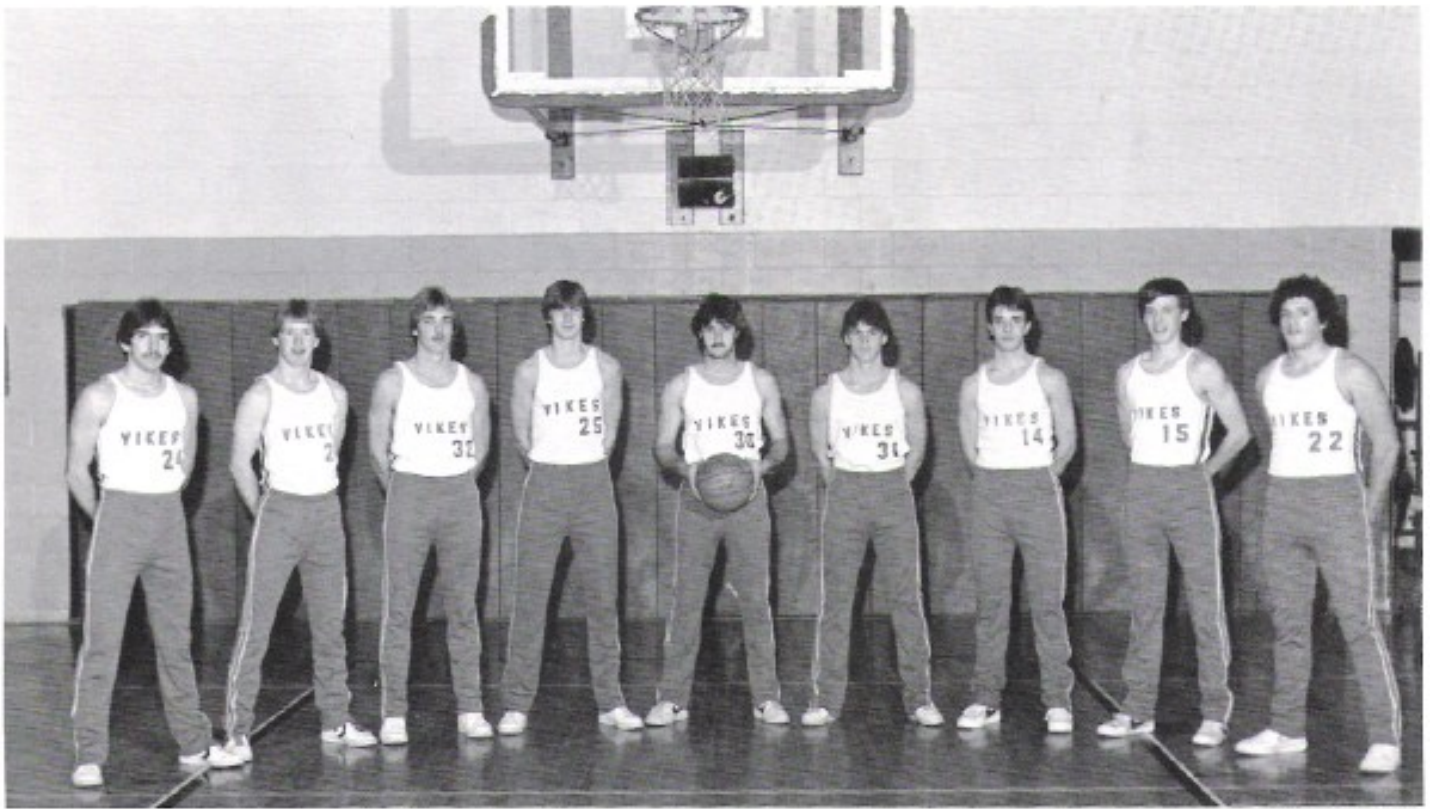

# Size, Experience Key To Glendale's Fortunes

FLINTON — Size and experience, along with five returning lettermen, figure to bolster the Glendale Area High School basketball team's chances of bettering last season's disappointing 3-20 record.

Returning lettermen for coach Tom Terza's team include seniors 5-9 Dave Lloyd, 5-11 Bill Noel, 6-1 Rick Holes and 5-9 Dan Kutch. Junior Tom Murray, a 5-10 forward, is the lone underclassmen among the returnees.

"The five lettermen will start," said Terza, who is in his sixth year at the helm of the Glendale basketball program. "All five of those players had varsity experience at one time or another last season. (Senior) Jeff Noel will be the first guy of the bench for us this year."

Bill Noel is the top returning scorer from last year's squad, having netted 159 points in 23 games. Lloyd, the fourth-leading scorer last year, scored 106 points, while Holes netted 60, Kutch 44 and Murray 10.

Gone from last year's squad are the Vikings two leading scorers — Bill Jones and Ron Jasper — who both graduated. Jones scored 276 points a year ago and had a 12.0 average per game, while Jasper added 255 points and an 11.5 average.

"We are going into this season with more size and experience than we had last year," Terza said. "We should be able to be a little more consistent offensively with our experience at the forward position."

"We'll be lacking in depth until some of our younger people gain the necessary experience."

Terza said he has been very pleased with his team's performance so far in pre-season drills. The Vikings will open up their season Tuesday, hosting Curwensville in a Moshannon Valley League game.

Terza said Curwensville could well be the team to beat in the MVL this season.

"I think Curwensville will be very tough in the league," he added. "They have a lot of size and a lot of experience. Harmony and DuBois Central should be all right, too, because they have a lot of key people coming back."

Assisting Terza with the varsity squad this season will be Ron Lynch.

# November 30, 1983: Curwensville 37 at Glendale 33

FLINTON — The Curwensville Golden Tide used a tenacious 1-3-1 zone defense to offset a poor shooting performance in downing the Glendale Vikings 37-33 last night in the Moshannon Valley League opener for both schoolboy basketball teams.

The Tide, debuting under new head coach Gary Orwig, shot only 26 percent from the floor, while the Vikings managed little better at 28 percent.

Senior Rich McKnight grabbed 14 rebounds and netted 15 points, including five buckets on offensive rebounds, to pace Curwensville.

"They played great defense, but it was the offensive rebounds that got us in the end," said Glendale coach Tom Terza, who saw his team

dominate the middle quarters to take a 26-25 lead into the last eight minutes.

But the Tide surged ahead 31-26 midway through the fourth quarter as Greg Bakaysa hit a 15-foot jumper and McKnight converted two rebounds into four easy points.

With 2:43 remaining in the game, McKnight was fouled after muscling in a short hoop and he hit the free throw to stake the Tide to a 34-28 lead.

Viking guard Tom Murray sank a free throw and a 17-foot jump shot to bring Glendale within striking range and Dave Lloyd's layup with nine seconds remaining closed the gap to two points.

But Tim Opaliski netted both ends of a one-and-one to seal the coffin with two seconds left.

"I told the kids we had to win on

the road, and we did it," Orwig said. "Everyone contributed and our big men did a terrific job."

Orwig also said he was pleased with his squad's performance, although he looks for better shot selection and foul shooting when the Tide takes on Philipsburg-Osceola Tuesday.

Curwensville shot 58 percent (11-for-19) from the charity stripe, while Glendale had only three foul shots, making one.

Terza said he was "real pleased" with the Vikings showing, although he expressed disappointment in "our horrendous outside shooting," which he attributed to first-game jitters.

"Our defense in the first quarter was the finest I've ever seen," said Orwig, referring to a flurry of forced turnovers and blocked shots that enabled the Tide to grab an 8-2 advantage.

Eric Flanagan hit a hort jumper at 6:15 of the opening period and Dan Stricek followed with a basket underneath and two free throws for an early 6-0 Curwensville lead.

Glendale finally broke the ice with a minute remaining when Rick Holes, who led the Vikings with 14 points, grabbed one of his game-high 25 rebounds and layed it in.

"We had stage-fright in the first quarter," Terza said, adding that "both teams were playing tight. We were just playing catch on the perimeter — we weren't looking to drive."

Glendale, behind Rich Laing's 10 points, won the junior varsity game 40-37 in another barn burner. Darren Anderson led the Tide with 21

BARNESBORO — The Glendale High School basketball team played three good quarters of roundball last night, but eventually succumbed to a taller Northern Cambria squad, 58-46, in a non-league fray.

A combination of poor shooting, costly turnovers and a lack of rebounding in the fourth quarter led to the Vikings' downfall.

Glendale shot a miserable 5-for-20 from the field, only 25 percent, in the final stanza, but the hosts poured in 22 points, as leading Colt scorer Mark Kelley hit eight of his 19 tallies.

The Colts outrebounded the Vikings 38-25 in the contest.

FLINTON — Sparked by Brad Timko's 21 points and Jim Stodart's 19, the Moshannon Valley High School basketball team upended Glendale 57-47 last night for its fourth consecutive Moshannon Valley League victory.

# Vikings Survive Slowdown by Warriors 31-28

ALLPORT — Tom Terza knew it was coming. Any team that plays West Branch in basketball these days, kind of expects it.

"It's almost like you're playing to lose, and not to win," explained the Glendale coach last night, following the Vikings 31-28 Moshannon Valley League victory over the Warriors. "I think it's tougher to play against a slowdown offense, than say, a run-and-gun team. It's very frustrating to play against."

"Instead of the kids making those nice crisp passes they normally make, they start to think about them and start throwing the ball all over the place," he said. "It affects your offense and defense and the kids have a tendency to lose their reaction time."

The Vikings did just that in the fourth quarter, when they were outscored 16-11, and nearly ended up falling into the Warriors' trap.

"If you widen the gap, then they have to come out on you and play basketball," Terza said. "If not, they stick with it. After playing a passive zone all game, West Branch got right up in our faces at the end. That's very tough to adjust to."

"We've been pretty

consistent playing defense this year, but we haven't been that consistent offensively," he said. "That's what happened at the end. We missed about four one-on-one situations."

The slowdown offense, which hasn't resulted in any Warrior victories so far this season, didn't work very well in the first half, but was fairly effective the final 16 minutes. Solarczyk explained his motive.

"We wanted to spread out our offense and get the easy layups," said Solarczyk, whose team fell to 1-12 overall and 0-4 in the loop. "We weren't really holding the ball. The shots were there, but they weren't falling in the first half."

"Other teams don't like to play us. It's no fun for them," he said. "It wasn't an all-out stall. We were just looking for the good shot. We like to put pressure on the other team, and make them play our game."

Glendale took advantage of nine Warrior turnovers in the first quarter to snare a 10-1 lead.

The Vikings controlled the tempo for most of the second period, and found time to score eight points. West Branch, which had just one field goal in the first half, scored seven points. Glendale led 18-8 at the half.

"We were a little out of character," Solarczyk said. "The kids were rattled. We figure that if we're down 10 at half, we

can score four or five points in the third quarter and we will be right back in it."

In the third quarter, West Branch held the ball for nearly six minutes, and was able to score four points. Glendale's offense, meanwhile, sputtered, but the visitors still were clinging to a 20-12 lead after three quarters.

The Vikings scored the six of the first eight points in the fourth quarter, at which point, Solarczyk had to change his strategy.

"We were down by more than 10, so I had to change some things," he said. "Midway through the fourth quarter, our kids finally started to take the ball to the basket like they should have in the first three quarters."

West Branch got to within 30-28 with 14 seconds to play in the game. Forced to foul, the Warriors hacked Tom Murray, who hit the front end of a two-shot foul to ice the victory.

"He misses that foul shot and we go down and score, it goes into overtime," Solarczyk said.

It didn't happen, but Solarczyk said once his kids start to believe in the slowdown offense, they'll be all right.

"We need to a win to boost the kids' confidence," he said. "It will work, but I think we can be more effective than we have been. It sure beats those 80-39 and 80-40 games. They aren't any fun at all."

"We tried to play run-and-gun for the first seven games and it didn't work. We were giving up something like 66 points and only averaging 37. At least this style keeps us in the ball game. We could be down six or seven points and still come back and win it."

# Golden Tide Nudges Vikings 43-41

CURWENSVILLE —

Despite playing with only three-and-a-half parts of its regular lineup, Curwensville Area High School's basketball team — thanks to a hot hand at the foul line — still managed to fend off Glendale 43-41 last night to clinch at least a tie for second place in the Moshannon Valley League.

"But our guys off the bench showed a lot of guts," he added. "They helped out a lot tonight, plus they showed us that we will be able to use them in key situations later in the season."

## Black Knights Edge Past Vikings 43-41 on Ballarotto's Clutch Shot

**AMESVILLE** — Moshannon Valley High School basketball coach John Lazor half expected that his Black Knights would be in for a tough time from Glendale in last night's Moshannon Valley League semifinal playoff game, even though the Knights brought an 18-4 record into the fray, while the Vikings came in 7-15.

Mo Valley, which held small leads throughout most of the contest, needed Vince Ballarotto's 12-foot jumper with three seconds left for a 43-41 squeaker and a ticket to the league championship game.

"I was concerned about the ball game and tried to impress upon the kids my concern in practice last night," Lazor admitted after the game. "I told them I hoped they weren't looking ahead. Now, I think they probably were looking ahead.

"The biggest thing is we learned a valuable lesson in that if you take anyone for granted, especially Glendale, you can get beat."

If it wasn't for Jim Stodart's shooting in the first quarter, Mo Valley might not have been in the position to win with a last-second shot.

The 6-3 senior guard tossed in eight of the Knights' 12 points and added two more buckets in the second stanza to help his team to a 24-20 halftime lead.

"Jim deserves a lot of credit for keeping us in the game in the first half," Lazor said. "I don't know where we would be without his shooting all year."

The Vikings forged their first tie with 4:21 left in the third quarter on a layup by Bill Noel and grabbed their first lead a minute and a half later on a jumper by Tom Murray.

The Knights had opened in a 2-3 zone defense, but the Vikings had success in shooting over it. When Lazor switched to man-to-man, Murray began a hot streak, burning Ballarotto for eight of his 15 points in a four-minute span in the third and fourth quarters.

After Murray gave Glendale what would be its last lead of the night on a jumper with seven minutes left, Lazor put defensive standout Chris Switala on Murray, ending the Vikes' rampage.

On the offensive end, Switala netted a

pair of clutch free throws with 37 seconds left to provide the Knights with a 41-38 lead, but Dan Kutch connected on a jumper for the Vikes nine seconds later and Murray hit the second of two foul shots with 12 seconds left to knot the score.

Mo Valley called time out to set up a play. The Vikes, however, triple-teamed Stodart on the right wing and he had to kick the ball out front to Ballarotto with the clock winding down.

The senior point-guard took a couple of dribbles into the lane, leaped and launched a rainbow that banged the glass and dropped cleanly through the rim.

"That was just the way the coaching staff diagrammed the play," Lazor laughed. "Vince has been our key man as far as getting the clutch shot. This is the third game he's won for us with a last-second shot. He has been in the right place at the right time."

The key to the Knights' play in the fourth quarter was 6-5 center Brad Timko, who grabbed eight of his game-high nine rebounds in the final stanza, helping Mo Valley to a 29-20 edge in that department (Switala hauled in eight).

"Timko, Switala and (Chris) Syktich have given us the rebounding all year, said Lazor. "They'll mix it up with anybody."

As it turned out, the Knights won the game at the foul line, where they canned nine of 14 shots, while the Vikes, who shot 46 percent from the field, managed just five of 15 from the charity stripe.

"Glendale played an all-around good game," Lazor remarked. "Tom (Terza) had them well-prepared. They were patient and selective in their shots.

"But all year, anytime our kids faced adversity, they've done what they had to do.

"Put it this way, it wasn't pretty, but it was a win."

Tomorrow, the Knights will try to finish their MVL season without a defeat when they host Curwensville at 7 p.m.
