## Mounties pull off emotional 74-68 win over Glendale

PHILIPSBURG - John Sypa was grinning ear to ear. His body, all 6-3 and . . . well, 200 pounds plus, was surging with adrenalin. The Philipsburg-Osceola senior was gushing with emotion.

"I think it's great to bring the winning back to P-O," Sypa exclaimed.

The reason for Sypa's joy was that the usually downtrodden Mounties had just executed on the bigger wins in the program's history. The Mounties pulled off a come-from-behind season opening 74-68 victory over Moshannon Valley League favorite last night at a very loud P-O gymnasium.

P-O, facing a team with 6-6 Steve Sinclair and 6-5 Ryan Andrews, had stayed close the whole game - Glendale's biggest lead was 8 – but it didn't have the lead until Rob Ferguson knocked down a three-pointer with 2:50 left in the game.

Ferguson came up big down the stretch, scoring 12 of his 26 points in the final 2:50. The P-O junior was 7-of-9 from the free throw line in that time and 14 of 18 in a very physical game where Steve Sinclair and Sypa were in foul trouble the whole game. Sinclair fouled out with 6:55 left in the thriller. Andrews scored only two of his 12 points in the second half.

"That's a big win for these guys," P-O coach Dave Gregor said in a jubilant locker room. "You're dealing with supposedly a contender for the Moshannon Valley League and we knocked them off. Everything I wanted from them, they gave me tonight."

After Todd Smith drained

both of his free throws at the 3:36 mark to tie the game at 59-59, Ferguson hit the trey, pumping his fist in the air as a large student contingent erupted with glee.

A Jason Hammerle score brought the Vikings to within one, 62-61, Ferguson connected on one of his two free throws to go up by one, but Shawn Wagner, who led all scorers with 27 points, canned a long jumper to tie the game again.

But Ferguson came through again as he scored on a drive to the hoop and was fouled in the process. He sunk the free throw and P-O had a 66-63 lead. Shortly following that, the Vikings were in a good news-bad news situation when the Mounties missed three from the charity stripe, but they lost Wagner when he fouled out with 1:01 left.

The Mounties, however, increased their lead to 6, 69-63 as Todd Smith sunk a free throw and Sam Shingledecker scored from the floor. A Hammerle putback with 17 seconds left made the score 69-65. After a Vikes timeout, Ferguson drained two free throws and Hammerle knocked down a trey with 8 seconds left.

Glendale coach Mike Strasser received a technical foul with 5 seconds left after arguing with the official, who said an inbounded P-O pass under the Glendale basket had deflected off a Glendale player instead of the Mounties who the ball was intended for.

"From what I saw and from what our boy said, he knocked the ball off the other kid's leg," Strasser said. "All I said was he (the official) took the game away from us."

Ferguson hit both technical

foul free throws and one of two on a separate foul to close the scoring.

"Robbie stepped up at the end and hit all his foul shots, Sypa said. "I know it's tough, I've been in that position, been under pressure. He did the job nicely."

"I was worried when they took the lead it would give them the momentum they needed," Strasser said. "And it did. They were able to go to the line and hit their shots."

The Mounties were able to keep the game close with their "motion" defense, which puts severe pressure on the guards and forces turnovers. They were able to force 30 turnovers and a number of jump balls as Gregor substituted freely.

The game was tied 17-17 after the first quarter and the Vik-ings took a 39-35 lead into the locker room at halftime. P-O was staying close even though Sypa was seeing lot of bench time. Eric Patrick, a 6-0 sophomore, played admirably as a substitute for Sypa.

"When I sit on the bench, I feel confident," said Sypa, whose voice thundered after a couple of his scores. "My team can definitely take over for me. They're great players and great guys."

The second half was a pressure packed one with the fans getting into it and the players diving on the court and pounding each other. It increased as the game to a climax.

"This is much better than last year," Gregor said. "I hope it continues. I have to get the maniacs up in the crowd going. We get a couple more games like this, maybe they'll get rockin'."

### December 13, 1993: Harmony 62 at Glendale 56

FLINTON - Good things come in small packages, just ask the Harmony boys' basketball team.

With only two players on the entire roster over six feet tall. the Owls defeated a Glendale team which started three players over 6-0 last night at Glendale High School 62-56.

"It was a big game for us," Harmony head coach Terry Kruise said. "We knew what we were up against coming in here and we knew what we were going to try to do. We didn't know it would work as well as it did."

Harmony's game plan was to put a lot of pressure on the ball, deny the ball getting inside to Glendale's big men, and get weak side help. Passing grades all around.

"I thought Harmony outhustled us and outplayed us," Viking head coach Mike Strasser said. "They came in here and they wanted it more than we did.'

Glendale, 0-2, scored the first four points of the game before Harmony senior Rich Rowles nailed a jumper from eight feet at the 5:28 mark. Rowles led all scorers with 31 points on the game, the second time in his career he has been over the 30point mark.

"Rich Rowles is offense," Kruise said. "I don't give him a lot of credit all of the time like maybe we should because we do have a lot of other good guys.

He is a great team basketball player."

Every time Rowles touched the ball, it meant trouble for the Vikings. His penetration into the lane caused Glendale problems all night.

"Rich Rowles is a great player and did a great job to-night," Strasser said. "We allowed way too much penetration with him and once he got it into the key he made things happen. He either pulled up and shot it, went the whole way to the hole and laid it in, or found the open man."

After the Vikings opened the game with a 4-0 run, the Owls outscored Glendale 10-4 to end the quarter leading 10-9.

"I thought early on we could have put them away," Strasser said. "We had opportunities. We jumped up 4-0, we had a couple of lay ups we missed. It away, but it never material-ized."

Glendale retook the lead with 6:28 to go in the second quarter when Matt Lieb sank two free throws. Harmony's Arden Fry hit the first of two free throws to tie the score at 22 with 3:03 remaining. The teams'went back and forth for the last three minutes before the Owls were able to take a 26-25 lead into the locker room.

Harmony took its biggest lead of the contest, 44-40, at the end of the third quarter to set up an exciting fourth quarter.

With 7:05 left in the game, Rowles stole a pass and went the distance for a lay up to give Harmony a 48-40 lead. But, the Vikes wouldn't die.

Glendale cut it to 53-51 after Ryan Andrews hit a short jumper in the lane. Andrews and teammate Steve Sinclair led the Vikes with 19 points on the evening.

Two free throws by Rowles gave the Owls a four-point lead with 2:25 remaining. Sinclair answered with a lay up. The teams traded free throws until Harmony's defense forced a turnover.

"The kids did a great job with the defense for just learning it," Kruise said. "We just started working on that defense and I'm real happy with it, and I think they're confident now with it too.

With 41 seconds to go, Andrews hit the second of two free throws to draw his team closer at 59-56. Rowles sealed the deal by stealing an inbounds pass and going to the line and hitting both shots to give the Vikings the win and a 2-0 record in the Moshannon Valley League.

"We're not real confident as far as the league goes because I've heard about the way Curwensville's been playing and I know what Mo Valley did to us," Kruise said. "Like I said, I think it's going to be an exciting year in the league.'

Glendale captured the jayvee contest 41-33 behind Jason Hammerle's 14. Bob Jones led the Owls with 15 points.

FLINTON - In sports there is an old joke about going to a fight and having a hockey game break out.

Last night, fans who attended Glendale/Bellwood- Antis the boys basketball game showed up hoping to see a basketball game, but ....

Unfortunately, lost in the whole incident was the fact that it was a competitive game that the Blue Devils won 56-54 and that Glendale junior Steve Sinclair reached the 1,000 career point plateau.

But, first about the incidents. With 3:18 remaining in the first half, Bellwood's Pete Stetter kicked the Vikings' Sinclair after a Paul McClellan foul shot which resulted in an intentional foul for Stetter.

Then, Stetter out-did himself. As the third quarter ended, he exectued a body slam that Hulk Hogan would have been proud of on Jim McCulley, who was driving into the lane. Intentional foul number two plus a technical foul on Bellwood head coach Gene Yingling.

"The intentional foul in the first half was uncalled for, completely uncalled for," Yingling said. "The one after the third quarter was just frustration from the play before when we got the ball inside to Pete and Sinclair was all over him and nothing was called."

Ironically, Sinclair ended up fouling out with 4:23 remaining in the game while Stetter played the entire game and helped his team to the victory with 12 points.

"Was that physical or what?," Glendale head coach Mike Strasser said. "What's sticking in my craw right now is that they have a player who gets two intentional fouls, who kicks a player, who bodyslams a player and he remains in the game. I don't understand that and I never will.

"Whenever you kick someone ... I watched the Steelers on Saturday and a player (D.J. Johnson) kicked someone and he was ejected. In the meantime, we're playing physical with the basketball and we have our power player on the bench with like five minutes left in the game fouled out."

Glendale (4-5, 0-3 JVL) led 52-49 when Sinclair fouled out, marking the turning point in the game.

Bellwood's Justin McCall, the man Sinclair fouled, hit on the first of two free throws to cut the lead to two. Then the most popular man in Glendale, Stetter, laid one in to tie things up at 52 with 3:55 remaining.

Out of a timeout two minutes later, the Devils' Chris Walker got the steal and converted a layup on the other end to give Bellwood (5-3, 3-1 JVL) a lead it would never relinquish.

# Sinclair reaches 1,000 point milestone

FLINTON – History was made in last night's Glendale boys' basketball game against Bellwood-Antis as junior center Steve Sinclair became the school's fourth 1,000 point career scorer.

The milestone came with 3:01 remaining in the second quarter as Sinclair took a pass from Ryan Andrews and drained a 12-foot jumper from the right side of the key, giving him 1,001 career points.

"There was some pressure, I guess," the soft-spoken Sinclair said. "I just wanted to get it, I didn't care what type of shot.


He finished the game with 15 points, all of which came in the first half.

The journey to 1,000 began Dec. 9, 1991 at Northern Cambria in which Sinclair scored 14. Fifty-six games later, he finds himself in the Glendale record books.

"When he came up as a freshman, we knew he was go-

## Saltsburg ousts cold shooting Glendale, 48-36

PURCHASE LINE – A little over a week ago, the Glendale boys' basketball team scored 86 points in a win over Williamsburg.

Saltsburg coach Stan Pizer was at that game and was concerned by Glendale's offense heading into Saturday's District 6 Class A playoff game between the two teams at Purchase Line High School.

He didn't need to worry.

Poor shooting and turnovers doomed the Vikings to a 48-36 loss to Saltsburg and an early exit from the playoffs.

"We couldn't throw our hat in the ocean."

Strasser said the Vikings may have been nervous in what was the first district playoff game for many of the players.

"We sort of stood around and waited for things to happen instead of making things happen," he said.

Strasser said he thought his defense played well enough for Glendale to win the game if the offense had been up to par.

The teams played nearly even in a fast-paced first half, with Saltsburg taking a 20-16 lead behind Ted McKnight's 14 first-half points.

But Glendale didn't score in the third quarter until 1:40 was left, Saltsburg had jumped out to 28-16 lead by that time.

The Vikings pulled within 30-24 on a Shawn Wagner trey with 7:32 left in the fourth quarter, but never got any closer than that.

Trojans big man Ted McKnight led all scorers with Ted 18 points. Chad Whitesel chipped in with 12 for Saltsburg.

"He's been our go to guy pret-ty much all year," Pizer said of McKnight.

The 6-3 McKnight and 6-5 Matt Fennell helped Saltsburg contain Glendale big man Steve Sinclair. The 6-6 Sinclair had a team-high 15 points for the Vikings, 6 points below his average.

Wagner had 9 points, all in the second half, and Ryan Andrews had 7 points, all in the first half, for Glendale.

Pizer said he decided to key on Sinclair after scouting Glendale and talking to some other coaches.

"Give our big guys credit. They did a pretty good job on him. He's a pretty good player."

Strasser said it was a disappointing way to end what overall was a good season.

"We lost nine games by less than 8 points, and three over-time games," he said. "We were in just about every game but a couple. We couldn't make the big play when we had to. I think there's a lot of positive things that happened this year."

He noted that Glendale will return four players next season who saw significant action this year, including Sinclair.
