Tide Trims Vikes in MVL Opener

By DAN DUKE Progress Sports Writer CURWENSVILLE — The Curwensville Area High School basketball team took a triumphant first stride last night in its march to Moshannon Valley League championship contention by beating Glendale 57-44.

The Golden Tide made it look easy by virtue of its superior height, controlling the boards and often limiting the smaller Vikings to one shot.

When the Vikings tried to shoot from inside, they were often blocked by Tide center Rich McKnight or forwards Bruce Shaw and Greg Bakaysa. By the end of the game, the Vikings were looping their shots with an arc that belied their fear of getting snuffed.

Forced to do most of its shooting from the perimeter, Glendale could not get the hot hands needed to stay close to the Tide.

Glendale mentor Tom Terza said the loss was due to "a combination of our lack of height and experience."

These two problems were worsened by the fact that their big man. 5-11 Bill Noel, was injured in Glendale's opener last week, a 78-33 loss to Williamsburg.

Noel was also one of Terza's two returning letterman. The other, Ron Jasper, was strapped with four fouls in the first quarter, saw no action in the second and fouled out in the fourth after netting eight points in the second half.

Jasper's absence forced Terza to change his plans to minimize Curwensville's height advantage, he said.

"We were hoping to use the full-court press," he said. "We wanted to make them play all over the court. But Jasper got in foul trouble and that changed our plans."

Glendale was down only 14-8 at the end of a sloppy first quarter. But when Jasper was taken out, along with much of Glendale's speed, the Vikings gave up the press and the Tide increased its lead to 29-16 at the half. "At the beginning of the game we had some first-game -of-theseason jitters," said Tide coach Dick McKnight. "Once they got those jitters out of their systems, they did a pretty good job."

Curwensville played agressive

defense that forced turnovers and limited Glendale to eight points a quarter in the first half, while offensively the Golden Tide moved the ball inside for easy shots that boosted its shooting percentage to 40 percent in the half.

The outgunned Vikings drew to within six points near the end of the third period. But the Tide's reserves had played most of that time.

It took McKnight, Shaw and company a while to stop the growing Glendale momentum. The Vikings were pressing full court again with the return of Jasper and they were running plays, setting up shots and hitting. That period was the only one in which Glendale outscored Curwensville, 13-7.

The rebounding power of the fresh Curwensville starters eventually wore down Glendale, which fell farther and farther behind as the final period progressed.

"One of the good points of our team is that we have a bench," said coach McKnight. "It was a total team effort."

"The replacements had an effect," _ admitted Terza. "They

kind of wore us down toward the end."

The Tide's Shaw added five points in the final period to bring his game-high total to 17, while Rich McKnight went four-for-five from the field to finish with 16 tallies.
