Vikings Lose 6-0 to Pirates

After giving up a quick touchdown following the opening kickoff, the Glendale Vikings battled the Blue Pirates of Williamsburg to a standstill the rest of the way to lose their opener 6-0 at the Williamsburg Athletic Field last night.

The Pirates hit paydirt when junior halfback Scott Brantner scampered 17 yards around right end with only two minutes and 20 seconds elapsed in the first quarter.

The touchdown was set up by a 15-yard penalty for a late hit and a 22-yard pass from junior quarterback Christian Appleman to Brantner after Bruce Kern returned the short kickoff to the W-36.

The sluggish Glendale offense lacked a passing attack (minus one yard for the game) and was able to mount only one serious threat the entire game, and that was set up by the Viking defense.

Midway through the second quarter, defensive end Jeff Noel sacked Appleman on a fourth-and-three pass attempt, and the Vikings took over at the midfield stripe.

David Lloyd picked up a first down at the W-38 on a third-and-one quarterback sneak, and two plays later senior tailback Bill Noel busted loose on a 33-yard romp, which ended just inside the 10-yard line.

But an illegal-use-of-hands call nullified the run, and the Vikings reached Williamsburg territory only once more.

While the Viking offense wasn't setting any records, the defense was busy ruining the reputation of the Williamsburg offense, which gained 1,086 yards on the strength of Appleman's arm last year.

The Vikings suffered from poor field position throughout the game, evidenced by the fact that the Pirates were in Viking territory no less than eight times.

The Viking defense forced the Pirates to surrender on downs on four

occasions, and Bill Noel picked off a deflected Appleman pass to thwart another Williamsburg attempt.

With 4:48 remaining, the Vikings stopped the Pirates on a fourth-and-goal at the G-21 after a fumbled pitch moved Williamsburg back from the G-9.

The Vikings took possession but chose to punt on a fourth-and-one-and-a-half at the G-29, and the Pirates ran out the clock.

The Vikings ground game netted 147 yards with Bill Noel leading the way with 74 yards on 17 carries. The Pirates rushed for 135 yards with Brantner's 86 stripes taking game honors.

Williamsburg hit on three of 10 passes for 77 yards, while the Vikings could connect on two of seven, which resulted in a net loss of one yard.

Glendale head coach Gary Walstrom said, "I'm really pleased with the way the kids played. The offense does need some work. The defense is a little ahead of the offense at this stage. Overall, on defense we played tough."

"The defense made a couple of mistakes early, but they settled down," Walstrom continued. "I was afraid the kids would hang their heads after Williamsburg scored early, but they sucked it up."

Glendale will host Tussey Mountain Friday at 7:30 p.m. in its home opener at Baker Field in Flinton.

Lloyd Scores Four Touchdowns...

Glendale Drubs Tussey Mountain

FLINTON — Glendale High School quarterback Dave Lloyd recovered from a recent bout with the flu to score four touchdowns, one on a 45-yard punt return, to lead the Vikings to a 28-6 romp over Tussey Mountain last night at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field.

But it was the offensive line — center Rich Hamilton, guards Jeff Noel and Gary Rydbom and tackles Bob Greenaway and Jim Orichosky — that deserved the majority of the credit for the blowout, according to head coach Gary Walstrom.

"They controlled the line of scrimmage and opened it up for the backs," Walstrom commented.

The trenchmen blasted gaping holes in the Titan line, enabling the Viking offense to grind out 244 yards on the ground while controlling the ball for about 31 of the game's 48 minutes.

The Glendale offense ran 61

plays from scrimmage, compared to Tussey Mountain's 38 and garnered 18 first downs to the Titans' five.

While the offense was mowing down the Titans, the Viking defense stood its ground, yielding the majority of TM's 157 yards on long gainers of 69 and 50 yards by halfback Scott Stevenson, the latter for a third-quarter TD.

The Vikings' balanced ground game was led by junior tailback John Campbell, who rushed for 77 yards on 13 carries, followed by junior fullback Jack Burmeister's 58 yards on 11 carries, Lloyd's 54 stripes on 11 rushes and senior tailback Bill Noel's 42 yards on 12 runs.

Noel, who suffered all week from a pulled back muscle, was replaced in the starting backfield by senior Calvin Hommer, who picked up 13 yards on three rushes and received praise from Walstrom for his blocking.

In the early going, it looked as though the Titans would jump out to a good lead, when Stevenson burned the Vikings' defense on a 69-yard run to the G-4 on the Titans' second possession.

But on the next play, Bill Noel, inserted at linebacker for his first play of the game, picked off a Robbie Russell aerial in the end zone and returned it to the G-35.

"Bill's interception gave us the momentum," Walstrom said, referring to the ensuing 11-play, 65-yard drive that saw Campbell pick up 36 yards on four totes before Lloyd snuck over from the four.

A pass for the two-point conversion failed after a penalty erased Burmeister's kick.

Although the Vikings continued to move the ball, penalties (55 yards in the first half and 80 total) shut down several drives and kept Glendale off the board until the end of the half.

With only two minutes remaining, the Vikes set off on a

59-yard drive after soph Chris Henry swiped a fumbled Titan punt from the grasp of a Titan player.

With the ball safely in hand, Lloyd picked up 19 yards on a sweep to the right, and Campbell added 23 more before Lloyd swept the right side again to pick up his second TD from three yards out with 25 seconds remaining. Burmeister booted the extra point for a 13-0 Viking lead.

"We came in at the half and the kids were celebrating already," Walstrom said. "Instead of patting them on the back we told them what are mistakes were. We are still playing up to our potential."

If the Vikings were overconfident entering the second half, it didn't affect their play, as they consumed the first seven minutes of the quarter with a 14-play drive that ended with Lloyd scampering untouched around right end from three yards out.

The Vikes upped the tally to 21-0 when a faked PAT attempt enabled Lloyd to find soph Kevin Swauger for two points.

The Titans cut the gap to 21-6 on Stevenson's TD run, but Lloyd iced the game with 6:36 remaining when he dazzled Tussey Mountain's punt coverage team with a 45-yard return to paydirt. Burmeister tacked on the PAT, and it was only a matter of time till the Vikes' record evened at 1-1.

Stevenson's 134 yards rushing led the Titans, who fell to 0-2. Russell tossed 12 passes, completing four to his own receivers for 33 yards and one to Noel.

Glendale's passing attack fared better, after a minus-1 yard performance last week in a 6-0 loss to Williamsburg.

Lloyd hit on five of 11 for 44 yards, and it was the appearance of the aerial game which Walstrom believed helped to keep

Tussey Mountain off balance.

"We felt if we didn't complete some passes, they'd have 11 men on the line," he said.

"You have to give some credit to Tussey Mountain," Walstrom said. "They have a good group of kids and didn't give up."

"We're very pleased with both our offense and defense," he said, but he noted that the Vikings must look ahead to next week, because "Claysburg-Kimmel is going to be tough."

The Vikings will attempt to improve their record Friday when they host the Bulldogs.

Bulldogs Put Bite on Vikes 15-0

FLINTON — Senior running back Mike Hoenstine of undefeated Claysburg-Kimmel out-scored, outrushed and caught more passes than the entire Glendale High School offense last night as the Bulldogs rolled to a 15-0 Inter-County Conference win at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field.

And Hoenstine didn't have that good of a night. The workhorse back needed 30 carries to grind out 105 yards and a touchdown, while the Vikings could muster only 84 yards running while not completing a pass.

Viking mentor Gary Walstrom labeled his offense "a little erratic."

The Vikings suffered from poor field position and never set foot in Bulldog territory, getting only as far as the Glendale 48 on their first possession of the second half.

"We were always in a hole," Walstrom said, "right from the beginning. We could never seem to fight our way out of it."

Punting continued to be a thorn in the Vikings' side, as evidenced by a

21-yard average for five kicks.

But the vaunted Claysburg-Kimmel offense found it tough going against a stiff Glendale defense, picking up only 194 yards despite running 61 plays.

The Bulldogs had accumulated nearly 600 yards in total offense in their previous victories, 21-0 over Juniata Valley and 29-12 over Williamsburg.

"I was pleased with the defense," Walstrom said, noting that "it's the fewest number of points Claysburg has scored all year."

It looked like a long night was in store for the Vikes when Bulldog runningback Sam Glass weaved to the C-K 46 after taking the opening kickoff at the 20.

The Bulldogs began a drive that consumed nearly half of the first quarter with Hoenstine picking up 29 yards on six carries plus another six on a sliding catch of an Anthony Garver pass.

But a couple of illegal procedure penalties put the Bulldogs on a leash inside the Viking 15, and defensive end Bryan Foust

ended the threat when he nailed Garver for an eight-yard on a fourth-and-nine pass attempt from the G-18.

The Vikings took over and picked up where they left off in a 28-6 shelling of Tussey Mountain last week, as fullback Jack Burmeister found a hole in the Bulldog for six yards and a first down.

But the Bulldogs shut the Vikings down and set off on an eight-play, 47-yard drive after a shanked Glendale punt traveled only 17 yards.

Glass fooled the Viking defenders went 24 yards untouched around the left side for the score three plays into the second quarter. Hoenstine blasted over for the PAT, and the Bulldogs led 8-0.

The remainder of the half consisted of two exchanges of punts, with Glendale mounting the only semblance of a drive when Burmeister picked up two first downs on the Vikes' last possession of the quarter.

After the teams traded punts to begin the second half, Walstrom said the Vikes attempted "loosen up" the Bulldog defense,

which was keying on the run, by trying a quick slant-in pass to tailback Bill Noel.

But Claysburg-Kimmel's Garver snared Dave Lloyd's aerial at the G-44, the starting point for the Bulldogs' second touchdown drive.

Ten plays later, Hoenstine dove over from the one, and David Helsel booted the PAT to set the score at 15-0, but not before an errant penalty flag by an official caused some excitement.

After an illegal procedure penalty had left the Bulldogs with a fourth-and-eight at the G-18, Garver hit tight end Mark Burk on a screen pass that resulted in a number of missed tackles, a Bulldog first down at the one and an apparent penalty.

But the official tucked the flag back in his pocket and never made a call.

"We asked him about it," Walstrom said, "and he said it just fell out."

But the accidental flag proved to be off little consequence as the Vikes could move no farther than their own 41 before the clock ran out.

Junior John Campbell rushed for 30 yards on 11 carries to lead the Vikes.

The Vikings will visit Northern Bedford Saturday for an 8 p.m. to face a team Walstrom says will be "extremely tough."

Glendale Checks NB's Koontz

ROARING SPRINGS —
The Glendale High School football team stopped the running of Northern Bedford tailback Brian Koontz, but the Vikings couldn't halt the passing game of quarterback George Eckenrode, and the undefeated Panthers scored a trio of fourth-quarter touchdowns to

down the Vikes 27-0 Saturday night.

Koontz entered the game with a 13-yards-per-carry rushing average in the Panthers first three victories, but Glendale, now 1-3, limited him to only 87 yards on 25 totes.

However, Koontz did score 20 points in the victory, hitting paydirt on three one-yard plunges and a PAT run.

"We geared the defense to stop Koontz," said Viking coach Gary Walstrom, "and we did that."

What Glendale couldn't stop was the passing of Eckenrode, who passed for 191 yards and a touchdown, to end Ron O'Neal, who gathered in five aerials for 112 yards.

Eckenrode hit on three of six attempts in the first half, improving to 7-for-9 in the second.

Walstrom said, "I thought the kids played tough," adding, "we stayed with them. The game was really a lot closer than the score indicates."

The Viking kickoff coverage team gave Koontz an idea of what was in store for him from the outset of the game, when they ripped off his jersey and picked up a 15-yard penalty for spearing before downing him at the G-42.

The penalty put the Panthers at the G-43 and two plays later, Eckenrode hit Tom Ferry with a strike to give NB a first-and-goal at the Viking five.

But Dave Lloyd scooped up a NB fumble and the Vikes managed two first downs before a quarterback sack on a third-and-10 passing at-

tempt shut the door.

After a Viking punt took a bad bounce and put the Panthers in business at the G-36, Northern Bedford rolled to the goal line in eight plays, with Koontz diving over from the one. Tom Garcia tacked on the PAT.

The score did not change until the fourth quarter when the Panthers scored on each of their three possessions, capitalizing on a Viking defense that was thinking Koontz, and only Koontz.

"Our secondary was watching the backfield instead of reading their keys," said Walstrom, referring to a flurry of fourth-quarter passes that put the Vikes away.

Walstrom took the blame for his secondary getting burned, explaining that "We had the kids thinking Koontz on every play."

The Panthers were driving when the final stanza opened, and six plays into the quarter, Eckenrode connected with O'Neal for a TD from nine yards out, his fourth completion of the 13-play, 83-yard drive.

After a Viking punt, NB took only a minute and three plays to score again.

Koontz carried for five yards from the G-39, before Eckenrode hit O'Neal again with a 33-yard toss to set up another one-yard plunge by Koontz.

It was Koontz again on the PAT run, and with seven minutes remaining, the game for all intents and purposes, was over.

But the Panthers continued to run up the score by passing the ball, and

Koontz set the tally at 27-0 with his third TD with 13 seconds remaining.

Outbreak of Mono At Juniata Valley Idles Glendale 11

FLINTON — Postponements are rare in football, but the Glendale High School team's Inter-County Conference game with Juniata Valley scheduled for Dr. Roy F. Baker Field last night had to be called off because several of the Green Hornet players have mononucleosis.

Glendale athletic director Matt Bordack said he's not sure when, or if, the game will be made up.

"Juniata Valley is suppose to give us a written statement this week," Bordack said last night. "They way I undertsand it, if we cannot reschedule the game, then we can take a forfeit victory."

Bordack said he received a call from the Juniata Valley principal late Thursday afternoon, informing him that the game might have to be called off.

"He told me that they had several players with mono," Bordack explained. "He said practically the whole team had it. They had a doctor check out the situation and take blood tests on the players. The doctor told them it was mono, and that they couldn't practice for four weeks. If that's the case, then we will take the forfeit."

"But I would like to get the game in, even if we have to play it some weekday night," Bordack said. "After all, it was a home game, and we lost a lot of money because of it. We probably won't be able to reschedule the game for several weeks."

The Vikings, 1-3, will entertain Marion Center Friday.

Glendale scores, but not enough

ALLPORT — The Glendale Vikings did score Friday night, but not enough.

After being shut out in three straight games and four times in five outings, the Vikes ended their scoreless streak at 15 quarters with Dave Lloyds' fourth-period touchdown pass to Eugene Jenkins.

But Glendale could do little more than scare the West Branch Warriors as the Vikes fell to 1-5 with a 14-8 loss.

Glendale did nothing in the first half, gaining just 52 yards and managing only two first downs. The Vikings yielded both West Branch touchdowns on nine-play, 52-yard drives. And Glendale didn't do enough in the second half.

West Branch's first drive culminated on Lester Smeal's 1-yard run and the second — what proved to be the winning score — came on an 11-yard pass from quarterback Terry Williams to slotback Tony Vallela.

"In the fourth quarter we certainly didn't play our best game. We missed two or three tackles on every play," said West Branch

coach Melvin Smeal, whose club is 3-4.

Glendale coach Gary Walstrom nearly had a cause to celebrate, but went away without his second win.

"We usually let down in the second half, but tonight we let down in the first half and then tried to come back in the third and fourth quarters," he said. "If we could put together a complete game, we'd be alright."

The Vikings' offense never got out of neutral until Glendale took possession on its own 44 yard-line with 9:41 remaining.

A few adjustments in the offensive scheme brought out a flaw in the Warriors' defense and Glendale began to take advantage.

"We put in the double-slot formation to open up our passing game. When we did that, West Branch gave us the middle for the run," Walstrom said.

"Our guards and center did a good job getting off the ball and Dave (Lloyd) had the option of calling to whichever side he wanted to run the dive. He did a nice job picking it out. Jack (Burmeister) just bulled his way through the middle."

Lloyd hit Jenkins with a pair of

passes — Glendale's first completions of the game — to open up the ground game for Burmeister, who ran four straight times for a total of 26 yards.

Lloyd took the call on the next three snaps, moving the Vikes from the 8 to the 2 before Glendale went back to the air. From there, Lloyd hit tight end Jenkins with a quick pop pass to break Glendale's scoring drought.

A pass from Lloyd to Kevin Swauger on the conversion cut West Branch's lead to 14-8 with 4:52 remaining.

A 15-yard sack by Bryan Foust threw the Warriors into a punting situation and the Vikings had 2 1/2 minutes and 52 yards standing between them and a tie and a chance for a win.

An illegal procedure call, a sack and a bobbled snap from center stifled the Vikings at the West Branch 44 as they ran out of time and downs.

Burmeister led the Vikings offense, gaining 77 yards on 15 carries. Lloyd hit 5 of 7 passes for 42 yards and Glendale's first TD since Lloyd scored four times against Tussey Mountain in the team's only win Sept. 9.

Glendale hosts Penns Manor next Friday night. The Comets, 3-3, face Saltsburg tonight.

Glendale beaten by Penns Manor

FLINTON — The Glendale High School Vikings broke out of their 15-quarter scoreless streak a week ago, and they nearly fought their way out of a three-game losing streak Friday night.

The Vikes bowed to Penns Manor 12-6 at Baker Field.

Penns Manor quarterback Brad Packer hit receiver Brian Goril with a 16-yard touchdown pass with 7:35 remaining in the game to culminate an 11-play, 67-yard drive that lifted Penns Manor to the win. Glendale is now 1-6.

The Viking offense was unable to score, with Glendale's only points coming on a 16-yard interception return by safety Dave Lloyd to tie the game at 6-6 in the second quarter.

The Comets took a first quarter lead when running back Dave Busovicki scampered around left end from 14 yards out on Penns Manor's second possession.

The run capped a six-play, 33-yard drive that was set up by a blocked punt.

"Defensively, we were tough at times, but we still seemed inconsistent on both offense and defense," said Viking coach Gary Walstrom.

The Glendale offense spent much of the night mired deep in its own territory, although it was handed several golden scoring opportunities by the Viking special teams.

Early in the second quarter, Lloyd pounced on a Bob Sprankle fumble at the PM 16, after the Comets failed to handle a line-drive kick by Glendale punter Rick Holes.

But Bill Noel couldn't come up with Lloyd's fourth-and-4 pass attempt and the Vikes gave up on downs at the PM 10-yard-line.

The second half opened with another Comet fumble, when Viking Duane McNelly fell on a loose ball following a short kick to the Penns Manor 37.

But Glendale managed to lose 5 yards before punting six plays later following two costly clipping penalties.

Glendale was penalized eight times for 113 yards.

"I question some of them, but you still have to take them," Walstrom said.

Moshannon Valley slips by Glendale

HOUTZDALE — Moshannon Valley's Roger Furlong booted a 20-yard field goal into a stiff breeze in the second quarter Friday night to take the wind out of the Glendale Vikings' sails 3-0.

"It wasn't pretty, but we'll take it," said Moshannon Valley Howie Camberg. The win pushed Mo Valley over .500 to 4-3-1. The Black Knights close the season Friday at Claysburg-Kimmel.

"It was a great high school football game. Both teams played great defense," Camberg added.

Glendale's backs were smothered all night by a stingy Mo Valley defense that yielded just 20 yards on the ground and 36 through the air. The Black Knights' offense found the going a little easier against Glendale's defense, which would bend but didn't break.

"We got tough when we had to," Glendale coach Gary Walstrom said, referring to five different occasions in the second half when Valley drives were thwarted in Viking territory.

Glendale's defensive effort impressed Camberg.

"They were outguessing us," he said.

Walstrom, although frustrated, showed a sense of pride after watching both clubs struggle through the battle.

"They had to take a field goal when they did score. They couldn't punch the ball across," Walstrom said. "It's been the same way all year (for us). The defense played tough, but the offense was erratic."

Each offense was erratic in a first quarter when both teams man-

aged just one first down. But the Knights' initial first down, which came on a 15-yard penalty against Glendale for an illegal block, proved to be the turning point of the game.

The Knights, faced with a fourth-and-six at their own 18, were forced to punt. But the penalty — Glendale's only infraction of the night — put Mo Valley back in business at its own 33. That set the stage for the only points of the night.

After the drive finally stalled, 12 plays later, Furlong split the uprights with his field goal at the 7:22 mark of the second quarter.

"We didn't think 3 points would mean the game," said Camberg. "We just wanted to get on the board."

Mo Valley tailback Brad Alexander gained 39 of his game-high 96 yards on the scoring drive.

Glendale Loses Finale to B-A

FLINTON — The Glendale Vikings suffered their sixth shut-out of a disastrous 1-8 season last night as Bellwood-Antis High School tailback Don Stiffler ran over, around and through them en route to a 277-yard, three-touchdown performance in a 35-0 Inter-County Football Conference victory.

The game was the finale for both teams.

Stiffler, who needed 306 yards to reach the 1,000-yard plateau, rushed for TDs of 10, eight and two yards to up the Blue Devils' record to 7-2.

Stiffler, who has been playing with an air cast on his ankle, missed more than two-and-half games due to the injury, ruining his shot at the milestone, according to B-A coach John Hayes.

"He's still not 100 percent," said Hayes. "He hasn't regained all his mobility and he's been forced to run straight ahead more than we would have liked. Don has a future in football. He proved tonight what a great back he is, because Glendale is very hard-nosed defensively."

Glendale coach Gary Walstrom said that while his offense has been "inconsistent all year, the defense was also inconsistent at times tonight."

Hayes also praised his offensive line for enabling Stiffler to gouge out respectable gains on

nearly every carry.

Walstrom was awed by Stiffler's showing, noting "he is quick and powerful; he just burned us."

Although Stiffler carried the ball 33 times, Walstrom said the Vikes' were not able to key on the tailback due to Bellwood-Antis' multi-faceted attack.

"We didn't try to key on anybody in particular, because they have other good backs besides Stiffler," he said.

"We wanted Don to get his 1,000," Hayes said, "but that wasn't the only reason for giving him the ball. Our offense is geared around the tailback."

There was little reason to go to anyone else, as Stiffler led an offense that moved the ball at will, punting only once. The Blue Devils ground out 332 yards rushing and added 33 through the air, controlling the ball for nearly three quarters of the game.

The Vikings managed 72 yards on the ground, led by Bill Noel's 40 yards on 12 carries. Quarterback Dave Lloyd completed 8 of 18 passes for 77 yards. Four of those aerials were hauled in by Noel.

Glendale's impotent offense was able to reach Devil territory on only two occasions, with drives stalling at the B-A 13 and 25-yard lines.

With B-A leading 7-0 in the second quarter, the Vikings garnered three first downs rushing and one via penalty to

find themselves with a first-and-10 at the B-A 20. But the Devil defense stiffened and Glendale surrendered the ball on downs at the 13.

"After they stopped us on the fourth-and-three, it seemed like we let up," Walstrom said, adding his gridders weren't too psyched from the outset, after last week's 3-0 setback to Moshannon Valley.

After the Viking offense stalled, Bellwood-Antis wasted little time daring the Vikings. After their initial drive was halted at the G-24, the Blue Devils scored on their next three possessions to take a 22-0 lead midway through the second quarter.

A 22-yard pass from quarterback Bob Gill to end Jamie Eisenhart and a 26-yard sweep around right end by Stiffler keyed the Devils' 63-yard first quarter TD drive which proved to be the game-winner. Stiffler dove over from the two for the score.

Gill scampered in from the 20 on B-A's next possession for the Devils' second score, and Stiffler bolted over from the 10-yard line several minutes later to ice the game. Bellwood's second half scores came on TD runs of two yards by Mark Baney and eight yards by Stiffler.

Hayes praised the Viking squad for not giving up when the Devils led 35-0. "They were still out

there trying to get on the scoreboard," he said. "It shows they have some pride."
