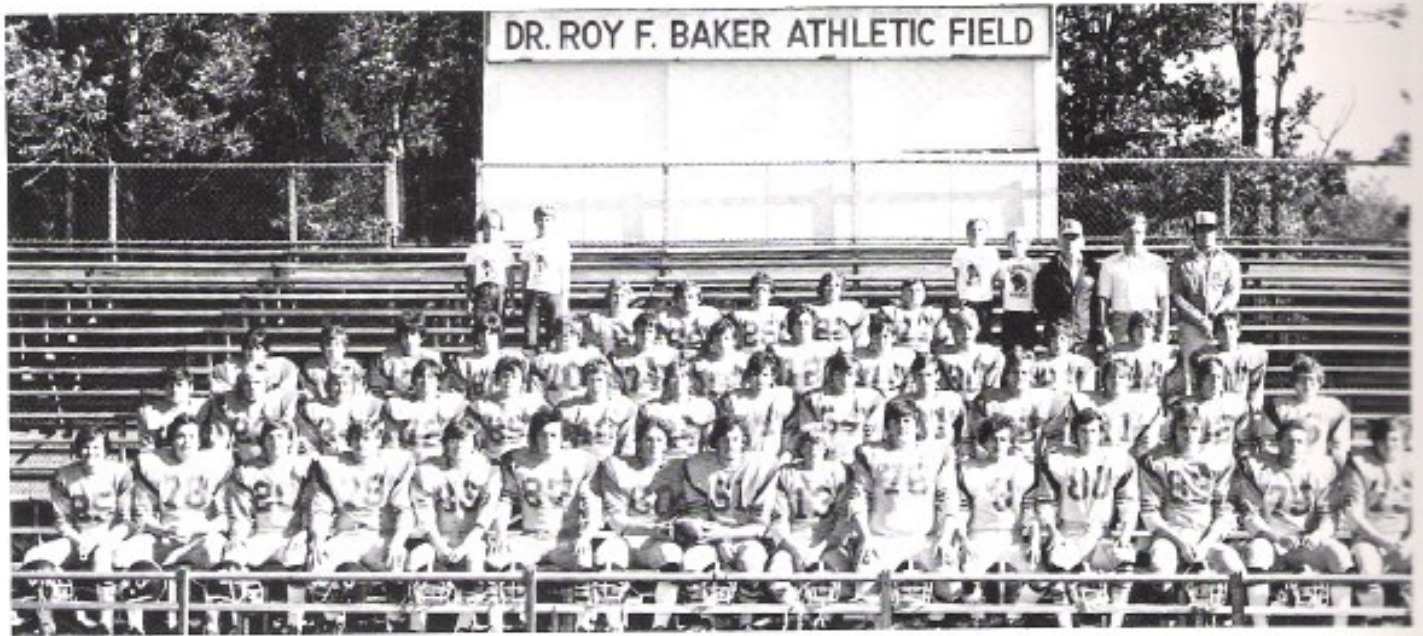

Patented Fairy Tale Ending Lifts Vikes

FLINTON— The magic of Roy F. Baker Field, a stubborn defense, a fairy tale ending and, ironically, muscle cramps combined to lift the Glendale Vikings over the Bucktail Bucks last night 3-0.

The Glendale offense, outplayed most of the night, finally got into gear in the waning moments and moved the ball within field goal range with just 0:06 remaining, when junior guard Jeff Foust booted a 35-yarder, which cleared the crossbar with little to spare, to pull out the victory.

Actually the defense, solid as a rock all night, even set up the winning kick after the offense had fumbled the ball away at the Bucktail 34 with only 3:41 remaining.

The Vikings defense held the Bucks to one yard on the

first play, benefited from a motion penalty and then sacked John Watash, Bucktail QB, for a 15-yard loss.

Then Michael Hulyo, the Bucks' punter who had done just about everything all night, made his only mistake when he shanked a 7-yard aerial shot that landed on the Bucktail 29, and put the Vikes in business.

First a 3-yard burst up the middle by running back Bill Tiesi, who started the evening at quarterback, then Steve Turchick hit Pat Turchick with a look-in pattern for a quick six yards and then Todd Cossick blew up the middle for six more and a first down at the Bucktail 14-yard line.

Indecision in the Glendale huddle cost Foust five precious yards as the Vikes were whistled for a delay of the game penalty with only 0:13 showing on the clock.

Foust never flinched and kicked the ball through the uprights, sending the Glendale fans into euphoria.

"Both teams played well and hit very hard on defense," claimed emotionally-drained head coach John Lloyd afterwards.

He said he wasn't particularly happy with the performance of the offense but said the unit would get better with a little experience.

"I can take some of the blame for the offensive problems tonight, because we have been working hard with the defense. If you have a good defense, you'll always be in the game."

"Our offense will be all right."

He said he wasn't surprised in the least that Foust kicked the 35-yarder.

"He practices religiously and puts a lot of hard work into his kicking," Lloyd said. "Thirty-five yards is well within his range, he's a fine kicker."

Oddly enough, leg cramps throughout the course of second half helped to thwart a couple of Bucktail's more serious threats.

On one of those serious threats, Bucktail actually had the ball in the end zone, but the play was called back because of another motion call. The threat ended when junior Brian Johnson came up short on a 27-yard field goal attempt.

Several Viking defense-men were stricken with leg cramps and each seemed to come at a time when Bucktail seemed ready to take control of the game, but they weren't planned.

"We conditioned the kids hard to prevent cramps, but I'm told that when kids get

emotionally high, things like that will happen," Lloyd said.

"I certainly hadn't planned it because when you are as thin as we are, you don't like to put a kid with even less experience at line-backer. It cost me time outs because I had to go out on the field and put the kids where they were supposed to be."

The Bucks had the good ground game as running back Hulyo ran around, past and over the Glendale defense and picked up a game high 81 yards on 20 carries.

Hulyo also returned four kicks back for 25 yards and had a 36.6 average on six punts, including a 50-yarder that pinned the Vikings on their own 3-yard line.

The Bucks defense was also very tough and held the Vikings offense to just four first downs and only 62 yards on 37 carries.

Cossick lead the Vikings with 34 yards on just 11 carries.

Glendale will now travel to Shade-Central next week before returning home against Claysburg-Kimmel on Sept. 14 to test the mystery of Roy F. Baker Field once again.

Stunting Panthers Shade Glendale Vikings

CAIRNBROOK — Shade-Central City's blitzing defense gave Glendale fits until coach John Lloyd could make adjustments at halftime last night.

And, when the Vikings tried to retaliate with some stunting of their own, Mike O'Ship wrecked them with a pair of long touchdown runs in the second half.

All of which made the bus ride home long and dreary for the Vikings after the 20-7 setback.

From the outset, Panther coach George Pasierb had his linebackers firing into the Viking backfield from 5-2 and 5-3 alignments, and they wreaked havoc on the Glendale offense.

Only three of the Vikes' 22 running plays in the first half netted five yards or more.

"We sort of got a little confused in the line," Lloyd

defended his players. "We were chasing people instead of picking up the linebackers when they blitzed."

The veteran mentor, who emphasized he didn't want to make any excuses, pointed out that his already banged-up squad lost another offensive lineman Friday morning when guard Mike Kutruuff reported he was ailing.

"We have a lot of kids going both ways now, and it's tough to show them what we want during a timeout," Lloyd said. "We worked on picking up their blitzes during halftime, and the kids seemed to do a better job in the second half."

The Vikings were still very much in the game at that point, trailing just 6-0.

Aided by a stiff wind that affected the high punts of Viking Todd Cossick, the Panthers kept the visitors pinned down deep in their own territory most of the first half.

They had two threats aborted by turnovers, Steve Turchick intercepting a pass at the G-19 and Stu Moore recovering a fumble at the G-30.

On the final play of the first quarter, the Vikes mishandled a pitchout and Doug Lasure, a bear of a defensive end, recovered at the C-32.

O'Ship, who was to rack up 179 yards in just 11 carries, sliced through the left side of Glendale's defense on a quick opener and scooted 17 yards for the first of his three touchdowns with 10:41 left in the half. Mark McKolosky's conversion was low and blocked by Don Morrison.

The Vikings, held to 33 yards in the first half, were down 13-0 before they were able to show the Panthers their offensive adjustments.

On the first play of the third quarter, O'Ship shot through the line of scrimmage on a simple dive left, broke a tackle near midfield and scampered 68 yards to paydirt. McKolosky's placement tacked on the 13th point.

The Vikings made an effort to keep the Shade-Central City linebackers honest by springing a halfback pass, Cossick hitting Dave Noel for a 24-yard gain.

A nice run by Mike Vesnesky on a trap play and two Steve Turchick-to-Pat Turchick passes plus a major penalty against the hosts for grabbing a face mask gave the Vikes a shot at their first touchdown of the season. Pass interference provided a first down at the four, but a TD pass was dropped on third down and Lasure blasted Steve Turchick to foil the fourth-down pass, which Panther lineman Pat Knapp grabbed with a diving effort.

Glendale's defense held and forced a punt. Lloyd then ordered the Vikes to switch from their Straight-T and Winged-T attack to the I.

Steve Turchick showed option on the first play and then began pitching to Vesnesky for sweeps, and the speedy soph accounted for 40 of the 49 yards in the touchdown thrust. Turchick scored on a 2-yard sneak to open the fourth quarter, and Jeff Foust kicked the extra point.

The back-breaker came four downs later. Shade-Central City gambled with inches to go at its own 44. Glendale's defense pinched in, but O'Ship slithered through a small hole, broke two tackles at the G-45 and raced 56 yards for a TD.

McKolosky's conversion made it 20-7 with 9:28 remaining, but the Vikings didn't threaten.

"We were coming with a full blitz on one of those second-half touchdowns, maybe both of them, but our linebacker and lineman went through the same hole and that left nobody in the next gap," Lloyd said.

"He (O'Ship) just popped through, and he did a nice job keeping his feet."

The 5-8, 145-pounder's performance spurred a 270-yard ground game by the Panthers, and that's bound to bruise the Vikings' pride. Defense has been Glendale's forte under Lloyd.

"We'll just have to go back to work," said Lloyd, who was pleased with Vesnesky's running on sweeps and Cossick's passing on the halfback option.

"Vesnesky did a heck of a job. He has good outside speed and that forced them to spread out some in the second half."

Unfortunately, the Vikes couldn't muster an inside running game to complement Vesnesky's outside bursts.

Lloyd gave Pasierb credit for the win, Shade-Central's first in two games. "He had them ready for us."

OVERTIME — The Vikings, now 1-1, host winless Claysburg-Kimmel next Friday... Impressive Vikes Roll, 26-12

BEAVER VALLEY —

The Glendale Vikings didn't need the mystic fortune that shrouds them on their home field, leg cramps or anything like that to dispose of Claysburg-Kimmel last night.

Simply put, the Vikings were a much better football team.

Sparked by a pair of long-range touchdowns by Bill Tiesi and Steve Turchick, the Vikes finally gave their sputtering offense a swift kick, rolling up 342 yards rushing en route to a 26-12 victory over the Bulldogs.

"We're gettin' better," said Glendale head coach John Lloyd with a grin following his team's second victory of the season. "The kids have more confidence. I was extremely pleased with the offense."

Although Claysburg-Kimmel, now 0-3 with 100 points having been scored against them, is not to be mistaken with any of Central Pennsylvania's small-school powers, last night's Glendale win may have done more to mold the Vikes than anything they've done previously this season.

Lloyd pulled a switch in his offensive alignment, putting junior Todd Cossick at tailback and setting Tiesi and Mike Vesnesky at halfback spots in a power "T" formation.

The switch proved effective: the Vikes rolled up 140 yards rushing in the first quarter while opening up a 14-0 lead.

Glendale tailed off a bit after that, but the balance in the individual statistics had to please Lloyd. Cossick

gained 88 yards on 11 carries, Tiesi ripped off 84 yards on 11 carries, Vesnesky gained 77 stripes on 12 tries and Turchick, thanks to a 46-yard touchdown sprint, gained 49 yards.

"We made a few changes to get the offense to move," said Lloyd. "Todd, with his size and physical strength, can gain those tough yards inside and he's a good blocker. He broke some tackles tonight and that's what you need from a fullback."

"Bill (Tiesi) and Mike (Vesnesky) have good speed and so does Steve (Turchick)," he added. "The kids seemed to like the wide stuff, so we sort of got away from our tight 'T.'"

Glendale did nothing fancy to get its massive rushing yardage. Tiesi gained his mostly on deep pitches while Cossick took the inside beating, though it often seemed like he was doing harder hitting of the Bulldog defenders.

Ironically, Glendale's first drive following the opening kickoff, though a beauty, failed to produce points when the Vikes' Jeff Foust missed a 24-yard field goal.

Claysburg-Kimmel went nowhere after that and following Eric Claar's punt to the G-36 was returned 18 yards by Buddy Fulton to the CK-46.

Turchick wasted no time reaching the end zone, keeping on an option to the right and cutting underneath the secondary after turning it up. He found an opening and darted untouched all 46 yards for the Glendale touchdown.

The score, which came with 4:19 to play in the quarter, was just Glendale's second of the season. Foust's extra-point attempt was wide to the right.

The Vikes set up shop moments later when Claar dropped the kickoff and Rich McGarvey was there to jump on it at the CK-25.

Four plays later, Cossick wiggled through a narrow gap off the left side and dragged a Bulldog secondary man across the goal line on a 7-yard scoring run.

The Vikings faked the PAT kick, holder Tiesi sprinting to left and finding Mark Lightner totally unguarded in the end zone for two with 2:39 remaining.

The game hit a dead spot as both offenses faltered and the half ended with Glendale ahead 14-0.

Claysburg-Kimmel suddenly made it a game midway into the third quarter. The 'Dogs Rich Dively had scampered 45 yards to the G-11 before the Vikes' Mike Kutruuff recovered a C-K fumble at the line of scrimmage.

That only kept the Bulldogs out temporarily as Cossick's punt was blocked by Jeff Hartman at the CK-10 and Eric Black returned the ball to the G-4.

The Vikes stretched C-K out to the end, but a wobbly 5-yard slant-in from Claar to Dave Mauk was good for the score. A PAT pass failed with 5:56 showing on the Baker Field scoreboard.

Embarrassed a bit by the fact that Claysburg-Kimmel now had a shot at getting back in the game, the Vikes got down to business on the very next series.

It took five plays to go 72

yards, and that the Vikes did when Tiesi took an option pitch to his left, saw nothing but running room on the left sideline and sprinted 57 yards for the clinching score with 3:21 to play in the third stanza.

Terry Troxell's sack on the next series snuffed a C-K drive and Claar's short punt was downed at the Bulldogs' 34-yard line.

An 8-yard run by Tiesi plus a face mask penalty put the ball just 12 yards away from the end zone and Vesnesky clipped off that distance following a pitch-out to the left side. He was nearly knocked out at the CK-3, but showed good balance to stay in play.

Foust's extra-point attempt was blocked by Hartman, but the Vikes had a commanding 26-6 lead with 26 seconds left in the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was mostly a flurry of passes by Claar, most incomplete, but the Bulldog QB finally began connecting against the Viking reserves, hitting Mark Musselman on an 18-yard scoring pass with just 1:55 to play.

While the Viking offense can take a bow for its show, so can Glendale's defensive line, which reached Claar six times for sacks totaling 37 yards.

The return of some injured players and the fact that all players saw action last night enabled Lloyd to take on an amiable demeanor.

"I was real pleased that all the kids got to play," he stated. "We get into it next week, though, don't we? Penns Valley's a good team. I hope we improve as much

next week as we did tonight from last week's game."

Glendale will indeed have their hands full at Penns Valley next week. After an opening-week loss, the Rams have bombed two consecutive opponents.

Penns Valley Downs Glendale 35-6

SPRING MILLS — Rain moved Friday night's scheduled game between Glendale and Penns Valley to Saturday night, but had the two teams played Friday Penns Valley was the team which would have been walking on water.

The Rams could do no wrong as they capitalized on numerous breaks to trounce the Vikings, 35-6.

A fumbled reception of a punt and an interception return for a touchdown set the Vikings back 14-0 with only five minutes elapsed.

The Rams led 20-0 at the half and 27-0 before Glendale could score.

A puzzled Viking coach John Lloyd summed the contest with a disgusted outburst of "We just got blown off the field.

"I guess I just didn't have the kids prepared mentally. We played well in spurts, but you can't play in spurts.

"We're not consistent, we do not have a good mental attitude. We can't figure it out, but we better figure it out. We've gotta get consistent."

The Vikings did indeed play well in spurts.

Penns Valley forced a Glendale punt on its first possession, but the Vikes returned the favor on a Rams' fourth-and-six from the Vike 39.

The punt, however, was

dropped by Bill Tiesi, and Ram defensive standout Wayne Shawver jumped on the ball at the Vike five.

It took one carry by star running back Jim Henry (18-125) to make the five yards, and Penns Valley led 6-0 after the PAT pass failed.

Glendale's second possession resulted in another Penns Valley touchdown as Steve Turchick's third-down pass was pilfered by Lynn Bowersox and returned 40 yards for the score.

Quarterback Kevin Welch hit Gary Leach for the two-pointer and Glendale trailed 14-0 with 6:49 remaining in period one.

After another exchange of punts, Glendale's defense stiffened, and a bad snap on a Ram punt led to Glendale's taking over at the Ram 31.

Quarterback Turchick kept for five and Tiesi ran for two. Randy McGarvey could not get control of a Turchick pass in the end zone and the Rams took over on their 26 after a fierce fourth-down rush on Turchick.

Penns Valley wasted no time in scoring its third TD. Henry carried for six and the Rams got 15 more on a Glendale personal foul penalty.

Breaking numerous tackles, Henry covered 32 stripes on a draw play and Welch hit Leach on a 25-yard

pass play, Leach taking the pass at the eight.

The Rams mounted an eight-play, 64-yard drive at the outset of the second half, the drive being capped by a halfback pass from Henry to Jerry Hosterman after a fourth-down offsides penalty against the Vikes.

After an interception by Tiesi, Glendale finally got its ground game moving. Tiesi carried for seven and Mike Murray picked up 21 more on three totes.

Turchick and Mike Vesnesky teamed up on a quick pitch on which Vesnesky earned 25 yards to the Ram two.

Todd Cossick got one and Murray plunged in for the score. The PAT kick was wide left.

The back-breaker was the Rams' seven-minute drive in the fourth quarter. Glendale had held at its 43 but was guilty of roughing the kicker. From there the Rams needed seven more plays, Taylor getting the honors from one yard out.

GAME NOTES ... Vesnesky was the Viking workhorse as he carried for 79 yards on 13 carries...Cossick earned 40 more on 10 tries...At one point in the second quarter, Cossick jumped for a high pass which was tipped by two Ram defenders. Cossick, lying on his back, had the ball come down right in his stomach for an 11-yard

gain...That was one of the few breaks the Vikes got all night...Glendale hosts Juniata Valley Friday.

Hornets Float Past Vikes, 18-0

FLINTON — Last night was a case of where good just wasn't nearly good enough as the powerful Juniata Valley Hornets splashed by the Glendale Vikings 18-0 at a soggy Roy F. Baker Field.

"We played pretty well," claimed Glendale coach John Lloyd afterwards, "but they are a very good ball club with a tough defense."

Last night the Hornets, who have allowed just 24 points all season, all to a loaded Southern Huntingdon team last week, showed just how tough that defense is as it turned back numerous threats by an improved Viking offense, including stopping Glendale on four plays after it recovered a fumble at the Juniata Valley 16-yard-line.

"We were really pleased with the way the offense moved the ball," Lloyd said. "Coach (Tom) Terza should be credited with that because he worked with the offense all week."

"I was also very pleased with our defense," he said. "It was improved 100 percent over last week because we were much more aggressive. We gave them one score because we fouled up a couple of assignments."

Fumbles were a major problem throughout the game for both teams as a driving rain greeted the teams at the outset and

never stopped. The Hornets lost four of seven fumbles and the Vikings lost two of five.

After stopping the Hornets on the first series, Glendale moved to the Juniata Valley nine-yard-line, behind the hard running of Mike Murray up the middle and sophomore Mike Vesnesky around the ends, before a penalty and the Hornet defense caused the Vikings to hand the ball over on downs.

"We really hurt ourselves with penalties because 15 yards is hard for anybody to make up," Lloyd said. "That first drive really hurt."

The Vikes were in business again just minutes later when they recovered a Hornet fumble at the Juniata Valley 44 yard line. But a holding penalty and a fumble at its own 30 squandered the Glendale hopes.

Juniata Valley then took the ball and scored just five plays later, benefitting from another Glendale penalty, when all-purpose back Rich Clouse banged over from the one.

On the series following the Juniata Valley kick-off, Glendale fumbled at its own 47 and opened the door for another Juniata Valley score. The Hornets covered the necessary real estate in eight plays and just under three minutes, capped when Bill Boyd slashed over from six yards out.

Later in the period the Vikings recovered a fumble by full back Tom Jones at the Hornet 16, but turned the ball over on four downs at the eight-yard line.

The second half was pretty much three plays and punt, three plays and punt until the Hornets took over on their 48 with just over eight minutes to go in the game.

On a fourth-and-ten situation at the Juniata Valley 49, Glendale prolonged a Hornet drive by roughing the kicker and giving them a first down at the Viking 36.

On the next play Hornet quarterback James Wenner hit Clouse on a short swing pass. Clouse shed three or four would be tacklers, cut back against the flow and danced the final 36 yards into the end zone for the game's final score.

The Vikings put on a valiant 15-play-drive in the closing moments, highlighted by a perfect lob pass from Steve Turchick to his brother Pat, good for 25 yards and a first down, but eventually lost the ball on downs after a fourth-and-goal play from the 12 with just 1:13 went awry.

Lloyd said the Vikings moved and handled the ball well, considering the circumstances, but "we just blew a couple of the opportunities we had."

Vesnesky led Glendale

with 47 yards on 12 carries, mostly on option pitches from Turchick, and Murray rambled for 34 yards on 17 carries.

Clouse led the winners with 49 yards on 19 carries and two scores, and Boyd added the other touchdown while gaining 43 yards on just eight carries.

Glendale Vikes Shut Down Berlin's Aerial Attack, 6-0

FLINTON — It was just like the Pope was in attendance at last night's Glendale-Berlin Brothers Valley flood-like football fray.

At the outset of the first quarter, cold, water-logged fans looked to the skies with obvious thoughts of: Let the rain stop.

And it did.

The next thought on most fans' minds was obviously: Let Glendale win.

And it did.

And after the game, Glendale coach John Lloyd was asked to comment about his team's hard-earned 6-0 win.

And he did.

"The kids did a good job," a happy Lloyd said in an even happier locker room. "We had our backs to the

wall a few times but we did a real good job. It was not an offensive night."

For sure. The game featured 16 punts, nine fumbles and 10 penalties. Someone, however, forgot to tell the Berlin Brothers it was a wet night, and on wet nights most teams don't pass much.

But the Mountaineers threw 34 times, completing only eight for 99 yards. Add that 99 to the paltry total of 23 yards rushing yielded by the Glendale defense and it says the Vikes held Berlin to 122 yards.

The key was a mid-third quarter goal line stand by the Vikes after Berlin had passed its way to the Glendale 10.

On first-and-goal Mountaineer quarterback Bob Czekaj hit his favorite, and only, receiver Jeff Paul with a pass to the four.

Czekaj got one on a keeper and Richard Hay was stopped cold by Vikes Stu Moore and Robert Krus. On fourth down, Czekaj had Doug McClintock open in the end zone but the ball slipped out of his outstretched hands.

Glendale couldn't move the ball from there, but a booming 53-yard punt by Todd Cossick gave the defense room to work.

Defense was the story all night for the Vikes because the offense became bogged down after its first period touchdown, let alone fumbling seven times and losing four.

But that first period tally was all the Vikes needed, and it materialized after grinding out 53 yards on 10 plays.

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After an exchange of punts, Glendale had the ball on its own 43. A facemask penalty got Glendale its initial first down and quarterback Todd Cossick swept left end for 13 yards to the Berlin 25.

Bill Tiesi got seven yards on a trap play and workhorse Mike Murray, on his first of 19 carries, picked up seven more to the 13.

After Tiesi got another, Murray bolted over left guard, breaking two tackles on his 12-yard jaunt to paydirt.

Glendale faked an extra point kick, but the ensuing pass failed. With only 10 minutes having elapsed, the fans had seen the last points flashed on the scoreboard.

"On a night like tonight you can't get any good footing, and it wouldn't have

been any better tomorrow," Lloyd noted.

But the muddy mess didn't affect Mr. Murray all that much. Murray rushed for 85 yards on 19 totes, including some clutch running on Glendale's final clock-killing drive.

With 3:19 remaining, Jeff Foust pilfered Czekaj's 33rd pass and the Vikes started from their own 47.

Faced with a third-and-eight situation, Murray danced right up the middle for nine, and got the same amount on the next play when he slashed over right tackle.

"Mike was tough tonight," Lloyd said in an understatement. "We had to go with our power runner and hope he could get it for us."

He did. And other players came through for Glendale, too. Buddy Fulton made an excellent second quarter grab of a Berlin aerial at the Vike 25, stopping yet another Mountaineer drive.

Stu Moore recovered a fumble at the Glendale 35 in the final period and Turchick made a couple nice deflections of Czekaj passes.

Berlin had many opportunities but the Viking defense, which looks like the Vike D's of old, failed to crack.

"I think the kids are getting better," Lloyd said. "We've been working on an outside game but tonight was a night for straight-on football. We've got to work on our passing game, though," he said, adding that it wasn't a good night for passing either.

Warriors Ambush Vikings 14-13 in Progress Bowl Tilt

ALLPORT — There were plenty of big plays in last night's Progress Bowl clash between West Branch and Glendale, but perhaps the biggest was a leaping pass reception by the Warriors' Shane Gaines.

Gaines' jumping catch on a fourth-down desperation pass kept the Warriors' last-ditch drive alive and several plays later workhorse fullback Greg Andrews crashed into the end zone for a game-tying touchdown.

Andrews then kicked the second of his two PATs to lift West Branch to a stunning 14-13 victory over the long timenemesis Vikings, a team the Warriors hadn't beaten since 1971.

"Everyone played a helluva game," a happy Gene "Chip" Ropchock said in the noisy Warrior locker room. "Our defense gave us some breaks, our offensive line blocked very well and there was a lot of sticking out there."

"There is one thing I want to be quoted on for sure," Ropchock added above the blaring disco music of Wild Cherry. "We won this game for about five fans that didn't want us to. Can you actually believe that some of our fans were hoping we lost?"

Last night's victory brought a little sunshine into an otherwise dismal season for the Warriors, who were 1-5 through the first six games, with several losses

coming because of second-half breakdowns.

"A big thing for us this week," Ropchock stressed, "was that we were healthier than we have been. We didn't have to go with 11 players both ways, instead, we got to use about 15 or 16 players and give some guys some rest."

Inside the Glendale dressing room, Viking coach John Lloyd was kicking himself while thinking back on the fumbles and penalties that proved costly to his team.

"We've been killing ourselves every game," Lloyd said. "One look at the fumble and penalty stats tells you the story of the game. West Branch played almost error-free, we didn't."

"I don't know if it was a lack of concentration on the kids' part or if we didn't work hard enough on techniques."

"I thought we hit hard, but we can't put together a whole game, we just play in spurts," the veteran Viking mentor added.

"But you have to give West Branch credit, they sustained that last drive. Chip got his kids up, they deserve a lot of credit, they were consistent all night."

Last night's loss did more than eliminate Glendale from capturing The Progress Bowl II for the second straight year. It also put the Vikes' drive for their 11th straight winning season in jeopardy.

Glendale is now 3-4 with just two games remaining, road trips to Williamsburg and Moshannon Valley. The game at Mo Valley, the Vikes' biggest rival, is another Progress Bowl game but only the Black Knights, who have never won the bowl, have the bowl-incentive for that meeting. The Knights best the Warriors 21-6 in August.

As Lloyd pointed out, last night's game boiled down to who made the fewest mistakes, and that was the Warriors.

Glendale lost three fumbles and committed five penalties for 55 yards, and most of them proved to be costly. West Branch coughed up two fumbles but had just two minor infractions.

"Glendale played tough on defense," Ropchock claimed, "but we had a couple of chances to break open and couldn't."

Ironically, the Vikings were the first team to cash in on someone else's mistake after they smothered a bad punt snap by the Warriors on West Branch's 14.

Mike Grega took care of punter Andrews on the play while David McGarvey pounced on the loose ball.

Four plays later Mike Murray dove over the top for a 1-yard touchdown and Jeff Foust kicked the PAT to give Glendale a 7-0 lead with 2:03 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Warriors, who have found so many ways to lose to Glendale over the past decade, weren't believing in the "Viking magic" this time, though, and they came right back with a game-tying TD on their next possession.

The capper was a 46-yard run by Andrews, which helped him roll up a game-high 149 yards on a bruising 31 carries. Andrews tacked on the point-after, too, and

he has now scored all 30 points the Warriors have put on the board this season.

The 7-7 score held up for the final 9:34 of the first half and it looked like that might be the final score of the game, too, the way both squads started the second half.

Glendale fumbled the ball on its first three possessions, on its own 32 and 41 and West Branch's four, but the Warriors reciprocated with a fumble on the Vikes' 19 and a missed 44-yard field goal by Andrews.

But as slow as the game was for the first 17 minutes of the second half, it picked up the final half-quarter.

It took Glendale just one play, a 45-yard pass-run from Steve Turchick to his younger brother Pat, to get the Vikings a 13-7 lead with 6:21 remaining in the game.

The Vikes then converted the extra point on a kick by Foust, but the Warriors were ruled offside before

the snap and Glendale had to kick again, and this time the boot was no good.

West Branch then went to work.

With the front line of tight end Chris Hoover, tackles Ron Sunderlin and Mark Simcisko, guards Ron Kyler and Doug Schmidt and center Paul Tarbay plowing out the Viking defense the Warriors drove 67 yards in 14 plays, a march that consumed over five minutes.

The first big play was a 19-yard pass from Vic Welker to Hoover and the next was Gaines' leaping catch at the three on a four-and-seven from the 20.

On first-and-goal, Andrews was stopped two yards short, but on his second shot around right tackle, behind Simcisko and Schmidt, he bulled into the end zone with a couple of Vikings riding his back.

There was just 1:02 left in the game when Andrews scored the tying six-pointer,

and he then added the conversion to ice the victory and stop a three-game losing skid for the Warriors.

West Branch will begin its home stretch next Saturday when the Warriors visit Juniata Valley. Game time is 1:30. After that they travel to Bucktail and close out the season by hosting Philipsburg-Osceola.

Glendale visits Williamsburg next Friday night.

Glendale's Success Streak Has Ended

WILLIAMSBURG — It's been a long, long time since Glendale football players have felt the chill of a losing season.

After 11 straight years of winning football, the Vikings will learn what life is like on the other side of the ledger.

A 14-0 loss to Williamsburg last night was the lock on Glendale's worst season since 1968. The Vikes are 3-5 with just one game to play.

A brief look around the locker room found expressionless faces similar to those struck by sudden disaster. Disbelief, shock and, in a way, shame.

Quiet locker rooms are eerie, especially one like Glendale's last night.

But Viking head coach John Lloyd, who will wrap up his 16th season at the helm of the Vikings against Moshannon Valley next week, still approached with a smile and a handshake.

After 11 years, it was a familiar sight. It's easy to praise and be proud and grin and talk to the press when you're a winner.

Faced at last with a losing season, Lloyd didn't react any differently at all.

"I feel more for the kids than I do for myself," he said as he glanced back toward his players, who were silently dressing

behind him. "They really want to play football, but we've had so many position changes and mental mistakes this year..."

Mental mistakes. Those have plagued the underclassmen-laden Vikings all year and were the finishing touch to last night's frustrating loss.

Although Williamsburg solidly outplayed the Vikings (note the Blue Pirates' 249 yard total offense compared to Glendale's 85), the victory would have been well within the Vikes' reach had it not been for a few blunders.

The first came midway through the first period when Glendale quarterback Steve Turchick fired a pass upfield while being chased by a pack of Pirates and the ball was intercepted at the G-47.

Williamsburg wasn't able to move the ball, but the punt landed at the G-11 and running back Dave Noel and Turchick missed the connection on a handoff, allowing Pirate defensive tackle Richard Mingle to recover at the line of scrimmage.

Two plays later, Williamsburg running back Alan Detwiler, who churned out 108 yards on 20 carries, easily slipped through a big hole on the right side from three yards.

Dave Greaser's ex-

tra-point with 3:29 to play in the quarter made it 7-0.

Glendale had a golden opportunity to stop the score when Detwiler fumbled one play before the touchdown, but a Williamsburg lineman beat everyone to the loose ball.

In the second quarter, Glendale picked up its only first down of the half and Turchick gained seven on an option one play later as the Vikes appeared to have some momentum going.

The fact that Williamsburg outgained the Vikings by such a large margin and had possession of the ball for nearly seven more minutes yet failed to score on a sustained drive does speak well for the Glendale defense.

However, Williamsburg fumbled the ball six times last night and Glendale was able to recover just twice. In addition to Kutruff's pickup, linebacker Todd Cossick scooped up an errant Williamsburg pitchout in the fourth quarter, but he did not have open field in front of him, returning from the G-15 to the Vikings' 45-yard line early in the third quarter.

Thus was Glendale destined to lose last night.

The Vikings won't be down next week. They will visit Moshannon Valley in one of the area's hottest rivalries. The Progress

Bowl is on the line for the Black Knights and one can bet that a Bowl loss to Mo Valley isn't in the Vikings' season-ending plans.

But Turchick didn't see Detwiler's blitz on the next play and pitched the ball right to the Pirate senior, who tipped the ball once, grabbed it and wasn't touched for the next 33 yards, the distance from the lateral interception to the Glendale goal line.

That happened early in the second quarter, but the Vikes had a chance to get back into the ball game minutes later when Mike Kutruff found a loose pigskin in his arms at the W-48 and he rambled to the W-12 before being pulled down.

Lloyd decided to score through the air, but Turchick's second-down pass was off the mark and Pat Brantner intercepted with a juggling catch at the W-4, returning nine yards.

"Maybe that was a mistake going to the air right after the fumble," said Lloyd. "It seemed to be as good a time as any to throw."

The Vikings lost momentum after that depressing turn of events and briefly marched in the third quarter to the W-23, but Turchick was sacked for an 11-yard loss on third down at the W-23, Glendale's

deepest penetration of the second half.

Although the Pirates racked up 215 yards rushing on 55 carries, Lloyd lauded his defense for a fine effort since only the turnovers brought about Williamsburg scores.

"That was one of the best defensive efforts we've had all year," he said with pride. "The kids deserve a lot of credit. The two touchdowns Williamsburg did get were gifts."

There were only two threats, each team having a field goal attempt go awry. Mo Valley's Jim Hawkins was short on a 32-yarder in the second quarter, while Glendale's Jeff Foust pulled a 26-yarder to the left 10 seconds before the final gun.

"It just was a hard-knocking game," Viking coach John Lloyd said in tribute to the players on both sides of the Hilltop Stadium gridiron.

"I think Moshannon Valley deserves a lot of credit. They played tough.

"I can't say I was disappointed. The kids went out and played their hearts out. I can't ask for any more. They're high school kids."

Mo Valley coach Harold Camberg couldn't swallow the tie quite as easily.

"We had our opportunities, and we didn't score," he said. "We made a few mistakes when we were in close, so we ended up with a tie. That meant nothing."

Camberg wasn't critical of his players, though. "We stuck together throughout the game. We played pretty good defense and the offense moved the ball, but we just can't seem to get into the end zone."

He added, "You can't take anything away from Glendale. They played a good game."

The mutual respect the coaches had for the opposing teams was reflected by the players themselves

as they trudged off the field together.

They knew they might have played four more quarters without any scoring.

The first break went to Glendale. Steve Turchick recovering a Black Knight fumble at the MV-41 just 1:40 after the kickoff, but the hosts surrendered only three yards and forced a punt.

Late in the first quarter, the Vikes set up at the MV-48 after a quick kick of 37 yards by Hawkins.

A third-down run of 26 yards by Dave Noel on a scissors play moved the stick to the M-16, but John Boulton broke through to nail Bill Tiesi for a 12-yard loss on third-and-nine. The Vikes turned the ball over on downs at the 23.

The Knights responded with two first downs on the running of Hawkins, who led all runners with 75 yards in 18 carries, before finally having to punt.

Turchick made a bad pitch on first down at the 20, and Greg Kokoskie recovered at the 15 to give Mo Valley a tremendous opportunity.

Glendale's defense stiffened. Two rushes by Hawkins netted two yards. A pass was broken. And Hawkins tried his field goal, but he got under the ball and lofted it high and straight, but short of the goal posts.

Mike Vesnesky's 40-yard return of the second-half kickoff appeared to pep up the Vikes as Tiesi circled left end for 12 yards, but they ran out of downs at the MV-25.

Glendale used up nearly seven minutes of the fourth quarter with a 63-yard drive that fizzled at the MV-17 when Mike Murray was less than a foot shy of a first down.

The Knights gambled on fourth-and-five at their own 38, and Mike Grega charged in from his defensive end spot to trip John Murarik for a 6-yard loss.

Only 52 seconds remained, but a pass interference penalty and a personal foul penalty against the Black Knights had the Vikes perched at the MV-9 with 10 seconds remaining.

Lloyd, who contemplated faking a field goal and going for the touchdown, used his last timeout setting up

Foust's attempt. Then Camberg called a timeout to give Foust more to think about.

"That's a lot of pressure to put on a high school kid, but he was kicking good before the game," Lloyd said.

Though Foust hooked the 3-point try, it appeared the kick would have been blocked if straight, for Knight Greg Sherkel had excellent penetration.

So, Glendale finished 3-5-1, its streak of consecutive winning seasons ending at 10.

This has been a long season for Lloyd, who lifted

the Glendale football program to the championship level in the late sixties and kept it there.

"There was a lot of pressure on this team," said the 16-year mentor. "We had only one starter back."

While Lloyd can sit back and look to next year, Camberg must solve the riddle of his non-scoring offense before next Saturday when the Knights take to the road for their finale against Claysburg-Kimmick.

Mo Valley is 1-7-1 but has scored only three touchdowns since beating West Branch 21-6 in August.

That promising start and

West Branch's 14-13 upset of Glendale earlier this month provided the Knights with the chance to be Progress Bowl champs, but the Vikings don't intend to let Bowl II get out of their sight just yet.
