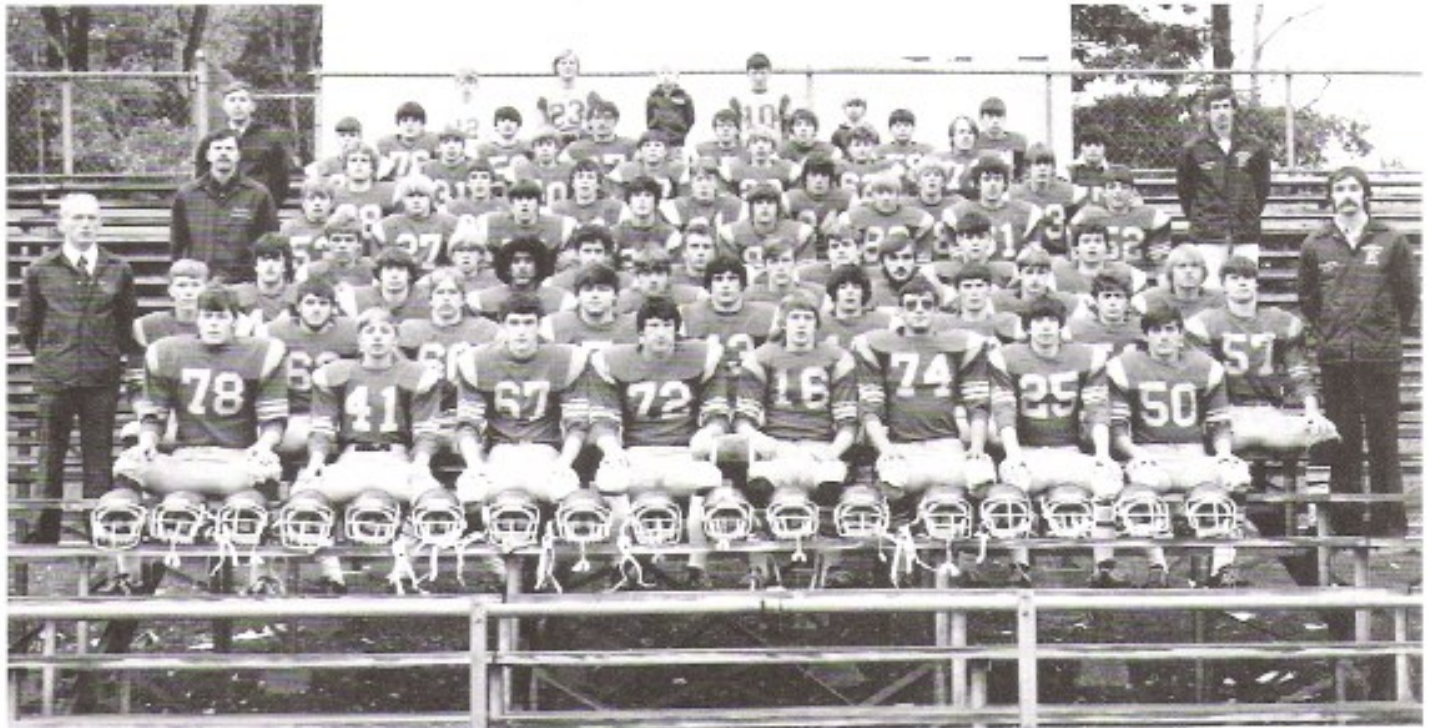

## Vikings' Ground Game Paves Way To Win Over Bucks

FLINTON — Glendale Viking fans held their breath last night when a vastly improved Bucktail team came within two points of spoiling the Viking opener at the Dr. Roy F. Baker Athletic Field.

The Vikings squeaked by the Bucks with a 14-12 score that accurately reflects the fine performance put on by both squads, who played last night in the first night game held under the lights at the Glendale field.

Glendale tailback Mark McCartney led the way on the 255 yard Viking ground attack, as he piled up 101 yards on 11 carries. One of those totes was a dramatic 59 yard touchdown burst that brought the Glendale crowd to its feet.

Bucktail fans also had reasons to cheer, because thier outstanding junior running back Jerry Francis piled up 88 yards in 27 carries to lead the Buck rushing game, which brought the team from Renovo a total of 155 yards.

"This is one of the best Bucktail teams I've ever seen" Viking head coach John Lloyd said after the game. "They're hitters and real stickers."

Bucktail had the chance to turn the game their way early in the first quarter when the Bucks put together a march from mid-field to the

Glendale four yard line, where Viking Frank Tiesi recovered Bucktail quarterback Jay Houser's fumble.

Tiesi's fumble recovery made up for his own miscue at mid-field that set up the Bucktail drive. Neither team was able to move the ball on their possessions prior to the first Glendale fumble.

The fumble left Bucktail in excellent position with a first and 10 at the Glendale 13. However, on the last play of the first quarter, the Viking defenders penetrated the Bucktail offensive line and dropped Buck quarterback Houser for an eight yard loss. After four downs, the Bucktail team couldn't capatilize on the Glendale mistake, so the ball went back to the Vikings on their own 19.

From there, the Glendale team put together a 13 play, 81 yard touchdown march. Viking wingback Roger Parks chipped in a 14 yard run on this series, but the big play that sustained the drive was a 32 yard pass from Tiesi to Viking end Joseph Pyzowski.

The Glendale quarterback drilled the ball into Pyzowski's hands as a host of red shirted Bucks looked on, putting the Vikings at the Bucktail 13 yard line. Four plays later, Tiesi plowed in on a keeper from the one, and he turned over the two point conversion by hitting McCartney with a pass in the endzone. This made it 8-0 Vikings with 5:15 left in the first half.

Again Bucktail bounced back, putting together a drive that took them from their 30 to the Glendale 12, where they ran out of time and downs when the half ended.

Since Bucktail won the toss and received first, the Vikings took the ball to start the second half. Viking end

Stan Rohrbach took the Buck kickoff at the Glendale 23, returning the ball 18 yards to the G-41.

On the first play from scrimmage in the second half, Viking tailback McCartney picked his way on a sweep right, sidestepping defenders as he crashed down the sideline for his 59-yard touchdown run. The kick failed, leaving the score 14-0 Glendale with 11:29 left in the third quarter.

Bucktail wasn't able to move the ball on the next series, but a Glendale fumble on their next possession set up a Buck TD. The Vikings muffed a snap that turned the ball over to Bucktail at the Glendale 36.

The Bucks marched to the Glendale 23, then they went 10 yards the other way to make it third and 20 at the Viking 33. A halfback pass from Buck Boyd Mazzulla to end James Tomko covered 27 yards and kept the drive alive for the Bucks, giving them first and goal at the Glendale 6.

Halfback Francis crashed into the end zone three plays later, giving the Bucks their first score of the night with 3:55 left in the third quarter. The kick fell short, so the score went to 14-6 Glendale.

Viking McCartney punched out a 19 yard run on the first play of the next Glendale series, and team mate Richard Lender chipped in a 15 yard run, but the drive fell short at the Bucktail 31.

Two plays later, Bucktail turned the ball over to the Vikings on the Buck 34, but an encroachment penalty set the Vikings back to third and 25 at the Buck 48, a defecit that they couldn't overcome.

Bucktail put together its last scoring drive of the night in the fourth quarter when it took the Glendale punt at the Buck 21. From there a series of runs and two key passes—which quarterback Houser tossed 14 yards to end Richard Poorman and 23 yards to halfback Mazzulla—ended the drive with Houser's one yard plunge into the end-zone.

However, Houser's pass fell short in the conversion attempt, so with 5:47 left in the game, the score went to 14-12, Glendale.

The Vikings chewed up the remaining time on a march from their own 31 to the Bucktail 11' where the drive ended as the final gun sounded.

Bucktail head coach Robert Young walked away from the game sounding confident in his revitalized team. He said the squad will have to work more on defense, but he said he was well pleased the way his offense moved the ball against the seasoned Glendale defense.

"We got a couple of horses we've been running on offense, but we got hurt with the inexperience of our defensive backs," Young said.

While the Bucks work on defense, coach Lloyd said the Vikings will be concentrating on not fumbling the ball as much as they did in last night's game. The Vikings turned the ball over twice, one time giving Bucktail a touchdown as a result of the miscue. Glendale also recovered six of their own fumbles during the game.

"We fumbled too much," Lloyd said. "This is what we

had problems with in the scrimmages, so we'll just have to go back and work harder."

He said running back McCartney is a "good quality player," and that he was pleased with his team's performance except for the fumbles.

Next week, the Vikings travel to Shade Central City.

## Long Trip Turns Into Lost Cause for Viking Squad

**CAIRNBROOK** — Glendale's darkest gridiron day in recent history occurred while the sun was shining brightly.

The Vikings, stymied by four lost fumbles, never got their offense in gear and saw their overworked defense yield three touchdowns en route to a depressing 23-6 loss to Shade-Central City Saturday afternoon.

What kind of day was it for Glendale? The bus broke down on the way home, the game films turned out lousy and the Vikings lost a game that they could have easily won.

The Vikings and the Panthers played to a near stand-off in the first half until the Panthers took advantage of a Viking fumble at the good field position after Frank Tiesi's punt to the G-32 from his own end zone to take an 8-0 halftime lead.

The third quarter was the real killer for Glendale. The Vikes ran just two plays (both lost fumbles) while Shade-Central cracked off 19 plays, finally wearing down a Viking defense that was doing a fine job previously.

In that disastrous third quarter, the Panthers scored two touchdowns, one a superb individual effort by

fullback George Leasure on an eight-yard run and the other a 12-yard sweep by Tom Baxter on third-and-four.

However, Glendale head coach John Lloyd is actually right when he said the Vikings executed well, except for their ballhandling. The Viking defense played an admirable game considering Shade ran 49 plays compared to Glendale's 25. On a day as hot as Saturday was, it was just too much for the Vike defense to handle consistently.

"We worked hard in practice and felt we had our ballhandling under control," mused Viking coach Lloyd. "The kids were executing rather well except for that."

The Viking defense showed what it was made of on Shade-Central's first possession of the game. The Panthers drove from the G-37 — after a fumble recovery — to a first-and-goal situation at the G-8.

The Vikes put up a solid wall at that point, stopping Shade-Central on four straight cracks at the goal line, regaining the oval at their own two-yard line.

With the Vikes hemmed in, Tiesi punted to the G-32 where Shade-Central took over once more. Key first down runs by Leasure, the

game's leading ground-gainer with 68 yards on 20 carries, and Dave Knepp moved the ball to the G-1 where Knepp sneaked over from his quarterback slot with approximately seven minutes to play in the half.

Knepp skirted the right side for a pair of extra-points and Shade-Central took the 8-0 lead into the locker room with them.

Not even the most ardent Shade-Central supporter could imagine what was going to happen in the third quarter. The Glendale players, coaches and fans especially hardly believed what happened.

After receiving the kickoff, the Panthers neatly wrapped up on three straight downs by the Viking defense and forced Leasure to punt to the G-32 where it rolled dead.

An attempted bootleg backfired as the ball dropped to the turf after a muffed fake when it appeared as though Tiesi would have had room to run on the left side. Shade's George Thomas jumped on it at the G-32.

The Panthers slowly punched their way goalward, moving to a first-and-goal situation at the G-3. Two plays netted one yard and the next play was a six-yard loss to the eight when a Viking back caused a fumble

that Leasure recovered.

But Leasure swept around left end on fourth down, received a nice block from George Zborvancic, made a sharp cut and was met at the one by a Glendale defender. A last-ditch Leasure lunge put the nose of the ball inches over the white stripe.

It was that play, followed by a fumble on Glendale's possession that turned the tables for good.

Knepp passed to Tim Smith to the Panthers a 16-0 lead with four-and-a-half minutes to play in the third quarter and the home-standing squad regained the ball almost immediately as Glendale fumbled it away on the first offensive play after the kickoff.

It took the Panthers seven plays to travel 32 yards for the touchdown as Tom Baxter, playing back-up quarterback, optioned around the right side for a 12-yard touchdown run with about 10 seconds remaining in the quarter. Sam Lanzic's extra-point kick was good to make it 23-0.

Glendale finally put together its first drive of the game at the outset of the final stanza, moving from its own 40 to the SCC-20 in 11 plays before yielding the ball on downs.

Another strong effort by the exhausted Vike defense forced a punt to the G-42 that Stan Rohrbach returned to the S-43. The Vikes finally scored on a four-play 43-yard drive, capped by Mark McCartney's 27-yard jaunt

The touchdown came with about two minutes left in the game and the Vikings hopes for a miracle comeback were shorted out when a Shade-Central defensive back made fine play to break the PAT pass.

"I can't get down on the defense," Lloyd noted after the scuffle. "They played tough in our own territory."

"We're gonna lick this thing," Lloyd emphasized about Glendale's recent woes. "We have a much better football team than we showed Saturday. We have good football players. I've never had football players that gave up and I have faith in this bunch of kids."

Granted Glendale reached a low point Saturday with a 17-point loss, the most a Viking team has lost by since Sept. 28, 1968 when they were blasted by Blacklick Valley 40-6. That's nine years.

But Glendale has never been the type of team that

has stayed down, and if that statement holds true, the Glendale football of the past eight years may soon reappear in 1977.

The Vikings will attempt to get back on the right track this Friday evening when they host the Claysburg-Kimmel Bulldogs at Flinton in their third game of the season.

# Solid Defense Sparks Vikings To Second Victory

**FLINTON** — The rest of the Glendale opponents better beware because it looks as though the Vikings may have regained the touch that has brought them so many victories over the past few years.

Last night the Vikings played superb defense and adequate offense to beat Claysburg-Kimmel 20-14 in a drizzle at Dr. Roy F. Baker Football Field.

As Glendale coach John Lloyd put it, "We're coming along."

Although the Vikings haven't been overpowering anybody this season they've still got a 2-1 record, so when things begin to fall into place Glendale could again become an impressive football club.

"The boys were really fired up out there tonight," Lloyd stated while heading for the celebration in the locker-room. "We've been a little complacent but that seems to be changing."

"We were also much better offensively," the long-time coach pointed out. "We're reading stunts much better and really firing off the ball."

On defense the Vikings were in top form as they forced five fumbles, recovering them all, and limited the Bulldogs to just 76 yards total offense, only 21 on the ground.

Offensively Glendale chewed up 155 yards on the ground, 81 by the power-running Mark McCartney and 79 more by the slashing Roger Parks, and luckily kept its errors to a minimum.

The two turnovers Glendale did commit cost the Vikings. Although they lost only one

fumble it set up a Clay-Kimmel touchdown and an interception was run all the way back for the Bulldogs other six-pointer.

Several bad punts, one which just made it back to the line of scrimmage and the other which traveled just 10 yards with the help of a bounce, put the Vikings in a hole early in the game, but Glendale's defensive unit held the 'Dogs off.

Claysburg had a second-and-nine on the G-12 and lost the ball via a fumble but the Vikings couldn't sustain a drive and they never crossed the 50 until they jumped on another loose ball on the C-K 33.

A late-hit penalty put Glendale within striking distance and some hard-nosed running by McCartney put the Blue-and-Gold into the end zone at the 5:14 mark of the second period.

McCartney's first of two TD's came from two yards out but Glendale had to settle for six as Parks fumbled a pitchout on the try for two.

Another fumble recovery, this one by Joe Pyzowski, set up yet another scoring drive and a 16-yard pass from Frank Tiesl to Chuck Cusick and a 13-yard scoot by Parks didn't hurt any, either.

McCartney put the points on the board with a one-yard dive over the top and his run around end for the PAT upped the Glendale lead to 14-0 with just 40 seconds remaining in the half.

Early in the third quarter Lloyd called for a halfback option pass and Rich Lender got the nod. But Lender's aerial was off target and Don Grabill stepped in for the interception and outran the Glendale offense for a 48-yard return and a touchdown.

The Bulldogs put the pressure on with a two-point conversion on a pass from Doak Hoenstine to Gary Mussleman as Glendale's lead was cut to 14-8 with 9:29 left in the round.

Glendale, which went in spurts on offense, got back onto the board again after Parks broke off a 43-yard scamper on a double reverse, putting the Vikings on the five.

Three plays later Tiesl plunged over from the one and with 8:37 to go in the game Glendale was ahead 20-8. The PAT was no good as McCartney was thrown for a loss.

Tiesl fumbled later in the contest and two long passes and a two-yard dive by Rex Mussleman had C-K back within a touchdown.

Hoenstine's pass to Rex Tremmel was dropped but there were still 3:39 minutes left and the Bulldogs were behind just 20-14.

Claysburg got one last shot when they took over with 58 seconds remaining on the Bulldog 45, but on the very first play Terry Willis and Terry Peacock pounced on a Hoenstine fumble to ice the win.

Glendale will travel to Penns Valley next Friday.

# Vikes, Rams Deadlock

SPRING MILLS — Penns Valley had a touchdown called back, Glendale missed a last-ditch field goal and everything else was a dead heat as the Vikings and Rams battled to a scoreless tie in last night's scholastic grid action.

It was just that kind of night as neither team could get the big play that would put points on the scoreboard.

Penns Valley had a couple of chances but big defensive plays by Rich Lender and Clark Cree stymied those.

Glendale, meanwhile, never got inside the Rams' 30 until the Vikes made a last-minute drive behind the passing of sub quarterback Jamie Rydbom.

But just as Rydbom was getting the Viking offense in gear time began to run down and with five seconds left in the game Glendale mentor John Lloyd elected to go for a field goal.

Frank Tiesi's kick from the 28 was straight but the boot fell into the end zone about 10 yards short of the crossbar and Glendale had to settle for its second scoreless tie in as many seasons.

Last year Glendale fought to a 0-0 standoff with Berlin-Brothers Valley in a rainstorm.

Glendale, which has been having its offensive problems all season long, kept making those nagging little mistakes that slow down drives and make a coach want to pull his hair out.

"We moved the ball a times," Lloyd pointed out without much expression as

he was still trying to think back to any spots where his Vikes may have been able to get some points. "But everytime we started moving we'd make a mistake that would hurt us."

The mistakes weren't turnovers, either, as the Vikes fumbled the ball away just once, but those painful little five-yard penalties that can take the starch out of an offense.

Glendale was whistled for no less than eight minor violations on offense, three of them for delay of game. Those kind of things can really stymie an offense, and last night they did for the Vikes.

"We sure can't fault our defense," Lloyd pointed out. "Penns Valley had us backed up against a wall a couple of times but our defense didn't crack. They played a good game under a lot of pressure."

The stats couldn't have been much more indicative of how even the game really was.

Glendale was outrushed 117 yards-to-110 yards but Tiesi and Rydbom outpassed Penns Valley's John McMullen 56-44. Both teams lost one fumble and there was only one interception, that by Tiesi. Both punters got a lot of work, Tiesi kicking seven times for a 31.3 yard average and Van Winter six times for an average of 32.3 yards.

McMullen was the game's top rusher with 59 yards on just five carries, the big one being a 50-yard keeper that set up Penns Valley's "touchdown". Ram standout Al Pifer had just 24 yards on

14 carries as he sat out most of the second half with an ankle injury.

Mark McCartney topped the Viking runners with 47 yards on 14 totes.

The first quarter was a game of punts until McCartney broke off a good run for 15 yards, only to fumble on the PV-15 on the last play of the stanza.

Several series later the Rams threatened when McMullen outraced most of the Glendale defense on a keeper around the right end. He outran everyone for 50 yards before Terry Wills pulled him down from behind on the two.

An unsportsmanlike conduct penalty moved the ball half-the-distance, which was just a yard, and McMullen plunged into the end zone with about 5:30 to go until the intermission.

But the refs detected a little too much movement in the Rams' line and the penalty set Penns Valley back on the six. Pifer fumbled a pitchout on the next play and Cree was there to pounce on the loose pigskin to save the Vikes' necks.

Penns Valley again threatened in the second period when a shanked Tiesi punt bounced out to the Glendale 30. The Rams got as close as the one but Lender made a good play in the secondary to stop a fourth down pass headed for Mike Williams in the end zone.

Glendale mounted several time-consuming but fruitless drives in the second half, never crossing the PV-40 in fact, until late in the game

when the Vikes made one last effort.

Tiesi snagged McMullen's pass at the Viking 40 and with 1:35 left in the contest Glendale had one more shot.

Rydbom was in for an injured Tiesi and he completed two-of-four passes for 36 yards and another 15 yards for a pass interference call moved the Vikings to the PV-21 with five seconds to go.

The field goal try by Tiesi was all Lloyd could hope for but the kick fell short and both teams went off the field empty handed.

Glendale, now 2-1-1, will host Juniata Valley next Friday while the Rams, who are 1-2-1, host West Branch the same night.

# Jekyll-Hyde Glendale Overtakes Valley, 18-9

FLINTON—It looked like Jekyll and Hyde on the football field.

A Glendale High School team which looked hard-pressed to contain the Juniata Valley High School offense last night did a sudden turnaround, overcame a 9-0 deficit and went on to an 18-9 romp over the Hornets.

Senior quarterback Jamie Rydbom got his first real opportunity as signal caller since being injured in an auto accident last Summer, and the combination of Rydbom and halfback Mark McCartney was too hot for the Juniata Valley defense to handle.

The Vikings, who've steadily used McCartney as the mainstay of the backfield, continued to go to the senior, and McCartney responded by picking up 137 yards.

Glendale's defense looked as sharp as it has all season—something which became painfully evident to the Hornets in the second half. With the pressure turned all the way up, the Juniata Valley offense only had the chance to run eight plays in the second half, and they ran those eight for a net loss of 29 yards.

But the Vikings didn't start off the game looking like the team Glendale coach John Lloyd described as "self confident and believing in ourselves."

In the opening minutes of last night's contest, both sides looked a little sloppy.

Midway through the opening stanza, the Hornets worked their way inside the Glendale 10 but backed up when two miscues totaled a loss of 9 yards.

The Hornets had to settle for a 12-yard field goal by junior Paul Wright.

In the next three plays after the kickoff, Glendale fumbled the ball away, recovered a Juniata Valley fumble and then fumbled the ball to the Hornets again.

The Hornets took over at the Viking 32 and worked their way within spitting distance of the goal line, picking up a first down at the Glendale 2-yard line.

## Glendale Recovers

But the Hornet offense couldn't hold onto the ball, and fumbled the ball back to Glendale on a second down at the goal line.

Three plays later, on a third and eleven situation at their own 7-yard line, the Viking quarterback Frank Tiesi let go of the ball and the Hornets found themselves with another shot at a 9-0 lead.

On the next play, quarterback Steve Borst, a junior, handed off to sophomore halfback Bill Boyd who went around the left side for the score.

Juniata Valley tried for the two-point conversion, but the Borst-Boyd combination didn't work this time.

When the Vikings took possession, coach Lloyd made the decision to go with Jamie Rydbom.

## Rydbom Returns

"Rydbom is an experienced quarterback, but we kept thinking about the accident. We weren't really sure if some of our kids were hitting him as hard as he might be hit," Lloyd said after the game.

The senior started off by getting thrown for a 6-yard loss, but came back with a pair of handoffs to Mark McCartney for 14 yards. The Vikings came up two yards short and punted, but when they got the ball back on a Juniata fumble two plays later, Rydbom and McCartney started burning a path downfield.

On a six-play march through Juniata Valley territory down to the Hornet two-yard line, McCartney carried the ball five times for 25 yards.

From the two, though, Rydbom handed off to Richard Lender who went up the middle for the touchdown.

On the conversion attempt, Rydbom tried McCartney again, but the senior drew up short of the score.

Juniata Valley went to the locker room carrying a 9-6 edge, but the Glendale offense had already found the key which turned out the lights on the Hornets in the second half.

The Vikings took the kickoff at their own 16-yard line as the opening to a 16-play drive for the go-ahead touchdown. Glendale hung onto the ball for five first downs during the drive, running up almost seven minutes in possession time.

Rydbom rotated his handoffs among his backs, consistently picking up short yardage and solid blocking, with halfback Roger Parks providing a wall for McCartney to run with.

The Vikings inched their way down to the Hornet 1-yard line where Rydbom ran in for the touchdown.

## 2-Point Fails

On the try for the two-point conversion, Rydbom was sacked, but the Vikings had taken the lead for the first time during the evening.

When Juniata Valley finally got hold of the ball, they were backed into a fourth and twelve situation at their own 43, forcing them to punt.

The Vikings took the ball at their own 20, and started the offensive machine rumbling downfield again.

The drive lasted into the fourth quarter as the Vikings worked their way down to the Hornet 15-yard line, taking 13 plays to hammer at the Juniata Valley line for short yardage.

From the 22-yard line, Parks picked up two yards and broke loose on a second effort for another five yards, bringing Glendale to the Hornet 15-yard line.

From there, Lender carried for 10 yards and the Viking's sixth first down of the drive, setting up the Vikings at the Juniata Valley 5-yard line.

On the give to McCartney, the senior tacked up another five yards for the score.

Frank Tiesi came back to try the extra point for the Vikings, but he was forced to throw under pressure. The Vikings didn't pick up the point, but they had sealed the 18-9 win.

The kickoff marked the last time the ball would be turned over to the Juniata Valley offense which ran up a net loss of 26 yards in four downs before being forced to punt.

## Savor Victory

For the next four minutes, the Vikings held onto the ball, savoring the victory they earlier looked like they wouldn't get.

The game boosts the Glendale record to 3-1-1, and marks the fourth straight time they've beaten Juniata Valley.

For the Hornets, the loss dropped their tailspin to 0-5.

Coach Lloyd said the Vikings rolled up the win because they were "mentally ready."

In the first quarter, he said, the Glendale team was "mentally flat."

"But this game is going to change that," he contended. "The kids know now they can perform under pressure."

"Anytime you can come from behind," he added, "you have some pretty good kids."

While the Glendale rout pleased the local fans, the special half-time activities last night turned out to be something less than a rousing success.

Organizers of the halftime crowning of the high school homecoming queen decided to add a little extra touch of class to the ceremonies by arranging for a parachutist to drop from an airplane onto the field with the queen's crown.

It may have been a stunt which would have made P. T. Barnum happy, but the prevailing winds apparently refused to cooperate.

While organizers held up the halftime festivities and gazed skyward for their messenger from the heavens, word came that the jumper, former Green River's paratrooper Terry Koofin of Coalport, had landed safely — crown and all — in the weeds about 1/4 mile away.

You can't win 'em all.

## Vikings, Mounties Duel To Second Straight Tie

**FLINTON** — For the second time in as many meetings the Glendale Vikings and Berlin-Brothers Valley came away from their head-to-head clash without determining a winner.

Last year the Vikes journeyed to Berlin and fought the Mountaineers to a scoreless standoff in a driving rain-fall.

Last night Glendale and the Mounties deadlocked at 7-7 on Dr. Roy F. Baker Field.

The Vikings weren't without their chances, however, as three last-quarter field goal attempts failed to connect.

One shot, however, came very, very close to being three points as Terry Peacock's kick from 27 yards out hit the left upright and fell into the end zone for nothing.

John Lloyd, Glendale's long time coach who has seen his Vikes play in two tie ballgames this season, just shook his head after the incredible string of bad luck that plagued his Blue-and-Gold squad in the final quarter.

The Vikes controlled the ball for all but five plays in the final eight-and-half minutes of the game and still couldn't get any points on the board.

"It was a tough one to lose," Lloyd sighed after the Vikes dropped to 3-1-2. "We made one mistake and it cost us. Our only fumble set up Berlin's touchdown."

The way Glendale's offense moved the ball on the first drive of the game, it looked like the Vikings were in for a big night.

Jose Delorme returned the opening kickoff 20 yards to the Viking 39 and 13 plays later Glendale had a 7-0 lead.

Jaymie Rydbom, making his first start as varsity quarterback, completed two passes for 16 yards and Mark McCartney, who led all runners with 93 yards in the game, bulled his way for 36 yards on seven carries to fuel the march.

Capping off the drive at the 6:49 mark was Rydbom on a 3-yard plunge behind center Denny Cherish and guards Rick Smith and Dan Garman. Peacock latched on the PAT to give Glendale an early 7-0 lead.

After a couple of punts, a Viking fumble late in the quarter was recovered by Berlin's Rob Cugini on the Glendale 34.

Cugini, who roams between quarterback and halfback for the Mounties, broke off a 23-yard run to the Glendale 9 and three plays later the Berlin senior tossed an 8-yard touchdown pass out of the shotgun formation to Larry Hankinson. Tim Landis kicked the PAT with 11:10 to play in the first half.

Those two early scoring drives amounted to all the scoring as the Viking defense yielded little more and the Glendale offense failed to come up with the big play.

Berlin never penetrated the Glendale 30 the remainder of the game as three Mountie possessions were stopped by interceptions, two by Frank Tiesi and one by Delorme, and another was ended by Perry McCartney's fumble recovery.

The Vikes came up 196 yards total offense, including Rydbom's 10-for-21 night for 57 yards, but they too were held outside the opposition's 30 until late in the game.

Glendale's first field goal effort was set up by Delorme's kamikazee punt return of 10 yards that put the Vikes just across the 50.

Tough-yardage running by fullback Rich Lender sparked the Vikings to a first-and-ten 4-yard loss by Cugini and Lloyd called timeout.

Blake Lightner, who's seen little action this season due to injuries, was called on to attempt a 35-yard field goal but his boot out of Lender's hands sailed wide to the left with 5:24 to go in the game.

Tiesi got Glendale another chance as he picked off a Cugini aerial and stepped out of bounds on the Berlin 40. Strong running by McCartney again moved the Vikes inside the 20 but once more the Mountie defense stiffened.

Lloyd was faced with a fourth-and-six at the 10 this time and again he sent in the field goal team, with Peacock lining up to do the honors.

Peacock's boot appeared to

be on target but it hit the upright and although long enough, 27 yards, it went for nothing.

Tiesi tried to give the Vikes another shot as he intercepted a pass and ran back 18 yards to the Berlin 33, but once more Glendale's offense was stopped.

The Vikes got as close as the 19 behind Rydbom's aerials but one more time Lloyd had to call on his kicking team, this time Lender placing the ball on the 25 for Peacock.

Peacock's 35-yard effort fell way short and time ran out on both teams on the very next play.

Next week the Vikes will try to get back into the winning column at West Branch in a Progress Bowl game.

# Pirates Chip Away to Defeat Glendale, 23-6

WILLIAMSBURG — The National Weather Service will swear it didn't happen, but Williamsburg High School conjured up a little bit of lightning last night.

And the Blue Pirates did it three times in 24 minutes to stun Glendale 23-6.

While the Vikings led at the half, 6-0, the Pirates were off and running at the start of the third quarter, chipping their way to one touchdown and then using a pair of big plays to get two other scores.

The win gives Williamsburg, now 6-2, first place in both the Mountain High (Division III) and Inter-County (Division B) Conferences, wresting those top spots away from the Vikings who are now 4-2-2.

The Pirates displayed strength both ways as quarterback Tim Cooper keyed the offense while the defense slowed down Viking threat Mark McCartney, although McCartney still rambled for 80 of the Viking's 123 rushing yards.

"They did a good job of containing us," Glendale Coach John Lloyd said with his characteristic composure after the game. "I guess we started thinking they were trying to key on McCartney, and we started mixing up our plays."

One of the ingredients for the second half lightning was the decision to try to run more inside on the Vikings.

The inside running helped the Pirates to sustain their drives.

While the second half turn of events sent the packed house screaming in delight, the Wil-

liamsburg fans were sitting on their hands when Glendale's Rick Lender reeled in a Cooper pass early in the second stanza.

The interception started the Viking drive at midfield. Seven plays and two first downs later, Glendale quarterback Jamie Rydbom lobbed a 9-yard pass to Charles Cusick for the score.

The extra point try was no good, but the Vikings took their lead into the locker room.

Glendale fans who spent their halftime planning their victory celebration quickly found they had a revolting development on their hands.

The Williamsburgers mounted an 18-play drive to the Viking 6-yard line where Cooper steamed his way for three yards.

Glenn Wyland, a senior, got the call for the touchdown try, but a charging Glendale defense met him at the line of scrimmage and knocked him back an extra yard for good measure.

On third down, with four yards to go for the touchdown, Cooper again went to Wyland who made his way around the left side for the score.

The Vikings were caught looking when Cooper picked up the ball instead of holding it for would-be kicker Dave Rhule and passed it to Rhule as he raced into the end zone.

Rhule doesn't do any of the Pirate kicking, Williamsburg coach Dave Baker noted, but he had the feeling they would be able to pull the wool over the Vikings eyes.

For a while, the Vikings looked like they were going to come right back.

They mounted a 14-play drive

to move inside the Pirate 20-yard line, but the advance fizzled and the Pirates took over.

Two plays later, Rhule took the Cooper handoff and fumbled, knocking it downfield until the Vikings recovered at the Williamsburg 37-yard line.

On the first play, Rydbom's handoff was knocked into the air and Dave Greaser picked it off and ran 63 yards for the Pirates' second score.

The Williamsburgers were elated; the visitors were stunned. The Williamsburg team showed no signs of buckling.

The Pirates pieced together the conversion play, and with eight minutes to go in the game, they were leading 16-6.

Three minutes later, Williamsburg exploded again.

This time, Gary Speacht, recovered a fumble by Glendale's Rydbom.

After a short gain and a 5-yard penalty, Cooper faked the handoff to Rhule and gave the ball to Speacht, who raced down the left side for the 27-yard touchdown.

Mike Morelli got off a short, high kick which just cleared the uprights to set the final 23-6 score.

Next week, the Pirates host Everett, while the Vikings travel to Moshannon Valley.

HOUTZDALE—A strong second half ground game was the key last night for Moshannon Valley as they overcame a 6-0 Glendale lead and went on to beat the Vikings 7-6, giving the Vikes a closing record of 4-3-2.

There, the Knight defense was up to fending off a Viking drive inside the Mo Valley 10-yard line.

In the third quarter, though, the Knights controlled the ball so well that it looked like they'd sent it to obedience school.

Quarterback Chris Sherkel, a junior, engineered the Mo Valley ground game as the Knights picked up 57 yards in 18 plays for the score.

The drive lasted nine minutes and netted the Knights three first downs.
