Comets Too Much for Vikings

FLINTON — When the opposition puts on a dunking show in the pregame shootaround, and the lob pass is an integral part of the offense, it often means that tough times are ahead for the opposition.

Nonetheless, the Glendale Vikings made the most of a tough situation in dropping a 72-54 decision to Penns Manor last night.

The Comets of coach Tony Delfonso blasted into the Vikings' gym last night with plenty of fast, large horses. With both size and speed, Penns Manor quickly built a 21-5, first-quarter lead, as every Viking shot was taken with the tentative feel of someone who has been intimidated.

The Comets showed that they had depth as well as talent by inserting the second five at the beginning of the second period, with the subs playing even basketball with the Vikings.

Penns Manor showed quality basketball in both full and half-court modes, and held a 38-16 halftime bulge when George Oakes drilled a three-pointer to finish the half.

Those Viking fans who expected a duplication of last week's Bellwood rollover were happily proven wrong.

"We decided during halftime that we were going to be aggressive, play good defense, and see what happens," commented Glendale coach Mike Strasser.

What happened was a different Viking team on the hardwood for the second half. Scott Sedei opened the third quarter with a jumper, and converted a steal into two points seconds later.

Even as the Comets started working the lob pass to 6-foot-5 Chris Zayachak, the Vikings were not impressed. The Blue and Gold kept on fighting, and often it seemed that the Viking quintet was playing like eight men.

Bill Norvell nailed a three, John Ninosky netted a baseline jumper, and Sedei scooped in a layup to bring the Vikings back to 48-37 with two minutes in the period.

The margin was 54-41 at the end of the quarter, and it was definitely a different Glendale team that was fighting for respectability.

The Vikings continued to play quality basketball as the game wound down. But 13 proved to be unlucky for Glendale, as they got as close as that amount a few more times, but could never break the barrier.

Penns Manor always seemed to have someone to answer Glendale's rallies with a basket, one of the marks of a team that has district and interdistrict playoffs on its mind.

Some Viking errors widened the Penns Manor lead at the end of the game, but the fact the Vikings stood there and slugged it out with a bigger and better opponent was not lost on Coach Strasser.

"We definitely were in awe of them the first half," offered Strasser, "but we didn't throw in the towel like we did against Bellwood. We came back and played evenly with them. We don't like to lose, but we're definitely happy with the effort we had tonight."

The Vikings have the holidays off, with a January 5, Moshannon Valley League clash with Curwensville in the cards.

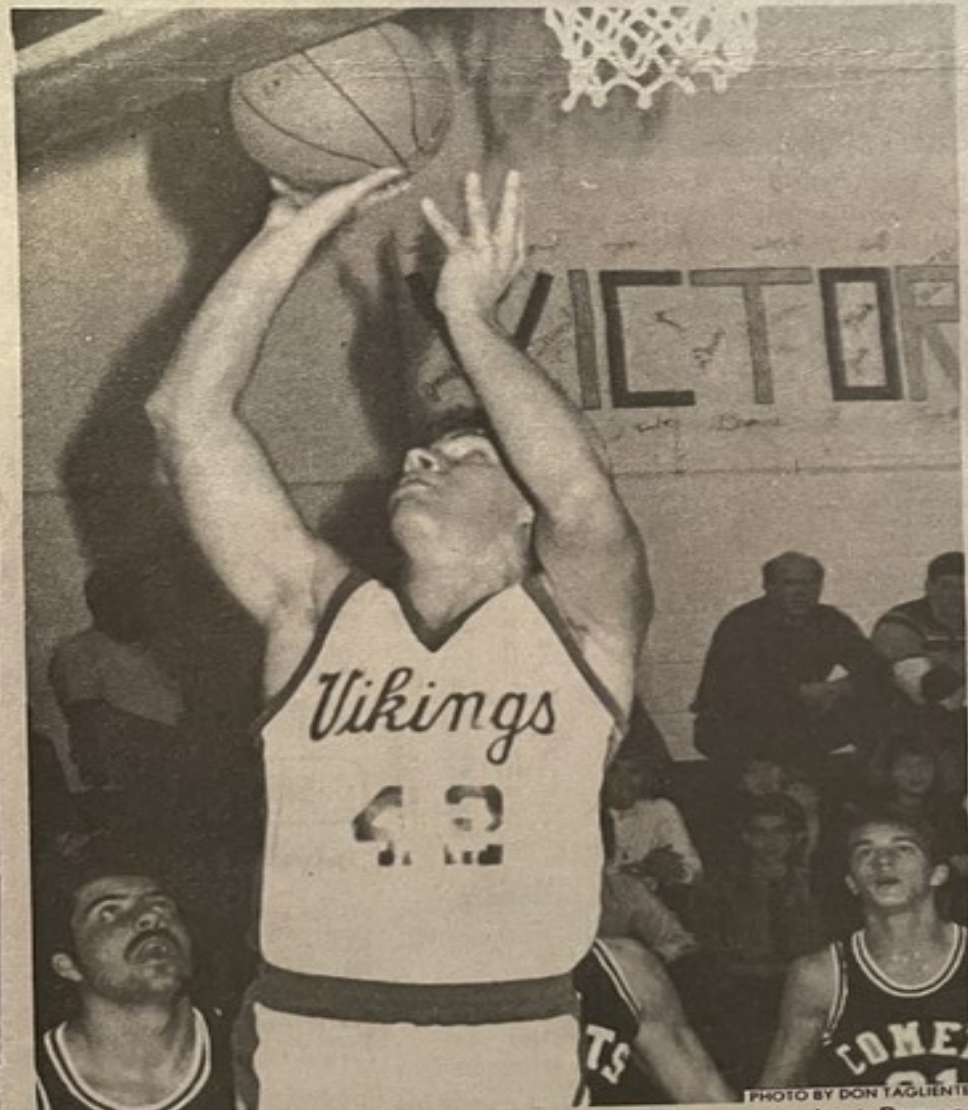

Tide Wins Mo Valley Opener With Win Over Vikes

CURWENSVILLE — It was a game and gutsy effort by a short-handed team on the road, but Curwensville held off Glendale 69-62 last night in a Moshannon Valley League matchup.

The Vikings were forced to play without leading scorer Scott Sedel who was out with the flu. And another starter, Frank Hutton, also battling the flu, played but did not start.

Two starters, Mike Jasper and Drew Hutton were forced to play in the junior varsity game for Glendale to field a team.

Curwensville controlled much of the game, building a 10-point lead late in the second quarter, and a 17-point bulge just before the end of the third, but both times Glendale clawed back into it.

In the end though, the Golden Tide had enough offensive firepower to answer Glendale's persistence and jumped their record to 9-1. Glendale fell to 3-3 with the loss.

Curwensville Coach Vic Gearhart was less than happy despite the win. "We just can't come out lethargic like we have been. We think people are going to roll over for us and they won't."

Mike Strasser, Glendale's head man, despite the loss, was happy with his team's effort in a difficult situation. "Overall, I'm happy with our performance. We knew Curwensville would be a difficult test for us. We didn't know how we would play."

Eric Addleman gave Glendale problems all night on the offensive boards and his three-point play after an offensive rebound gave Curwensville a 17-13 lead with :51 to play in the first quarter.

Addleman repeated his three-point effort off an offensive board at 4:28 of the second frame to give the Tide a 28-19 lead. "Ad-

dleman was crashing that weak side," Strasser said. "It was a good job on his part."

Addleman finished with 13 points and added a three point shot as well to show his versatility.

The Tide opened up a 10 point lead at 2:37 of the second on yet another offensive rebound, this one coming from Jeff Long to make it 30-20.

But Glendale refused to wilt, and went into the locker room trailing only 30-26 when Phil Stemple converted the layup on a pretty behind-the-back bounce pass from Tom Terza with :47 remaining.

The Vikings got as close as 30-28 at the start of the third when Stemple scored 20 seconds into the quarter after twice grabbing his own miss. But that would be as close as the Vikings would get.

Glendale kept it close, but after Stemple picked up his fourth foul at 4:26 and had to sit down, things began to unravel for the Vikings. Jasper canned a leaner at 3:57 to make it 39-36, but then the Tide cut loose on a 15-1 run.

Tom Baughman scored three layups following steals in the third frame, two which he made himself, the third coming during the 15-1 burst. Jim Fleming capped the Tide spurt with a three-point play with only :05 in the third to put the Tide on top 54-37.

But again Glendale refused to die, and Terza canned a three point shot just beating the third-quarter buzzer.

Glendale would get as close as 62-58 when Terza got a layup on a double-team steal with Mike Jasper at 2:57, and then 62-59 when Stemple hit the first of a one-and-one with 2:24 to play.

But Fleming made a big three-point play when Curwensville broke the press to make it 69-59 with only :59 left. The Vikings were forced to shoot three-pointers and foul, and Jasper's trey with :22 to play to put the

score at 69-62 just wasn't enough. "I think Phil Stemple did a heck of job making his shots and getting the ball to the corners," Strasser said. "When he went out, that hurt us." Stemple finished with a game-high 18 points and had 10 rebounds, eight off the offensive glass.

"We didn't handle the press and I'm dissatisfied with that," Gearhart said, of the Vikings defense that got them back in the game in the fourth quarter. "It's frustrating right now, because you know what they're capable of," Gearhart added of his team.

The Tide got double-figure scoring from four players. Shane Pentz quietly had another solid all-around game to lead his team with 18. Fleming added 13, as did Baughman, and Erik Elenky had 11.

"That's two games in a row that Fleming has come off the bench and made some big buckets for us. We're not getting consistency from anyone else," Gearhart said.

Jasper, who scored 26 in the junior varsity game, had 15 for Glendale and was a key in the fourth quarter Viking press. Terza had a dozen points and Ninosky added 11.

Curwensville is 1-0 in the Mo Valley League, while the Vikings go to 1-1.

Glendale won the junior varsity game 39-34. Tom Greslick had 16 points for Curwensville.

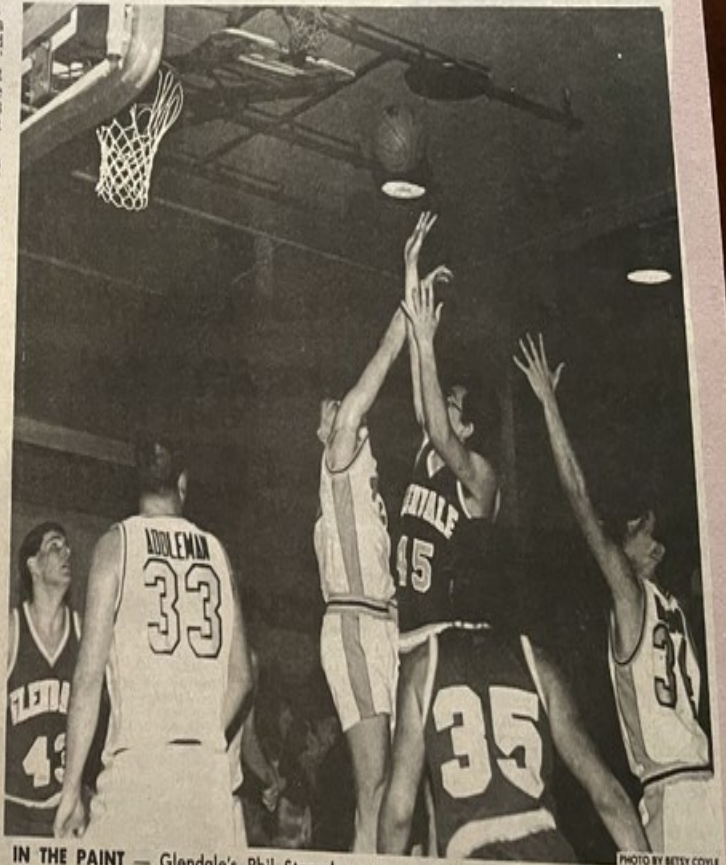

Southern Huntingdon boys didn't lose Saturday night's Juniata Valley League tilt with visiting Glendale because they faltered at the end. The Rockets did their stumbling right at the outset and came up on the short end of an 83-58 decision.

The loss is the 10th in as many starts this season for the Rockets, who have dropped 28 in a row since winning the 1987-88 season opener. They are now 0-4 in JVL play. The Vikings raised their season mark to 5-4 and evened their JVL log at 3-3.

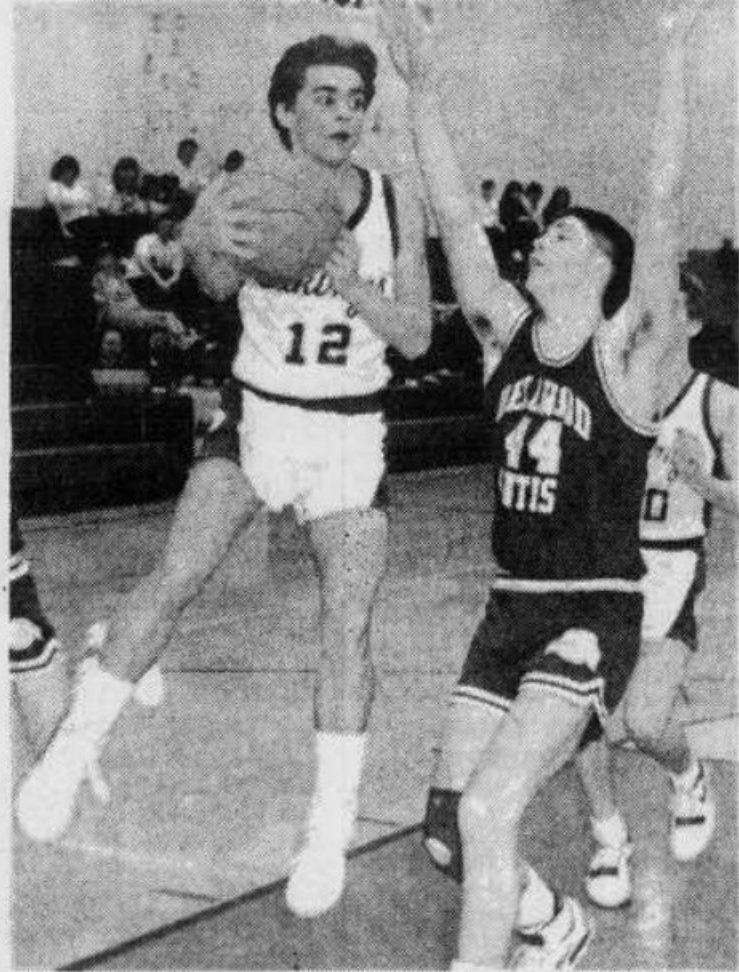
