Vikings Fly High on Rydbom's Aerials . . .

Glendale Clips Bucktail, 20-7

RENOVO — After finding their ground game wasn't clicking, Glendale's Vikings went to the air and started off the 1968 season successfully by whipping Bucktail Area 20-7 Saturday.

Quarterback Larry Rydbom completed eight of 13 flings, one of which was a 25-yard touchdown pass to end Gary Kizina.

Kizina and wingback Bud Bollinger teamed up nicely with Rydbom as the Vikings air attack produced 143 yards.

Although the Vikings did not move the ball well on the ground they still outgained the Bucks, 101 to 33.

The Vikings marched 55 yards in nine plays for their first score. Included in that series of plays was a fine diving catch by Bollinger that was good for 17 yards. Dwayne Smeal's 25-yard run capped the drive.

Rydbom and Kizina clicked for 63 yards on two passes to account for all but four yards in the Vikings second scoring drive which began on the Vikings 33. The first pass went for 38 yards and the second was the 25 yarder for the score. Rydbom's pass to Bollinger gave the Vikings the point after

for a 13-0 lead.

The Vikings recovered a fumble on the Bucktail 49 early in the fourth period and marched 51 yards to score on Pat Pino's plunge from the one. The extra point was a pass to Smeal from Rydbom.

The Burks finally got on the scoreboard but only because the Vikings had three penalties that moved the ball down to the Viking six. Senior Fullback Steve Tripp went over from the one for the score and took a pass from quarterback Gary Campbell for the extra point.

Glendale Coach John Lloyd was pleased with his team's performance in that they won but saw many things that he feels must be omitted if the Vikings are to play winning football this year.

"The boys were guilty of too many violations; most of them of the moving type such as in motion, holding and grabbing the face mask. We just can't get away with that and win ball games," he said.

"Over-all I was pleased with the work of the defense. They hit hard and covered the pass well. Most of the time they

played heads up on defense.

"The secondary did a pretty decent job on pass defense but the offensive line was blocking too high.

"The team move in spurts and we will have to be much more consistent in the future."

Lloyd said he was very pleased with the protection his backs and linemen gave Rydbom. "They gave him plenty of time to throw."

Lloyd praised Smeal for his all-around good job of running. Smeal saw action both in the backfield and at end.

Lloyd called the game a good "team effort, despite the mistakes."

The Vikings visit Chestnut Ridge Saturday and Coach Lloyd feels it will be a tough game.

Pino, Rydbom, Kizina Star...

Glendale Thumps Chestnut Ridge

FISHERTOWN — Pat Pino smashed the Chestnut Ridge line for 128 yards in eight carries and Gary Kizina caught four passes good for 91 yards to lead the Glendale Vikings to its first win ever over the Lions Saturday by a 24-0 score.

It is the first time the Vikings have put victories back-to-back. They are the only area team in the unbeaten ranks.

The Vikings scored a touch-down in every quarter but every extra point try failed.

In the first quarter, the Vikings took the ball on their own six and marched 94 yards in just five plays for a 6-0 lead. Pino's 75-yard run on a dive play off tackle set up quarter-back Larry Rydbom's five-yard scamper into the end zone.

The Vikings went 77 yards, mostly on Rydbom's passes, in the second period to up the lead to 12-0. The drive started on the Glendale 23, and 12 plays later the Vikings hit paydirt on a 20-yard aerial from Rydbom to Kizina.

Earlier in the drive Kizina had caught a 25-yard pass and Dave Cunningham pulled in a 32-yard heave from Rydbom.

The third Viking TD was a 49-yard run by Tom Baer in the third period. Pino's 11-yard run preceded Baer's break away for the score.

Linebacker Ed Hasson intercepted a Randy Sleek pass at midfield in the final quarter and raced down the sidelines for the final Viking touchdown.

Rydbom had impressive sta-

tistics in Saturday's game. He had nine completions in 21 attempts for 179 yards in the air, scored one TD and threw for another.

Baer wound number two in rushing with 51 yards in two carries.

Viking Coach John Lloyd had much to say of his undefeated eleven. "We felt our kids did a pretty nice job but we must be much better next week for our game with Claysburg-Kimmel.

"We were very pleased with the hitting and tackling which turned out to be the key factor in the game.

"The boys lacked consistent aggressiveness but at times showed good form. Clair Reynolds and our other linebacker Dave Troxell and Rydbom at safety gave us real fine performances in the secondary while Dan Kitko did some nice blocking on offense.

"We also felt our blocking in the line has improved vastly over last week's performance."

Coach Lloyd went on to say that Saturday's victory was one of the best team efforts both offensively and defensively since he's been coaching at Glendale.

"Our big test is coming up next week with Claysburg-Kimmel because they have already beaten two of our future opponents for this year." A Viking victory Saturday night over Claysburg would go a long way towards a respectable season.

Claysburg-Kimmel Hands Loss to Glendale

CLAYSBURG — In a clash between undefeated teams, the Vikings of Glendale dropped a rugged defensive battle to Claysburg-Kimmel here Saturday night by a score of 6-0.

The Vikings found themselves deep in the hole after the opening kick when a reverse hand-off failed and was smothered at the 10 yard line.

Glendale played the entire first half in its own territory as the offense couldn't get untracked. Only a magnificent defensive effort kept the Bulldogs in tow.

The third quarter found the Viking offense beginning to jell, but it couldn't produce the big play. Quarterback Larry Rydbom received little pass protection all night and could complete only 6 of 15 flings.

On the other hand, Claysburg's whole attack was its passing. The Bulldog aerial game netted 112 yards and set up the only score.

That coming on the second play of the last quarter when quarterback Phil Glass found Mitch Collodge behind the Viking secondary for a 46-yard play that left the ball on the Glendale one Jeff Lingenfelter picked up the score.

Lingenfelter was the leading ground gainer for the Bulldogs as he racked up 71 yards in 25 carries. Pat Pino carried only five times and picked up a like number for Glendale.

Head mentor John Lloyd saw it this way: "Our kids played a real fine defensive game. They were hitting hard and they give 110 per cent. We misread one play and that was the one that beat us. Offensively, I'd say it was one of the poorest games we've had. We made a few mistakes and didn't give Larry enough protection."

Glendale hosts Blacklick Valley in its home opener Saturday at 2 p. m.

Blacklick Bops Glendale, 40-6

IRVONA — Blacklick Valley's George Yokitis threw four touch-down passes and ran 71 yards for another six-pointer as his team defeated Glendale, 40-6, here Saturday afternoon.

The classy quarterback completed 14 of 20 passes and amassed a total of 239 yards through the air.

He connected with Joe Hayes for 33 yards and Dennis Putsakulich for 18 on two scoring plays in the initial quarter. Both PATS also came on heaves from Yokitis.

The Glendale score came on a screen pass from Larry Rydbom to Pat Pino good for 86 yards. Strangely enough, the quarter in which Glendale scored was the only one in which BV didn't.

The third quarter saw Yokitis pass to Hayes for 20 yards and Flick running 49 yards with a pilfered Glendale aerial. In that frame also, Yokitis showed his speed and maneuverability as he raced 71 yards for another six. He kicked one PAT and tossed the other.

The Blacklick standout then completed the scoring with a 30-yard toss to Manuel Casado.

Blacklick has won four in a row, while Glendale is 2-2.

The charges of Coach John Lloyd were just overpowered, Coach Lloyd said. "We made a lot of mistakes . . . did too much hesitating. I hope we got our bad game out of our systems. I feel that if we would have played the kind of ball we played in the first three games, we would have won. We'll have to play that kind of ball next week."

The Glendale squad travels to Huntingdon to meet Juniata Valley Saturday night.

HUNTINGDON — A poor first half effort cost the Glendale Vikings their third win as they fell to Juniata Valley here Saturday night, 13-12.

Juniata scored two first half TDs and a PAT, then hung on as the Vikings completely dominated the second act.

The Hornets (3-2) scored on an eight-yard scamper by Jeff Boyd in the first frame, with Bob Leidy tossing to Don Price for the conversion.

Leidy notched his squad's second TD as he went 12 yards to set the halftime count at 13-0.

During the intermission, Viking coach John Lloyd instilled some "aggressiveness" in his team. It was evident in the final two quarters.

The Vikings (2-3) scored the Hornets only one first down and accumulated 60 per cent of their final statistics as they made a valiant bid.

West Branch Rallies, Nips Glendale, 13-12

COALPORT — West Branch came from way back to beat Glendale's Vikings by a scant 13-12 margin here Saturday afternoon.

Duane Smeal opened the scoring for Glendale when he hauled in Larry Rydbom's aerial and went 35 yards for the TD.

The game then settled into a defensive battle until the third quarter when Glendale added on six more via a beautiful 102-yard run by Pat Pino with a stolen Warrior pass.

Pino took the pass in his own end zone and started down the sidelines. Picking up some fine blocking, he cut to the inside, then back to the sidelines as he scampered for the longest scoring run in Glendale history.

Then the tide turned, and it was the Warriors turn to roar.

Ralph Nelson notched the first West Branch TD when he went over from two yards out. The important extra point was scored on a run by Bill Howe.

In the last quarter, the Warrior's Tim Howe banged his way into the end zone from five yards away to close out the scoring.

Warrior Coach Jack Bailey said, "The kids came back. They took a bad break but decided to play football. This was the third game in a row that the defense was good and the offense finally moved the ball. I thought Nelson and Sones played real well both ways . . . I think the kids are starting to believe in themselves."

Glendale mentor John Lloyd had this to say: "We made some costly mistakes. We as coaches as well as the players. You just can't make those kind of mistakes and expect to win.

Glendale Defeats Williamsburg 19-0

IRVONA — Glendale's Vikings ended a five-game losing streak as they treated their Homecoming crowd to a 19-0 romp over Williamsburg here Saturday afternoon.

The Blue Pirates never really had much of a chance against

the fired-up Vikings. From the outset it was evident that Glendale was out to return the lumps that Williamsburg had dished out in past years, including last season's 54-14 pasting.

Glendale started the game minus the services of its two tackles, Bob Grissinger and Ken McGarvey due to injuries. That

didn't stop the Vikings, however, as their enthusiasm was tremendous.

The defensive unit in particular was outstandingly aggressive as they caused eight fumbles and recovered five. Two of those fumbles set up Viking TDs

The first came in the opening quarter when Clair Reynolds pounced on the ball at the Williamsburg 43. From there the Vikings used 10 plays to hit paydirt, the big one coming when Larry Rydbom connected with Gary Kizina for 14 yards. Bud Bollinger scored from the four and the Vikings were never headed.

On the first play of the second quarter, Pirate quarterback Jim Farringer fumbled the ball and this time Dave Cunningham fell on it for Glendale. From their own 45, the Vikings needed only nine plays to score.

This drive was highlighted by a spectacular catch by Dwaine Smeal. On a fourth and eight, Rydbom passed to Smeal who snared the ball in the midst of

three Pirate defenders and managed to fall forward five more yards on a play that covered 23 yards. That set the ball on the 5 and two plays later it was Cunningham ending the drive he had started as he bucked over from the two. The pass for the extra point failed as it had the first time.

Williamsburg threatened at the end of the half, but Glendale held on their own seven as time ran out.

The Blue Pirates got a big break in the third frame when Viking John Heverly got a bad snap from center as he was set to punt. The hurried kick went straight up into the air and bounced back when it hit. The punt was good for minus 4 yards and Williamsburg was sitting pretty at the G-25.

The Pirates managed a first down before the Vikings stiffened Farringer, who had a very long day, fumbled again and it was Jerry Mack at the bottom of the pile who had the ball.

Early in the fourth quarter Rydbom tossed a strike to Kizina, who then outran the Pirate secondary on a 36-yard scoring play. Bollinger rushed for the PAT, the first for Glendale since the opening game, to close out the scoring.

Head coach John Lloyd said, "These boys all did a real fine job. I can't single out any one. These kids have had this one coming . . . they've lost a lot of close ones."

"Williamsburg has sure given it to us. It felt good to beat them."

The Vikings, now 3-5, close out their season next Saturday afternoon when they play host to Mo-shannon Valley.

Glendale Defeats Williamsburg 19-0

IRVONA — Glendale's Vikings ended a five-game losing streak as they treated their Homecoming crowd to a 19-0 romp over Williamsburg here Saturday afternoon.

The Blue Pirates never really had much of a chance against

the fired-up Vikings. From the outset it was evident that Glendale was out to return the lumps that Williamsburg had dished out in past years, including last season's 54-14 pasting.

Glendale started the game minus the services of its two tackles, Bob Grissinger and Ken McGarvey due to injuries. That

didn't stop the Vikings, however, as their enthusiasm was tremendous.

The defensive unit in particular was outstandingly aggressive as they caused eight fumbles and recovered five. Two of those fumbles set up Viking TDs

The first came in the opening quarter when Clair Reynolds pounced on the ball at the Williamsburg 43. From there the Vikings used 10 plays to hit paydirt, the big one coming when Larry Rydbom connected with Gary Kizina for 14 yards. Bud Bollinger scored from the four and the Vikings were never headed.

On the first play of the second quarter, Pirate quarterback Jim Farringer fumbled the ball and this time Dave Cunningham fell on it for Glendale. From their own 45, the Vikings needed only nine plays to score.

This drive was highlighted by a spectacular catch by Dwaine Smeal. On a fourth and eight, Rydbom passed to Smeal who snared the ball in the midst of

three Pirate defenders and managed to fall forward five more yards on a play that covered 23 yards. That set the ball on the 5 and two plays later it was Cunningham ending the drive he had started as he bucked over from the two. The pass for the extra point failed as it had the first time.

Williamsburg threatened at the end of the half, but Glendale held on their own seven as time ran out.

The Blue Pirates got a big break in the third frame when Viking John Heverly got a bad snap from center as he was set to punt. The hurried kick went straight up into the air and bounced back when it hit. The punt was good for minus 4 yards and Williamsburg was sitting pretty at the G-25.

The Pirates managed a first down before the Vikings stiffened Farringer, who had a very long day, fumbled again and it was Jerry Mack at the bottom of the pile who had the ball.

Early in the fourth quarter Rydbom tossed a strike to Kizina, who then outran the Pirate secondary on a 36-yard scoring play. Bollinger rushed for the PAT, the first for Glendale since the opening game, to close out the scoring.

Head coach John Lloyd said, "These boys all did a real fine job. I can't single out any one. These kids have had this one coming . . . they've lost a lot of close ones."

"Williamsburg has sure given it to us. It felt good to beat them."

The Vikings, now 3-5, close out their season next Saturday afternoon when they play host to Mo-shannon Valley.
