Glendale Routs Bucktail 36-0

REVIEWS — The Glendale Vikings' season was a 36-0 triumph over a Bucktail team that was out of its mind.

The Vikings kept scoring in the second period. Taking the call on their own 15 they scored first three plays later on a 14-yard TD run by Mike Tiasi, their other halfback. Tiasi was stopped short of the PAT.

After forcing the assembled Bucks to start Glendale scored again. Dohler capped the 35-yard drive when he plunged over the goal line from the two.

His run for the PAT notwithstanding Glendale's halftime lead to 36-0.

The Vikings reserves scored the game's final points early in the fourth quarter. Dan Hewitt, a freshman halfback, drove into the end zone from a yard out to cap a 22-yard march. The PAT by Hewitt was no good.

The Bucks' most serious scoring threat came in the third period. They advanced as far as the 60's where they had a first-and-goal situation but Glendale drove them back to the 20.

The Vikings relied almost exclusively on their ground game, rushing for 226 net yards and eight first downs. Their only pass, a completion, went for 13 yards.

Lloyd, substituting freely, cleared the Glendale bench. The Vikings will be on the road again next Saturday afternoon when they test Chestnut Ridge.

Glendale Gets Second Shutout

FISHERTOWN — The Glendale Vikings manhandled Chestnut Ridge 28-0 Saturday afternoon for their second straight shutout win of the new season.

The Vikings, fresh from last week's 26-0 conquest of Bucktail Area, completely stifled the Chestnut Ridge attack. The Lions managed a net gain of just three yards on the ground and 19 in the air for a total offense of only 22 yards.

Glendale Coach John Lloyd was pleased with all aspects of his team's performance. "The kids did a fine job," he said. "They put forth a real team effort. The defense was especially good. They were getting off the ball real quick and doing a lot of zang tackling. The kids are proud of their ability to play defense and I hope they continue to play with this attitude."

"I thought we moved the ball real well, especially in the first half. Jeff Best is really coming along at quarterback. He made some good completions and good runs for us. John Vigne and

Mike Tiesi also had some very nice runs.

"Jerry Mack was outstanding on defense while Terry Rydbom did a fine job on offense and defense both. Bill Dubler led a lot of plays and made a lot of blocks at fullback even though he only played the first half.

"Over-all it was a nice game for us. The kids must realize, though, that we have an exceptionally tough game ahead of us next week against Claysburg-Kimmel. Our work will be getting tougher every week so we'll have to guard against over-confidence."

Glendale outclassed the hosts statistically as well as on the scoreboard. The Vikings picked up 219 yards on the ground and 194 in the air and ticked off 15 first downs to Chestnut Ridge's one.

The Vikings got the only score they needed early in the first quarter. Starting at their own 38 they marched to the Lion end zone in nine plays. Vigne denied the goal line on a 23-yard end run but Dubler's rush for the two-point conversion was stopped short.

Glendale all but put the game out of reach with a 26-point effort in the second quarter.

Mike Tiesi capped a Viking drive that started on the GL-18 when he barreled 11 yards up the middle for the first of his two touchdowns. Best passed to Rydbom for the PAT.

Towards the end of the half the Vikings struck again. This time they charged from their own 40 to the Lion end zone in just two plays, the payoff coming on a 58-yard bomb from Best to Rydbom. Rydbom took the pass about 10 yards from scrimmage and, thanks to a fine block by fellow-end Lyle Kizina, outraced the Lion secondary to the goal line. Best hit Rydbom in the end zone to boost Glendale's halftime lead to 22-0.

In the fourth quarter the Lions blocked a Viking punt but Kizina recovered the ball on the GL-42. The Vikings hit paydirt 14 plays later as Mike Tiesi

scored from the four on a trap play. The pass for the PAT was incomplete.

Sophomore quarterback Sam Tiesi, filling in for Best in the fourth quarter, scored on a 12-yard run but the play was called back because of a holding penalty against Glendale. "(Sam) Tiesi showed a lot of composure at quarterback for a sophomore," noted Lloyd.

The Vikings (2-0) will try for their third straight win on the road when they tackle Claysburg-Kimmel Saturday night.

Undefeated Vikes Yield First Touchdown . . .

Glendale Belts Blacklick 28-8

FLEETON — Glendale's strong football team had one impressive streak come to an end Saturday but extended a more important one by crushing Blacklick Valley 28-8 in the inaugural game at their new field.

The rampaging Vikings' proud defense, though surrendering its first touchdown of the season, was the difference in what was supposed to be a rugged test.

Thus, Coach John Lloyd's charges will carry a perfect 4-0 report and a six-game winning streak to Huntingdon Saturday night for a tussle with Juniata Valley.

Jeff Best, a junior who was moved from halfback to replace the multi-talented Larry Rydbom at quarterback, sparked the Glendale attack. He scored two touchdowns and a two-point conversion and passed for one of each. That's 22 of the 28 points.

Best gained 53 yards in 14 carries and added 78 yards passing with seven completions in 17 attempts. Fullback, the hardworking fullback, led the balanced ground attack with 37 yards in 11 trips.

Glendale dominated the first period but failed to score. One drive ran out of downs at the BV-12 and the next, following a poor Blacklick Valley punt, ran out of time.

The Vikes posted the initial touchdown on the second play of the second quarter when end Terry Rydbom made a circus catch of Best's six-yard scoring pass. Rydbom first tipped the ball into the air and then lunged to grab it before it fell to the ground. Best passed to Mike Tiesi for the PAT and an 8-0 lead.

Glendale's aggressive defenders forced a turnover on Blacklick's next scrimmage play. Lyle Kizina jolted Mike Gongloff as he faded to pass, and Chuck Beers recovered the fumble at the BV-3.

Three plays later Best plunged the last two yards, and the score remained 14-0 when the PAT was stopped.

Jim Washell's fumble recovery at the BV-25 set up another Glendale TD later in the quarter. The Vikings had a 20-0 bulge eight plays later when Rick Miles skirted left end on a wingback reverse for an 11-yard score.

The visitors' moment of glory came in the waning seconds of the half when Doug Knapic took a pitch from Gongloff and sprinted six yards to the right corner of the end zone. The TD was the first against a Glendale team in 19 quarters, counting the six at the tailend of the 1969 campaign. Knapic's 42-yard dash to the G-18 keyed the 80-yard drive. Knapic added the two extra points on a run around left end.

The Vikings put their final TD on the board in the fourth quarter as Best went in from the one to cap a 49-yard push again ignited by the defense. Rydbom deflected an attempted pitchout by Blacklick, and Rick Noel recovered. Best bootlegged around right end for the final points.

"The kids just played a whale

of a game," said Lloyd. "Blacklick is the strongest club we played so far, and we were especially pleased the kids didn't let up after their touchdown."

"They hurt us with their option play at the end of the half but we were ready for it in the second half. The kids just wouldn't quit. I think Best played a real fine game."

Unbeaten Glendale Drubs Juniata Valley 37-6

HUNTINGDON — Rain and lightning were the order of the night on Saturday as Glendale squared off against Juniata Valley.

Nature produced the rain. The Vikings provided the lightning.

Coach John Lloyd's forces scored four times on plays of 20 yards or more and turned in another defensive gem to pick up their fifth win of the campaign by a 37-6 margin.

The triumph extended Glendale's streak to eight games and also marked the first victory on Juniata Valley turf. The Vikings have now won 15 of their last 16 games.

Seven players took a hand

in the scoring, which began in the opening frame as the Vikings rolled 55 yards in five plays. Quarterback Jeff Best found Lyle Kizina wide open in the Hornet secondary and hit him for a 39-yard strike. Mike Tiesi broke across for the PAT.

Juniata Valley capitalized on Glendale's only mistake early in the second quarter as Dennis Porter scored on a seven-yard scamper following a fumble recovery. Porter's try for the conversion was so good and the score was 6-6.

Glendale opened up following the kick on its own 40 as the rains increased. The Vikings picked up a first down on two plays, and on the third play Best scrambled 47 yards for the touchdown. Dave Rydbom accounted for the PAT.

Late in the half, Juniata Valley tried to pass on a fourth down situation and the Vikings took over at the Hornet 45. Two plays later, Rick Miles took a double-reverse pitch and raced 37 yards for the game breaker. The PAT try failed, but it was 22-6 at the half.

Denny Thomas set up the fourth score when he fell on a loose ball at the JV-11 after a bad snap on a punt play. Best moved the Vikings in on three plays, teaming with Terry Rydbom for the final six yards. Bill Dubler was on the receiving end of Best's PAT toss.

The Vikings closed out the scoring with a march from their own 35 in just six plays. Two consecutive 15-yard penalties against the Hornets ate up most of the yardage, and Tiesi broke loose for a 29-yard jaunt and the TD. Best, rounding out a solid performance, kicked the final point.

The Glendale quarterback was the leading rusher in the game with 17 yards on 13 carries. Tiesi chalked up 55 yards on eight tries while Dubler had 42 on eight.

For the game, the Vikings amassed 249 total yards to just 93 of the hosts, who didn't complete a pass.

The diversified attack didn't surprise Lloyd. "That's what we like about the kids. The scoring is spread out. It makes it hard to key any one of the kids. The kids are all giving 100 per cent, they're all busting.

"The fact that we only fumbled once under those conditions was a real good sign, but the one that we had was costly. We were really pleased that Jeff could throw so well in that rain (he was 5-for-11)."

Lloyd was impressed by the Hornets also. He said, "The kids from Juniata Valley gave a maximum effort. They were hitting hard all night."

The Viking boss singled out

Terry Rydbom and Jim Washell for their two-way efforts and also said he was pleased with the downfield blocking on the long plays.

Now the Vikings must prepare for Saturday's home date with rival West Branch. A year ago, the Warriors ruined Glendale's bid for an unbeaten season by a 17-14 score on a last-second field goal.

Glendale Beats West Branch for First Time Vikes 6-0 After Come-From-Behind 12-6 Win

FLINTON — Football is king at Glendale, as it is at any school with an undefeated team, and the Viking sent the rabid fans into a frenzy again Saturday when they came from behind to beat West Branch for the first time.

The gratifying 12-6 win, the toughest of six straight this season, was the sixth in a row for the Vikings, who've lost only to West Branch in their last 17 games.

Pinpointing Glendale's emergence as a bonafide Class C power is not difficult. Hard work, lots of it, is the key.

Success requires total dedication. The talented Glendale coaching staff and the hard-nosed Vikings never short-change their fans in that department.

Against the stumbling Warriors, who have salvaged just one victory and one tie thus far in what was supposed to be a good year, the guaz-bo Vikings came up with another tremendous defensive effort. West Branch had only two first downs and 85 net yards, all on the ground.

Still, Coach Jack Bailey's team forged a 6-0 lead early in the second half when Gary Polmar's interception and 35-yard return set up the touchdown. The Warriors had the large Homecoming crowd thinking upset after Tim Howe skinned right end on a fourth down play from the four.

West Branch's defense, which has never been embarrassed this season, forced the Vikings to punt, but Glendale's John Vigne pounced on a Warrior fumble at the WB-23 two plays later.

Coach John Lloyd's charges drove in for the tying TD in five plays. Vigne, with Terry Rydbom and Jim Washell supporting the interference, sprinted the final 13 yards on a quick pitch to the left.

The Vikings, determined West Branch wouldn't mar their perfect record this year, put together the game's only sustained drive to pull out the sweet, sweet victory. They covered 51 yards in 14 plays, with quarterback Jeff Best mixing passes and runs well. Vigne, Mike Tiesi and Dale Rydbom did the running and Tiesi and Terry Rydbom did the catching, but most important play was one the Vikings never executed before, not even in practice.

Lloyd, who persevered through some mighty lean seasons when he first became Viking mentor, wasn't afraid to call the play on fourth-and-three at the WB 9. Best pitched to fullback Bill Dubler swinging to the left. Dubler then stopped and passed back to Best in the right ear, and Glendale moved the sticks to the three. On third down, Best bucked across the goal line for the deciding points. It mattered not that his PAT pass missed its mark, for the Viking defensive unit wasn't about to yield to the Warriors then.

"I'd like to give credit to Tom Terza, our line coach, for the play which got us that big first down," Lloyd said. "He suggested it the night before on our scouting trip. We put the play in our offense in the gym before we went up on the field. That shows the guys always are thinking and suggesting. We work well together."

Lloyd showed he has the confidence in his assistants and his team when he used the play in such a critical situation.

"I expected a close game," he added. "We were pleased that the kids kept their poise when they fell behind. Usually in a game like this, especially after a scoreless first half, you feel the team that scores first will win. Our kids really are a close-knit group, though, and they keep talking to each other."

"This win was a long time coming. We've been close before but we've never been able to beat them."

Lloyd praised his interior linemen on defense for shutting off West Branch's inside ground game, mentioning Chuck Beers and Dale Keith for their fine performances, and lauded his backs for their second effort.

"I kept looking for West Branch to go outside and they did at times but not as much as we expected," Lloyd said. "We thought they might throw more, too, but we were putting a good amount of pressure on the passer. West Branch is a good ball club. They hit us hard."

Bailey, who changed the Warrior offense for the game by going back to a Straight-T, accepted part of the blame but felt fumbles by his team were costly.

"That's been the story for us all year," he said. "Two fumbles really hurt us, one when we had the ball deep in their territory and the other which set up their first touchdown."

"We thought we could control the ball and just drive but their defense is tough. I think they're a better club than they were last year. We can't take anything away from them. We had them down and they came back."

The first half was a punting duel as neither team threatened.

West Branch got the first big break on John White's fumble recovery at the G-19 early in the second half, but the Warriors returned the favor and Terry Rydbom came up with the ball at the 19. Five plays later, Folmar cut in front of Rydbom for his pass steal.

Glendale faces what may be the supreme test Friday night at Purchase Line, another team which has been disappointing though capable of coming up with a big game. West Branch hosts Juniata Valley.

Defense Gets Glendale Past Purchase Line 8-6

PURCHASE LINE—Purchase Line held a pair of aces last night, but Glendale produced a full house to take an 8-6 win as the Vikings cleared what may prove to be the toughest hurdle en route to an unbeaten season.

Only Williamsburg and Mo-shannon Valley, with a combined record of 3-10, stand between Glendale and a perfect 8-0 mark.

Last night's win was brought to you through the courtesy of the Viking defensive unit — the full house. Led by end Terry Rydbom, who blocked both a punt and a field goal, the gang-tackling defenders scored all eight points and savagely fought off three scoring thrusts by the Red Dragons late in the game.

What offense the losers could muster was generated by the Dragon aces — Ken Deitman and Tom Kerr. Held to a combined total of 16 yards in the first half, the dynamic duo came back to spark Purchase Line's spirited upset bid. It just wasn't to be, however, as Glendale ruined the Homecoming festivities and ran its winning streak to 10 games.

Viking mentor John Lloyd,

suffering from a case of bronchial pneumonia, left his sickbed to patrol the sidelines after George Mills had put the squad through its paces all week. His appearance added even more fuel to the blazing Glendale fire.

The Vikings took the opening kick at their own 20 and marched to Purchase Line's 32 before two passes fell incomplete and the drive stalled.

That was the deepest penetration for either team as the Dragons failed to record a first down during the entire half. Glendale's defense made the difference in the second quarter, though.

Purchase Line opened up on its own 20 following a punt by Jeff Best midway through the period. Deitman lost two yards on a sweep, a Dragon penalty moved the ball back five yards, Rydbom played a reverse perfectly to drop Kerr for a nine-yard loss, and Deitman's third-down charge left the ball at the 10.

Daryl Dishong lined up for the punt, Rydbom stormed through to get a hand on the kick, and the ball sailed out of the end zone for a safety.

After taking the Dragons' free kick at the PL-44, Glendale advanced to the 12 before surrendering the ball. The Dragon defense, which played as brilliantly as Glendale's but didn't come up with the big play, had once again done its job.

There were 10 seconds left in the half, time enough for the Dragons to run one play. Quarterback Terry Lundberg's pass into the flat was picked off by cornerback John Vigna, who pranced 15 yards untouched for the TD to make it 8-0. The run for the PAT was stopped by Dragon demon Larry Polivak.

The second half, with the exception of eight plays, was staged in Glendale territory.

Purchase Line muffed the Viking offense completely as the teams traded punts. Starting at their own 48, the Dragons rolled to Glendale's 10 before stopping two yards shy of a first down. The big play on the thrust was Kerr's 19-yard burst over the left side.

The visitors slugged their way out to the 24 before punting as Purchase Line started again at the G-44 to open the final canto.

This time the Dragons weren't to be denied. Kerr picked up

five yards on the first play, then broke loose from no less than five would-be tacklers on a 27-yard dash to the 12. A clipping penalty marred that run, though, and put the ball back at the 35.

Deitman took over and chalked up 34 yards on seven carries, picking up the touchdown on a four-yard crack over the right side. The all-important PAT try failed when the ball squirted loose on the snap from center.

Purchase Line elected to kick deep and Glendale took over at the 20. On the first play, Polivak and Deitman jarred the ball loose from Best and the Dragons were in business again at the 23.

Glendale rose to the occasion, however, and stranded PL at the 26. Tom McCracken attempted a 42-yard field goal and just missed, but a penalty gave him another try from the 27. This time, he was less accurate and the 37-yard try sailed to the left.

The Vikings ate up the clock by picking up a first down and moving to the 35 before Best punted to the Dragon 35.

Lundberg hit Gary Henry for 13 yards, Dave Fyock for eight, McCracken for 21) and the Vikings were spotted interfering with a receiver as the ball was placed at the four. A penalty moved the ball back to the nine and there was time for only one play. McCracken's field goal try from the 15 never got five inches off the ground before Rydbom's diving block ended the contest.

It was a bitter and frustrating loss for the Dragons, now 2-4-1. The defense shut out the Viking offense, something that hasn't been done to Glendale in years. Poliyak was the standout here as he lived up to his Big-33 credentials, making tackles at every corner of the field.

For the game, Dettman netted 67 yards on 24 carries while Kerr added 52 on 12 tries. The pair accounted for every rushing yard.

On the Glendale side, fullback Bill Dubler enjoyed one of his better nights with 71 yards on 12 cracks, many coming on great second effort.

Viking boss Lloyd gave the credit to Mills, saying, "George Mills did a great job this week. The whole coaching staff deserves praise.

"I'd say this was our toughest game so far. The kids kept their composure when Purchase

Line was threatening and came up with another tremendous team effort. I'm just glad that it took them three quarters to figure out our defense."

The defense Lloyd was referring to was a special one designed to bottle up the powerful Dragon ground game. It succeeded, but who deserves the credit for this? Mills says it was Lloyd's brainstorm.

"Coach Lloyd told us what to do and that's what we practiced. He called me quite often during the week to give me the plans and we followed them. It was a tremendous job for us defensively." Mills also singled out guard Chuck Beers for his work against Poliyak.

The Vikings will have the home field advantage for the next two Saturdays as they shoot for the school's first all-winning record. Purchase Line has an engagement at Laurel Valley on Friday night.

Glendale Continues Drive for Perfect Record

Williamsburg 22-0 Victim, Best Stars

FLINTON — Rain and mud make passing difficult, but Glendale's all-conquering Vikings went to the airwaves Saturday afternoon to turn back Williamsburg 22-0 for their 11th consecutive victory.

Jeff Best, who doubled as a stellar defensive performer with two interceptions and a fumble recovery, passed for all three touchdowns and both PATs.

Terry Rydbom, Mike Tiesi and tackle Jim Washell turned short pitches into scoring plays with some fine running.

The shutout was the fourth of the season for the Vikings, who came up with another terrific effort. They held the Blue Pirates to just three first downs and 76 yards in total offense.

Saturday's home game with bitter rival Moshannon Valley will be on the lips of all Glendale gridgers and fans this week. A win not only will cap the school's first perfect record but also insure the Inter-County Conference Class B championship which the Vikings are defending. Coach John Lloyd's team, which has a string of 18

wins in 19 games, has a shot at the Mountain High League title, too.

Fumbles hampered the attacks of both teams in the early going, and the defenses took over to yield practically nothing until late in the second period.

Williamsburg, aided by two penalties, moved the sticks for the third and last time to reach the G-31 for its deepest penetration. On fourth-and-three, Allen McCall lost a yard.

With time running out in the half, the Vikings began to click. Bill Dubler's eight-yard scamper gave them a first down at the 43, and then John Vigne exploded for 14 yards on a draw to the W-41. Two plays later, Rydbom was wide open on a delay pattern across the middle, broke a tackle and outran three Pirates down the right sideline for a 40-yard touchdown.

The half ended on the ensuing kickoff with Glendale on top 6-0.

The Vikings dominated the final two periods but lost the ball on a fumble at the W-3 and on downs at the W-23 before scoring the TD that allowed the coaches and fans to relax a little. Dale Keith's interception at the W-25 was followed by Tiesi's six pointer. The junior halfback, after taking Best's pass in the right flat, danced around and away from several would-be tacklers before reaching the end zone. Bob O'Shell, a starter because regular Lyle Kizana is out with a broken hand, caught a pass for the bonus PAT.

The rest of the game also was played in Blue Pirate territory, with the Vikings adding their third touchdown in the final seconds.

A flurry of turnovers occurred before Best's second interception gave Glendale the ball at the 21. Tiesi bolted over left tackle for 11 yards. Viking Assistant Coach George Mills suggested the tackle eligible play, and it worked perfectly. Washell looked like a fullback after he caught the pass. The Vikings executed the same play to the other side for the PAT. Jerry Mack catching Best's toss deep in the end zone.

Williamsburg was in a 6-3 defense and that's pretty tough

to run against," Lloyd pointed out. "We knew we had to come out in the second half passing to loosen them up. I think Best mixed his plays well and he was throwing well.

"We were satisfied with our line blocking and felt the backs gave up those second and third efforts again. Fumbles always hurt but Williamsburg was working hard to pull the ball out, too. They had nothing to lose. They were going all-out.

"On defense, our kids were firing off the ball early but they got strong as the game went along. There was good inside pursuit and the ends, Rydbom and Denny Thomas, kept them from getting outside. Our linebackers were wide awake and the secondary did what it was supposed to. Everybody hustled.

"Now we can think about Moshannon Valley. The kids have been taking them one at a time, which is what we want. We know Mo Valley will be a tough game. We're forgetting about their record. They'll really be out to beat us."

Glendale Posts 9-0 Record

Vikings Cap Greatest Season by Blanking Knights 26-0

FLINTON — The impossible dream has become a reality at Glendale High.

Coach John Lloyd's rough and ready Vikings thrashed arch-rival Moshannon Valley by a 26-0 score on Saturday to wind up the first perfect season in the school's history.

The victory also extended Glendale's current streak to 12 games as the Vikes have now posted 19 wins in their last 20 starts.

The trademark of this year's squad was total elimination of personalities and complete dedication to the team. As in all of their eight previous wins, Saturday's victory by the Vikings was a beautiful display of teamwork.

Quarterback Jeff Best threw for two touchdowns and ran for a TD and two - point conversion, two-way end Terry Rydbom caught one scoring pass and ran 51 yards for another six-pointer, and every defensive player came up with at least one great individual effort.

"It was a dandy game," said Lloyd in his typically reserved manner, "a real sweet victory. It was the biggest game we played since we started football here in that so much was riding on the outcome.

"The kids really played an outstanding game, especially on defense. Moshannon's strong point all year was its offense, and we felt we'd have to play

a great game to stop them."

And stop them they did!

The Vikings limited the Black Knights to just 39 rushing yards and recovered four of the visitors' eight -- count 'em -- fumbles. Two of those bobbles were covered by senior tackle Jerry Mack.

What offense the Knights were able to muster came mostly from the combination of quarterback Terry Ludwig to end Greg Snyder. The duo accounted for 45 of the 70 passing yards that the Knights collected.

The first half was a nightmare for Mo Valley boss Barry Swift, who watched his team lose the ball four times on fumbles.

The first bobble came on the opening kick, and Bob O'Shell was there to cover it for the Vikings at the MV-24. Glendale returned the favor on its second play, but the Knights let the ball get away again on a punt try and this time Mack had possession at the 18.

On a third-and-six play, Best spotted Dave Rydbom all alone in the right flat and hit him for a 14-yard scoring play. Best then picked up the PAT and it was 8-0.

Mo Valley marched from its own 40 to the Vikings' 49 before a fumble put Glendale back in business at the Knight-29. Terry Rydbom belted Ludwig as he set up to throw and the ball bounced backwards before Mack scooped it up.

The Vikings got their second TD on a nine-yard jump-pass

from Best to Terry Rydbom. The PAT failed.

Glendale's next scoring drive was of its own making. The Vikes marched 88 yards midway through the second period in just five plays as Mike Tiesi reeled off back-to-back runs of 17 and 15 yards before Terry Rydbom took an end-around play down the sidelines on his 51-yard scamper. Again Mo Valley thwarted the bid for the conversion.

Fate seemed to be dealing all the cards to the Vikings as Mo Valley fumbled on the ensuing kickoff and Glendale took over at the MV-39.

A third down screen pass from Best to John Vigne was good for 38 yards, and Best completed the day's scoring with a one-yard plunge.

Trailing a team like Glendale by a 26-0 score at halftime is not unlike waking up on the middle of an operation. It gets sort of scary.

The Knights, however, refused to be humiliated. They battled Glendale on even terms throughout the final two periods and earned the admiration of the SRO crowd. Snyder, who also turned in a great defensive game along with Ron Bierlair, forced the Vikings to become pass-conscious and consequently Mo Valley's ground game opened up a big after being held to minus 25 yards in the first 24 minutes.

Soph Tom Janocko accounted for 26 yards on seven carries for the Knights while Glendale divided its attack evenly

among seven runners.

"We had a lot of work and a lot of worry over this game," said Lloyd, "I felt that their kids were really tough and they hit hard the whole game. Our boys knew they had been in a ballgame.

"Our kids were hitting hard, too, and they were where they were supposed to be and played heads up ball."

Commenting on the team, which compiled the first unbeaten slate in the area since Curwensville turned the trick in 1958, Lloyd said, "It was a good squad. We had the good kids who really wanted to play and we had a great group of seniors and lettermen who provided excellent leadership."

The shutout by the Vikings was their fifth of the year and it also marked the third straight time that the Knights have been blanked by their backyard adversaries.

The Vikings will now sit back and wait for the final standings of the Inter-County Group B and Mountain High Leagues. Glendale is the defending champ of the Inter-County loop and has a good shot at claiming the Mountain High crown now that Northern Bedford has been defeated by Central.

Moshannon Valley will close out its season on Friday at home against West Branch. Swift's forces own a 2-7 slate while West Branch is 3-5-1.

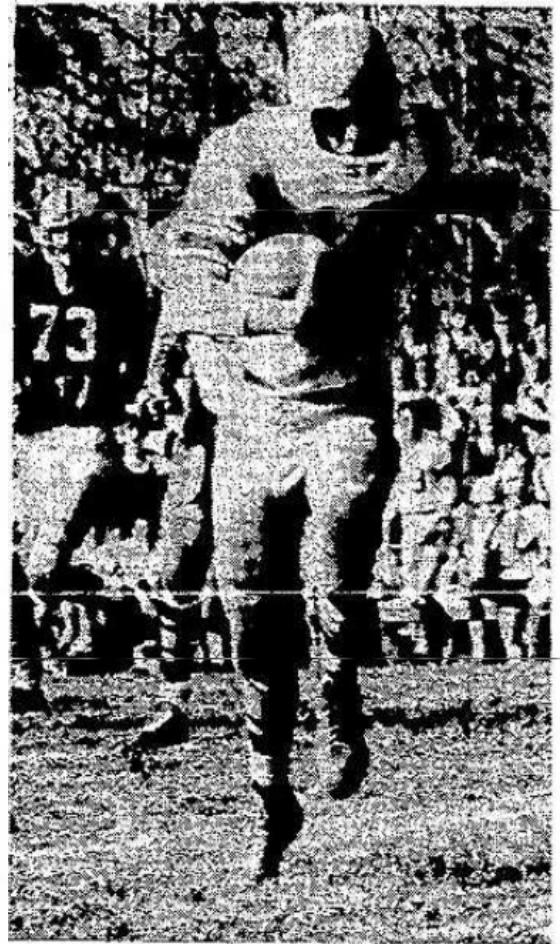
