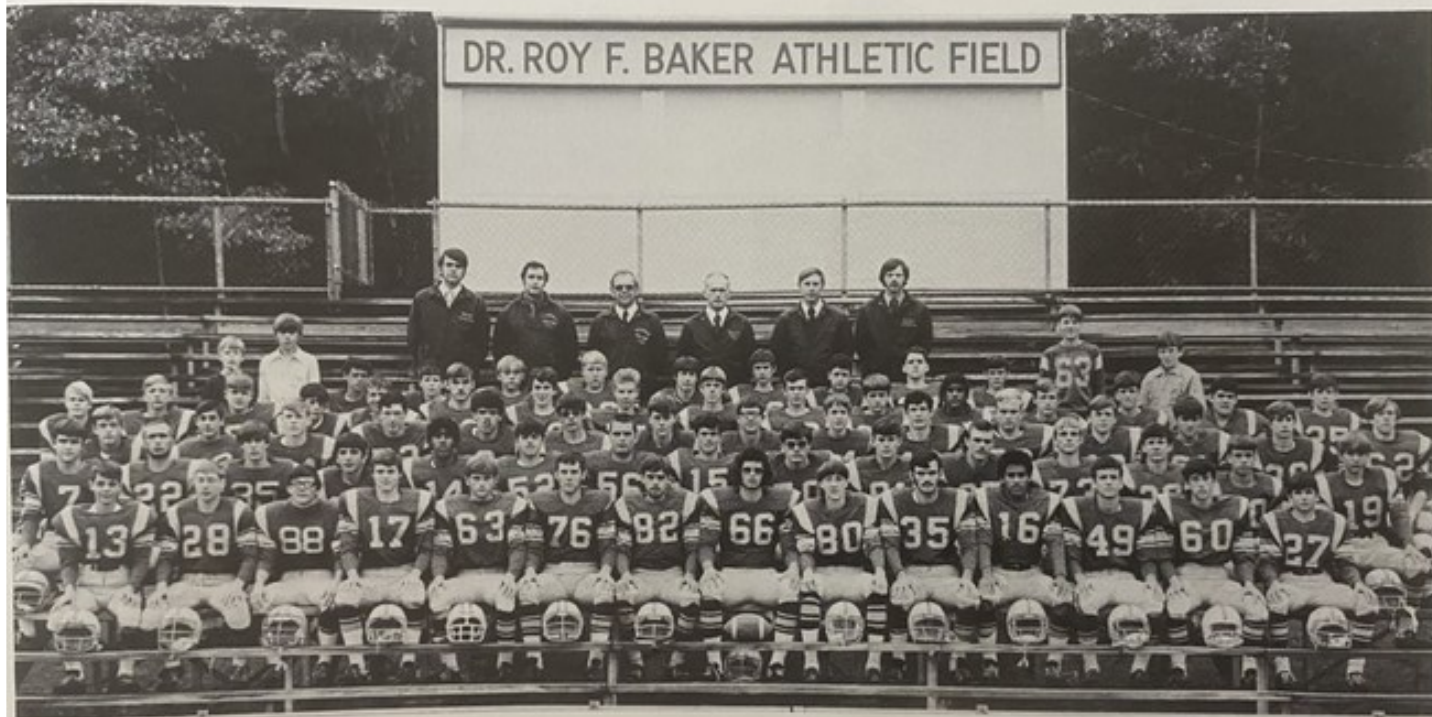

# Vikings Trip Bucks 20-6 for 14th Win in Row

FLINTON—With a little over five-and-a-half minutes to go in the first half the Bucktail Bucks finally did it; they scored a touchdown against Glendale, their first on the Vikings since 1969.

One touchdown wasn't quite enough, however, as the Glendale brother combo of Edsel and Felix Delorme penetrated the Buck defense for three six-pointers to up the Vikings win skein to 14 consecutive games via a 20-6 decision in Saturday afternoon's season opener at Dr. Roy F. Baker Athletic Field.

Felix Delorme, an untested senior who sat out most of last year's 9-0 season due to injury, proved he was more than capable of handling the bulk of the Glendale running chores when necessary as he

rambled 138 yards on 20 tries to join the other first-week enrollees in The Progress Century Club, Bill Nicholson and Randy Cathcart of Curwensville and Jim Eckberg of Moshannon Valley.

Edsel Delorme, one of John Lloyd's five returning letterman by way of specialty squads and spot duty as a sophomore, showed a lot of poise at quarterback and twice he powered his way into the end zone behind the strong Glendale line of Zane Hullahen, Perry McCartney, Richard Kerr, Hazen Ball and Dennis Swauger.

In all, it was a good opening game for the Vikes and head coach John Lloyd, who is beginning his 12th season as the Glendale chief, felt his team "showed a lot of improvement since their last scrimmage. Defensively the boys were reading their keys

much better and pursuit and gang-tackling were good most of the time."

First games also show a coach what improvements need to be made with his squad and Lloyd saw those too. "We definitely need to throw the ball more and we need to cut down on the arm-tackling. You can be sure we'll be working on those at practice this week to get ready for Shade. They (Shade) have a runner like (Bill) Ransdorf and that type is too hard to bring down with one arm."

Ransdorf, a senior with great balance and power, proved to be a one-man attack for the Bucks as he accounted for 80 of Bucktail's 95-yard offense with 43 on the ground and 37 more through the air on six receptions.

One man was not enough for the Bucks, however, as

the Glendale defense allowed only one penetration inside the 50, that being late in the game when the Vikes had the win locked up.

Bucktail scored its only touchdown when the Glendale offense coughed up the ball and Hank Williams picked it up on the 27. The Viking defense stiffened, but Ransdorf finally carried it over seven plays later from the six to make the score 14-6 at the time.

"We have to cut down on these kind of mistakes," Lloyd said of the costly fumble. "We also made a big error when we were inside their 20 near the end of the second half and weren't set and got caught with an illegal procedure penalty. I'm sure we could have scored."

The Vikings failed to capitalize on that drive after reaching the Bucktail 18

when Edsel Delorme's fourth-down pass fell short of Al Kizina but by then the Blue & Gold owned a 14-6 lead and were in complete control of the game.

It didn't take long for Glendale to put its first TD on the board when Felix Delorme took a pitchout from brother Edsel and raced 33 yards across the left end to cap the Vikes' second possession with a six-pointer at the 6:09 mark. Edsel's conversion pass to Rich Lender was good and Glendale owned an 8-0 edge.

A roughing the kicker violation gave Bucktail a second chance on the ensuing drive, but the Bucks failed to take advantage and five plays later they were punting again.

Lender returned the Ransdorf boot 11 yards to the Glendale 40 and the Vikes'

offense went back to work.

Eight plays later, with the march sparked by Lender's 30-yard gallop, Edsel Delorme was plunging over from the two to raise the Glendale margin to 14-0.

Following a Bucktail punt, Felix Delorme fumbled on the first play from scrimmage to set the Bucks' touchdown drive, with Ransdorf picking up 25 of the 27 yards needed.

After a third quarter standstill the Vikings punted and dug in defensively. The Bucks were sacked for 17 yards in losses and Ransdorf had to punt once more.

Glendale moved consistently downfield, the big play being Felix Delorme's 16-yard scurry, and they found themselves with a first-and-goal on the three. The Viking line had a tough time

budgeting Bucktail's front four but Edsel D. finally took it in from the one on fourth down with 1:58 to go in the game.

Bucktail's next march put them over the 50 for the second time of the game but to no avail as Jeff Desmond's fourth down pass to Ransdorf wasn't enough.

The Vikings return to action Friday night when they travel to Cairnsbrook to play Shade, a new entry on Glendale's schedule.

# Late Gamble Pays, Vikings Nip Shade

CAIRNBROOK — It took a sneaky but effective 80-yard pass play from Edsel Delorme to Gus Delorme late in the fourth quarter for the Glendale Vikings to win their 15th in a row by nipping Shade-Central 13-12 last night.

In what head coach John Lloyd termed a "tremendous team effort," both squads struggled through the scoreless first half before Glendale broke the ice with a third-quarter touchdown. However, the Panthers came roaring back with two straight touchdown drives and a 12-7 lead before the Delorme-to-Delorme bomb.

In the third quarter, Glendale had Shade deep in its own territory. On fourth down, a poor pitchout was fumbled into the end zone where Rich Kerr pounced on it for the Viking TD. Gus Delorme booted the point-after that proved to be the eventual winning point.

However, a determined Panther team fought back on the very next series to score as Mike Knapp bolted in from the 10. The run for the two-

point conversion was stopped short.

Shade took the lead late in the third quarter after a Glendale punt. Knapp again capped the drive with a five-yard burst for a touchdown. Glendale stiffened once more on the PAT try, breaking up the pass attempt.

From there the game more or less see-sawed with not much going on by way of offense and indeed it appeared that the Vikes had been stopped once more with a fourth-and-five situation at their own 20-yardline.

Edsel Delorme had dropped back into punt formation, but after receiving the snap from Denny Swauger, the Vike junior fired a pass to his waiting brother in an effort for a first down. Not only did Gus make enough yardage for the first down, he sprinted right on into the end zone with less than five minutes to play to make it 13-12. The pass for two failed, but the Vikings still retained that crucial one-point margin—and held it.

"They wouldn't give up," Lloyd praised. "There was no

let-up. They were behind and came back. I think our kids gained a lot out of this game, scoring early, falling behind, and then winning the game. We were able to move the ball."

Glendale will return to Roy F. Baker Field in Flinton to take on the Claysburg-Kimmel Bulldogs at 2 p.m. on Saturday.

# Vikes Shut Out Bulldogs For 16th Victory in Row

FLINTON—Coach John Lloyd can see his Glendale Vikings improving each week.

"There has been a tremendous amount of improvement since the start of practice," said the veteran mentor Saturday after the Vikes shut out Claysburg-Kimmel 14-0 for their 16th win in a row.

"I think these kids made up their minds they want to be a good football team," he added. "They are being more aggressive now. They're not as worried about making mistakes. At first, I think our kids were hesitating in a lot of situations. Now, they're not."

Like Viking teams in recent years, the 1975 squad is making things happen.

Glendale completely shut off Claysburg-Kimmel's ground game, allowing just 29 net yards, and held the bulldogs' aerial attack in check via good pressure on the passers and five interceptions.

"I felt we did a much better job defensively," Lloyd said. "In the first two games, the opposition ran our ends pretty well, but we seemed able to shut that off this game. I think we're reading better now and playing a little better position football. I think this comes with experience."

"Good pressure from our line helped the pass defense. We intercepted five passes, but I think we had the opportunities to intercept three

or four others and we didn't. We were in a zone back there and maybe instead of getting to our zones and watching the quarterback, we were watching the receivers."

Gus Delorme, who also had a big game offensively, picked off two of the Bulldog passes while Dave Irwin, Mick Yaworski and Edsel Delorme had one interception apiece.

Bill Snyder and Al Kizina recovered Bulldog fumbles, so the Viking defense had seven takeaways.

Surprisingly, Glendale converted only one turnover into a score.

Penalties really took the punch out of the Viking attack. In all, the hosts were penalized 11 times for 134 yards. Not reflected in those figures are offsetting penalties.

Lloyd attributed most of the infractions to the all-out effort by his players.

"We emphasized downfield blocking this past week, and we worked awfully hard on it," he explained. "We don't have great big kids, so we emphasize the cross-body block. I think our kids are very, very sincere in what they are doing. They're eager and they want to do a good job."

"After looking at the films, I feel there were some clips. But other clip calls looked like good blocks. I think a good block is when you get your head and shoulder in front of the boy. But, when the other boy turns as he's going down, and the official

doesn't see it until then, it looks like a clip.

"We got called twice for roughing the kicker, and the films show our boys just brushed him. I would say their kicker did some very good acting."

"We were penalized a lot, too much, but our kids did what we worked on. Downfield blocking was a weakness at Shade, and our kids made up their minds to give it to us this week."

"We had to be getting good blocking to get 247 yards with 134 yards in penalties."

Most of those 247 yards came from Gus Delorme. The senior halfback carried 24 times on quick hitters, power plays off tackle and pitchouts from brother Edsel on option plays. He wound up with 158 yards.

The scoring, however, was done by Rich Lender on a four-yard run and Edsel Delorme on a one-yard sneak. Gus Delorme did get two points after the second touchdown.

Glendale got a great break on the game's first scrimmage play, Snyder recovering a fumble at the C-K 27, but a clip pushed the Vikes back to the 41, and they lost the ball on downs at the 21.

On their fourth possession, the Vikes exhibited ball control with a 15-play touchdown drive that used up 8:04 of the second quarter. Gus Delorme accounted for 51 of the 74 yards as he carried seven times, including a brilliant 19-yard trip to the C-

K 4 on a fourth-and-three situation.

The Vikes' lone completion came in the march, an 18-yard pass from Edwel Delorme to Rich Lender, who scored the TD on a four-yard burst over left tackle with 3:11 left in the period. Gus Delorme's PAT placements just missed the left upright.

A mishandled punt by Bulldog Phil Sell set up Glendale's second touchdown in the third quarter. Sell tried to field the boot on the run and accidentally kicked the ball. Kizina recovered at the C-K 19.

Edsel Delorme executed a beautiful bootleg play on third-and-11, skirting left end for 19 yards to the one.

He scored on the next play. Gus Delorme took a pitch around right end for the extra points, and the scoring was completed with 6:03 remaining in the third quarter.

Aided by a roughing-the-kicker call against the Vikes, Claysburg-Kimmel crossed midfield later in the period before being stopped.

Bob Lender returned the punt 30 yards, but Edsel Delorme was hit as he tried to pass from the C-K 29, and the ball fell into tackle Gary Walter's arms.

Glendale stymied the Bulldogs, however, with three pass thefts in the final 10 minutes.

"Gus ran well," Lloyd said in reviewing the game. "Claysburg took the middle away from us, but they were giving us the outside. Against Shade, we had run well up the middle."

Glendale, 3-0 for 1975, visits Nanty Glo Saturday for a 2 p.m. battle against Blacklick Valley."

# Viking Defense Holds For 17th Win in Row

NANTY GLO — Bolstered by four goal line stands and converted wingback Bill Snyder's running, the Glendale Vikings captured their 16th consecutive win Saturday afternoon by downing a stubborn Blacklick Valley squad 12-0.

Snyder galloped for 68 yards in eight carries and tallied both Glendale touchdowns from the wingback position — an unfamiliar spot for the Viking senior. Snyder was pressed into service when regular wing Mickey Yaworski suffered a freak off-the-field accident that resulted in 13 stitches on his left hand.

Viking mentor John Lloyd was very happy with Snyder's performance and especially that of the Viking defense. "You have to give Snyder a lot of credit because

he learned all of the wingback plays in one night. Our other wingback, Rich Lender, is also out.

"I thought our kids played a tremendous game considering the backfield change," the Vike boss continued. "I have to give the defense a tremendous amount of credit. We had four or five goal line stands. The boys are picking up valuable experience and it's beginning to show."

With the Viking offense scratching out two touchdowns in the first half, it was up to the Viking defense to hold off the Blacklick offense.

Blacklick, also nicknamed the Vikings, penetrated the Glendale 10 four times and had a first-and-goal situation each time. Once the Blacklick squad was on the three and another time on the five.

Glendale lit up the scoreboard early when Snyder popped around right end for a 15-yard scamper to paydirt. Gus Delorme's kick was wide.

The Vikes came back in the second period to tag on the other six-pointer. This time, Snyder struck from 20 yards. Edsel Delorme's two-point pass fell incomplete.

Obviously, Lloyd had ball-control on his mind for Edsel Delorme did not attempt a pass the entire afternoon. It wasn't necessary for Glendale rolled up 188 yards rushing.

The Vikings are 4-0 and have a 16-game winning streak on the line as they face Juniata Valley next week at Flinton in their first big test of the season. The Hornets are 3-1 having lost only to unbeaten Northern Bedford.

# Vike Defense Keeps Unbeaten Streak Alive

FLINTON — It's been nearly two years since Glendale failed to win a football game. On Saturday afternoon at Roy F. Baker Field, the Vikings 17-game winning streak came to a halt.

However, an 18-game unbeaten skein lives on thanks to a gutsy effort by the Glendale defense in preserving a 0-0 tie against Juniata Valley.

The Hornets, a squad which boasted 21 lettermen and a 3-1 record coming into the game, virtually whipped the Viking defense between the 10-yard lines. When things got tough, though, it was the Vikes who were tougher.

Coach John Lloyd cited his squad for "playing the second half with our backs to the wall, but our kids were fighting their hearts out. The defense is really coming of age."

Indeed, two superior goal line stands capped a performance by the Vikes that relied on a sometimes porous defense to keep from losing; Glendale's offense was non-existent.

The Hornets skipped and bulled their way for 160 yards rushing and twice penetrated the Glendale 10. The first time was on Juniata Valley's opening series of the second half when the Hornets' two tough running backs, Paul Snare and Mike Carper, belted out 39 yards on six

carries to the G-15. On a second-and-five situation, Carper hammered out ten yards and appeared on his way to a score before Gus Delorme shook the ball loose and an unidentified Viking pounced on it to thwart the threat.

During the very next Hornet possession, the visitors again moved inside the Viking 10. After John Ciganik returned an Edsel Delorme punt to the Glendale 28, Carper bolted for four yards, then Paul Snare raced 15 yards to the G-9. On the first down, Carper slanted off right tackle for four. On the next play, the Viking line swarmed around Carper for no gain. Snare was then tripped up on the G-7, forcing a fourth-and-goal situation. The snap was mishandled by Hornet quarterback Gary Murray and Bill Snyder covered the ball at the 10 and took the pressure off once more.

Just the same, the Glendale offense (119 total yards) only penetrated Juniata Valley territory once — that being in the second quarter when Richard Kerr scooped up a Hornet fumble at the JV-35. The Vikings could only reach the Hornet 33.

On the other side of the coin, the Hornets were consistently buzzing about the Glendale half of the gridiron. When a team spends as much time in one's territory as Juniata Valley did, it's bound to pick up one touchdown. Credit some heads-up play by the Viking defense for preventing that.

The Vikings can also thank Murray's butter-fingered receivers for dropping three or four on-target passes; one was dropped in the end zone with about 35 seconds left in the game. Immediately after that play, Snyder again came to the rescue for the Viking defense when Murray's last-ditch effort deflected off his receiver's shoulder pad and into the Glendale senior's arms.

It was probably as good a defensive game ever played in the area, and Glendale has nothing to be ashamed of in tying a team like Juniata Valley. Rated as the underdogs by many, the Vikes

proved that they can deal with just about any test put to them.

Although the Vikes could manage just four first downs, one must keep in mind that they started on first down from inside their 20 nine times. That often times limits the choice of plays.

A team with five lettermen and little solid experience was given little chance of having a great season. After five games, that squad has gelled with a 4-0-1 record. That in itself is a tribute to the Glendale Viking football attitude.

The Vikings will tangle with 3-2 and fast-improving West Branch at L. T. Drivas Memorial Stadium this Friday in a revival of The

Progress Bowl series. It should be a good one.

## Vikes, Warriors Battle to Progress Bowl Tie

ALLPORT — A good parlay when Glendale and West Branch teams meet on the gridiron is that the clash will be close, low-scoring and a crowd-pleaser.

Since the inception of The Progress Bowl five years ago, and before, too, the Vikings and Warriors have waged some tremendous defensive struggles.

Last night's was another bruising, hard-hitting affair that ended, perhaps appropriately, in a 6-6 standoff.

Every player on both teams gave so much that none deserved to walk off L. T. Drivas Memorial Field a loser.

Granted, a tie isn't a win, but this tie extends Glendale's unbeaten string another week. Coach John Lloyd's defensively-proud Vikings haven't lost in 19 consecutive games, with the last two showing as stalemates.

And the deadlock keeps Coach Bill Vroman's Warriors above .500 at 3-2-1 for the stretch. Question: do very many West Branch fans realize that this 1975 squad, which Vroman claims has come 3,000 per cent in two

months, is only the second in many years to emerge from the first half of the campaign with a winning record?

Both Lloyd and Vroman, and their assistants, have done exceptional coaching jobs this fall. Credit, too, those players who have responded to such leadership.

As for The Progress Bowl, a tie definitely is not like a win. It goes to the team which can defeat the other two clubs in the Glendale-West Branch-Moshannon Valley rivalry.

That leaves only Mo Valley with a shot at the award for 1975. The Black Knights have never won it. West Branch took command the first year, but the Vikings permanently retired the first Progress Bowl with six consecutive wins. The new Progress Bowl will remain in Clearfield this winter unless Mo Valley does something about it.

Offensive heroes last night were few, for the hard-charging, hard-hitting defensive front walls plus alert, quick linebacking corps dominated.

Glendale had 94 net yards in the first half, and 67 came on a Edsel Delorme-to-Bob Lender pass that put the ball on the WB-2, setting up the visitors' touchdown.

West Branch, which controlled the ball more with its running game molded around Joe Baronak and Ed Kyler, missed two great opportunities in the first quarter and then drove 71 yards in the fourth quarter to register the equalizer. Early on, West Branch mounted a drive from its 23. Baronak, Kyler and Jack White did most of the toting on a march to a first down at the G-6. The Warrior offense didn't get set on its first play, though, and a fumble ensued with Viking Bill Snyder recovering at the five.

Following an exchange of punts, the Vikings covered 83 yards in eight plays, the big one that long pass. Two players earlier, Glendale gambled on fourth-and-inches at its 27, and Edsel Delorme just did make the sticks. After a four-yard pickup by Snyder, one of many two-way stalwarts in the game, the Vikes crossed up the Warrior defense. After a good fake, Delorme faded back and found Lender 15 yards behind the Warrior defense. A saving tackle by Kyler prevented Lender from going all the way, but Delorme sneaked to the one and then into the end zone for the TD with 4:18 left in the half. The snap on the PAT was mishandled, so Gus Delorme never got a chance to boot the ball.

Glendale threatened to pull away at the outset of the second half with a thrust to the WB-7. The Warrior defenders buckled down there, and Gus Delorme attempted a 28-yard field goal that had plenty of distance but just missed to the left.

West Branch began its scoring drive on the last play of the third quarter. The Warriors used quick pitches to Kyler to move the ball against a defense geared to stop the quick-hitters inside. At the G-22, Baronak broke one of those dive plays, maintaining his balance after one hit to stumble and then dive into the end zone with 8:53 remaining.

On the PAT, Glendale was called for interference when the Warriors went to the air. On the second try, Kyler tried the right side of the Glendale defense but was stopped cold.

The defenses saw to it that there were no more threats.

"It was a tremendous team effort," Lloyd said of his Vikes. "I thought we did move the football some the second half. I certainly can't ault our kids. There wasn't one of them out there who didn't give it his all.

"West Branch was well-prepared for this game. It was a hard-fought game.

"After the game, I got to thinking about the time we had to try the field goal. Maybe I didn't have them prepared enough to move the ball inside the 10. We worked a lot on goal line defense, but we don't work as much on goal line offense. Maybe this was a coaching error on my part.

"Maybe I'm guilty of neglecting the offense some, but I'm a firm believer in defense. When I first started coaching, I put an awful lot of emphasis on offense.

"From my own experience, I believe the only way you can stay in a football game is to have a good defense. If you have a good defense, I believe you can stay in a game with anybody. That keeps the kids fired up. As long as you're in the game, your kids are working.

"If you can't stop the other team, your kids can get demoralized, and you can be out of a game before you know it."

Vikings who made it tough for West Branch to move the ball were tackles George Dick and Denny Swauger, middle guard Richard Kerr and backers Snyder and Jon Morrison. Snyder had a pass

interception to go with his fumble recovery. Ken Kitko also picked off a pass.

Warriors who did the job defensive included Gary Turner at middle guard, Jim Jones and Dennis Bumbarger at tackles and Rod Leid and Jim Taylor at linebackers. Vroman has special praise for Taylor.

"The whole game boiled down to discipline, for us," Vroman said, "We didn't have it when we needed it. The kids are overanxious.

"We didn't get set on the play after we recovered their fumble, so we fumbled. That's discipline. Even on the extra point try, we weren't set. That was discipline. We ran the wingback counter there once in the second half when we didn't get a downfield block which would have opened up a big gainer. That's discipline.

"I'll tell you one thing, though. An indication of the type of kids we have is that they've had so many setbacks and drawbacks and are still sitting here 3-2-1.

"I've got to give John's kids credit. They're gutsy kids. They gut it out when they have to. John's done a heck of a job up there."

Glendale, 4-0-2 now, hosts Purchase Line next Saturday. West Branch travels to Huntingdon that night to play Juniata Valley, which battled Glendale to a scoreless tie last week.

# Viking Streak Ends At 20

WILLIAMSBURG — It was a good thing while it lasted, but then it had to end sooner or later.

The Glendale Vikings, owners of a 20-game unbeaten streak, lost its first football game in 21 attempts as a pair of touchdown passes from Williamsburg quarterback Bill Tate to running back Jeff White was the Vikings undoing as the Blue Pirates picked up a 14-7 win last night.

It was the first game that the Glendale Vikings failed to win since October 6, 1973 when Juniata Valley won 20-14. Throughout the 20-game unbeaten streak were a series of close games, but the Vikes either won or managed a tie—indicative of the quality that head coach John Lloyd and his staff have built into their teams.

Unfortunately, that was all for the Vikes and the starting for the Pirates. After a Viking punt, Williamsburg started from their own 35 late in the half. It took eight plays to go 65 yards. Tate fired to White for the final 13 yards with only 33 seconds remaining before intermission. A pass for two failed.

The Vikings were still ahead by one, but a determined Blue Pirate squad came up with the clincher in the third quarter. The Tate-to-White combination capped a nine-play, 41-yard march, scoring from two yards out. Tate picked up the two-point conversion by passing to Gordon England.

The never-say-die Vikings gave it one last effort, but ironically fell one yard short of their goal. Late in the fourth quarter, The Vikes were on the march and eventually reached the W-3. Gus DeLorme carried for two

yards, on fourth down but was stopped on the one. Credit a gutsy effort by the Pirate defense for preserving the win.

Stats were fairly even. Glendale had a slight edge in rushing yardage, 140-124. The Pirates owned the airwaves 62-3, but turned the ball over three times compared to Glendale's one. Williamsburg racked up 13 first downs while Glendale could manage only six.

Gus DeLorme was the Vikings top ballcarrier with 62 stripes in 19 attempts.

It was a tough one for Glendale to lose, but when you're number one, everyone's out to get you.

HOUTZDALE — Proud and poised, the Glendale Vikings shook off a stunning early touchdown by Moshannon Valley's Jim Eckberg, played their usual, solid, fundamentally-sound game and rolled to a convincing 28-6 win at chilly Hilltop Stadium last night.

Great defense, characteristic of these outstanding Glendale squads Coach John Lloyd and his fine staff turn out every autumn, and a new-found overland attack hyped by junior Mickey Yaworski and soph Rich Lightner doomed the Black Knights in The Progress Bowl game, which attracted an SRO crowd.

Yaworski darted 126 yards in just 10 carries, scoring the final touchdown on a 48-yard sprint, while Lightner, making his first varsity start, churned 99 yards in 16 trips.

Bob Lender accounted for two Vike touchdowns on a 56-yard punt return, an alert play that took a lot of zip out of the Knights, and a 40-yard pass-run play in which he stepped away from a tackler right after making the grab.

Quarterback Edsel Delorme ran for the other TD while older brother Gus, a sidwinding kicker, booted four extra points.

In the end, the vaunted Vike defense stood tall. The Mo Valley TD, a 65-yarder, was only the seventh given this year as Glendale opponents mustered just 44 points.

That unit is comprised of ends Joe Kruis and Ron or Rob Palmer, tackles Denny Swauger and George Dick, middle guard Rich Kerr, linebackers Jon Morrison, Bill Snyder and Ken Kitka, and backs Dave Irwin, Gus Delorme and either Edsel Delorme or Yaworski.

"Those kids gave us a tremendous effort all year," praised Lloyd. "They deserve a lot of credit. They gave us less than five points a game."

He also lauded the offensive line. "We were really moving the football. Those blockers just blew some big holes in their line."

He pretty well summed up the Glendale performance with, "In my opinion, this was the best football game we played all year."

Fittingly, it came in the finale against the school's arch-rivals as the Vikes, who permanently retired the first Progress Bowl last year made sure there would be no winner in 1975. Mo Valley had a chance because Glendale and West Branch had played to a tie earlier in the season.

More importantly, the victory gave the Vikings a brilliant 6-1-2 record for a season that many observers believed would be a real struggle.

That's where the pride surfaces.

Lloyd add, "I told the kids today, at the pep rally, that we sort of measure our players a lot of times by their experience, the number of boys back from the previous year, their size and their speed. Most of the time this is the good way to judge a team."

"However, you can't look inside a kid and see the pride he has, the desire to play the game. These kids had that type of attitude."

"I'll be very honest. I certainly didn't foresee a record like this before the season. Not with just three starters and two other lettermen back."

While pride was the factor for the season, poise was important after Eckberg took Joe Tarbay's pass in the left flat and burned the Viking defense on his 65-yard jaunt to the end zone. He cut back to the middle of the field after crossing midfield and outraced several Vikes.

The Knights had two chances for the PAT because Glendale was offside on the first attempt, but Eckberg was smothered both times after taking quick pitches to

the left.

Still, with the game just 1:20 and two scrimmage plays old, Mo Valley, especially Eckberg, had made the type of play that inspires upsets.

Except the Vikes don't rattle easily.

"It was the second play of the game, and it's pretty hard to tell what's going to happen," Lloyd said, "but it certainly shook up us coaches. I think it's another tribute to these kids that they fell behind so quick and stayed right in there."

Glendale answered with a drive that was aborted by a fumble at the MV-20, but the defense stiffened and forced a punt that turned into a much more controversial play than it should have. Too many fans don't know the rules.

A Knight player slapped the ball on first bounce. He didn't down it, however. Lender alertly caught the ball on the hop, sidestepped one Knight and breezed 56 yards down the left sideline for the TD. Gus Delorme tacked on the PAT, and the Vikes were on their way, leading 7-6 with 4:51 left in the quarter.

The rule stipulates the ball must be downed, not merely touched, before the play is dead. The four officials, who did a very good job in the backyard scrap, took much

uncalled-for abuse during intermission, though all but a few Knight rooters quit beefing once the rule was explained to them.

The officials, Jim Trude, Joe Zelenky, Joe Mahkovec and Bill Terry, handled the situation very well.

Glendale got a break later in the first quarter when Bill Reese, back to punt, had to scoop up a low snap and run for his life. He was tackled at the MV-34, but the Vikes fumbled the ball away at the 20, Eckberg recovering.

A great catch by Mark Stodart for a 36-yard gainer put the Knights in Vike territory, but Gus Delorme picked off the next aerial at the G-19.

Gus Delorme got off a high punt that took a Knight bounce to the G-37, but even an offside penalty against the visitors couldn't help the hosts move the sticks.

Glendale asserted its strengths in the next five minutes to open a 21-6 bulge. The 40-yard pass-run score capped a 64-yard thrust. Edsel Delorme was right on target with his pass after play-action fake, and Lender did the rest. He eluded Stodart's tackle at the 20 and sped to the end zone. Gus Delorme's placement made it 14-6.

Three plays later, the Vikes' hard-hitting defense forced a fumble that George Dick recovered at the MV-16. Yaworski, on a beautifully-executed trap the Vikes ran so successfully all night, just missed a TD. Edsel Delorme scored on the next play, leaning over right tackle. Brother Gus' conversion set the score at 21-6 with 4:31 to go in the half.

An 83-yard march by the Vikings' produced the lone second half TD, Yaworski's 48-yard romp on his pet counter play. The scoreboard flicked 28-6 with three seconds to go in the third quarter when Gus Delorme's placement was true.

Lloyd, always the gentleman, couldn't pass up an opportunity to cite his assistants.

"Anything we've accomplished has been because of the whole staff. I would like to see credit, as far as the

staff goes, divided equally. Coach (George) Mills, Coach (Tom) Terza and I have been together a long time, and believe me, I respect everything they have to say. They work on the varsity with me. The other guys on the staff certainly work just as hard, but they aren't involved as much with the varsity. They work with the younger kids."

A 6-1-2 record has to make this one of the most satisfying years for Lloyd and his aides.

Mo Valley dipped to 4-5 with the setback, and Coach Bob Sinclair's Knights will have to bounce back next week at West Branch if they are to avert a losing record.

Aside from Tarbay's two passes that netted 101 yards and some good second half runs by Eckberg, the Knight offense had little punch.

Bill Reese had an interception and Bob Simpson a fumble recovery for the Knights in the second half.

Gus Deletme, who was moved to fullback because Bill Snyder was ailing, opening the way for Lightner to make his debut, had two interceptions for the Vikings.

"Snyder got sick today and we had him checked out but we wanted to save him for defense, and that's why we switched Gus and started Rich," Lloyd said.

"This certainly was a good win for us. This is something to get the kids looking to next year."

The Vikings will be more experienced next fall but no more proud nor poised than the 1975 edition.

# Nicholson Top Rusher, Scorer

## Milsom, Norris Pacesetters in Aerial Stats

While Curwensville was enjoying one of its finest seasons ever on the gridiron with a 9-1 log, the Golden Tide's super fullback Bill Nicholson was also having a dandy time with 1,155 yards rushing and 122 points for The Progressland titles in both statistical departments.

Elsewhere, Clearfield tight end Jeff Norris hauled in 26 passes to grab the pass receiving crown while Jay Milsom of Philipsburg-Osceola earned top honors in the passing department with 762 yards and 57 completions.

Nicholson, whose three-year scholastic career carried him well over the 2,100 yard mark, lugged the ball 183 times for the Tide and averaged 6.3 yards-per-carry while doing so, his 1,155 yards

pushing him way ahead of the area's number two rusher, Jim Eckberg of Moshannon Valley, who had 893 stripes on 192 tries.

Nicholson and Eckberg also staged a one-two battle on the scoring sheet, but a slow midseason for the Black Knight runner kept him at the 60-point mark, far behind Nicholson's 122 points via 19 touchdowns and four two-point conversions.

Norris' 26 catches nudged out Perry Irwin of P-O, who had 22 receptions, but both ends accounted for 380 yards on the receiving end of passes.

Milsom was the only tosser in the area to complete over 50 per cent of his passes, 57 for 112 for a 50.9 percentage, and his 762 yards just edged

those of Curwensville's Steve Sopic, who had 737 yards on 37 completions.

Sopic, last year's leading passer as a junior, did top the area in one department, that being seven touchdown passes.

Following Nicholson, the number two ground gainer last season, and Eckberg in the running race were P-O sophomore Buck Petrosky, 782 yards on 207 lugs, Gus Delorme of Glendale, 703 stripes on 126 carries, and another Golden Tide runner, Pat Morgan with 678 yards on 103 attempts.

Rounding out the top 10 runners were Ed Kyler of West Branch (518), George Clark of Clearfield (477), Curwensville's Tim Wiggins (349), Joe Baronak, of West Branch (348), who alternated between quarterback and fullback, and another Curwensviller, Randy Cathcart with 321, putting four Golden Tide rushers in the first 10.

In addition to Norris and Irwin, other pass catchers with 10 or more receptions were Glenn Gearhart of Curwensville (17), Tim Bash of Purchase Line (17), West Branch's Mike Bunyak (16), George Kitchen of Purchase Line (14), P-O's Dave Mason (13), and Kyler (12).

George Magas of Purchase Line went to the air the most times, 121, and Mo Valley's Joe Tarbay was intercepted the most, 15 times.

Curwensville, which lead in team scoring with 287 points.

had five players in the top 10 scorers. Nicholson topped the scoring list, followed by Eckberg, Edsel Delorme (49), and Gus Delorme (42), both of Glendale, Morgan (40), Clark (36), Gearhart (36), Milsom (36), Wiggins (34), Cathcart (32), West Branch's Jack White (32).

Ed Kyler led in two-point conversions with 6 PAT's and Gus Delorme lead in kicking PAT's with six.
