Bucktail's 4th Quarter Scores Beat Glendale

RENOVO — Bucktail Area High School scored two touchdowns in the last five minutes to ruin Glendale's opener, 21-13, here Saturday afternoon after the Vikings had dominated play for three quarters.

Glendale, which beat Bucktail (13-0) in 1965 for its last victory, drew first blood as Barry Kutruff bowled into the end zone from the six midway through the first period. Kutruff also plunged for the extra point.

Dick Hepner, the Railroaders' 6-1, 228-pound fullback, brought the hometown fans to their feet with a 26-yard jaunt in the second period, and Dave Klinger passed to Dave Kime for the PAT.

Viking signal-caller Jim Tiesi broke the 7-7 tie in the third stanza with an eight-yard excursion around end. The extra point try, a rush, failed.

The Glendale defense made the 13-7 edge hold up until late in the final stanza when Bucktail pushed across its second score. John Burnell went in from the one and Klinger arched the point-after pass to Jim Kanouff to put the Railroaders ahead.

Moments later Wes Burrows broke through to block a Viking punt and the ball rolled into the end zone, where Clate Stockman fell on it for a touchdown. Klinger this time ran for the PAT.

"We ran out of steam at the end of the game," Viking Coach John Lloyd said. "It was one of those things that happen when you can't substitute.

"Still, I was pleased with the boys' performance. It was the best exhibition of offensive football we've ever put on since I've been here."

Tiesi, a junior, Kutruff and tackle Dick Braniff were singled out by Lloyd for their fine play. Tiesi rolled out for 95

yards in 21 carries while Kutruff piled up 88 more in 23. Braniff was a stalwart up front both ways.

Glendale, which ran 25 plays to Bucktail's eight in the second period, missed a touchdown at the end of the half when the gun sounded with the Vikings on the five-yard line.

Chestnut Ridge Buries Glendale

FISHERTOWN — Chestnut Ridge High School's offense had the ball nine times and scored six touchdowns to thump Glendale, 49-7, here Saturday afternoon.

The Lions turned loose two sets of hard-running speedy backs who ripped through and around the Viking defense for 304 net yards on the ground.

A power sweep around the left end accounted for most of the yardage as the Vikings never did stop the Lions on that side. On the other side, Gary Frisco contained most of the rushes that came his way and also intercepted two passes to thwart Lion penetrations.

Quarterback Jim Tiesi was the only Viking who did anything against Chestnut Ridge's defense as he picked up 112 yards and scored the touchdown on a 49-yard jaunt.

The Lions, unbeaten in two outings, required only six plays to get into the scoring act after receiving the opening kickoff. Larry Ross churned around left end on a double reverse for a nine-yard touchdown run. Moments later, after stopping the Vikings near midfield, the Lions roared back downfield, Rose hitting up the middle from the seven for the score. Glenn Imler passed to Woody Will for the winners' only extra point.

A pair of long scoring plays in the second period gave Chestnut Ridge a 25-0 halftime bulge. Paul Hillegass squirmed free on an end sweep and rambled 41 yards, and Stan Mock passed to Will for a 35-yard payoff strike.

Chestnut Ridge converted Glendale's offensive mistakes into three six-pointers in the third stanza. Larry Benton dashed 31 yards, Gary Imler plunged in from the two after a fourth down punt attempt went awry

for the Vikings and Imler passed 31 yards to Jerry Saylor in the end zone after Jim Ridge recovered a Viking fumble.

Marlin Cathers ended the scoring parade for the Lions with a six-yard run around end midway through the last quarter.

With less than three minutes left, Tiesi got loose on his long touchdown run for the Vikings and also rolled out for the extra point.

Leading rushers for the Lions were Hillegass with 84 yards, Benton with 75 and Rose with 62.

Glendale Beaten

CLAYSBURG — Senior quarterback Bob Ebersole sparked a second half surge that carried Claysburg-Kimmel to a 31-0 victory — its first in three games — over Glendale Area High here Saturday night.

The winless Vikings held their own for two periods, but the Bulldogs resorted to bad control in the third quarter and ground out three touchdowns.

Claysburg-Kimmel opened the second half with a 62-yard drive to paydirt, Ebersole breaking

the 6-6 stalemate with a two-yard plunge.

When the Bulldogs regained possession, they went in for another TD, Ebersole again doing the honors from the two.

Just before the period ended, Bob Eicher got loose around end for a 36-yard romp to the end zone, and Denny Walters' conversion made it 25-6.

Fullback Bill Cox powered over from the three for the fourth quarter touchdown.

Jim Tiesi ran five yards for

Glendale's six-pointer in the second period, but that was offset by Jeff Lingenfelter's five-yard jaunt around end.

Kutruff, Tiesi Score In 13-7 Victory Over Black Lick Valley 11

IRVONA — Glendale Area High's determined Vikings ended their 11-game losing streak in their home opener here Saturday, edging Black Lick Valley, 13-7.

A stubborn defense keyed the Viking victory, first in four games this season. The last win for Coach John Lloyd's team came in the 1965 lidlifter.

While the defensive unit was stopping the winless Rams cold — a net of 54 yards for the afternoon — the offense was doing its share by controlling the ball after two first period touchdowns.

On the third play of the game, Glendale's Gary Frisco intercepted a Ram pass at midfield and ran 33 yards to the Ram 17. Two plays later, Barry Kutruff ran four yards for the touchdown.

Junior Tim Tiesi scored the second TD later in the period on a 21-yard run on a keeper. He ran for the extra point, too.

Though the Viking scoring ended there, Glendale did show a net of 238 yards as Tiesi gained 101 in 19 carries and Kutruff added 64 in 21 carries. Tiesi connected on four of his seven passes for 57 yards.

Black Lick Valley scored while the Glendale offense was on the field. Dave Grembi picked up a Viking fumble and sped 71 yards to paydirt. Grembi circled end on a pitchout for the PAT that made the score 13-7 at halftime.

The defense saw to it that the Rams never had a good chance to tie or win in the second half. Louis Reeger, Ed Hasson, Bob Giles, Bernard Belgin, Dick Braniff, Mike Yelko and Roy Peacock were the Vikings who stymied the Ram attack.

Glendale meets one of the toughest teams on its schedule Saturday, taking to the road to play Juniata Valley.

Juniata Valley Whips Glendale Eleven, 46-21

HUNTINGDON — The Green Hornets of Juniata Valley chalked up their fifth straight win here Saturday night, outscoring the Glendale Vikings 46-21, as sophomore quarterback Bob Leidy tossed four TD passes.

On the first set of downs, Juniata Valley scored with an eight-yard pass from Leidy to halfback Terry Scalia. Harv Port kicked the PAT, and the Hornets grabbed an early 7-0 lead. They increased their edge minutes later, when fullback Port rambled five yards up the middle to paydirt. Port again booted the PAT. Just before the end of the quarter, Port tallied again on a 56-yard run around the right end. The PAT kick by Port was good, and the Green Hornets were up 21-0.

The Juniata offense continued to roll in the second period, as Leidy uncorked a 60-yard pass to end Jim Borst. Again, Port's PAT kick was good. Five plays later, Leidy tossed a 35-yard aerial to Port for another TD. This time, however, the conversion kick was blocked. Moments before the end of the half, Juniata racked up another tally on Leidy's 53-yard pass to Roy Scalia. Again, the PAT kick was blocked.

The Glendale offense, sparked by halfback Barry Kutruff, began to jell in the second half. Early in the third quarter, Kutruff climaxed a 63-yard drive with a 10-yard end run to score the first Glendale TD. Jim Tocarchick scored the extra point on a pass from Jim Tiesi. On Glendale's next possession, Kutruff broke free and ran 65 yards for another tally. Kutruff rushed for the PAT, and the score stood with Glendale behind 40-14.

Juniata Valley closed the scoring in the third period on Cal Hood's 5-yard TD run. Roy Peacock blocked the PAT kick;

this was the third time he had done so.

Glendale's fourth period score came on Jim Tiesi's five-yard run up the middle. Jerry Hewitt rushed for the extra point, which brought the score to 46-21. Neither team posed a serious scoring threat in the remainder of the contest.

For the Green Hornets of Juniata Valley, it was their fifth win without a setback. Coach John Lloyd's Vikings are now 1-4.

Warriors Drub Vikings

IRVONA — Opportunistic West Branch, converting Glendale mistakes into easy six-pointers here Saturday afternoon, rolled to a 38-7 victory that squared the Warriors' record at 3-3.

Five different players got into the scoring act for Coach Ralph Ventresco's Warriors. Halfback Paul Bunyak garnered a pair of touchdowns while Don Folmar, Roy Swansegar, Jerry Liptak and reserve Dennis Danielson also hit pay dirt.

Ventresco made the best of the chance to use his reserves and benched the regulars for good early in the third period.

Viking mentor John Lloyd also had his underclassmen in action for most of the second half. Quarterback Jim Tiesi accounted for all of the Viking points.

Glendale, which absorbed its fifth loss in six games, got into big trouble on the first scrimmage play. A mixup in the backfield resulted in a fumble and Folmar recovered for West Branch at the G-20.

In six plays, the Warriors were in front 7-0, Folmar sneaking the last yard for the TD and Mike Paul hoofing the extra point.

Tiesi, who started at halfback as Lloyd sought to utilize his speed, broke away on a 78-yard run on the next series of downs, but the officials ruled he stepped out of bounds on the G-33, and the Vikings had to punt. The boot went only 28 yards against a strong wind.

West Branch covered the 61 yards in just six plays. Folmar hit David Lutz with a 20-yard pitch that was the big one before the senior passer found Swansegar wide open in the end zone with a 22-yard heave. Paul again converted.

Early in the second period, Glendale gambled on fourth-and-eight at its own six and was successful when punter Gary Heverly passed to Barry Kutruff for an 18-yard pickup. However, Warrior Liptak intercepted a Viking aerial on the next play and scooted 40 yards down the left sidelines for a touchdown. Paul's PAT try was wide.

A pass steal at the G-19 by Bob Tokarchic stopped the next Warrior threat and set up Glendale's lone score. On the eighth play, Tiesi, back at quarterback, faked to Kutruff, kept the ball and skirted right end for 54 yards, racing down the sidelines unmolested. The junior signal-called rolled to the left for the extra point.

The Warriors boosted their margin to three touchdowns in

a hurry after Liptak returned the ensuing kickoff 42 yards to the G-38. They caught the Vikings napping with a double reverse, Bunyak sprinting 11 yards around left end for the score. Paul's conversion again was wide, and it was 26-7 at the half.

The last drive by the West Branch regulars followed the second half kickoff. They needed only seven plays to travel 63 yards. Bunyak sweeping left end for the final 17. Paul's placement was wide for the third straight time.

Glendale had the ball for only four plays in the third stanza. On a Warrior punt late in the period, the ball was fumbled and West Branch's Greg Nadzom recovered at the G-45.

Jeff Spanogle guided the jayvees to paydirt in nine plays, Danielson cracking over left guard from the two as the last quarter got under way. On the PAT, Paul's boot fell short.

The Viking reserves controlled the ball for most of the last 11 minutes, but didn't threaten.

Both teams play Friday night, West Branch hosting unbeaten Juniata Valley and Glendale traveling to Purchase Line.

In the same quarter, Dan Lucas scored on a five-yard run off left tackle. The extra point attempt failed, leaving Purchase Line with a 13-0 edge.

IRVONA — The passing of Ed Gunnett and the rushing of Jim Appleman paced the Blue Pirates of Williamsburg in a 49-20 rout of the Glendale Vikings here Saturday afternoon. Quarterback Gunnett fired three TD aeriels, including one to Appleman, who rushed for two other tallies.

Early in the first period, Gunnett tossed respective 34 and 38-yard TD passes to end Tom Cooper and halfback Appleman. Cooper booted both placements. In the second quarter, Appleman raced five-yard up the middle for another Pirate tally. Cooper kicked the PAT, and Williamsburg led 21-0.

Late in the frame, Glendale halfback Barry Kutruuff capped a 50-yard Viking drive with a one-yard TD plunge. A pass from quarterback Jim Tiesi to Kutruuff accounted for the PAT, and the halftime score stood at 21-7.

The Blue Pirates increased their margin in the third quarter, as they recovered a Viking fumble on the G-40 and tallied five plays later on a two-yard end run by Appleman. On their next possession, Williamsburg hit paydirt on a 43-yard TD jaunt by fullback Steve Hamilton. Cooper followed the touchdown with his fourth and fifth PATs of the afternoon, putting the Pirates ahead 35-7. On the second play of the fourth period, Gunnett fired a 35-yard TD pass to end Dave Irvin. Cooper passed to Gary Greaser for the extra point.

Glendale tallied next when Kutruuff took a lateral from end Bob Tokarchic and carried it four-yards to paydirt. Tiesi rushed for the PAT, but the Vikings still trailed 42-14.

Hamilton closed the Pirate scoring minutes later, as he plunged across the goal line from two-yards out. Dan Khule rushed for the extra point.

With twenty seconds remaining in the contest, the Vikings tallied on a 43-yard end run by Tiesi. The extra point try was stopped on the ground, and Glendale remained behind 49-20.

Glendale's fourth straight loss drops their record to 1-7; the victorious Blue Pirates are now 5-2-1 on the year.

Tiesi Scores on Runs Of 86, 35, 91 Yards; Defense Outstanding

IRVONA — For Glendale Area High, happiness is a victory over Moshannon Valley, and Saturday afternoon the Vikings rocked and rolled to a 19-6 shocker over the Black Knights in what ranks as one of the biggest upsets of the 1966 pigskin campaign.

The defense did the rocking, limiting the Black Knights to only 48 net yards rushing and forcing three fumbles and two interceptions, while quarterback Jim Tiesi did the rolling, dashing 86, 35 and

91 yards for second quarter touchdowns.

The stunned Black Knights, prohibitive favorites to notch their fourth win instead of suffering their sixth setback, were never in the game after the early moments of the second period.

Glendale, with a tremendous team effort in an inspired performance, stands 2-7 after ending a four-game losing streak with its biggest win in history.

"Beating Mo Valley is like going undefeated," exclaimed an elated Coach John Lloyd. "The kids were higher than a kite and every one of them played a whale of a ball game."

Bob Giles, Barry Kutruff, Bob Tokarchic and Tiesi were outstanding on defense while linemen Dick Braniff, Roy Peacock and Don Peacock sparked both ways against the heavier Black Knight forward wall.

Offensively, Tiesi and Kutruff were the whole show for the Vikings as they accounted for all but 16 of the 354-yard attack. Tiesi, a junior, was a one-man wrecking crew as far as Moshannon Valley was concerned.

All three scoring runs came on identical plays — rollouts around right end. In each instance, end Bud Bollinger and wingback Gene Shawley provided the key blocks.

The three touchdowns give Tiesi a 10-point lead over Moshannon Valley's Jack Hopkins in the area scoring derby with one game remaining. Hopkins, the Knights' chief threat, was bottled up completely by the Viking defense and showed only 35 yards in 16 carries.

A 39-yard pass-lateral play from Tiesi to Tokarchic to Kutruff and a 35-yard run by Tiesi moved the Vikings deep into Knight territory, but they yielded possession at the 30.

Bill Bowser recovered a Glendale fumble at the G-33 on the last play of the first period but Hopkins was stacked up twice by Giles as the Vikings held at the 14.

Three plays later, Tiesi rolled out to the right, picked his way through the Black Knight secondary and sped 86 yards for his first six-pointer. Kutruff plunged for the extra point.

Mo Valley Coach Jim Reese, disgusted with the regulars, substituted his entire jayvee unit on offense on the next series, and the reserves fumbled the ball away to Kutruff at the MV-32.

Tiesi lost three yards as Hopkins blitzed through from his linebacking position, then came back with his 35-yard sprint that made it 13-0.

In the final two minutes of the half, Tiesi made a leaping interception of a Steele pass at the G-9 to thwart a Black Knight threat. After Kutruff was stopped for no gain, Tiesi took off again around the right side, cutting back to his left at mid-field to elude the last would-be tackler on a 91-yard jaunt to the end zone.

The Black Knight had the ball three times in the second half before scoring. They had to punt twice and Tokarchic pilfered a pass for the Vikings on the other occasion.

Finally, Steele got the Knights on the board with his eighth and ninth completions of the drab afternoon. He hit Pat Ronan with a 15-yarder and then combined with Morris Anderson for a 64-yard bomb. Anderson made an over-the-shoulder catch at the Glendale 40 and easily dashed to paydirt.

After an onside kickoff, the Vikings ran out the clock to send their delirious boosters home shouting as they never have before.

Tiesi showed a net of 242 yards in 15 carries and completed all three passes for 53 yards in one of the top individual performances by an area back this season.

Both teams end the season Friday night, Mo Valley hosting West Branch and Glendale visiting Southern Huntingdon.

Southern Huntingdon Tops Glendale, 13-6; Viking TD Nullified

ORBISONIA — The Rockets of Southern Huntingdon defeated the Glendale Vikings by a score of 13-6 here last night, as they seized the lead early in the second quarter and never relinquished it.

Both teams were scoreless in the initial frame, but the Rockets recovered a Viking fumble at the G-19 to set the stage for their first score. They tallied three plays later when quarterback Dick Welker fumbled to paydirt from seven yards out. Fullback Joe Bruni rushed for the extra point, putting Southern Huntingdon out in front 7-0.

The lone Glendale score came just before the end of the half, as Viking quarterback Jim Tiesi raced seven yards around his right end for the touchdown. The PAT try was stopped on the ground, leaving Southern Huntingdon with a 7-6 edge at halftime.

After receiving the second half kickoff, the Vikings executed a triple-reverse which culminated in a 70-yard scoring run by Tiesi.
