Glendale Suffers First Loss, Bows to Lilly, 19-6

COALPORT — George Klayko ran for more than 250 yards and scored all three touchdowns as Lilly-Washington High spoiled Glendale Area's first football game 19-6 here last Saturday afternoon.

This was Glendale's first game after becoming a jointure of BCI and Reade Township high schools, this school year.

Klayko practically ran over everybody as he scored on touchdown runs of 68, 38 and 15 yards for the Cambria Coun'y high school. The speeding left-halfback ran almost 90 per cent of the plays, as Lilly stuck to the ground, churning out 315 net rushing yardage while gaining nothing in the air in three tries.

Lilly posted a six-pointer in the first period after taking the opening kickoff. It took the visitors four plays to cover 80 yards, with Klayko running the final 68 yards for the score. Glendale threatened twice in the first-half traveling to the six and ten yard lines of Lilly before giving up the ball on downs, making the half-time score 6-0.

Glendale started the second half with Chuck Rydbom on the first play of scrimmage, racing 81 yards for a touchdown to even the contest. Runs by Roger Peacock of 38 and 30 yards set-up another Glendale threat but it was stopped at the ten, as the losers were then held at bay the rest of the game.

Lilly posed two touchdowns in the fourth quarter both by Klayko. Early in the last period

the winners started a drive on their own 29, and seven plays later Klayko ran 38 yards for the score. In this particular drive, Klayko accounted for all the yardage but ten. Lilly recovered a fumble after the kick-off on the G-37. This set the stage for Klayko's final scoring run of 15 yards. Peneck ran for the point after touchdown to end the winners' scoring.

September 17, 1965: Glendale 0 at West Branch 18

Warriors Top Glendale, 18-0, For First Win

PHILIPSBURG — Capitalizing on three breaks, West Branch Area's Warriors scored three touchdowns to blank Glendale, 18-0, at Philipsburg Memorial Stadium last night.

The Warriors took advantage of a blocked punt, an interception and Glendale's failure to move the sticks on a fourth and eight situation on their own 35, as they scored touchdowns in the first, second and fourth quarters. The victory evened the Warriors log at 1-1, while it was Glendale's second straight defeat.

West Branch took the ball on downs when Glendale failed to produce a first down on their own 35 in the first quarter. Jerry Liptak, in two carries, moved the ball to the one-yard line, where quarterback Don Folmar plunged over for the first score of the evening.

In the second quarter the Warriors' Roy Swansegar crashed through the Glendale line to block Roger Peacock's punt. Mike Tutokey recovered the stray ball on the Glendale 30 yard line and five plays later Liptak crossed the goal line from four yards out. The half-time score thus read 12-0.

With neither team able to produce a formidable scoring drive, the ball exchanged hands four times in the third quarter. Midway through the fourth period Folmar intercepted a Tony Pino pass on the Glendale 44. Folmar then went through the airways himself as he completed two passes, one to Dave Lutz for 13 yards, and another to Liptak that covered 30 yards for the last Warrior touchdown.

Liptak, who scored twice, ran 28 yards in 19 carries to lead the Warrior offense.

Glendale threatened only once in the contest as it traveled to the Warrior 14 in the last period. The losers advanced into West Branch territory only two other times.

September 25, 1965: Claysburg 12 at Glendale 6

IRVONA — Pass interceptions proved to be the downfall of the Glendale Vikings here Saturday afternoon in a 12-6 loss to Claysburg-Kimmel before a good-sized crowd at the Irvona gridiron.

The visiting Bulldogs scored their second touchdown of the game in the third period when Bob Taylor, a guard, intercepted a Viking aerial and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown.

Then late in the fourth period and trailing 12-6, the Vikings again went to the air in a bid for a touchdown and a pass interception stymied this effort at the Claysburg-Kimmel 14.

The Vikings' air attack did pay off for their only score of the game when Roger Peacock and Barrie Kutruff teamed for a 45-yard scoring play in the third quarter.

Earlier in the game, Chuck Rydbom and Lanny Frisco combined for a longer gaining play, but one that did not result in a touchdown. The Bulldogs took the opening kickoff to the Glendale 16 where the Vikings recovered a fumble. On the first play, Rydbom tossed a pass to Frisco who scampered to the Claysburg-Kimmel 20 before he was stopped. The play covered 64 yards, but the Vikings were unable to cross into paydirt.

Claysburg Is Winner Over Glendale, 12-6

A fumble set up the Bulldogs' first score. They had driven to the Glendale 31 where the Vikings held. Failing to generate a first down, the Vikings went into punt formation only to fumble with the Bulldogs recovering on the Viking 1. Phil Witherspoon, the workhorse for the Bulldogs, carried over for Claysburg-Kimmel's first score.

Witherspoon shouldered the brunt of the offensive chores for the visitors as he carried 17 times and gained 112 yards.

Rydbom's touchdown climaxed a 52 yard drive and came on the first play of the second quarter. Glendale recovered a Bucktail fumble on its own 45 and marched 55 yards in 17 plays for the second touchdown.

Glendale had another scoring opportunity in the second quarter when a poor Bucktail punt was downed on its own 13. The Vikings were unable to move the ball, however, and Bucktail took over on downs.

Barry Kutruff was the leading ground-gainer for the winners with a total of 66 yards while Rydbom contributed 48 and Cossick 45 yards to Glendale's net of 138 yards rushing.

The defeat was Bucktail Area's fourth of the season. Glendale is now 1-3 for the year.

A parade through Coalport preceded the game and Miss Gaye Shrock was crowned Football Queen at halftime. She was one of four candidates nominated for the title and was selected by a vote of the Glendale High School student body.

October 9, 1965: Juniata Valley 18 at Glendale 6

IRVONA — Juniata Valley packed too much offensive punch and stopped two of Glendale's three scoring threats to register an 18 to 6 victory over the Vikings in a game played on a wet field here Saturday. The loss was the fourth in five starts for Glendale.

With Mike Cook and Allen Scalia accounting for 93 and 55 yards respectively, Juniata Valley rolled up a net of 177 yards rushing and added 68 on passes in scoring its victory. The visitors picked up 13 first downs to six for Glendale.

Coach John Lloyd's Vikings relied mostly on an aerial game in an effort to score against the visitors. With Chuck Rydbom doing most of the passing, the Vikings completed six of 17 tries for 97 yards and a Tony Pino to Tom Cossick pass accounted for their lone touchdown.

A 55-yard march that started in the first quarter after taking a Glendale punt on its own 45 gave Juniata Valley the first score of the game, two plays after the second period started. End Phil Ieraci scored the TD from 23 yards out after taking a pass from Cook.

The second Juniata Valley score came after a 42 yard drive the next time the visitors had their hands on the ball. Allen Scalia scored from six yards out.

Glendale made its first serious threat in the third quarter by marching from its own 36 to the visitors' 21 before losing the ball on downs. Passes from Rydbom to Roger Peacock and Tom Cossick featured the drive.

Glendale Bows To Juniata Valley, 18-6

Juniata Valley came right back with a 79-yard drive that resulted in a touchdown in nine plays. Cook and Allen Scalia carried the ball most of the time on the march and Scalia went over from the 11-yard line.

Glendale's touchdown came in the fourth period after tackle Roy Peacock intercepted a Juniata Valley pass to give Glendale the ball on the visitors' 25. Rydbom passed 15 yards to Tony Pino for a first down on the 10 and two plays later Pino passed to Cossick for the score.

The Vikings threatened again in the fourth when Lou Nardelli recovered a Juniata Valley fumble on the Glendale 45. A 23-yard pass from Rydbom to Larry Frisco put the ball on the Juniata Valley six, but Glendale's attack stalled at that point and the visitors took over on downs.

Last Minute Pass Play Defeats Glendale, 14-7

81-Yard Play Gives Victory To Gallitzin

IRVONA — The visiting Gallitzin High School gridders connected for an 81-yard touchdown pass play with less than a minute of play remaining here Saturday afternoon to post a 14-7 victory over the Glendale Vikings.

The two teams had battled on even terms and Gallitzin was deep in its own territory with 50 seconds to play when Larry Yartin, who had a hand in all 14 of his team's points, passed to Durkay for the winning touchdown.

Earlier, Yartin passed 30 yards to Bryan Mazzocco for the game's first touchdown in the third period. Yartin ran for the first extra point and passed to Lacorata for the second extra point. The scoring play climaxed a 57-yard drive.

The Vikings, ending their home schedule for the 1965 season, sandwiched in its touchdown early in the fourth quarter on a 38-yard scoring march. Glendale stopped Gallitzin on the latter's 38 and after several plays, Chuck Rydbom, the workhorse in the Viking backfield, plowed into the end zone from two yards out. Of the 38 yards needed for the touchdown, Rydbom rushed for 33 of them. Tom Cossick completed the Vikings' scoring when he ran for the point.

Glendale generated the first scoring bid early in the game when the Vikings moved from their own 35 to the Gallitzin 32 mainly on the strength of passes to Lanny Frisco and Roger Peacock. This effort was stymied when Lacorata intercepted a pass for Gallitzin.

After taking over when Glendale was forced to punt, the visitors moved to the Viking 21 where Frisco returned the favor by intercepting a pass to stop the Glendale drive.

Thanks to two long runs by Yartin, Gallitzin molded another scoring bid before the half ended. The drive carried to the Glendale 15 where Roger Peacock recovered a fumble.

Despite the setback, Glendale had the game's leading individual rusher in Rydbom. In addition to his 33 yards gained on Glendale's only scoring effort, Rydbom picked up an additional 58 yards to give him 91 for the afternoon. Gallitzin's Alex Berardinelli was next with 88 yards.

The Vikings, with a 1-5 record, will start a three game away from home schedule this Saturday night at 8 o'clock when they battle Northern Bedford at Roaring Spring. Other away games remain with Williamsburg and Moshannon Valley.

The victory gives Gallitzin a log of two wins, one loss and two ties.

October 23, 1965: Glendale 6 at Northern Bedford 23

ROARING SPRING — Once-beaten Northern Bedford scored in every quarter here Saturday night as it posted its fifth victory of the season — a 33-6 conquest of the Glendale Vikings.

Northern Bedford, paced by Ralph Scott, used long gainers to score the victory. The shortest touchdown jaunt was for 13 yards and the longest was on an 80-yard pass play.

Glendale, trailing 26-0, got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter when Tony Pino slammed into the end zone from the one-yard line on a quarterback sneak. The Vikings marched 80

yards for the touchdown and Tom Cossick caught several passes to highlight the drive.

The winners opened the scoring in the first quarter when they engineered a 60-yard drive. Scott and Keith Van Horn shared the bulk of the offensive load during the drive with Scott going the last 13 yards.

In the second period, Glendale launched a drive only to be stymied by a fumble at the Northern Bedford 20. On the first play, Dick Miller passed to Van Horn in a play that covered 80 yards and was good for a touchdown. Van Horn also ran for the point giving Northern Bedford a 13-0 halftime lead.

Northern Bedford, after taking over on its own 43, needed six plays to move 57 yards into paydirt with Scott carrying the final 25. The winners added another six-pointer the next time they got possession. Harry Imler posted the touchdown on a 15-yard run with Scott running for the extra point.

North Bedford Has Too Much For Glendale

After the Vikings recorded their only touchdown, Northern Bedford's defense stiffened and stopped the next Viking drive at the Glendale 39. On the first play, Scott raced 61 yards for his third touchdown of the game. Dick Miller kicked for the extra point.

WILLIAMSBURG — The Blue Pirates of Williamsburg are big, strong and aggressive and they proved it last night by overpowering Glendale's Vikings, 72-0, in an awesome display of offensive power and defensive strength.

The Vikings did not play bad football; they were simply overpowered defensively and offensively. Williamsburg scored three times on passes and eight times on the ground, while the defensive unit intercepted five Viking aeriels to set up as many touchdowns and held Glendale to a net of one yard rushing and 40 yards passing.

Blue Pirate quarterback Ed Gunnnett teamed up with end Danny Irvin, halfback Ron Bookhammer and halfback Tom Ferringer for three of the scores, and ran for a touchdown himself. Bookhammer intercepted a Viking aerial which set up a score for teammate Dick Wilkinson, ran for three touchdowns and kicked three extra points.

In the second quarter, tackle Terry White intercepted two passes, one of which set up a score by fullback Bill Bertes for the Pirates. Also in the same quarter, Pirate Ken Aurandt intercepted a Viking aerial and ran 51 yards for a touchdown.

Mo Valley Rolls Over Glendale In Second Half

HOUTZDALE — The Black Knights of Moshannon Valley garnered their second victory of the season last night by rolling over Glendale's Vikings, 33-6, in their neighborhood scrap before a home crowd of about 2,000.

The two rivals battled on fairly even terms in the first half, which ended with Mo Valley in the lead, 13-6, but the Knights broke the game wide open in the third and fourth quarters by scoring 21 points while blanking the Vikings. The defeat ended Glendale's season and gave the Vikings a 1-8 record for the year while Moshannon Valley will close its season against West Branch at Philipsburg next Saturday night.

Jim Mihalko paced the scoring for Moshannon Valley with three touchdowns, one on a 60-yard run in the second quarter, and it was his third quarter romp of 22 yards that made the score 20-6 and put the game out of reach of the Vikings. Wayne

Morrone and Jim Steele tallied the other TDs for the winners while Barry Kutruff scored for Glendale.

The first touchdown of the game came on a 12-yard run around left end by Morrone after the Knights had moved 50 yards on the ground. Jim Mihalko plunged for the extra point which gave Mo Valley a 7 to 0 lead.

The Vikings retaliated in the second quarter when Barry Kutruff ran up the middle 6 yards for the score. The drive had started on the Viking 40 yard line, and Kutruff picked up 33 yards in the march. At one point in this drive the Vikings lost the ball on fourth down on the Mo Valley 15 but an unnecessary roughness penalty against the Knights gave the Vikings a first down on the Mo Valley 7, half the distance to the goal.

The longest run of the game came immediately after the Vikings scored when Mihalko, on the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, turned on the steam and romped around left end for a 60-yard touchdown run shaking off three Viking tacklers in the process, and giving the Black Knights a 13 to 6 lead at the half.

In the opening minutes of the fourth quarter, Mo Valley moved to the Viking 2-yard line only to be stopped by a stubborn Viking defensive wall. Minutes later, however, Mo Valley recovered a Viking fumble and drove 50 yards for their fourth touchdown of the game with Jim Mihalko going up the middle from 11 yards out and Jack Radomsky running right end for the extra point.

The Black Knights' final score occurred after another Viking fumble. Jim Steele ripped around right end for the tally after the Black Knights had moved from the Viking 36 yard line.

Moshannon Valley's offensive and defensive squads turned in their best performance of the season as they put on an excellent display of gang tackling and hard hitting.
