## With a year under his belt, Terza expects Vikes to make positive strides

FLINTON - It's been a rocky road the past two seasons for the Glendale High School basketball team.

The Vikings have gone 5-42 the past two years including a 1-23 record in 1998-99. However, despite the recent troubles, second-year head coach Tom Terza feels that his team can really make positive strides this season.

"I inherited the program right before basketball season started last year," said Terza. "I didn't get a chance to work with them in the offseason before last season began. Any more, in any program you look at, it's a year-round thing. There really isn't any 'end of the season.

"We've had a really good bunch of kids that have put in a lot of time over the offseason. We played in a tournament last spring, we went to camp together this summer, we played in a summer league and we even played in a fall league over in Altoona. We've put our time in to get better, so I think that we are going to see dividends."

Glendale welcomes back seven letterwinners to this year's team. Senior Brent Matish, the team's top scorer from last season, returns, but will probably be out of action for awhile.

The 5-10 Matish, a Progressland Honorable Mention Selection as a junior, suffered a fractured ankle in the second day of practice and could possibly be out of action until early January. Matish's 18 threepointers last season were third on the team behind graduates Mike Hoey and Jim Dick.

"Brent is not only a leader on the court, but also off it," said Terza. "I think with his injury,

it's going to force some of our underclassmen to assert themselves right now. We have a really good core group of juniors. They're not going to have to wait to make an impact in Brent's absence.

"Even though Brent's hurt, he's still been a factor. He's been coming to practice and he's still vocal. That will definitely help for when he gets

One of those juniors that will most likely make an immediate impact is 5-8 guard Adam Beers. Terza said that Beers will run the point for the Vikings while Matish is out. Beers

tallied 3.3 points per game in 19 contests last season.

"Adam is cat quick," said Terza. "We'll be looking for him to make things happen."

Terza noted that juniors Brian Dubler (3.6) and Kyle Dague (2.4) are expected to see time in the front court along with 6-4 senior Phil Ricketts (4.0). Junior Brad Harrison (0.8) and senior Nathan Garman (4.3) will see time with Beers and Matish in the backcourt.

"Kyle and Brian have put in a whole lot of time in the offseason to improve their game," said Terza. "Brad is our quarterback in football.

## Black Knights topple Vikes in consolation game, 57-34

AMESVILLE - Moshannon Valley High School boys' basketball coach John Lazor knew that his Black Knights were better than how they played in their 57-37 loss to Cambria Heights Friday evening in the first round of the Moshannon Valley Booster Tip-Off Tournament.

Mo Valley proved its head coach right with a strong 57-34 triumph over Mo Valley League rival Glendale in the tournament consolation game Satur-day evening at Monte Close

Gymnasium.

"We didn't play a terrific game ... we played a decent game," said Lazor. "We have to keep on working hard. We just have some lax spells at times, but it's early in the season. We have a lot of inexperience out there and there are guys feeling their way through right now. We're pleased with the win." "We turned the ball over too many times to be in contention to win the game," said Viking head coach Tom Terza. "There were a few times that (Mo Valley) pressured the ball out of bounds. We made a few bad decisions.

"I think we shot poorly also," added Terza. "If a few more shots from the outside would have gone down, I think it might have been a little closer."

The Knights had three players in double figures led by sophomore Lance Thompson with 11. Brandon Stodart and all-tournament selection Ryan Hawkins added 10 each.

"We had a well-balanced scoring attack," said Lazor. "You can't complain about that."

Mo Valley controlled the boards in the contest swiping 38 caroms to 21 for Glendale. Five Knights had at least five rebounds in the contest. Hawkins had 10 followed by eight from Stodart, six from Tom Wulderk and five each from Thompson and Jeremy Alleman.

"I knew after watching them against Cambria Heights that they were bigger and more physical than we were," said Terza. "I knew that controlling the boards was going to be a key factor and it definitely was. There were several times where they got three or four shots. Any time you allow that, you're going to be in trouble."

Kyle Dague had a strong game for the Vikings with 10 points and nine rebounds. Brian Dubler, who added four points in the contest, was named to the all-tournament team. Dubler tallied 13 points for Glendale in its opening round loss to Philipsburg-Osceola.

Stodart and Dague each scored four points for their respective squads as the first quarter ended tied at six.

Dubler hit a jumper in the opening seconds of the second quarter to give the Vikings their only lead of the game at 8-6. 
