

Glendale hopes to make some noise in 2010-11

FLINTON — Is this the year the Harmony boys basketball team is knocked from its perch atop the Moshannon Valley League?

Whatever happens, it's safe to say Glendale will have something to say about it in 2010.

After going 13-10 overall and 6-2 in the league last year — with both MVL losses coming at the hands of the Owls — the Vikings return four of five starters, all of which are third-year starters, to form a group that may very well be even better than a season ago.

"Experience should be a strength. Absolutely," said Glendale head coach Rick Stackhouse, who's in his third year helming the team and is joined by first-year assistant Mark Yeckley.

"There are several letterwinners, and some have been there since sophomores, really, and have been in the system all the way since elementary. We're as solid experience-wise as we have been in a long time."

Leading that experience is returning first-team Progressland All-Star Tyler Jenny, a senior fourth-year starter. Jenny is the most versatile player in the area, and

could play any position on the floor without missing a beat.

In the Glendale system he plays the small forward role, as a strong ball-handler and tough rebounder capable of scoring from anywhere on the court. Jenny averaged 16.3 points-per game in 2009.

After Jenny, the rest of the squad will have to pick up the scoring slack left by the loss of leading scorer Brad O'Donnell, who was second in Progressland with 18.0 ppg.

But the team has the balance and the talent to redistribute those points after leading the area in scoring offense with 55.6 ppg.

"Yeah, we lose Brad's points," Stackhouse said, "but his points kind of got absorbed by everybody. Everyone is scoring four or six more. That's kind of taken care of itself.

"I still think (the main guy is) Tyler, first and foremost. But after that, I think you're right. It doesn't matter to me whose night it is. ... We have the potential to have five or six guys in double figures, really.

"That's important. I always think it's tough to play teams that are well-balanced."

An athletic trio of seniors will be looked to for more production this year, including forward Ethan Cree (8.9 ppg), who has the size to be strong on the boards and has shown the ability to hit long-range shots.

Two other upperclassmen form a quick pair of guards, as Lucas Westover and Ty Stackhouse will share ball-handling duties in the backcourt and can get to the hole in a hurry.

Those two also provide the engine to a high-pressure defensive scheme that often runs a full-court press and forces opposing teams into making mistakes.

"Our focus is on not turning over the ball and defense," coach Stackhouse said. "Team-wise, we're better defensively."

Potentially improving that defensive presence by providing length in the paint is the lone newcomer to the starting lineup, Michael Wigfield.

The 6-foot-4 junior saw a good deal of playing time last year and started on a couple of occa-

sions when filling in due to injury or suspension. Already Wigfield has gotten positive reviews from his head coach.

"He really impressed me over the summer," Stackhouse said. "He got a little bit stronger, but he got very much more aggressive offensively. At 6-4 with long arms, he takes up a lot of space."

While the top five offer some experience, the bench gives Glendale depth that Stackhouse hopes will bolster the team throughout the campaign.

"I think we'll have pretty good depth, too," he said. "There are a couple of kids I'm pretty satisfied with. That's one thing I like in practice already — our second team gives our first team (a push)."

Playing the role of sixth man will be sophomore Damon Braniff. Braniff got some limited court time last season, and showed good basketball sense, quickness on the ball and a shooting touch.

More opportunities could lead to a breakout season for a player who may be a dangerous weapon for the Vikings.

Also filling in at times will be

Kyle Wright, a 6-2 junior who provides more length and who also got praise from his coach.

"Kids develop at different speeds, and Kyle developed quite a bit this summer," Stackhouse said. "He did some pretty good things. He's 6-2, has long arms and sees the floor fairly well."

Patrick Hamilton, Chris Wilson and Billy Sanders, who Stackhouse said is "just better" heading into the season, will all be role players off the pine.

It all points to positive things after the team made the 2009 District 6 playoffs only to suffer a second-half collapse against Laurel Valley in the first round.

"We don't do a whole lot with goals, in a way," Stackhouse said. "I think this year is going to kind of be an every game kind of goal. The goal is to just go as far as you can go. ... The potential's there (to go far)."

I thought we played really well as a team (over the summer). Hopefully we can put it together. It's one thing to talk about it; it's another thing to do it."

Glendale opens its season on

Dec. 10 by traveling to Curwensville.

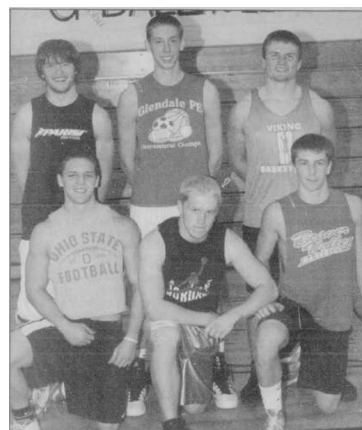

FLINTON — Monday night's Bellwood-Antis and Glendale boys basketball game pitted two teams that were among the premier squads in the Inter-County North Conference.

Both teams were sitting tied in the standings with one loss apiece.

But instead of being the competitive game everyone may have presumed, it turned into a stinker.

The Vikings routed the Blue Devils, 55-33, at the Glendale Junior-Senior High School.

"Their coach came over after the game and told us how hard we played tonight," Glendale coach Rick Stackhouse said. "It's true. It was a good team effort."

Glendale improved to 10-2 overall and 5-1 in the ICC. The Blue Devils fell to 10-3 overall and 4-2 in the ICC.

The Vikings held the Blue Devils to just a pair of field goals in the first quarter, until sophomore Noah Davis made a 3-pointer from beyond half-court just as the buzzer sounded to cut his team's deficit to four. The low-scoring first quarter by Bellwood-Antis was a combination of Glendale's strong defense as well as the Blue Devils just not being able to knock down a shot.

In the second quarter, Ethan Cree of Glendale scored eight of his 10 points in those eight minutes to give the Vikings a 25-18 lead going

into the half. Davis scored 10 of his team-high 14 points in the half to help keep the Blue Devils within striking distance.

"We couldn't put the ball into the hoop," Bellwood-Antis coach Brent Gerwert said. "We picked a bad night to have a poor shooting night. Noah kept us in the game."

Even though the Blue Devils struggled so much shooting the ball, it was just a seven-point deficit with a whole half left to play. Gerwert has a team that can score points in a hurry, so Stackhouse was not satisfied with their lead.

"I told the guys at halftime that it was still a game," Stackhouse said. "We had to have a good third quarter."

Stackhouse's team responded by forcing eight third-quarter turnovers and outscored the Blue Devils, 16-4. Lucas Westover scored

seven points, and Wigfield added six points in the decisive third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, the Vikings opened by going on a 10-3 run, along the way increasing their lead to 26 points (51-25) courtesy of a lay-up by Westover.

The Blue Devils and the Vikings will both be back in action Wednesday night, against Juniata Valley and West Branch, respectively.

"They'll be ready for us," Gerwert said of Juniata Valley.

BELLWOOD — "A tale of two halves."

There is perhaps no phrase in a basketball coach's vocabulary more overused — but too often no words describe a game better.

Such was the case on Tuesday night when the Bellwood-Antis boys hosted Glendale in an Inter-County Conference, North Division matchup.

Switching defenses helps Blue Jays knock out Vikings

EBENSBURG — If something doesn't work, fix it.

That's exactly what Conemaugh Valley boys basketball coach Jim Preuss did with his team's defense Friday night.

As a result, the eighth-seeded Blue Jays knocked off top-seeded Glendale, 51-46, in the District 6 Class A quarterfinals at Bishop Carroll High School.

"I'm crediting my kids," Preuss said. "We played defense when we needed to play defense. We wanted to keep the game under 50. That was the plan. We played tough defense. The credit goes to the kids. They hustled and played hard."

The Vikings opened the game with a hot hand, converting 9-of-13 shots — including 4-of-7 from behind the arc — on Conemaugh Valley's zone defense in the first quarter to build a 23-16 lead after one.

But Preuss switched to a man-to-man defense, and the Blue Jays clamped down.

Glendale (19-5) netted only nine

of its final 37 attempts for the rest of the contest.

"That's a tough team. You don't get to be No. 1 if you're not a good team," Preuss said. "They're a nice team, and they're well-coached. We just had a good night and that's the way it went."

But after the first quarter, things collectively went downhill for Glendale.

Part of the problem was rebounding. The other was foul trouble. And unfortunately for the Vikings, the two went hand-in-hand.

Conemaugh Valley (15-9) held a 38-29 edge on the glass after grabbing only two boards in the opening quarter.

Glendale's Ethan Cree sat most of the second quarter with his third foul, picked up his fourth early in the second half and fouled out with 2:50 left in the third quarter.

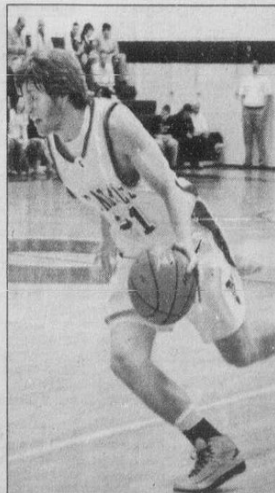

But it was obvious why Glendale coach Rick Stackhouse let the 6-2 senior forward play with four fouls.

"Cree's thing, first and foremost, is rebounding," Stackhouse

said. "He's big, physical. Of course, they were a little bigger than us."

"I think the first thing I wrote on the board [in the locker room] was exactly that — rebounding. With [Cree] out, we lost one of our three [leading rebounders]."

The Blue Jays mounted their comeback while Cree was out in the second quarter and took the lead on Hunter Furman's 3-point-er.

They quickly built a five-point lead after the break, but Tyler Jenny's 3 with 34 seconds left in the third, knotted things up, 36-36, with eight minutes to play.

Glendale's defense held, but a 3-for-13 effort in the third quarter was a tough pill to swallow for Stackhouse.

"That was kinda the black mark of the game — that third quarter and not getting the ball through the rim," he said. "It didn't happen. Our effort was there."

"We played good hard defense. It kept us in the game when our offense didn't."

2010-11 Progressland Boys Basketball All-Stars announced

Glendale's Tyler Jenny tabbed as Player of the Year; Vikings' coach Rick Stackhouse named Coach of the Year

The 2010-11 Progressland basketball season was filled with ups and downs.

While some teams had their most success in recent memory, others floundered through a year they'd just as soon forget.

Some took a step forward, others took a step back, while yet others continued to attempt to vault themselves over the hump.

With all playoff campaigns in the books — four area teams visited the postseason this year — it's now time to review the season and hand out postseason honors.

Glendale posted the most impressive campaign in Progressland, riding a tight-knit, veteran group to a 19-5 record, championships in both the Mosbannon Valley League and the Inter-County Conference North and a District 6 playoff berth.

It was the first MVL title in 28 years for the Vikings, who had also never been atop the ICC before.

Although things ended in disappointment, as Glendale was upset in the first round of the playoffs by Conemaugh Valley, there were many big moments on the way there.

After losing six of the last seven to Harmony — and all meetings since 2009 — and all the area's top hardwood rivalry, the Vikings swept the Owls.

They also avenged a nail-biting, early-season loss to Juniata Valley by knocking off the Hornets at their place in a critical ICC victory. And Glendale put together a 13-game winning streak to open 2011.

The area's best team was also its most balanced, but leading the way was senior Tyler Jenny.

At its most critical moments Glendale went to Jenny, and more often than not he answered the call. That ability has earned

Jenny the title of 2010-11 Progressland Player of the Year.

The Vikings finished as Progressland's top scoring offense (37.3 points per game) and defense (38.8 ppg), all with Rick Stackhouse at the helm.

The third-year head coach piloted a group of players he had coached since elementary school, and that unique bond helped him to earn 2010-11 Progressland Coach of the Year honors.

While Glendale was poised for a special season, Purchase Line posted the biggest turnaround. After being mired in losing

seasons as of late, the Red Dragons went from four wins a year ago to a 16-7 record and a D-6 playoff game this time around.

Head coach Brad Buterbaugh made a strong case for recognition as Coach of the Year, after helping his squad realize its potential in just his second year on the bench.

With his guidance, Purchase Line was one of the most fun teams to watch in Progressland, as their run-and-gun style led to the area's second-best offense at 55.2 ppg.

And what would a

Progressland basketball season be without Harmony?

Despite losing talent to graduation every year, the Owls put together yet another winning season, even if a 14-16 record and a runner-up spot in the MVL aren't quite what Harmony fans are used to after five straight league championships.

Continuing to fight on the court as head coach Terry Kruse battled with cancer off it, the Owls lost only two MVL games — both to Glendale — and defeated Portage in the first round of the D-6 playoffs before falling to Juniata Valley.

It's hard by graduation, Clearfield had one of the most athletic teams in the area — and one of the best defenses, allowing 49.9 ppg — but offensive struggles led to a 5-13 season.

Still, the Bisons traveled to the District 6 playoffs, where they fell in the opening round to St. Marys. It was also Clearfield's debut season in the Mountain League, where it went 4-12 and split the season series with Route 322 rival Philipsburg-Osceola.

P-O finished the year at 4-12, but that was still more wins than its last two seasons combined, as new head coach Dave McKnight began his work to turn the program around.

There were defensive struggles at times, but the Mounties were one of the best outside-shooting teams in Progressland, with 3.9 3-pointers per game.

West Branch had an up-and-down season with a number of close calls that prevented the Warriors from getting over the hump.

But a young team took its lumps and still clawed its way to a 7-15 campaign, a four-win improvement over the previous season, and with four of its five starters returning as seniors next year — and its top four scorers — West Branch could be setting the table for a Glendale-esque 2011-12.

Curwensville also posted a 7-15 record, winning four of its last five games to finish out the year on a positive note after a late football season may have contributed to a slow start on the court.

Inconsistency plagued the Golden Tide, but they did manage a sweep of West Branch, taking two very close halves, and were able to stabilize as the season wore on.

Both Mosbannon Valley (6-22) and Clearfield Alliance Christian School (9-17) were winless on the year, with the Black Knights dealing with low numbers and a

short bench from the start.

Head coach Aaron Mills, in his first year after sliding over from the girls team, put an extremely inexperienced group on the floor, often starting three freshmen.

Lingering injuries that cost junior guard Joel Martin almost half the season didn't help either.

The season saw two individuals reach the 1,000-point milestone, with Glendale's Jenny and Harmony's Erik Wetteroth getting there.

Coach of the Year: Rick Stackhouse, Glendale — Three years ago Stackhouse took the open coaching position at Glendale, largely because the core group there, going into its sophomore season, was a cadre of kids he'd coached since their first days on a basketball court.

This season he took that unit to the top of two conferences and 19 wins, pushing his record at Glendale to 45-35.

Castig an imposing, ever-present shadow on the sideline, Stackhouse is built like a man who would have been a line-backer in his heyday. His intensely matches the physique, and it all adds up to an intimidating figure.

But while it's easy to see how his on-court persona can fire up his team, away from live action Stackhouse comes across as a coach who cares deeply about his players, and his players immediately give him credit for guiding them in the direction of success.

Player of the Year: Tyler Jenny, Glendale — A microcosm of his team, Jenny was balanced, dangerous and effective.

No player in Progressland was more versatile, as the athletic wing was a threat out of the post, off the dribble or from long range, and was a skilled ball handler.

In fact, the 6-foot-2, mop-haired star is listed as a guard, but boasted the skill-set to legitimately play any of the five positions, from center to point guard. And as one of the area's best quarterbacks, he translated that athleticism to the hardwood with an explosive burst to the basket that was second to none.

Most importantly, Jenny was the ultimate team player. While he could have been posting astronomical numbers on a mediocre team, he was instead just posting very good ones on a very good team.

Jenny averaged 14.4 points per game (fourth in Progressland), 5.1 rebounds, 2.5 assists and 2.7 steals. He also hit more 3s than any other first-teamer, with 21.

He carried his team early in the season, putting up 19 points, seven rebounds and four steals against West Branch in the year's second game, and celebrated the Christmas holidays with three consecutive 21-point games in a week.

The senior added 15 points in each of two critical mid-season wins against ICC foes

Williamsburg and Mount Union. And even when he let his teammates do the heavy lifting, Jenny was still there to put on the finishing touches.

In the Jan. 25 victory over Harmony — perhaps the best boys game of the year — Jenny scored only eight points, but three of them came on a game-changing 3-pointer with 1:08 left that launched his side to a 48-43 victory.

Jenny also reached 1,000 points for his career early in the season. After falling a point shy against Juniata Valley on Dec. 16, he reached the milestone in the next game, taking on Curwensville on Dec. 20, when he had 21 points and eight boards.

Michael Wigfield — Wigfield was the odd man out this season, putting up 19 points, seven rebounds and four steals but he didn't seem to care.

In a starting lineup that featured four other seniors, Wigfield was the only underdog to pull on a Viking shirt as a regular starter. He also appeared to be the missing link.

The junior's emergence marked him as easily the most improved player in Progressland, and his offensive and defensive abilities completely changed his team's dynamic.

His 12.7 ppg average wasn't eye-popping, but was among the area's top 10, even as a first-year starter. And much like others garnering first-team recognition, Wigfield could do it all.

At 6-5 he was one of the tallest players around, but that didn't limit him to layups and put-backs.

Wigfield could certainly do those things — he averaged an area-tops 8.0 rpg — but he also scored from outside the arc 18 times and was comfortable penetrating defenses on the bounce.
