348 points and Kephart was tenth that season.

In addition to that trio of returnees, five others repeated in the top 20. West Branch's Pat Coval climbed from 18th to 14th with 233 points (20 less than he scored last season). Norris went from 13th (277 points) to seventh, Delorme from 17th (256 points) to tenth and Cassidy from 19th (249 points) to sixth. Glendale's Kevin Miles dropped from 12th (279 points) to 13th.

Stew Kirk of West Branch 15th last season with 264 points, but he wound up with just 166 tallies this year.

Underclassmen among this season's top 20 are juniors Norris, Scott Adler of Clearfield St. Francis and John Fry of Purchase Line and sophomore Dave Bloom of Curwensville.

West Branch nudged Clearfield by just more than one-point-per-game in team offense with a scoring average of 59.8 ppg. Glendale's Vikings, who had their second-best season ever, yielded an area low of just 47.9 points-per-game, one less than Harmony.
