Glendale Must Rely on Quickness, Shooting

BEAVER VALLEY The biggest question facing Glendale basketball coach Tom Terza this season is whether quickness and shooting ability can offset the lack of size and ex-

perience.

Last spring's graduation wiped out the Vikings, a team that logged just the school's second winning record in 14 years with a 12-11 mark, and all that remains are two lettermen that were platoon players most of last season.

And to make matters worse, only one potential starter reaches the six-foot

mark.

"Our two drawbacks are the lack of height and overall varsity experience,' Terza, who begins his second season as head coach do feel our overall assets are good team quickness and shooting.

"I think we're a better shooting team than we were last year, and that will change our style. Last year we were conservative, trying to work for the good percentage shots. We're still Valley going to be looking for good share. shots this year, but we want developing a good running game."

The returning veterans are both seniors, 5-10 Bill Vigne and 5-8 Anthony Boito. Vigne scored 66 points last season and Boito 69.

Terza plans on utilizing a three-guard offense, with Matt Blaschak, the lone six-foot starter, or junior Bill Vesnesky joining the ball handlers. Another senior, Randy Miller, may also see work out front.

Glendale's forwards will come from 5-11 junior Steve Turchick, 5-10 senior Bill Tiesi or 5-11 senior Anthony Tiesi.

"These eight players will predominantely make up our varsity," Terza noted, adding that he'll be doing a lot of juggling throughout a game.

"Overall these kids have been working hard and hustling in practice," Terza added. "That can really help overcome some of the inexperience."

Terza's Vikes will again compete in the South Section of the Moshannon Valley League, along with Mo Valley, Harmony and Nor-

thern Cambria.

Terza wants his Vikings to do one thing offensively: look for the open man.

That simple procedure produces lots of assists, balanced scoring and often times a win like last night's 60-54 decision over Juniata Valley.

Early Finish Taints 49-42 Glendale Victory

FLINTON - Poise and cool got their due at Glen-dale last night as the host Vikings managed to keep their heads on straight and score a 49-42 win over an angry Central Cambria basketball team.

The game ended with 1:38 to play when Central Cambria head coach Ron Rufrano pulled his Red Devils off the floor, claiming it was for his team's protection.

The scene was rowdy at Glendale as Rufrano, upset at the officiating, ranted at referees Tony Berdine and Bill Czap and the Devils were assessed with a bundle of technical fouls.

Although there wasn't any violence, implied or otherwise, at the Viking gym, ac-

cording to Glendale head coach Tom Terza, Rufrano was upset enough to call it quits with just 98 seconds to play, his team down by just

seven points.
"I felt bad that it happened," said Terza. "Our kids busted their tails and I felt we should have had the satisfaction of winning with the clock running down to zero." That was the strongest statement Terza, a class person who has always had a cool head, would make publicly. He did express his displeasure with the entire scene, but praised his team for keeping its cool.

The kids didn't let the emotion of the game get to them," said Terza proudly.

"That's very important. You can't get caught up in that type of thing and lose your concentration. I was proud of the kids."

If Terza was proud his kids for keeping cool, he was elated by their game performance.

The Vikings were at definite height disadvantage against the Devils, but outrebounded the visitors 51-42 and stole the ball 23 times from the flustered Davils.

"I was very, very pleased with our work on the boards because they had a big height advantage," beamed Terza. "We took the ball to them offensively and we frustrated them early with our press.

"You can see from our stats that we didn't shoot well," Terza added. "If we had, the score could have been a lot worse. But in that type of game, we were a little edgy, too, and didn't shoot as well as we could have."

"Bishop McCort had too much for us," Glendale coach Tom Terza said after what turned out to be the Vikes' season finale.

'With their height, we had to be able to match them basket-for-basket or they'd get us on the boards, and that's what happened.

"I felt we could stay with them if we could play disciplined basketball, and we did for one quarter," Terza noted. "But our shots weren't falling and they just pulled away from us."

Bishop McCort held a slim 9-6 lead after that first period, even though Glendale went over six minutes between their first basket and their second.

But in the second quarter, McCort coach Tim Koshute put in 6-2 senior Keith Varrato and he, along with the 6-3 Gresik, helped the Crushers open up.

The board strength of Varrato and Gresik got Mc-Cort's running game click-

ing and by the intermission Glendale, which didn't help itself any with six-for-26 shooting in the first half, watched as the Crushers cruised out to a 36-17 lead.

The third period was more of the same and with a 61-27 lead going into the final frame, Koshute began clear-

ing his bench.
"We had to score to stay
with them," Terza said,
looking back, "but our cold shooting took that away.

"I think the kids were tight, knowing they were little Glendale playing a big-name team like Bishop Mc-Cort. And that overtime loss to Northern Cambria last week (in the Mo Valley League playoffs) was an emotional drain on us, too."

But as Terza pointed out, the Vikes' 15-10 final record was still the second best mark in Glendale's basket-

ball history.

"I'd like to thank my seniors for what they've done this year," Terza said. "They worked very hard, the proof is in the pudding.

Seniors playing in their final game for the Vikes were Bill Vigne, Matt Blaschak, Randy Miller, Bill Tiesi and Anthony Tiesi. A sixth senior, Anthony Boito, sat out most of the

season with an injury.
Vigne, who didn't start, was the only Vike to score in double figures with 12

points, while McCort's top guns were Dan Pavlick with 21 points, Varrato with 14, Gresik and Mike Burgo with 12 points apiece and David Solomon with 10.

Gresik pulled down 12 re-bounds, Varrato nine and Glendale's Steve Turchick

grabbed 15.

McCort now moves into the Class A quarterfinals against Homer-Center, which beat Conemaugh Valley 69-62 last night. In the other Class A contest, United dumped Clay-Kimmel 66-50.

In Class AA prelims, Central Cambria beat Lock Haven 79-55, Penn Cambria topped Penns Valley 73-68 and Westmont-Hilltop erased Huntingdon 67-63.
