Williamsburg Rolls Past Glendale 32-0

FLINTON — Glendale High School's new head coach, Gary Walstrom, would prefer to remember the first 1,015 seconds of last night's season-opening game with Williamsburg.

For that long, at least, his career coaching record was perfect and his team had never given up a point.

But then, midway through the second quarter, Jeff Peacock, the spirit of the Glendale defense, went down with an injury for the second time of the night. Williamsburg scored shortly thereafter, unleashing an offensive artillery that simply overwhelmed the Vikings, 32-0, at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field.

"I'm shellshocked," admitted Walstrom, who received his coaching baptism under a heavy fire.

What really caused the damage were two touchdown passes from Christian Appleman to Scott Brantner, both sophomores, and 165 yards on 21 carries by running back Scott Bumgardner.

Yet the absence of Peacock, who hobbled back to play a gutsy second half, opened the door for the scoring barrage.

"Peacock's the leader," said Walstrom. "When he went out, we could have gone two ways: We could have gotten fired up and

went after it, or we could've let down."

The Pirates capitalized on such a downshift in Viking emotions and drove 84 yards for their first touchdown, the final 32 yards coming on an out pass from Appleman to Brantner. In that drive, Bumgardner carried the ball three times for 24 yards as Williamsburg made good use of its option offense, running the option as if it owned the patent rights to the wishbone.

On its next possession, Williamsburg continued to execute the option well and when the Glendale defensive backs cheated in to halt the outside running, Appleman went to the air again. And again the result was a scoring pass to Brantner, this time for six yards. The score put Williamsburg up 16-0 at halftime. The key play in the drive was a 20-yard run by Bumgardner that came via the option.

"When we started to run that option, it seemed to be the difference," Viking head coach Dave Baker said. "Glendale was tough inside until then, but when we went outside, it also opened the passing game."

The Pirates' passing game also set up two second half scores, a 3-yard run by Bumgardner and a 1-yard dive by Dave Baney.

Overall for Williamsburg, Appleman completed eight of 13 passes for 134 yards, while Gary Kennedy completed two of three for an additional 28 yards. Glendale, on the other hand, could only muster an aggregate passing mark of four completions on 16 attempts for 59 yards.

Two of those completions came on trick plays, both involving quarterback Randy Wills. The first was a pass from flanker Rich Strong, who took the pitch from Wills and then threw back to the quarterback for a 17-yard gain. And the second was a fake punt pass on fourth down from Wills, who doubles as the Vikings' punter, to Steve Mulhollen. The two plays accounted for half of the Vikings' four first downs.

"The big thing was mental mistakes due to inexperience," summed up Walstrom. "We told them not to get down and write the whole season off. We can rebound and learn from this."

NOTES: Glendale hopes to get Walstrom career win No. 1 next week at Tussey Mountain... Wills had a successful game punting last night, averaging more than 39 yards on seven kicks, including a 56-yarder... Williamsburg's victory was its first over Glendale in three years, the last two of which were season openers.

Tussey Tumbles Glendale 20-6

SAXTON — In what was essentially a Jekyll- and Hyde performance on the part of both schoolboy football teams, Tussey Mountain parlayed the running and passing skills of quarterback Chuck Hess into 20 second quarter points and a 20-6 victory over Glendale last night.

Hess ran for a pair of touchdowns, added a two-point conversion, and threw 26 yards to end Dave McClain for another score as the Titans accumulated their entire offensive output in a span of just less than nine minutes in the second quarter to even their log at 1-1.

The hosts dominated virtually every aspect of play in the first half, piling up 117 yards of total offense to the Vikings' 52, and that, in the opinion of Glendale coach Gary Walstrom, was the difference in the game.

"I think we took thwm too lightly at the start," noted Walstrom, whose team suffered its second setback in as many outings. "We played very poorly in the first half. We didn't hit and we didn't come off the ball.

The Vikings took heed of Walstrom's halftime advice and owned the entire second half. The visitors outdistanced Tussey in total yardage 186-22, and mounted the only points of the half on Steve Mulhollen's three-yard run with 3:19 left, but it wasn't enough.

Hess saw to that in the first half. Moving his team 36 yards in nine plays, the Titan signal-caller put his

team ahead to stay with a two-yard sweep around left end 18 seconds into the second quarter. Hess fooled the Vikings again on the conversion, stampeding around the right side for two additional points to give the hosts an 8-0 advantage.

The Titans made it 14-0 when Hess founq McClain in the center of the end zone with a 26-yard scoring strike 6:07 before the close of the half. The pass capped a six-play march that took just over three minutes to complete, and began when Rick Mellius blocked a Glendale punt to set the winners up on the G-43.

Tussey converted another Glendale miscue into its final six points later in the half. Matt Baker's fumble recovery gave the Titans excellent field position at the G-35 with just four minutes remaining in the second quarter. Four plays and less than 90 seconds later, Hess hit paydirt on a power sweep around the right side to give the Titans an insurmountable 20-0 cushion.

The Vikings posed three formidable threats in their second-half comeback bid. The first occurred only four minutes into the third quarter when quarterback Randy Wills, in punt formation at his own five, covered 85 yards with a trick pass to flanker Rich Strong. The play set the Vikings up with a first-and-goal at the Tussey 10, but four fruitless running attempts snuffed out the threat.

Mulhollen's three-yard touchdown blast ended a seven-quarter drought for the losers as Glendale second

serious scoring attempt proved successful with a little over three minutes to play.

A third drive, set up by Will's 41-yard toss to Bill Noel, ended inside the Titan's 10-yard line in a flurry of incomplete passes as time expired.

Glendale will be seeking their first win next Saturday night when it travels to Claysburg-Kimmel.

Glendale Loses to C-K

CLAYSBURG — Claysburg-Kimmel High School senior running back Anthony Dively rambled for 184 yards and four touchdowns Saturday night as the Bulldogs rolled to a 40-0 Inter-County Conference triumph over Glendale at Bulldog Stadium.

The win snapped an 11-year losing streak in the series, the last Claysburg-Kimmel win in 1972.

Junior quarterback Sam Glass connected on seven of 12 passes for 119 yards and the Bulldogs racked up 359 rushing yards to win their first game of the season after two tough losses. Junior halfback Mike Hoenstine picked up 141 yards.

Meanwhile, the setback was the third in a row for the Vikings, who were limited to five first downs and just 41 yards in total offense.

The Viking offense, which has scored just six points in 12 quarters, had trouble moving the ball most of the night and their deepest penetration was the C-K-39. Through it all, though, Viking first-year coach Gary Walstrom isn't ready to throw in the towel yet.

"We just told the kids to hang tough," Walstrom said. "It's tough for the kids to lose, especially when everybody here is used to winning. I just told them to put this game behind them and look forward to our next game."

"We lost our first three,"

he added, "but there's still seven games left. Our season is not over yet. We can still turn it around."

Claysburg-Kimmel, which dropped its first two games by a combined total of five points, struck for a touchdown on their first possession. Dively took the hand off on the fifth play of the drive and broke through the Glendale defense en route to a 41-yard touchdown jaunt. Dively, however, was stopped short of the goal line on the try for the two-point conversion.

Mike Heisel blocked a Randy Wills' punt to set up the Bulldogs' second score a few minutes later. The ball wound up on the Viking seven, and it took Dively just two carries to punch it in. Dively also ran for the conversion to give the hosts a 14-0 lead after one quarter.

"Dively's a very fluid runner," Bulldog coach Jack Krider barked. "He's not going to run over many people, but he does have quickness. He made some nice moves. And Mike, he seemed to break tackle after tackle."

Claysburg-Kimmel scored on its fourth possession early in the second quarter following a 33-yard punt by Wills that backed the Bulldogs up to their own 12.

It took the winners six plays to move 88 yards. Glass hit split end Mark Claar, who caught three passes for 72 yards, on a crucial third-down play that moved the ball to the Bulldog 31 and kept the drive alive. Faced with another third down at their own 41, the Bulldogs once again turned to Dively, who scampered 59 yards to paydirt.

"They're a lot better than their 1-2 record indicates," Walstrom observed. "Dively is a super back. I thought their offensive line was just overpowering our tackles and ends the whole way across the line."

The Bulldogs continued to control the Viking defense as they built up a 28-0 cushion at the half on the strength of a 97-yard TD run by Hoenstine. Hoenstine's jaunt was the second longest run from scrimmage in the history of Claysburg-Kimmel football. Glass ran for the two-point conversion.

The Vikings held the powerful Bulldog offense scoreless in the third

quarter, but a trick play on their first possession of the fourth quarter set up the hosts fifth score.

On fourth down and 11 at the Viking 41, Glass dropped back in punt formation, but to everyone's surprise he threw a 35-yard pass to Claar to move the ball down to the G-7 seven. Dively then lugged the pigskin into the end zone for his fourth score.

The winners added their final score in the final minute of the game after holding the Vikings on four downs. The Bulldogs got possession of the ball at the G-25 with 42 seconds remaining.

Heisel, who had earlier blocked a punt, carried the ball all the way down to the Viking two on a 23-yard run, then he capped off the two-play drive by plunging into the end zone with seven seconds left.

The Vikings will host Northern Bedford at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field in Flinton Friday. Claysburg-Kimmel will travel to Allport for an important showdown with West Branch. Both are ICC games.

Glendale Shows Improvement in Loss to Northern Bedford

FLINTON — The Glendale Vikings played their best game of the season last night, but they still lost to Northern Bedford 26-14.

Even though his team fell to 0-4, Viking coach Gary Walstrom said he felt pleased after the game. "I feel 100 percent better about the team."

Keep in mind that Glendale scored just once in the first three games, that they were coming off a 40-0 beating last week and that they were only down by eight points at the half.

Walstrom said his team had worked all week on correcting the mental mistakes that have plagued the offense this year.

On their first possession, the Vikings showed what they had learned by marching 75 yards in 10 plays for their first score.

The key play in the drive was a 26-yard pass from quarterback Randy Wills to end William Noel on

third-and-long from the G-40. After that, Wills ran three of four plays, scoring on the fourth from 19 yards on a keeper up the middle.

The Vikings forced Northern Bedford to punt after three downs and it looked like the game might be closer than the sparse Glendale crowd was expecting.

But the Panthers stopped Glendale after three plays and struck quickly. Their drive, too, hinged on a third-down pass, this one from quarterback George Eckenroad to Tim Foor, who blew by the Glendale secondary from the slot to pull in a 51-yard pass that put the Panthers 10 yards from paydirt.

Halfback Brian Koontz took the ball the rest of the way on two runs behind the power-I blocking of running mates Foor and Wayne Heck.

Koontz, who led all runners with 102 yards on 22 carries, plunged in from the three for his first of two touchdowns with only sec-

onds left in the first quarter. He also kicked the extra point.

What appeared to be Glendale's biggest break of the half turned into a back-breaker when an interception by Wills was nullified by a roughing-the-passer penalty.

Instead of having a first won on the 50, Glendale had to stop the Panthers — which it could not do. The Panthers, or namely Koontz, took it in from the 46 on five plays. The junior halfback gained 41 of those yards, including the final two. Of course, he booted the extra point.

With 1:20 left in the half, Walstrom called for a pass. After Wills threw up a prayer into a crowd of receivers and defenders on the first play, Walstrom decided to run out the clock.

"I felt our position was very poor (on their own 32). They might have gotten an interception and an easy touchdown," Walstrom said. "I thought

we should just run the half out, go back to the locker room and look at our mistakes. Then we could come back out and stop them."

The Vikings did stop them, but only for one possession.

Koontz's best punt of the game, 44 yards, put Glendale back on their 11 and they could not move the ball. The Panthers regained possession on the G-43 and drove for a touchdown in eight plays.

Eckenroad began the drive with a 26-yard completion to Foor and finished it with a seven-yard pass to Darrin Troutman, who made a nice grab in the corner of the end zone.

A crucial turnover by Glendale on its next possession set up the Panthers' final TD. Wills went back to punt for the Vikings, but by the time the snap bounced to him, it was too late to kick and the Panthers had possession on the G-13.

They wasted no time in

scoring. Eckenroad threw to Foor, who scooted down the sideline for a 26-6 lead.

The Vikings came back on their next possession and scored on a pass from Wills to Noel from 15 yards out at the 10:58 mark. Wills pushed into the end zone for two points, but it was too little too late.

The Panthers ate up the clock until Wills made a diving interception on the G-31 with 5:58 left to play, but the Viking offense stalled on its 40 when three passes fell incomplete.

Walstrom said he is looking forward to the next game at Juniata Valley Saturday. "There was so much improvement tonight over the last games," he said. "The kids feel like they're coming around."

Glendale Notches First Win

AXELANDRIA —

Glendale's rookie mentor Gary Walstrom enjoyed his first high school coaching victory Saturday afternoon as the Vikings downed Juniata Valley 18-14 in an Inter-County Football Conference game.

The visitors employed a big-play offense fronted by senior quarterback Randy Wills, who threw for two touchdowns and ran for another in pacing Glendale to its first win in five decisions.

Juniata Valley is 3-3.

"It feels good to win that first one," said the personable Walstrom, who was undoubtedly speaking for both himself and his team. "We did what we wanted to do. We played a good game."

The winners used a 64-yard, 10-play drive to score six points on their first possession. Wills completed the march with a two-yard sneak 4:49 into the game. The Green Hornets were assessed two costly 15-yard penalties that perpetuated the drive, a fact that did not go unnoticed by Hornets' skipper Bill Clouse.

"We made some mistakes at the start that

really hurt us," Clouse pointed out. "We were young when we started the season, and today, we got a little younger."

In the second quarter, they also got further behind.

Steve Mulhollen's interception gave Glendale a first down on the hosts' 20 with 10:26 left in the first half. Three plays later, Wills hooked up with junior Bill Noel on a 15-yard scoring aerial to make it 12-0 at the intermission.

The same combination accounted for the Vikings' final touchdown with 4:05 remaining in the third quarter. Wills found Noel all alone behind the Hornets' secondary and hit him with a pass on a play that covered 52 yards.

With an 18-0 lead going into the final stanza, Glendale looked very comfortable. However, prosperity burned a hole in the Vikings' pockets, and they committed two mistakes that resulted in both Juniata Valley scores, creating a nail-biter in the final minutes.

The first miscue occurred when Glendale fumbled on a running play at its own 20 with 11:16 left in the game. Hornet junior Jim Clouse scooped up the ball from his linebacker

position and ran unmolested into the end zone to make it an 18-6 contest.

A bad center snap to punter Wills gave the Hornets a first-and-goal at the G-6 with less than three minutes remaining. Clouse covered that yardage by sprinting off the right side to paydirt on the next play from scrimmage. His conversion run made it 18-14.

Juniata Valley made a final spirited comeback bid but was thwarted at the G-22 as time ran out. The Vikings' Jeff Peacock made a game-ending, and potentially game-saving, tackle on Clouse, who had taken a pass from quarterback Dave Borst and eluded a host of Glendale defenders.

Glendale travels to Marion Center Saturday for a 1:30 p.m.

Vikes Score Twice In Final Quarter...

Glendale Rallies To Tie Stingers 20-20

MARION CENTER — The Glendale Vikings put on a Rip Van Winkle act in the first half Saturday afternoon and were hard-pressed to recover.

In fact, they recovered only partially — scoring 14 unanswered points in the second half to forge a 20-20 tie with a Marion Center team that has won only once in the two-year history of its varsity football program.

Prior to Saturday's tie, the Stingers had been outscored, 165-34, while dropping their first five decisions this season.

Buoyed by the right arm of junior quarterback Greg Wilden, who completed six of nine first-half passes for 137 yards and one touchdown, the hosts mounted a 20-6 lead at the intermission.

Overall, Wilden perforated the Viking defense for 13 completions in 25 attempts and a total of 221 yards through the air. He accounted for the Stingers other two touchdowns with a pair of one-yard runs.

"I think we came into this game thinking it was going to be an easy one for us," said Glendale coach Gary Walstrom, whose team now stands 1-4-1. "We were overconfident at the beginning, and we weren't going all out like we did against Juniata Valley," added Walstrom, referring to the Vikings 18-14 triumph last week.

Marion Center drove 51 yards to paydirt on its first possession. Wilden, who capped the seven play junket with a one-yard sneak up the middle, completed a 24-yard pass to sophomore tight end Ron Dermitt to ignite the drive. Glendale's scrappy Jeff Peacock deflected Bob Elliot's conversion kick attempt to keep the Stingers lead at 6-0.

The visitors mustered their finest sustained drive on their

ensuing possession. It covered 77 yards, entailed 19 plays and was polished off by Peacock's two-yard touchdown burst. Nat Traveny's placement kick sailed wide right and the score remained 6-6 with 11:21 left in the half.

Glendale compiled five first downs in the advance, including two via the peanlty route.

Both teams were heavily penalized in the contest. The Vikings were caught in the wrong 12 times for a total of 89 yards, while the Stingers were assessed 10 penalties totaling 85 yards.

Two passing plays from Wilden to Dermitt put Marion Center back in the lead just over a minute after Glendale had evened the count.

Dermitt was on the receiving end of a 62-yard Wilden bomb that moved the ball from the MC-27 to the G-11. On the very next play, Dermitt, who caught four passes for 115 yards, made a diving grab in the right-hand corner of the end zone to stake Marion Center to a 12-6 advantage.

The conversion try failed, as Wilden completed the pass to halfback Sam Peterson, who was pushed back short of the goal line by the Vikes' Dave Lloyd in his quest for the two points.

Two minutes later, with Glendale in a punt situation at its own 17, Randy Wills received a poor center snap near the goal line and was pinned inside the end zone for a safety. The Stingers had a 14-6 lead with 8:09 left in the first half.

After Wills' free kick following the safety, the Stingers assembled a 54-yard scoring thrust to widen its lead. Wilden culminated the seven-play drive by streaking off tackle into the end zone on a busted play. Although Nat Traveny blocked Elliot's kick, the hosts had a

commanding 20-6 bulge at halftime.

Following a scoreless third quarter, Glendale pulled even with a big showing in the final stanza.

Wills bowled into the end zone from the one-foot line with 9:29 left in the game. The score ended a 43-yard drive that took eight plays to complete and was highlighted by the performance of senior tailback Dave Vereshack, who caught a 22-yard aerial and added nine yards on one ground attempt. Although Wills' conversion pass to Vereshack failed, the Vikings now had that all-important intangible in sports — momentum.

The next time they got the football, the visitors used that momentum to tie the game.

Glendale sophomore Jack Burmeister dumped Stingers' punter Dave Canton to give the Vikes' a first down on the MC-29 with 7:25 remaining.

Glendale covered the remaining yardage in five plays. Wills' three-yard run put the finishing touches on the drive with 5:39 left. Earlier in the march, Wills' 13-yard, third down pass to flanker Rich Strong had given the Vikings a first down on the MC-13.

Peacock then set the table for the senior quarterback's second TD of the game by blasting up the middle for a first down at the three. Peacock's leaping catch of Wills' conversion loss created the 20-20 final. "I expected to win, but I was afraid this would happen," explained Walstrom. "All week I was worried about us looking past this game to West Branch (the Vikings next opponent)."

"I'm displeased at the outcome, but happy with the way we came back in the second half."

Glendale will host West Branch at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field in

Flinton Friday.

NOTES — Saturday was Homecoming Day at Marion Center... Vereshack, with 62 yards in nine carries, fronted the Glendale rushing attack... Peacock supplemented that effort by gaining 53 yards in 15 cracks... Scott Lohr was the Stingers leading ballcarrier with 61 yards in 11 attempts. Glendale Downs Penns Manor 19-6

KENWOOD — Visiting Glendale unleashed a disciplined running attack in the second half Saturday night to upstage Penns Manor 19-6 in the first gridiron game between the two schools.

The Vikings racked up 130 of their 181 rushing yards in the last 24 minutes. They scored 13 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to break a 6-6 tie and salt away the victory.

"Our offense was working very well," said Glendale coach Gary Walstrom, whose team is 2-5-1. "We wanted to establish a ground game here tonight and we were able to do it."

With the score deadlocked early in the fourth quarter, the Vikings culminated a concise five-play, 54-yard touchdown drive to take the lead.

A two-yard scoring bolt off right tackle by flanker Rich Strong ended the march and gave Glendale a 12-6 advantage with 11:09 left in the game.

Following Randy Wills' diving interception six minutes later, the Vikes staged a 10-play advance which spanned 51 yards

and netted them an insurance touchdown.

Jeff Peacock, who paced Glendale's well-balanced ground arsenal by compiling 71 yards on 15 carries, smashed in from the one with only 28 seconds remaining to put the game out of reach at 18-6. Nat Traveny's successful placement kick gave the Vikings' their final margin of victory.

"They came at us with a 5-2 at the start and then changed to a differernt (4-4) setup, noted Walstrom, speaking of Penns Manor's defensive alignment. "Our guys had trouble blocking in the first half, but out offense made the necessary adjustments in the second half."

Glendale parlayed a 12-play drive into six points on its first possession. Wills' quartereback sneak from the one-foot line provided the capper to the scoring march with 3:22 remaining in the first quarter.

The drive begin when Steve Mulhollen pounced on a Comet fumble at the losers' 43.

The Comets turned the ball over four times and were assessed 80 on six penalties.

"We made more mistakes than you can shake a stick at," groaned mentor Ken Kundla, who watched his Penns Manor club dip to 1-6-1.

The Comets averted a shutout on senior Dave Bagley's one-yard touchdown run two minutes and 32 seconds into the second quarter. Penns Manor quarterback Brad Packer, who completed six of seven passes for 119 yards, threw a 24-yard strike to Brian Goril and a 12-yard toss Mark Myers to highlight the 13-play, 78-yard scoring drive.

That was all the offense the hosts could muster against Glendale's inspired defense, though.

"Our defense has been good all year," commented Walstrom, "Until tonight, though, it has been forced to stay out there most of the time."

Glendale faces undefeated Moshannon Valley at Flinton Friday night in a Progress Bowl clash. The Black Knights can take possession of the Bowl for the first with a win, but, like last year, the Vikings will be out to play the spoiler.

FLINTON — Unbeaten Moshannon Valley Area High School's football team ran into a fired-up Glendale 11 last night in one of Progressland's fiercest rivalries, and even though the final score was 21-0 in favor of the Black Knights, it might have been the Knights' sternest test thus far.

A pesky Viking defense made it that way, coming up with one key defensive play after another in the first half. The Vikings limited the Knights, 9-0, to just 96 yards on the ground in the first half and trailed 7-0 at the intermission.

Glendale held the winners scoreless in the third quarter before yielding two fourth quarter touchdowns that made the visitors the outright winner of the Progress Bowl for the first time ever.

"We played on emotion for a long time," said Glendale coach Gary Walstrom, whose team is now 2-6-1. "But you can't expect to do that the whole game. I thought we had them for awhile. We were hanging tough."

In the first half the Vikings played near flawless defensive football, and not once, not twice, but three times they stopped the powerful Knight offense.

On the Knights' very first offensive possession, the visitors marched to the G-28 before a fumble stalled their drive. On its very next series, Mo Valley, once again, had excellent field position, thanks to a 35-yard punt return by Jack Sahlaney. The winners moved the ball to the two-yard line before Sahlaney was shut down by Viking linebacker Jeff Peacock.

"Glendale really hung in there," Mo Valley coach Howie Camberg said. "They played excellent defense on that goal line stand."

"We just went out and hit and took it to them," Walstrom countered later.

After sputtering on their first two offensive series, the Knights offense went to work on their third possession and finally were able to move the football. It took them just four plays to march 39 yards, with Doug Kephart's one-yard jaunt off right tackle resulting in the pay-off.

The key play in the drive was Sahlaney's 28-yard pass to split end Scott Evans, which gave the Knights a first down at the G-6. Tom Hopkins' kick gave the visitors a 7-0 lead.

Following the touchdown, Mo Valley moved the ball as far as the G-23 before Sahlaney's pass was intercepted by Viking safety Randy Wills in the end zone. The ball caromed off cornerback Rich Strong's hands into Wills' waiting arms.

"In a rivalry game like this, mistakes always play a big part," said Camberg, whose team fumbled the ball six times. "We made a lot of mistakes early. We're just lucky the kids hung in there and played together as a ball team and came out the winner."

"We played our hearts out," Walstrom said. "We came up against an undefeated team that nobody gave us a chance to beat, and with a couple of breaks, we could have changed the whole thing around."

One of those breaks came early in the third quarter with the hosts trailing 7-0. After Steve Mulhollen had returned an interception 23 yards to the G-43, the Vikings set up shop from there and moved the ball to the MV-37, where Wills threw an apparent 37-yard touchdown to tailback Dave Vereshack, but the play was called back because of a holding penalty.

"If we could have scored right there, then the pressure would have been on them," said Walstrom, who thought that was the turning point of the game. "That TD would have made it 7-6 and depending on what we did for the extra point, we could have either tied the game or went ahead."

"But when we didn't get it, it gave them the ball back, and the momentum swung in their favor."

Indeed it did. Mo Valley took advantage of the missed opportunity, as its offense took over the controls. Scott Jarrett, who finished as the game's leading ball-carrier with 126 yards on 12 carries, broke through a beleaguered Viking defense en route to a 47-yard touchdown gallop that gave the the Knights a 13-0 lead just 37 seconds into the final quarter.

Sahlaney ran for the two-point conversion with 11:23 left as the Knights grabbed a 15-0 cushion.

"Our seniors took charge out there in the fourth quarter and they did the things that they had to," Camberg offered. "Glendale played a super defensive game, but I think they tired in the fourth quarter. That's when we started playing much better football."

With 7:25 left in the final stanza, the winners added an insurance tally following another fine punt return by the speedy Sahlaney. He returned the ball 36 yards to the G-22, and two plays later, he hooked up on a 22-yard touchdown pass to Bill Reese. The conversion run failed.

"I'm really proud of the way our kids played tonight," Walstrom analyzed. "We played super tough defense, but Mo Valley's such a well-balanced team. It's hard to hold them down for four quarters."

The victory snapped a four-year losing streak for the Knights, who last beat the Vikes' 7-6 in 1977. The two teams tied 0-0 in 1979.

It took the Knight's 12 years to win their first Progress Bowl, but this time, the win finally paid dividends.

"This team has struggled a long time to win this Progress Bowl," an elated Camberg said. "The team and the coaching staff are proud to be taking it back to Mo Valley."

Only a home game with Claysburg-Kimmel Friday night at Hilltop Stadium in Houtzdale separates the Knights from an unbeaten season. A victory would give the Knights a perfect 10-0 slate.

The Vikings, meanwhile, will travel to Bellwood-Antis for their season finale Friday night.

Bellwood-Antis Grinds Out 39-0 Victory Over Glendale Eleven

BELLWOOD — It was back in the 20's again last night — both the temperature and the brand of high school football.

In Bellwood-Antis' 39-0 victory over visiting Glendale at a bitter cold Bellwood-Antis Memorial Field, the two team completed but four passes. And of the 599 total yards accumulated, only 36 came via the pass.

The game was the last of the season for both teams. Bellwood-Antis ended the season 7-3 and Glendale finished 2-7-1.

The difference came on the ground. Two B-A backs ran for more than 100 yards each as the Blue Devils piled up 468 yards rushing, while the Vikings ran for only 95 yards.

Jeff Youngkin scored on touchdown runs of one, five and 19 yards and rushed for 123 yards on 10 carries. His backfield mate, Don Stiffler, added 138 yards on just nine carries to lead the Devils.

But Blue Devil coach John Hayes reserved his praise for the offensive line, a group composed solely of seniors.

"Our line has been neglected as far as recognition goes," Hayes said. "They were the nucleus with which we built the team around this season. Glendale's biggest weakness was in the line and that was the difference right off."

Most of B-A's yardage came off tackle, behind the blocking of Wally Rossi (5-8, 245 pounds) and Ron Riley (5-10, 207 pounds).

"There a good football team, no doubt about it," said first-year Glendale coach Gary Walstrom. "But under the circumstances, I thought we went out there and did the best we could."

Walstrom said he thought the Vikings, who dressed only 23 players, left their best on the playing field last week against Moshannon Valley. In that game, the Vikings held Mo Valley to seven points in the first three quarters before falling 21-0.

"Coming off the Mo Valley game, we just weren't the same. They played their heart and soul out last week. It's tough to get up for a game at the end of the season when you're not playing for a championship or title," Walstrom said. "Especially after playing like we did last week."

Bellwood-Antis may have chilled any fire the Vikings had left when it scored on its first four possessions, on drives of 54, 95, 50 and 41 yards to race to a 26-0 lead.

And on their fifth possession of the first half, the Blue Devils drove 70 yards to the G-5 before time ran out.

It was the second drive, which began on the B-5 due to an excellent 40-yard coffin-corner punt by the Vikes' Randy Wills and covered 95 yards, that may have been the real clincher for the Blue Devils.

"I'm certain that had to have a demoralizing affect on them," Hayes said.

Before it even threw a pass, Bellwood-Antis has a 19-0 lead, on two scores by Youngkin and a seven-yard TD run by Jerry Potts. The first Bkue Devil pass was for a touchdown, an 18-yarder from quarterback Bob Gill to split end Rick Paradis that put them up 26-0 at halftime.

Glendale threw a bit earlier in the game, but Wills' first two attempts were both intercepted by B-A.

Walstrom said that by halftime, the Vikings were without six starters. That forced a number of players to play out of position

including for example, back-up quarterback Jack Burmeister, who saw a lot of action at tight end.

"The inexperience and lack of depth are what hurt us the most," Walstrom said.

The Blue Devils came out running in the second half as Steve Miller, who was on crutches all week, and Youngkin traded carries to pace a scoring drive of 81 yards. Youngkin rushed the final 19 yards for the TD, his third of the night, to put B-A up 33-0.

Dave Johnson scored on an eight yard reverse in the final quarter to round out the Blue Devils scoring.

NOTES — Bellwood-Antis did not punt once... Gary Rydbom recovered a Blue Devil fumble and Rich Strong also picked off an errant B-A pass... Glendale's Steve Mulhollen left the game late in the second quarter with a sprained right ankle... Mulhollen still ended the season as the Vikings leading rusher, with 249 yards on 72 carries.
