The Warriors fell to 1-4 overall, 0-2 in the MVL and 0-3 in the JVL.

The Vikings played without the services of Phil Moore due to illness. Chris Swauger suffered an ankle injury midway through the first half and missed the remainder of the game. Swauger was taken to Tyrone Hospital for X-rays.

"Playing without Phil tonight, the win was a total team effort," said Terza.

Glendale took a seven-point lead into the fourth quarter, but thanks to some pinpoint three-point shooting from Allen Pryde, Brian Lee and Chase Cowder, West Branch was able to tie the game at 54 with 4:07 to play.

The Vikings were 14-of-17 from the line in the fourth quarter. Beers accounted for 10 of the 14 points from the line out of 11 attempts in the final stanza. Beers paced Glendale in the second half with 21 of his 27 points.

"(Beers) did a nice job for them," said West Branch head coach Jeff Bair. "He stepped up and controlled the ball. They had the lead and they were going to do all they could to keep it."

"We had to put them on the line (in the fourth)," said Bair. "They were going to hold the ball forever if we didn't."

West Branch opened up the game with a 7-0 run, but Glendale battled back to tie the game at 13. The Warriors led 19-18 at the end of one.

AMESVILLE — With his team down by a point, 57-56, to Glendale in the last minute of the fourth quarter on Friday night, Moshannon Valley guard Lance Thompson wanted to make a big play either on offense or defense.

He ended up making a big play on both sides of the Monte Close Gymnasium court — in the span of about five seconds.

The pesky 5-foot-8 junior stole the inbounds pass and dropped in the layup with 25 seconds remaining, giving the Black Knights the lead for the first time since the first quarter. Glendale's Phil Moore missed a three-point shot at the buzzer and the Knights pulled off a 58-37 victory.

"Our kids have been real resilient all year — even in the games that we've lost," said Mo Valley coach Darin Ricciotti, whose team is now 2-5 overall. "We've been down by big margins and we've cut them, but we just haven't been able to put it over the top. Finally tonight, they made some plays. It's real exciting for the kids because they worked extremely hard for this."

What made Mo Valley's win so amazing is the Vikings (2-4) had a 10-point lead, 54-44, with about four minutes left in the game.

"When we were faced with all that pressure at the very end of the game, we just crumbled," Glendale coach Tom Terza said. "Our inexperience showed. I'm disappointed because we made some real poor judgements in the fourth quarter. Instead of protecting our lead, we were forcing shots and doing things we shouldn't have been doing at that time of the game."

"We were down," Thompson

said, "but we knew we could come back if we just worked hard at it."

After a score by Tom Wulderk, Thompson, who had 17 points, stole the inbounds pass and scored as he was fouled with 2:55 left. He drained the free throw to make the score 54-49.

Thompson knocked down a trey with 2:14 left to make it a two-point game. Glendale's Shawn Krestar, who matched the 18 points by Mo Valley's Rob Kitchen, scored to push the lead to four.

Wulderk then stole Glendale's inbounds pass and scored on a layup with 1:43 left to make the score 56-54. A Wulderk foul sent Krestar to the foul line with 55 seconds left. Krestar drained the first one, but missed the second.

Kitchen's short jumper with 34 seconds left drew the Knights to within one. Thompson's pickoff and layup caused the Mo Valley fans to erupt with glee.

"Lance is a pretty tough-minded kid," Ricciotti said. "We wanted him to deny. We knew that he could do that right out of the inbounds. He did an excellent job of that tonight. He did an excellent job of finishing after he got the ball."

Krestar, who hit five three-pointers and seemed to be open all night, bombed away again with about 10 seconds left and missed. Matt Belella and Moore battled for the rebound and Moore was fouled with five seconds left.

The Vikes got the ball out of bounds. Moore, who scored 15 points off the bench, grabbed the pass and heaved a three-pointer. The ball bounced off the rim and the Knights celebrated.

Before Thompson's winning hoop, the Knights had last held the lead with about three minutes left in the first quarter. The Vikings would go on a 16-5 run

late in the first quarter and into the second quarter to take a 29-18 lead.

But the Knights would charge back, going on a 7-2 run to end the first half. Kitchen and Wulderk were keeping the Knights in the game in both halves with their work on the boards. Both finished with 11 rebounds.

"Kitchen and Wulderk were a force in the second half," Terza said. "They were picking up everything inside and they were hard to stop. We didn't stop them, and that's why we lost."

A sloppy third quarter gave way to the furious fourth quarter in which the Knights scored 22 points. Krestar's three-pointer gave the Vikes a 54-44 lead. It didn't turn out to be an insurmountable lead.

Mo Valley also won the junior varsity game, 56-48, behind John Swistock's 23 points. Krestar poured in 13 points.

The Knights are back in action on Tuesday at home against West Branch. The Vikings travel to Penns Valley on Wednesday.

For Thompson, the win over Mo Valley's arch-rival was a much-needed one.

"It feels good, especially since it was only our second win," he said. "This is going to give us a real big boost for the next few games."

Moore pours in 39 to help Vikings stem Golden Tide

Glendale's Phil Moore had a career night against Curwensville in a Moshannon Valley League clash Wednesday evening at Curwensville's Patton Hall.

Moore poured in 39 points, including nine threes as the Vikings defeated the Golden Tide 81-69.

"Phil played a super game," said Viking head coach Tom Terza Jr. "We know he's capable of that because we see him do that every day in practice."

The Vikings led for almost the entire game. Glendale trailed 10-7 with 4:10 left in the opening quarter before a quick 8-0 run put the Vikings ahead, 15-10. They would never trail after that, but the Tide stayed close.

Curwensville trailed by six at halftime and by nine at the end of three. A 10-2 run at the start of the fourth cut the Glendale lead to one at 61-60 with 4:49 to play.

That's when Moore struck again.

Following a timeout, Moore, who had tallied 24 points through three quarters, buried three straight treys to extend the Viking lead to 70-60. He punctuated the run with a steal and dunk that sent the Glendale

faithful into a frenzy.

"Phil was just on fire in the first half," said Terza. "He cooled off a little in the third quarter, but he came back on towards the end of the game.

"It wasn't only him," Terza added. "There were a couple times when Curwensville was really threatening, that the other four, either Adam (Beers), Kyle (Dague), Brian (Dubler) or Bill (Peoples) stepped up with big buckets."

"Those threes by Phil, for all intents and purposes, put us out of it," said Fleming.

Glendale hit 7-of-10 from the line down the stretch to seal the win.

"We let them get too big of a lead and we had to expend too much energy trying to come back," said Fleming. "We need to get a lead and maintain it. We have the personnel to do it, it's just a matter of execution."

In addition to Moore's big night, Beers and Dague each hit double figures with 17 and 10 points, respectively. Dague also added eight rebounds to lead the Vikings.

Adam Donahue tallied a team-high 22 points for the Tide. Elliott Wagner added 17 points, seven rebounds and nine assists. Stu Michaels scored 16 points and pulled down seven boards.

Three players scored in double figures as Curwensville took the junior varsity game, 53-44. Jim Thompson scored 13 points and Travis McDonald and Mark Records each added 12. Scott Laing scored 14 points for the Vikings.

Both teams return to action Friday. Glendale hosts Claysburg-Kimmel, while Curwensville travels to Harmony.


