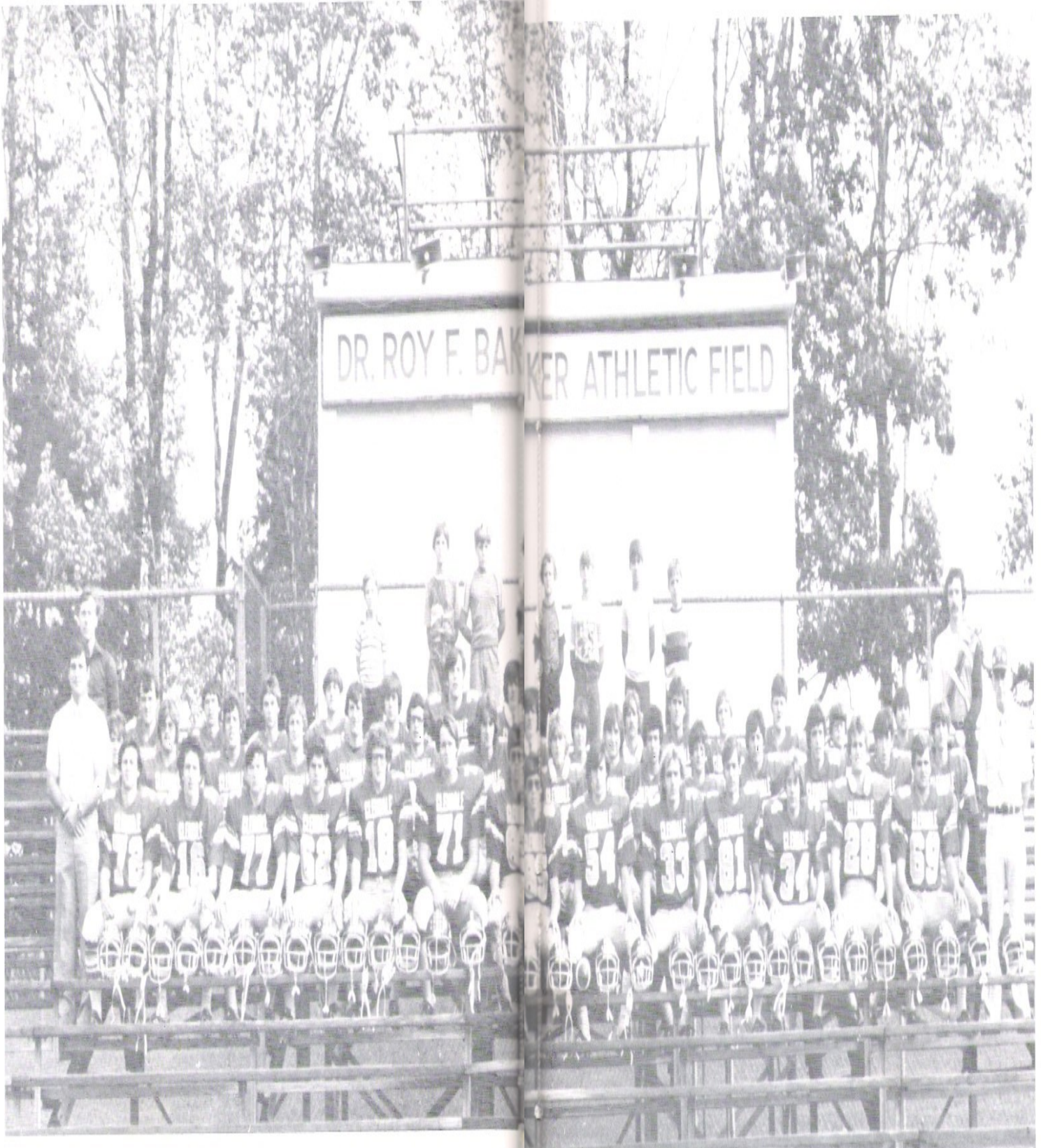

Vikes Greet New Coach With 7-0 Win

FLINTON — "This group's attitude is unbelievable. I am really excited about this team."

Those are the words of Glendale High School's first year head football coach Tim Laurito, and he has good reason to be excited.

His Vikings had just methodically put away a stubborn Williamsburg Blue Pirate team, 7-0, in the 1980 season opener for both teams last night at Roy F. Baker field.

Although Glendale only pushed across one score, late in the third period, the Vikings continually moved the ball on the ground and in the air, when necessary, and played good, tough defense.

"It's a pleasure to coach these kids," Laurito said in a noisy and happy locker-room. "We don't have a lot of size, but we're very physical and we're not afraid of hitting."

With the exception of maybe one series, the Vikings dominated the play in the first half with quick bursts up the middle by senior back Mike Murray, slick option running by quarterback Steve Turchick, and the ground gulping sweeps by super-quick wing back Mike Vesnesky.

And they mixed the plays well. But just as they were about to move into scoring position, a penalty, a missed block, or a mistake would end the opportunity.

"We made some mental mistakes in the first half," Laurito said. "I think we could have had at least one score in the first half, but I think we were a little excited, first game tension."

Glendale had one real scoring chance midway through the first period after the defense had pushed Williamsburg back against its own goal line with the help of three penalties, a clip, an off-sides and an offensive interference call, and after the punt, they started at the Williamsburg 37.

After a dive play up the middle by Murray, who led Glendale with 68 yards on 20 carries, Turchick started a student body left sweep when he pitched the ball back to the speedy Vesnesky and the junior back picked up 19 yards to the 16.

But the Vikings were hit with a personal foul call after the whistle and had 15 yards marched off against them.

The Vikings tried, but just couldn't overcome that penalty, finally giving the ball over to the Blue

Pirates after a fourth and 10 incomplection.

Late in the second period, after Williamsburg had just stopped the sweep for the first time, the Vikings' defense was tested for the first time.

Williamsburg QB Sam Mingle hit Pat Brantner (six catches for 60 yards) for 13 yards and Roy Allison rumbled up the middle for nine tough yards and all of a sudden the Blue Pirates were threatening.

On a fourth and two from the Glendale 29, Mingle tried to hit a receiver over the middle, but Vesnesky stepped in and picked the ball off to end the threat and the first half.

After a four-play series and a punt by Williamsburg at the start of the second half, the Vikings started a 17-play, 61-yard march to paydirt that used up almost 7:30 off the clock. And everyone had a hand in it.

Turchick ran for five, Murray took an option pitch for six, Vesnesky swept left for four more, Pat Turchick, a junior split end, hauled in a look-in pass for seven yards and so on, until Murray raced to the left end zone flag from eight yards out for the game's only touchdown.

Jeff Foust capped the

scoring by nailing the extra point out of Steve Turchick's hold.

"I think the key to the game was our control and consistency when we took up most of the third quarter with the scoring drive," Laurito said.

"We got them in a hole and kept them there."

The Blue Pirates weren't done yet, though.

They turned what appeared to be a crushing mistake, allowing Glendale to recover the ensuing kickoff, into the spark they needed to get going.

When Vesnesky was dropped for a six-yard loss on the first play, Turchick was forced out of the pocket and threw an incomplection on the second play and Vesnesky fumbled on the third, it seemed momentum was about to switch sides.

But the Viking defensive line, lead by Mark Kutruff and Ivan Queen, stood up and took charge on each of the next two Williamsburg possessions by forcing rushed passes and dropping backs in the backfield to thwart any possible drives.

"I started to get a little worried there in the last quarter when it seemed like they (Williamsburg) were starting to jell", Laurito said. "Our backs were playing soft and

allowing their receivers to get behind them. "It was a heckuva game. We don't have depth, but our line really did a good job tonight. "There wasn't just one star, but all 22 men putting out. And that's something to get excited about.

Vikings Log Second Shutout

Less than a year after the Glendale Vikings slowly walked off a football field with blank expressions on their faces, they're back to howlin' and screamin' and carryin' on just like they used to.

Yep, the Vikings are winning again.

Purchase Line happened to get in the way of Glendale's buzzsaw defense last night, one that recorded its second straight shutout in a 19-0 triumph.

That's eight straight scoreless quarters for the Viking defense, and they didn't give up a touchdown in either of their two scrimmages.

Granted Glendale's second shutout came against a team that's yet to put the ball in the end zone, but that doesn't much matter to first-year head coach Tim Laurito.

"Our defense is doing a great job, and they're doing it as a unit," said Laurito, spewing out the words faster than reporters could write them, so excited he was.

"There just aren't any individuals on this team, and they all want to win", he continued.

Meanwhile, a befuddled Purchase Line head coach Dave Rackovan would offer no excuses, but his frustration was evident.

"We've been beating ourselves," he moaned. "We're not consistent on offense, and we're playing too much on defense. We need that consistency to take the burden off our defense."

The Red Dragon defense did a admirable job for the most part, but they lost their touch any time Glendale quarterback

Steve Turchick looked for end Mark Kutruff.

That combination destroyed the Dragons, Turchick hitting the tough senior with five passes for 103 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-breaker with just five seconds left in the first half.

Kutruff couldn't have played much better. In addition to his fine receiving effort, he went wild at defensive end, logging two sacks (the Vikes got to Dragon quarterback Bill Gach five times for minus-36 yards).

In the first few minutes of the game, however, it was the Purchase Line defense that earned the plaudits.

Mike Vesnesky hauled in Dan Hopkins' opening kickoff at the G-4, found a hole in the middle, veered to his left and saw nothing but white stripes until he was dragged down at the PL-7, some 89 yards later.

The Vikes blew a perfect scoring opportunity, though, gaining just two yards on four rushing plays against a hard-hitting Dragon 'D'.

The Vikes had more good field position on the next series following a Dragon punt to the PL-34. Turchick found bootlegs to his liking, running two of 'em for 18 yards before rolling to his left for a 4-yard touchdown run with 3:47 left in the quarter.

Jeff Foust kicked the extra-point to make it 7-0.

The game turned into a defensive slugfest until the Dragons made themselves a very fine break late in the half.

Linebacker Tim Voris, a hard-nosed player who gets things done on guts, stormed through the Viking front to block a Todd

Cossick punt, Hopkins wrapping around the ball at the G-45 with just 2:10 left.

But on the next play, middle guard Brian Rydbom got a good jump, chased Gach to his left and knocked the ball loose with a blind side hit, the Vikes recovering at the PL-48 with 1:44.

Again, the Dragons gave ground grudgingly, so Laurito decided to put the ball up from the PL-36 with 21 seconds left.

Turchick found his brother Pat for a short slant-in, then threw incomplete with 11 seconds left, his lone incompleting of eight attempts.

On the next play, with Purchase Line in a deep prevent, Kutruff somehow slipped behind the Dragon secondary on a post, and Turchick put the ball on his hands at the goal line with just five seconds left.

It mattered little that Glendale missed a two-point conversion. The Vikes had just landed an uppercut on the Dragons' chin.

"The big play that killed us was that one with five seconds left," said Rackovan. "There was a lack of concentration there. We were in a prevent, and the kid still got behind us."

Purchase Line nearly gained the momentum on the opening drive of the third quarter, using up 14 plays and over seven minutes to march from its own 41 to the G-5.

The Dragons set up at there with a fourth-and-four, but Gach never had a chance to get his pass off, cornerback Mike Murray crunching him on a blitz at the G-13.

It's a wonder Gach is walking after the way the Viking pass rush, keyed by defensive ends Kutruff and Dave Noel, destroyed the Dragon offensive front, then Gach's back and legs, in that order.

"We didn't get too much time to throw," said Rackovan, with a snort.

"I felt we had to keep pressure on Gach," said Laurito. "He was getting the ball in there when he gave him the time (Gach was five-of-11 for 49 yards).

"We tried to play off the ball for a while, but our ends starting pressuring him. Dave Noel did a great job."

The Viking defense yielded some yardage to the Dragons as the second half wore on, but came up with some big plays to snuff Purchase Line's blossoming drives. The Vikes recovered a fumble, and linebacker Jeff Foust, another hero of the Glendale defensive unit, picked off a pass with just over seven minutes left to set up Glendale's final touchdown.

It was time for the

Turchick-to-Kutruff Show, which accounted for 57 yards on a 56-yard drive (the Vikings were penalized five yards on first down at the G-44).

The capper was a 28-yard pass that Kutruff grabbed around the 20. He slipped a weak tackle attempt, then glided almost effortlessly through a Dragon secondary that never got a solid hit on the Viking.

That score came with 5:05 left, and Laurito left his subs play the game out after Foust jumped on a Guy Small fumble the PL-30.

Laurito tended to spread the praise around for his team's passing performance.

"The line was blocking really well, and Steve was getting his passes out there, but Mark did a helluva job," he said. "I felt we should go with some play-actions in the second half."

"He (Kutruff) made some nice catches and they (the Vikings) were executing on their passes," said Rackovan. "But when it was 13-0, we felt we had to shut them down and we concentrated on their run. We were almost giving them that (the passing game)."

Asked if was surprised that his team had started the season with successive shutouts, Laurito replied, "Yes, I am. Williamsburg and Purchase Line both pass a lot and move the ball well."

"But," he added, "I believe in these kids."

Judging by the noise the Vikings were making in the locker room after the game, they believe in themselves, too.

Glendale Drubs Clay-Kimmel

CLAYSBURG — The only thing good about Glendale's easy 48-0 triumph over an outmatched Claysburg-Kimmel football team Saturday was that the Vikings gave up a touchdown.

That's good?

"Yeah, maybe the pressure's off the kids now," said Glendale head coach Tim Laurito after his team's third win without a loss this season. "They've had four weeks of shutting other teams down. We're not the Steelers; we're gonna have a few breakdowns."

So far, the Vikings have had very, very few.

Claysburg-Kimmel's touchdown with nine seconds left in the first half was the first that the Viking defense has given up this year. Period.

Their scoreless streak of nine straight quarters prior to the Bulldogs' score did not include two shut-outs in scrimmages in pre-season.

So C-K's score was about the only thing surprising on a night when Glendale moved the ball at will and

got everyone in the game.

The Vikings pounded out 272 yards rushing, including 86 on 15 carries by senior tailback Mike Murray, who gained all but 12 of those in the first half.

Murray scored a pair of first-quarter touchdowns, rewards for his workhorse effort, plowing in from one and five yards out.

He could have had bigger stats, but Laurito let the jayvees play most of the second half after two quick third-quarter scores made it 33-8. No less than 11 Vikings carried the ball.

The whole story was written at the line of scrimmage, where the Vikings simply overpowered the smallish Bulldogs. Including a quartet of sacks, the Vikings pushed the hosts backwards to the tune of minus-25 yards rushing on 11 carries in the first half.

When the stats were subtracted at game's end, Clay-Kimmel had minus-17 yards on 24 carries.

The Bulldog's limited offensive success came with quick slant-ins and a couple of bombs by quarterback Dave Glass,

who was doing a relatively decent job when not prone.

The Bulldogs moved 76 yards on 12 plays, mostly passes, to score its touchdown, and the drive was given a substantial push on a pass-interference call inside the G-20.

C-K's score had come after Murray's two short blasts, including an excellent individual effort on his 5-yard score after being hit hard at the CK-2, and a 6-yard scoring run by wingback Dave Noel, who took a pitch left and ran through some C-K defenders at the goal line.

The Bulldogs, fired up by their unexpected success, came out throwing in the third quarter, picking up a first down before cornerback John Lloyd timed a Glass pass, snagged it at the G-48 and rolled 52 yards for a touchdown to make it 26-0.

During the next series, Glass fumbled after a solid hit by a Glendale rusher, and Murray grabbed the loose ball at the CK-21.

Murray scooted 12 yards to the nine, then Todd Cossick hammered out three pops for 14 yards (Glendale was penalized for five yards) to score his first touchdown of the year.

Jeff Foust kicked the third of his four extra points to make it 33-8.

The subs got in on the act with a pair of fourth-quarter scores. Rich Strong capped a 33-yard, 10-play drive with a 1-yard shot up the middle.

That TD was set up by a nice stand by the Glendale front wall (the subs were

in at this point) when the Bulldogs had two cracks with less than a yard to go for the first down.

The final touchdown was a 35-yard gallop by sophomore Jeff Peacock, who saw nothing but white stripes after breaking the line of scrimmage on a simple trap play.

"Everyone got a chance to play, and that's what was good about this game," admitted Laurito. "These other kids don't come out just to sit around."

"I just couldn't ask for a better group of kids to start out with," he said. "I know I've been saying that for three weeks and you're gonna hear it the rest of the year."

"We see 'em all week. Everyone sees them when they go out on the field on Friday or Saturday."

You can bet Claysburg-Kimmel saw all it cared to see of this year's Vikings.

Glendale Defense Shines Again

BEAVER VALLEY —

There's no doubt about it, Glendale's defense won Saturday afternoon's game between the Vikings and Northern Bedford.

Granted, it's obvious that the defense was an important part when you look at the 28-0 final score, but it goes deeper than that.

The Viking defense, which logged its third shutout in four games, held its fourth straight opponent to less than 100 yards rushing, intercepted two passes, allowed the Panthers inside the Glendale 40 just twice, once on the Panthers' last possession when Tim Laurito had inserted his second unit, and held its ground when Northern Bedford had a first-and-goal on the six.

That goal line stand, according to first-year coach Laurito, "broke Northern Bedford's backs. They came out and moved the ball in the second half, but when we stopped them there the momentum changed for good."

In addition to stopping Northern Bedford's offense the Viking "D," along with the special teams, scored one touchdown and set up the other three.

Glendale's first TD came after sophomore Rich Strong recovered a Panther fumble on the opening kickoff, the second after Mark Kutruuff blocked a punt, the third when Pat Turchick recovered a fumbled punt in the end zone and the fourth

after Buddy Fulton intercepted a pass.

So for the three touchdowns that it scored, the Viking offense had to go a total of just 92 yards in 20 plays, thanks to the opportunities the defense and special teams provided. But then again, credit the offense for showing the ability to cash in when given the chance.

Glendale, playing its first Saturday afternoon game at Roy F. Baker Field since 1976, got its first break of the contest on the opening kickoff when Jeff Heltzel fumbled after a 22-yard return and Strong recovered on the Panthers' 35.

Ten plays and one penalty later, Viking tailback Mike Murray went untouched through the middle, behind center Don Glass and guards Calvin Glass and Jeff Foust, for a three-yard touchdown. Foust kicked the extra point and with less than five minutes gone Glendale led 7-0.

The Vikes, who never penetrated the Panther 20 other than the four times they scored, were whistled for a roughing-the-kicker penalty early in the second quarter, but Northern Bedford had to punt again four plays later from its own 23.

That's when Kutruuff easily broke through both lines of protection to bat down Merle Wachter's punt. Kutruuff picked up the ball and ran nine more yards before being dragged down on the three.

On first down Murray bolted into the end zone again, giving Glendale a 13-0 lead with 7:54 left in the first half. Foust's PAT attempt was partially blocked.

The Vikes ran three plays for one yard and then punted to start the second half, and that's when Northern Bedford put together its best drive of the afternoon.

The Panthers moved from their own 34 to Glendale's six in five plays, but then the Viking defense dug in.

Heltzel got inside the one on first down, but the Panthers never got any closer. On second down Brian Rydbom and Mark Zelenski threw Heltzel for a 1-yard loss, on third down Zelenski made the first hit on Todd Detwiler at the one and on fourth down Heltzel was stopped on the 1-foot line.

"Our kids are playing tough defense, there's no doubt that," Laurito said. "We make a few defensive adjustments every week, but we also play better in our regular defense, and that's what we were doing in the second half."

The Vikings got out to their 33 before running out of gas, and Todd Cossick was called on to punt. Cossick lifted a long, hanging boot and Robbie Reed dropped it at the 10 and then knocked it backwards, and Glendale's Pat Turchick jumped on the loose ball in the end zone for a TD.

Turchick took a pass from brother Steve in the end zone for the conversion, giving Glendale a 21-0 lead with 1:42 re-

maining in the third period.

Fulton's interception, one play after the Vikings fumbled the ball away, set up Glendale with a first down on its own 46.

With 4:46 left in the game Glendale capped the scoring when Steve Turchick hit a wide-open Brett Yingling on a 6-yard swing pass in the end zone. Foust tacked on the PAT, setting the final score at 28-0.

Glendale will put its perfect 4-0 record on the line Saturday at Juniata Valley. Game time against the 3-1 Hornets will be 1:30.

"Next week's game will be a big test, perhaps our biggest," Laurito said, noting that the Vikings will be doing plenty of work during this week's practice.

September 27, 1980: Glendale 14 at Juniata Valley 19 Hornets Sting Vikes With Late TD

ALEXANDRIA — Over the years the Glendale Vikings have won so many football games during the last minute that it seemed hard to believe when Juniata Valley pulled out a win Saturday with just 24 seconds left on the clock.

But that's exactly what happened on the Hornets' A.R. Simkins Memorial Field when once-beaten Juniata Valley stung the previously-undefeated Vikings 19-14 on Rich Clouse's third touchdown of the afternoon.

Glendale's defense had worked successfully with its back against the end zone twice before for two impressive goal line stands, but the third time the Hornets finally found a way to get through the mass of Blue-and-Gold bodies.

The Vikes had held when Juniata Valley had a first-and-goal from the one early in the game and again in the third period, but late in the game the Glendale "D" was called upon one too many times.

Juniata Valley took possession at the 4:03 mark trailing 14-12 and the running of Clouse and Rodney Peters took the Hornets inside Glendale's 10 with just over a minute left in the game.

With a third-and-inches on the two, Glendale's front wall threw Peters for a one-yard loss and Juniata Valley called its final timeout at 0:43.

Clouse got the call and he snaked his way through a hole for a 2-yard pickup, not enough for a touchdown but, as it turned out, enough for a first down.

With the sticks set and the clock running Clouse hulled his way into the end zone at the 24-second mark, and Glendale's dream for an unbeaten season was suddenly over.

Jack Galloway kicked the anti-climactic extra point, setting the final score at 19-14.

"I can't take anything away from Clouse, he's an outstanding back," Glendale coach Tim Laurito said after the tough loss. "But our kids played their hearts out on defense, and

I'm proud of each and every one of them.

"I know our kids never quit," Laurito added, "and we played well enough to win, especially on defense.

"A few breaks here or there and the game would have been ours. We made a few costly mistakes early, but we run a high-risk offense to try and make things happen and sometimes we're going to make those mistakes. I think our kids were just so fired up before the game that that's why they made those mistakes.

"A few more breaks early in the game and it would have been an entirely different ballgame."

On Glendale's first possession the Viking offense committed its first of four turnovers when quarterback Steve Turchick coughed up the football on his own 37.

Clouse ran two plays to put the Hornets on the Viking one, but then the Glendale goal line defense dug in.

Mark Zelenski threw Clouse for a loss on first down, Clouse was stopped at the one on second down and finally, on third down,

Clouse fumbled the football and Stew Moore recovered on the one.

The Vikes still couldn't generate any offense, in fact they had just 181 yards net offense for the game, one less than Clouse had by himself on 23 carries, and they quickly punted the ball away.

It appeared as though Galloway fumbled the ball on the return, but the ball was whistled dead on the Vikes' 31. Four plays later Clouse ripped off a 23-yard touchdown run to make it 6-0 with 5:07 remaining in the first quarter.

Glendale lost the ball on interceptions on its next two possessions, but in between the Vikes' Brian Rydbom recovered a fumble to keep the explosive Hornets at bay.

A 54-yard run by Clouse put Juniata Valley on Glendale's 15, but a delay of game penalty, a sack and another penalty forced the Hornets into an obvious passing situation with a fourth-and-26.

Roger Hamer stepped back into the pocket but was quickly greeted by Rydbom, who hit the quarterback as he threw

the ball. Mike Vesnesky picked off the pass at the 11 and zig-zagged his way 89 yards into the end zone to put Glendale right back into the ballgame at 6-6.

Jeff Foust's kick was blocked, leaving the score tied with 6:13 left in the half.

A fumble recovery by Vesnesky on the Vikes' 47 set up Glendale's second TD, a beautiful 29-yard pass from Steve Turchick to Pat Turchick. That capped a five-play drive that was helped tremendously by David Noel's 20-yard run.

The Turchick to Turchick combination worked again for the two-point conversion, putting the Vikes ahead 14-6 with 1:58 remaining until the intermission.

But the scoring wasn't done yet, as Clouse rambled 65 yards two plays later for Juniata Valley's second touchdown. The Hornets fumbled the handoff on the two-point attempt, however, and Glendale went into the half with a 14-12 lead.

Early in the second half Juniata Valley tested the Vikes' goal line "D" again when it got another

first-and-goal on the one. Again Glendale held.

On first down Zelenski stood Clouse up for a one yard loss. After a delay of game violation by the Hornets, Peters was held to one yard, Clouse to zero on a hit by Todd Cossick and Steve Turchick and on fourth down Clouse was stopped inches short of the goal line by Mark Kutruuff and friends.

Glendale's offense never really got moving the entire second half, and with 4:03 left in the game Cossick punted the ball away and Galloway returned it to the Vikes' 41.

Clouse and Peters, who teamed up for 311 yards rushing on 43 carries, drove the Hornets for the winning TD, and the Vikes were saddled with their first setback.

"Juniata Valley is a good football team," Laurito pointed out, "but so are we, and our kids will bounce back."

The Vikes will look to move back into the win column Friday night when they host Shade-Central.

Vikings Suffer Second Straight Tough Loss After Staging Rally

FLINTON — Scholastic football coaches usually give their players a brief post-game talk before sending them into the showers, but the Glendale staff changed the script last night.

Rookie head mentor Tim Laurito, Tom Terza and John Lloyd kept the Viking squad together for an unusually long time after a gut-wrenching 21-20 Homecoming Game loss to Shade-Central City.

Not to berate the grid-ders. Not to serve up a tongue-lashing. The coaches just didn't want any player stepping out into the rainy night doubting his ability or that of his teammates.

The Vikes' heads were down as they trudged from Dr. Roy F. Baker Athletic Field to the locker room, and not much was said.

"This one is hard to swallow," Laurito said. "I feel bad for them. They worked hard this week. They've done everything we've asked of them. And they played their hearts out."

Glendale, uncharacteristically, couldn't stop Shade-Central City the first two times the Panthers had the ball and fell behind 14-0, but John Lloyd's interception early in the second quarter sparked a comeback that had the Vikings on top 20-14 and seemingly on their way to the clinching touchdown with five minutes left.

Then, after Glendale had completely dominated the second half, the fortunes changed on a fumble plucked out of air by Panther Buddy Barnes, a do-everything player who plagued the Vikings all night.

The Panthers, who are 4-1-1, quickly capitalized on the turnover. On second-and-16, Barnes hit Steve Rhoads with a bomb that covered 40 yards. Steve Gulakowski scampered around right end for 11 yards, and a personal foul penalty against the Vikes tacked on 12 yards to the G-12.

Encroachment cost the Vikes five more yards, and the Panthers needed four plays to push back the Glendale defense the last seven yards. Barnes scored from the two on a quarterback sneak to tie the game with 1:26 left.

Rhoads, whose long kickoffs were a big help to the Panther defense, booted the winning point, saddling the Vikings with their second heart-breaking loss after four wins.

They had a victory snatched away from them last Saturday when Juniata Valley scored in the final minute for a 19-14 triumph.

"Our jayvees lost in the last minute Monday night, too, so these kids have had a tough week," Laurito said.

"But we'll be back," he promised.

Coach George Pasierb's Panthers stunned the umbrella-covered crowd at the outset with two impressive touchdown drives. After Carl Sprock returned the opening kickoff 28 yards, the visitors paraded 52 yards in only five plays, Barnes skirting right end unmolested for a 9-yard TD with 2:35 gone.

Glendale tried a trick play on the ensuing kickoff, Mike Murray running straight up the middle and handing off to Todd Cossick, who handed to Mike Vesnesky on a reverse from left to right, but the Panthers stayed in their lanes and stopped the speedy junior at the G-20.

As a result, when Glendale was forced to punt, the Panthers were in business at their 41. Seven plays later, they crossed up the Viking defense as Barnes spotted Mark Satkovich wide open in the end zone for a 19-yard scoring pass. Barnes rolled right for the two extra points, and Shade-Central City was in command at 14-0 with only 7:15 elapsed.

Lloyd's interception changed the complexion as he leaped in front of Sprock at the SCC-48 and raced 29 yards down the

right sideline. The Vikes were on the board in four plays, Vesnesky dashing around left end for a 6-yard touchdown with 6:11 left in the half. Jeff Foust's conversion made it 14-7.

"We just didn't play our kind of game in the first half," Laurito said. "They controlled the line of scrimmage, and their defense just took it to us."

There were no major adjustments at halftime, according to Laurito. "We did change our blocking a little. They were firing into the gaps, and we had to seal off their stunts."

The Vikings looked like a different team in the third quarter, though.

Viking pride, some might call it.

Glendale started knocking the Panthers off the ball, tailback Murray and Vesnesky were running hard and Steve Turchick was able to click with Mark Kutruff for some key passing yardage.

The Vikings were playing their kind of game, ball control. They took the second half kickoff and moved

76 yards in 12 plays to tie the game. Murray blasting over left tackle from the one and Foust booting the extra point.

A personal foul on the kickoff had the Panthers near midfield, but the Viking defense stopped 'em cold, and Rhoads punted to the G-20.

In 18 plays, the Vikes had completed their comeback, Murray needing three cracks from the three to get into the end zone. His 1-yard TD came with 7:32 left. Foust's PAT kick sailed off to the right, but it didn't appear important the way the Vikings were in charge.

Possession time in the second half was 11:34-2:22 at that point.

And Viking fans were sure of victory when Kutruff sacked Barnes for an 11-yard loss when Pasierb gambled on fourth-and-one at the SCC-41.

Murray hammered right tackle for two yards to reach the 100-yard plateau on his 26th carry, but the ball was ripped from

Vesnesky's grasp on second down, and Barnes was Johnny-on-the-spot for the Panthers.

The rest is history.

"We came out in the second half and controlled the football. We were moving the ball. We had 'em. We would have punched another one across, but they got the fumble, and that's part of football," Laurito said.

"Shade played a good game," he added.

So did the Vikings. They deserved to win the way they battled back. But Shade-Central City didn't quit, either.

They are two good teams with a lot more success to be gained this season. Laurito and his staff made sure they reminded the Vikings of that after the game.

You can bet they'll be pumped up when West Branch pays a visit next Friday for a Progress Bowl game.

Vikes Overpower Warriors in Bowl Battle

Ball control — that was the name of the game for the Glendale Vikings last night as they ran over West Branch 30-0 in last night's Progress Bowl battle at Roy F. Baker Field.

Glendale ran 63 plays for 320 yards net offense, including 57 running plays for 314 yards, and chalked up 14 first downs and four touchdowns rushing to up its record to 5-2 while sinking the winless Warriors to 0-7.

And, as Viking coach Tim Laurito said after his team put an end to a two-game losing skid, "your best defense can be a ball-control offense."

Glendale's defense was on the field for 20 less plays than the offense, and it limited the Warriors to 94 yards while collecting three interceptions and recovering three fumbles.

Laurito installed a few new wrinkles, mainly giving the ball to fullback Todd Cossick, and the Vikes' revitalized running game was just too much for the outmanned Warriors to handle.

Cossick picked up a season-high 90 yards on 15 carries and tailback Mike Murray got 80 yards on 20 carries. Add in 50 yards by David Noel, 30 more by end Mark Kutruff on two reverses and 35 by Mike Vesnesky, and the Vikes were able to wear down West Branch's "D".

"We limited our mistakes and played good, sound football," Laurito said. "We decided to go back to our ground game and pound it out. We have

the big backs and we decided to use them. We never really ground it out until last week and tonight. I think we really have a well-balanced attack now."

Tim Launtz, still looking for his first victory as a West Branch coach, couldn't say the same for his offense, but he was still happy with the effort his defense turned in.

Three out of four Glendale touchdowns were set up by Warrior turnovers, and the West Branch offense never really got enough going to give the defense a rest.

"Turnovers cost us the game, the whole game," a disappointed Launtz said. "We let them have every score.

"We thought we could run, and we did a little, but when you get behind early you don't have time to establish anything, especially with all those turnovers. I can't ask any more of my defense. They were on the field the whole ballgame. They can't do it all."

The Warriors got stung for two early touchdowns, but then the West Branch defense actually held its own until the Vikes wore the Warriors down late in the second half.

A fumbled snap by West Branch quarterback Grey Hubler was covered by Glendale's Jeff Foust on the Warrior 43, and nine plays Murray went scored standing up from eight yards out. The Vikes faked a kick and holder/quarterback Steve Turchick passed to Cossick for the two-pointer, making it 8-0 with 2:02 left in

the first period.

Dan Folmar then coughed up the ball on the kick return, and this time Noel recovered on the Warriors 34.

It only took one play, and a couple of broken tackles, for Noel to score, and the fake kick worked again, Turchick passing to Pat Turchick to make it 16-0. So, in a matter of 36 seconds, the Vikes had scored twice.

And a two-touchdown lead against the Warriors proved to be more than enough.

Early in the second half West Branch, which has scored just 32 points in seven games, came out flying, and they got a big break when Steve Turchick lost the handle on a punt and Paul Tarbay recovered on the Vikes' 26.

On the first play Andy

Danko, who had 54 yards on 11 carries, ran 16 yards, but on the second play Hubler fumbled the snap again, and Cossick recovered for the Vikings, stopping the Warriors' only serious threat of the game.

A 21-yard pickup by Kutruff on a fourth-and-11 end-around play was the key to Glendale's third scoring drive, which was capped with 7:03 left in the game by Murray's three-yard run and a kick by Foust.

An interception by John Lloyd set up the Vikes' final TD and Cossick did all the carrying on a 39-yard, six-play drive. Cossick finally scored from 10 yards out and Foust converted again.

An interception by Doug Rowles late in the game put a lid on Glendale's fourth shutout in seven out-

ings.

The Vikes, who meet Moshannon Valley later in the season to determine the winner of The Progress Bowl for 1980, will visit Bucktail next Friday while the Warriors host Juniata Valley.

Vikes, Bucks Battle to Draw

FARWELL — The old adage goes; a tie is like kissing your sister.

But in the case of the Glendale Vikings, a 7-7 tie against undefeated Bucktail might be just what the doctor ordered.

Glendale entered the contest with a 5-2 record against the tough Bucks, who were 6-0 after coming off a 7-3 season last year, the first winning season in 43 years for Bucktail. And the contest was supposed to go in the Bucks' favor, especially while playing at home.

But the Viking defense, which has played extremely well this season, rose to the occasion in the second half, completely closing down the Bucks and their outstanding back, Mike Hulyo.

Hulyo entered the contest with 769 yards on 142 carries and 11 touchdowns, but the Viking defense, which has limited its opponents to an average total offense of 155.5 yards per game put the clamps on Hulyo in the second half. Hulyo raced for 72 yards in the first half and just 40 yards on 11 carries the last half.

On the other sidelines, the offense awoke a little, responding with 182 yards rushing but that wasn't the good news.

The good news is that Todd Cossick became the second Viking in two games to rush for over 100 yards. Mike Murray rushed for 100 yards on 26 carries in last week's contest, and Cossick did the blocking.

But in last night's contest against the Bucks, Cossick did the running, and Murray and Dave Noel did the blocking. As a result, Cossick came up with 133 touch yards on just 18 carries, a nifty 7.4 per

carry average, not bad for a back who has carried the ball just 40 times for 184 yards prior to last night's contest.

To some a tie is nothing, but it sure beats a loss and Viking rookie coach Tim Laurito summed it up best in the silent Vike locker room after the contest.

"We have nothing to be ashamed of. Keep your heads up and let's start thinking about next week's contest," he said. We played a touch football team to an even standstill, and we can be proud of our effort.

"In the first half, we were really tight, but in the second we came out and really controlled both lines of scrimmage. We started to read the blocks well and their defensive sets better; and we just relaxed and played better basic sound football," Laurito further stated.

But those sentiments weren't exactly the same from the other lockerroom where Buck coach Bob Young was visibly upset over the outcome of the contest.

"The tie doesn't really do much for us," he said. "The mistakes just killed our momentum, but they were our mistakes, not something that Glendale forced us into. Technically I feel we are still a better team than they are. With our own mistakes, we just took away our own field position the second half and didn't have anything to work with."

Young further stated, "On the touchdown run (a 44 yard beauty by Cossick to tie the game), we had three of our starters out with little aches and pains. We just have to learn that you have to play football with little bumps and bruises. I just can't understand it. You have to be able to play hurt a little once in a while."

While Young was obviously upset over his Bucks' performance, which was to many their poorest performance of the year, the Vikes can rejoice in that they played a heady and steady contest against a very tough opponent and came away winners, at least in the hearts of the fans that made the long trek to the contest.

The Vikes only managed 20 offensive plays the first half while the Bucks rolled up and down the field. But like Young stated, mistakes kept them out of the end zone and the Vikes were always in the ball game.

While Young complained of his team's mistakes, one by the young Vikes managed to give the Bucks their only score.

Late in the second period of a scoreless contest, Todd Cossick was in punt formation, but a bad snap left Cossick with no choice but to attempt a pass, a la Garo Yepremian, and the result gave Bucktail the ball on the G-36.

Hulyo, Brian Johnson and Ray Gentzyl rambled for a first down at the G-24 and Hulyo gained another three. Then Gentzyl scampered to his left, outraced two Vike defenders to the sideline and drilled a 21-yard scoring pass to a driving Ed Polski in the left corner of the end zone. Johnson then drilled the point after and with 1:14 to go in the half, it was 7-0.

The Bucks fumbled on the first possession after the halftime homecoming ceremonies with Glendale's Jeff Foust recovering at midfield, and the Vikes had good field position, but the Bucks defense held and Glendale punted.

Bucktail moved behind Hulyo and Robbie Risley, but two big stops by Brian Rdybom and Stew Moore enabled the Vikes to stop the Bucks' momentum.

With Murray and Cossick alternating carries, the Vikes managed to move from their own 15 in for the score on eight plays. A 16-yard scamper and a five-yard jaunt by Cossick and Murray, respectively, helped set up the scoring play.

While Young's three starters were nursing their wounds on the sidelines, Cossick went off tackle to his left, cut right. Against the flow and back again for a picture-perfect run of 44 yards for the score.

No fewer than five Bucks had shots at the Vike, but no one laid a hand on him. Foust booted the all-important point, and with 1:42 to play in the third period it was tied at 7-7.

Most of the fourth period was laced with punts, fumbles and mistakes on both sides and it looked like neither team was trying to win the fray.

Following a Viking punt, the Bucks set up shop at midfield with 4:45 to play. A screen pass didn't work; in fact, it lost eight yards. When Gentzyl was back to pass again, his arm was hit by John Lloyd, and Dave Noel pounced on the loose ball at the B-33 with 3:15 to play.

Cossick carried three times and Nurray once, but the last carry by Cossick was stopped just inches short of the markers at the B-22, and the Bucks took over.

This is where the Vikes' defense rose to the occasion. A halfback pass went for naught, and a Gentzyl to Johnson pass was completed for a yard.

Then when Gentzyl dropped back in shotgun formation, the ball was supposed to be centered to Hulyo, but there was a mixup and Gentzyl had to recover on the B-18, suffering a five-yard loss.

Hulyo, who punted for a 36.5 average, picked a bad

time to shank one, this one going just 10 yards.

With :26 remaining, Glendale had the ball on the B-28.

Murray went up the middle for three as did Cossick, hoping to line up the ball in the center for as field goal attempt by Foust and with six seconds on the clock.

Foust's 38-yard field goal attempt just missed to the right by a foot, and the contest was over.

Asked why he decided to run the ball instead of throwing from the B-28, Laurito stated, "We were going for the win, and we were getting pressure all night long when we tried to pass. We thought we might be able to get close enough for Foust to win the contest for us. He certainly has the leg, and he didn't miss by all that much."

Glendale Blanks Mo Valley, 18-0

FLINTON — Just a little is enough.

That was all Glendale needed Friday night in a hastily-played 18-0 win over Moshannon Valley under windy, cold conditions at Roy F. Baker Field.

Both coaches agreed — their teams' passing attacks were the keys.

"We have no passing attack," said Harold Camberg, Mo Valley head coach.

"Steve did a good job," said Glendale coach Tim Laurito regarding the play of Viking quarterback Steve Turchick. "It was awfully hard to throw the ball out there tonight because of the temperature."

In fact, neither team passed consistently. Valley quarterback John Murarik was just 2 of 5 and Turchick only 2 of 6.

The difference was that Turchick made the most of his completions — both for touchdowns.

The Vikings used touchdown passes of 9 and 15 yards to Pat Turchick for their first two scores. The club's top scorer, Mike Murray, raced 6 yards for the other touchdown.

"We made some dumb mistakes in the first half," pointed out Laurito. "Penalties hurt us."

Twice in the first quarter Glendale drove inside the Mo Valley 25 yard-line. But each time the Vikings were hampered by penalties.

On one other occasion, late in the game, the Vikings had a drive killed when Mike Vesnesky's fumble was recovered by MV after a 17-yard gain.

Thanks to a 60-yard punt by Glendale's Todd Cossick, the Black Knights were forced to begin working from inside their 1.

The Viking defense limited the visitors to just 1 first down on the drive and took over in good field position at the MV 47.

After Vesnesky rambled 36 yards to the MV 11, Glendale faced a third-and-four from the 6. Steve Turchick was chased violently by Mo Valley's defensive line. But the tall, lanky quarterback calmly floated a 6-yard scoring pass, on the run, to his brother, Pat.

Turchick found Turchick once again on the first play of the fourth quarter to hike

the lead to 12-0. Murray iced the victory with his TD run late in the contest.

"Actually," said Laurito, "our offense is not getting the recognition it deserves. Our defense is getting all the praise. Our offense has averaged 26 points a game this year and our players on that unit execute very well."

Laurito singled out Murray and Cossick, in addition to the Turchicks, as having good performances.

"Murray and Cossick run hard, and when we mix it up with our passing game, they're tough," concluded Laurito.

Game notes: Murray has scored 10 touchdowns for 60 points this year...Senior Night was observed Friday ... The two teams played to a scoreless tie last year ... Glendale (6-2-1) closes out its season next Friday at Bellwood and the Knights, now 2-7, host Claysburg in their season finale.

Glendale Slips Past Bellwood-Antis 22-21 in Thriller

BELLWOOD — The Bellwood-Antis Blue Devils and Glendale Vikings saved the best for last.

The Blue Devils seemed on their way to a storybook ending, but it was the Vikings — or, perhaps more appropriately The Fates — who wrote the final chapter in a 22-21 Glendale victory. It was the end of successful seasons for both teams — Bellwood finished 7-3 and Glendale 7-2-1 with a conference title.

"The turnover at the goal line," was Glendale rookie coach Tim Laurito's answer when asked to name the game's key play. "Both teams just kept going back-and-forth, back-and-forth, and when it came time to capitalize, it hurt them."

The turnover was on a 2-point conversion try that would have put Bellwood ahead with just 2 minutes left in the game. On the option, quarterback Butch Riggleman pitched to tailback Steve Walker who had clear sailing over the right side. But the ball got away and so did the game.

Had the conversion been successful and the Blue Devils been able to hold on for the win, the Brothers Grimm couldn't have written a better ending. With less than 3 minutes left in the game, Bellwood was behind 22-15, and junior tailback Walker needed about 15 yards to become the first Blue Devil back since 1962 to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a 10-game season.

Well, Walker broke off a 43-yard touchdown run to achieve his goal, breaking tackles up the middle, cutting outside and outracing six defenders to the end zone. But the team fell short when the try for the extra point failed.

"It was a great game for the fans," first-year B-A coach John Hayes said, "especially for the fans on the other side of the field.

"We just made too many mistakes at the wrong times."

In a way, it was fitting that the ghosts that have haunted the Blue Devils through most of the year would come back on Halloween night to cost them a game. Three big mistakes that stuck in Hayes' mind were:

- allowing Glendale to keep the ball because of a facemask penalty after a Viking runner had been thrown for a loss.
- an interception that resulted in the winning touchdown for Glendale.
- a roughing-the-kicker penalty that cost Bellwood the ball on a crucial fourth-quarter play.

"I had not thought of going for the tie," Hayes said of his decision to go for 2 points after the final TD. "We wanted to win it all the way, and we could have had it."

Laurito said the decision to go for the win was laudable.

"You have to say a lot for the Bellwood coach that he went for the win," the Viking mentor said. "You have to give a lot of credit to Bellwood; they're tough, they didn't quit. It was a good football game all the way around."

Laurito had high praise for his offensive line, which showed its power and precision in a 14-play, 99½-yard drive that spanned the first and second quarters and stunned a usually tough Bellwood defense.

"If you're going to credit anyone for this win," he pointed out, "credit the offensive line. They really had a surge; they kept the pressure off (quarterback

Steve) Turchick."

Turchick, much of the time, had good protection and found receivers on his first six passes. He finished with 7 of 9 for 71 yards, including some key connections to Mark Kutruuff to keep alive sputtering drives.

Laurito seemed more inclined to talk about his season than the final win, which all but assures the Vikings of the Inter-Conference "B" championship.

"All year these kids never quit," he said in a jubilant locker room after the victory. "All these kids worked their tails off since last February, and it paid off ... I have all the admiration in the world for these kids ... they were like brothers all year."

Hayes' view of the season was from a somewhat different perspective.

"I guess anyone would be satisfied with a 7-3 record his first time out," he said. "But I feel we had the talent to do much better. When you think of it in those terms, you have second thoughts."

"We would like to have given our kids something a little better to go out on. But Glendale was a good football team. They did a tremendous job."

Game notes: No one in the press box was able to name the running back who broke 1,000 yards for Bellwood in 1962, nor even confirm that it was done ... It was Parents' Night for B-A, and seniors were honored ... That 99-yard drive by Glendale ate up about 7 minutes ... Buddy Fulton intercepted the Bellwood pass that led to Glendale's winning score ... B-A had a 4th-and-2 at their own 34 and lined up as though they were going for it. But a shift pulled Glendale offside and B-A retained possession. It was a planned play ... A look
