



December 26, 1989: Claysburg 55 vs Glendale 63 (West Branch Tourn.)

By Pete Sloan Progress Sports Editor ALLPORT-One game was closer than the score indicated, and the other wasn't nearly as

tight as the final appeared.
Glendale cruised in its 63-55
win over Claysburg-Kimmel while Moshannon Valley struggled in taking a 65-49 win over West Branch in the opening round of the West Branch Tournament

Tuesday night.

Mo Valley and Glendale will now meet in the championship game Thursday night at 8 p.m. The consolation game between Claysburg and West Branch will start at 6:30 the same evening.

Defense was the key for Coach Mike Strasser's Vikings as a strong press enabled the Vikes to open up a 14-2 advantage en route to a 20-6 lead over the Bulldogs after the first quarter.

Junior guard Mike Jasper led the assault, applying fullcourt pressure which led to numerous C-K turnovers.

Jasper paced a balanced Glendale arsenal with six points in the first stanza as five Vikings broke into the scoring column.

Strasser, whose team improved to 3-2, said the first-quarter effort by Glendale was probably the best of the season.

"I think the first quarter was as good as we've ever played," Strasser commented. "We just got some shots to start falling and jumped out to that hig lead."

Claysburg showed signs of coming to life in the second period. After Glendale upped its lead to 26-6 the Bulldogs, behind Jeff Helsel, reeled off 10 straight points to pull within 26-16 at the 3:05 mark.

"Overall we played well but we've got to eliminate those lapses. We were up 26-6 in the second quarter and we got a little complacent, stopped moving our feet, going over backs," Strasser commented.

One aspect of the Viking performance which pleased Strasser was a solid effort from the young cagers off his bench, including Nick Ninosky, Steve Wagner and

Rob Burmeister.

"I was really happy we played eight guys tonight. We've been wanting to develop a bench and some kids took some positive steps in that direction for us tonight," Strasser commented. Jasper led all scorers with 20

points while Sedei gunned in 19. Matt Langham paced C-K with 15 lightings while Helsel added 14.

But Jasper took control once again, canning a layup and two jumpers, including a three pointer, to put Glendale up 33-18 at the intermission.

The all-around play of the Vikings' junior playmaker was a key all night, but especially when try-

ing to break the Bulldogs' press.

'Mike is basically a human press breaker. Once we get the ball into his hands we're in pretty good shape," the Viking mentor commented.

Strasser's troops were never really challenged again after that point, thanks in part to a solid third-quarter effort from senior Scott Sedei.

Sedei, working both inside and outside in the Glendale offense, buried nine points in the third stanza as the Vikes maintained

their lead.

Desperation time set in for the Bulldogs as they buried four trifectas in the final minutes, but it was too-little too-late as the Vikings advanced to the title

Despite the win, Strasser stressed the fact that Glendale must overcome lapses in its play, such as the one in the second period that let Claysburg back in the game.

Sedei Sparks Glendale Title Win Over Knights

Scott Sedei gunned in 17 points to lead a balanced Glendale effort in a 52-40 win over Moshan-non Valley in the title game of the

West Branch Tournament

Thursday night.

With the victory Coach Mike Strasser's Viking cagers im-proved to 4-2 and proved that they are a force to be reckoned

with as 1990 approaches.
"We're ecstatic. We're happy.
We won something. We took a

first place in something. Hopefully we can use this as a springboard for the rest of the season." Strasser said.

Sedei's versatility to work of-fensively on both the inside and outside plus his work ethic not only won him the Tournament Most Valuable Player Award but also

earned Strasser's praise.
"I thought he played a heck of a game. They (Mo Valley) were geared to stop him the whole time, both nights as a matter of fact. He really responded and I think he really deserved that most valuable player," Strasser said.

Keying the win over Mo Valley for the Vikes was a tough zone defense which forced the Knights to shoot from the perimeter, something they found difficult on

the night.
"I think that was a factor. They (Mo Valley) had some trouble from the outside. I think it was because we played some good defense," Strasser said.

"We kept good pressure on their outside shooters and I thought we did a good job on

The first quarter was nip-and-tuck most of the way. Mo Valley pulled out to a 10-7 advantage midway through the opening period and led 14-12 late.

But Glendale playmaker Mike Jasper banked in a three pointer at the buzzer to give the Vikings a 15-14 edge after the first eight minutes.

Glendale sported a balanced offense in the opening stanza with four players scoring, but John Gallagher and Jay Aber-nathy did most of the Knight work with six points apiece.

to open up the tight contest in the second quarter. Mo Valley could manage only free throws from Bryan Ronan and Chris Stumpf and fell behind 21-16 halfway through the quarter.

Frank Hutton pumped in two late hoops as Strasser's cagers upped their lead to 27-20 at the intermission.

Strasser said the early advantage was important to Glendale's confidence in the title game.

"We came out and we started out well. That was our goal. We didn't want to let Mo Valley get

any momentum on us," Strasser said.

Neither team could mount much of an offensive charge in the third quarter, but Glendale still stretched its lead to 35-26 entering the final eight minutes

of play. As if things weren't bad enough for the Knights already, foul pro-blems began to set in. Abernathy picked up his fifth foul just 14 seconds in to the final stanza, forcing Knight coach Bob Sinclair to go to the bench.

Shades of Dean Smith and North Carolina set in after the Vikings had built a 40-30 advan tage with 5:23 left when Glendale went in to the four corners of fense.

Strasser said that despite the fact his cagers were running a stall offense they were still supposed to be aggressive and look for the basket.

"We figured that they would go into the trap. We just went in to the four corners and told the kids to look for a layup and we got a couple. We were looking for a shot," Strasser commented.

The Glendale tactic suffered what could have been a killing blow when trigger man Jasper was forced out of the game with an injury, but sophomore Steve Wagner came in and contributed solid ball-handling and six late charity tosses to seal the win.

"I was talking at the end of the last game about not being able to afford to lose Mike but I think we took a step in the right direction tonight," Strasser commented. "Wagner came in and did a

nice job. He was at the line when we needed it and he came through. He did a great job for

Providing support for Glendale in back of Sedel were Jasper and

Behind Sedei, the Vikes started Frank Hutton with 10 points apiece.

Mo Valley spent most of the game in gimmick zone defenses, but Strasser said he was pleased with the way his Vikings method-ically ran their offense against the zone and the balance the final scoring sheet showed ..

"We wanted to be patient, that was the bottom line. We kept it a low-scoring game. We really didn't want to get in to a race-horse type thing with them," Strasser noted.

"Yesterday in practice we worked almost entirely on triangle and two and box and one. We felt that's what they would throw at us and I thought that the kids responded well. We felt it wasn't going to be the kids who were played man to man who were going to be the difference. It was going to be the other kids and they came through."

Mo Valley, which falls to 3-3, was paced by Gallagher with 15 and Abernathy with 10.

Sedei, Jasper, Hutton, Gallagher and Abernathy were all named to the All-Tournament



January 4, 1990: Curwensville 81 at Glendale 53

FLINTON-Erik Elensky
didn't like the way things were going for Curwensville, so he just

took over.

The Curwensville senior guard scored a school-record 19 points in the third quarter to wake up the slumbering Tide (6-2) and spur it on to an 81-53 win over Glendale (4-3). Flat as a pancake in the first half, Curwensville

outscored the Vikes 48-16 after halftime to wipe out a game first-half effort by Glendale that kept the Vikings ahead of the heavily favored Tide into the

third quarter.

Glendale, now 1-1 in the Moshannon Valley League, keen-ly felt the loss of point guard Mike Jasper who is out with an injured ankle, but overcame the adversity with a near-perfect first half. Once Curwensville

woke up, it swept away the Vikings and their fragile confidence with its smooth and powerful

game.
"I told the kids that the clock struck 12 and the glass slipper fell off," quipped Glendale coach Mike Strasser, "Once Curwens-ville came back and took the lead, our kids just fell apart. I told them we'd have trouble com-

ing back on Curwens-ville—they're good enough to have won 22 games last year."

"I didn't have any words of wisdom," said Curwensville coach Vic Gearhart about the Tide's second-half comeback, "They knew what they did wrong; it was just a lack of effort in the first half—Glendale came after us and we just stood around. I asked them to concentrate in the second half."

Glendale had little trouble penetrating the Tide zone in the first half, but after intermission Curwensville "flattened the zone," according to Gearhart, and the results were dramatically different. Curwensville forced seven turnovers in the crucial third period, converting them into six fast break baskets, five by Elensky. Elensky added a three-pointer from the top of the key at the end of the period for his 19th point, breaking coach Gearhart's school record of 18.

The Tide defense shut off Scott Sedei's inside moves that had hurt them before intermission by pushing its zone back toward the baseline. Glendale also suffered the loss of Frank Hutton (on the bench with foul trouble), who had bulled his way to 12 first-half points on inside hustle off the

Curwensville continued to cruise in the last quarter, adding a 16-point run after a 28-8 third period to go up 77-47 before both teams cleared their benches.

'We cut down on our turnovers and hustled more in the second

half," explained Gearhart, "We seem to play to the level of the competition—we have to start playing well all the time."

Glendale came out smoking at

the start of the game, outhustling the Golden Tide for a 10-2 lead and a 22-14 first-quarter edge.
While the Vikes were hitting
from all over, Curwensville
missed its first ten shots, and only the Tide press kept Glendale from running away with the game.

Sedei weaved his way inside for 15 to go along with Hutton's 12 and Steve Wagner's eight to pace Glendale to its 37-33 halftime

"Steve (Wagner) played exceptionally well," said Strasser, "he's a shooter. We really missed Mike Jasper, though, he's our quarterback-he runs the show, and we can't replace him.'

Jasper, who hurt his ankle in the West Branch Tournament last week, is expected back in a few weeks.

Elensky scored 31 to lead the Tide, while Addleman added 19 and Shane Pentz scored 13.

Curwensville took the junior varsity game, 54-41, behind Lynn Chelgren's 11, with Wagner scor-ing 16 and Nick Ninosky 11 for Glendale.
