

Defense saves Williamsburg

WILLIAMSBURG — A rubberband defense — one which kept getting extended but didn't break enabled Williamsburg to outlast Glendale 20-14 in the season opener Friday night.

Twice in the final two minutes of the contest the Blue Pirates stopped the Vikings inside their 10 yard line.

"I'm estatic getting a win out of this one." said Williamsburg coach Dave Baker. "I think I aged 20 years during that last quarter."

The Pirates were coasting along with a 20-0 lead before the Vikings came to life early in the final period.

Two scoring stikes from quarterback Rich Laing to flanker Dave Burmeister within a two-minute span pulled the Vikings to within a touchdown of the Pirates.

But the Williamsburg defensive unit, getting key plays from Paul Rhole, Stewart Merritts and Scott Bush, kept the Vikings from the endzone the remainder of the game.

"Williamsburg stopped us when they had to," said Viking coach Gary Walstrom "They played a tough game and were better than what they had loooked in their scrimmages."

"I'm proud at the way we came back," Walstrom noted, "We showed that we can score quickly. Now all we need is a little more experience because I feel we gained some confidence tonight."

Three fumble recoveries — all in Williamsburg territory — provided Giendale with excellent shots at pulling out the victory.

A holding penalty hindered the Vikings the first time. Rhule and Merritis were responsible for keeping the visitors off the scoreboard the next time.

Rhule made a touchdown-saving tackle on Burmeister at the Pirates 5 and Merritts came up with an important sack on Laing.

With less than a minute left in the game the Pirates fumbled the ball away again. Glendale gained possession at the Pirates 17 and advanced to the 6 before being turned away by a determined Pirate defense.

Bush helped put the Vikings away for good by batting down a Luing pass then applying heavy pressure and forcing the Glendale quarterback to hurry his last throw of the game. "Scott Bush made some key plays as did Paul Rhule and Stewart Merritts, Baker pointed out, "I also was pleased with the way Dale McCall ran the ball."

McCall churned out 110 yards and scored a touchdown. Rhule rushed for 81 yards and added a six-pointer.

Quarterback Jay Baker flipped a 8yard strike to end Troy Isenberg for the Pirates first score.

"We played better threw three quarters than I thought we would." Baker said. "Offensively we were able to control the ball and our defense stood up real well when it had to."

September 6, 1985: Tussey Mountain 0 at Glendale 7 Glendale does just enough to beat Tussey, 6-0

FLINTON — Tussey Mountain was shut out for the second consecutive week Friday night, losing to_Glendale 7-0.

After giving up 40 points to Mount Union in the opening game, the Titan defense played well but couldn't get any help on the scoreboard.

The only scoring drive of the game came early in the second quarter when Glendale, following a Tussey punt, took over the ball on the Titan 45-yard line. Using 11 running plays, the drive was capped by tailback Jeff Doughty's 2-yard TD plunge Rich Laing booted the

extra point, and the 7-0 score never changed.

Tussey controlled the ball most of the second half, but costly mistakes stalled several scoring opportunities.

On the first possession of the third quarter the Titans drove the ball to the Glendale 26-yard line but a Joe Caropoli fumble was recovered by senior tackle Jim Orichosky. Later in the quarter Tussey had the ball on the Glendale 9 but an illegal procedure penalty and quarterback sack prevented the Titans from getting their first score of the year.

Tussey Coach Tom Matea had these comments about his team's offensive effort.

"We started to move the ball in the second half but just not when we had to." he said. "We made some key mistakes. I probably could have mixed up the plays better, especially in the fourth quarter. In the first half our line was too high on the blocks and our backs were going down too easily.

"Overall I'm pleased after having lost three starters due to injuries in the Mount Union game and two more during practice this week. We ended up changing our offensive line three times in preparation for this game."

Glendale did not complete a pass the entire game and attempted only four. This surprised Matea, especially after Glendale's aerial effort against Williamsburg last week. "We went into this game expecting them to throw to the flat but they stuck with the running game," Matea said.

On the other side, fifth year coach Gary Walstrom changed strategies from the previous week.

"We thought Tussey would be keying on our passing game," he said. "We wanted to establish the ground game, but after the touchdown we couldn't get things going again but still decided to stick with it as long as we were ahead. Our defense deserves the credit — they rose to the occasion when they had to."

 Tussey opens at home next Friday evening against Northern Bedford, and Matea sees improvement in the 0-2 team.

"We're starting to show that we can hit the entire game. The mental attitude is good and the fire is back." he said. "This game was a better indication of our abilities."

Glendale, now 1-1, entertains Claysburg-Kimmel Friday at 7:30 p.m.

Vikings blank Claysburg, 27-0

FLINTON - "When things go right, everything seems to go right."

Glendale Coach Gary Walstrom said these words Friday for many reasons.

One reason was that his Vikings had cashed in on two early Claysburg-Kimmel miscues to go on and blank the Bulldogs 27-0.

Another reason was that his senior tailback John Peacock, who had never scored a touchdown in his career, scored three touchdowns.

A final reason was that his defense, which has gone nine quarters without being scored upon, held Claysburg to two yards rushing and 66 yards total offense.

"This week, our offense seemed to gel," said Walstrom. "Our defense was as tough as it was last week."

Although Glendale scored twice in the first half as a result of Claysburg mistakes, the Vikings came out trying to throw the ball.

"Last week, our run never got started, our offense never got started," said Walstrom. "We thought that if we could get Claysburg worried about the pass, then we could run."

In the first quarter, Glendale's Mike Ponish recovered a Bulldogs' fumble at the Claysburg 32. On the ensuing play, Peacock bolted 32 yards for the first of his three touchdowns.

"He (Peacock) doesn't have real breakaway speed, but he runs hard," said Walstrom, "His confidence seems to be building."

"The play was 23-isolation," said Peacock. "The fullback leads up through the three hole and then I just pick out wherever the opening is."

Peacock, who rushed for 99 yards on 17 carries, was quick to point out that he had a lot of help.

"I had some good blocking," said Peacock. "My fullback Jeff Doughty and the line did a heck of a job,"

"We worked a lot of line blocking in practice," said Walstrom. "We worked hard on protection and opening up the hole on runs and it seemed to pay off."

Late in the first quarter, the Vikings turned a ruffing the kicker penalty into a score. The penalty took the ball from the Claysburg 42 to the 27. Five plays later, Peacock sprinted five yards for his second score of the game.

"We started off on the wrong foot and it got worse from there," said Claysburg-Kimmel Coach Jack Krider. "When we got down we gave them momentum and it steamrolled."

The Vikings' final score was a 12yard pass completion from Rich Laing to Don Johnston.

"We seem to be improving from week to week," said Walstrom. "But we are going to have some tough games down the road."

September 20, 1985: Glendale 6 at Northern Bedford 28 Northern Bedford pounces on Glendale, 28-6

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ROARING SPRING - Northern Bedford continued its string of impressive early season performances Saturday night with a 28-6 victory over Glendale.

Once again, a mixture of tough straight-ahead running on offense and a ball-hawking defense which forced four turnovers were the cornerstones of the Panther game.

Afterwards, NBC coach Joe Nastasi said he was especially pleased with the play of his offense. The

Panthers racked up 28 points on Giendale, a team which had not been scored upon in nine previous quarters of play.

"We were playing a team which year in and year out plays very tough defense, and we were successful moving the ball offensively," he said.

Nastasi reported that one change with this Panther team over recent NBC squads was that, there is no one standout player.

"We're operating without a star. We're getting a good learn effort from all our players."

Pointing to sophomore defensive ends Dana and Dustin Troutman, who have stepped in to fill the shoes of all-stars Don and Dan Foor, Nastasi observed, "We don't think of them as sophomores. They're players, and they're all treated as players. That's one of the good things about this team. The seniors are not looking down at the juniors or the sophomores, and the sophomores aren't in awe of the seniors. We're getting a real good attitude out of what we've been doing."

Although the score remained close through the first half, the Panthers controlled the tempo of the game from the outset. A nine-play, 63-yard drive which culminated in a 2-yard dive by Sam Hicks put the locals on the scoreboard late in the first quarter.

Northern twice advanced the ball into Glendale territory in the second quarter, but turned it over on a punt and on an interception. But Mike Reed capped another nine-play effort with a four-yard scramble for a score with just three seconds to go before halftime.

Dustin Troutman set up the third score when he fell on a fumbled Glendale pitchout at the Viking 42 early in the third quarter. Hicks carried the ball on six of the nine plays it took to cover the distance, and he

scored the touchdown from two yards out with 5:07 to play in the period.

A Brian Kagarise interception on the next-to-last play of the quarter put the ball on the Glendale 44. Hicks carried the mail five of six times, and scored the touchdown from a yard out.

Glendale countered with its only score of the game when it went 70 yards in eight plays. The payoff came on a 29-yard screen pass from Rich Laing to Steve Doughty. Nastasi said that he was encouraged that his team had been able to clear the early part of its schedule without problems.

"You're never satisified. I'm not satisfied and the kids aren't satisfied," he said. "There is no doubt that the toughest part of our schedule is in front of us. But I would much rather go into the latter part of our schedule 4-0 than with shortcomings."

GAME NOTES: Rob Bollman continued larceny in the Panther secondary by picking off two Laing passes. ... He now has seven interceptions in the first four games, and the team has picked off

September 27, 1985: Juniata Valley 16 at Glendale 0 Hornets Sting Vikings 16-0

FLINTON — Hurricane Gloria didn't hit Glendale last night, but, courtesy of Juniata Valley, the Viking offense washed out to sea nevertheless.

Juniata Valley parlayed early and late scoring drives, a long field goal, and an inept Glendale offense into a 16-0 Inter-County Conference win at Roy F. Baker Field that spoiled the Vikings' Homecoming.

"We didn't execute well offen-sively," lamented Glendale coach Gary Walstrom after watching his Vikings muster only 43 yards total offense. "Our line just didn't open things up."

After Juniata Valley's Dave Hensor returned the opening kickoff 35 yards to the G-45, the Hornets wasted no time putting points on the board. Running back Mike Smith was a one-man tornado on the drive, as he handled the ball all but once on the 10-play march. His 5-yard thunderbolt around left end and Hensor's kick gave the Hornets a 7-0 lead with fust over three minutes gone.

Glendale attempted to respond to the touchdown on the next series. Aided by two penalties, the Vikings advanced from the G-36 to the JV-23. Unfortunately, a Glendale clipping penalty stalled the drive, and two plays later Hornet Brett Ormsby pounced on a botched Viking handoff at the JV-37.

The Vikings made some adjustments as the second quarter began in order to weather the Juniata Valley storm surge. The Glendale defense deciphered the Hornets' unbalanced line, and kept Juniata Valley out of the end zone. However, just when the Vik-

ings had stopped a Hornet drive at the G-24 with seconds left in the half, Hensor thundered a 42-yard field goal through the uprights with room to spare.

Meanwhile, the Glendale of-fense was getting nowhere fast. Using a 4-3 defense, the Hornets smothered the Viking passing game; moreover, the Vikes could not move on the ground, and they headed for the halftime break with only 16 overland yards.

"Juniata Valley tried to stop the pass and gave us the run, but we to Marion Center Friday. still didn't move the ball," concluded Walstrom.

The third quarter developed into a rerun of the second, as the ! Viking offense remained stalled. The Glendale defense kept the Vikes within striking distance, with Donnie Johnston and John Peacock each picking off Hornet passes to thwart Juniata Valley' drives.

The Vikings continued to keep a lid on the Hornet offense as the game entered the final stages. As Glendale attempted to narrow the Juniata Valley lead, the Hornets realized that the Vikings would have to pass. The Hornets blitzed I their linebackers; harassing Glendale quarterback Rich Laing as he attempted to pass. An almost-intercepted screen pass forced the Vikings to punt, and the Hornets put the ball in play at the JV-48 with just under four minutes to play in the contest. A Glendale penalty kept Juniata Valley's drive alive, and the Hornets found themselves with first and goal at the G-9. Two plays later, quarterback Tony Payne called his own number, found a hole to his liking, and slipped into the end zone from five yards out with 50 seconds remain-

ing. The extra point failed, and Juniata Valley had a 16-0 shutout to boost its season and conference record to 3-2.

"Our defense played well enough but the offense didn't help us," added a dejected Coach Walstrom. "We'll have to take a hard look at the offense. We can still have a good season, but we have to get back on track right now."

Vikings Bulldog Stingers 7-6 With Fourth-Quarter Touchdown

FLINTON -- After two consecutive lackluster offensive performances, the Glendale Vikings traded in their Model-T offense on a Mack truck and bulldogged their way to a 7-6 win over Marion Center in a junkyard dogfight at Roy F. Baker Field last night.

The Glendale defense served notice that this would be no ordinary pooch parade during Marion Center's first possession. Five plays into the series, the Viking defensive line tore the ball loose from Stinger fullback Doug Carney, and Chris Henry fell on the pigskin at the MC-49.

The Vikings, looking for more offensive punch, attempted to establish a diverse ground game early. Using wideout Dave Burmeister as a third running back, the Vikings drove to the MC-20, but a procedure penalty

foiled the march. On fourth down and 14, a John Peacock draw play came up short, and the Stingers took over.

At this point, both defenses decided to show their teeth, and neither team could advance the football. Just when a scoreless first half seemed inevitable, Marion Center found the stiff breeze coming in from Lake Glendale to its liking. A Glendale pass-interference penalty gave the Stingers first and 10 at its 46. On the next play, quarterback Mark Wilden faded back and aired the ball out. Wally Shaffer gathered in the perfect strike at the G-20 and raced into the end zone with one minute left in the half. The conversion klck failed, and Marion Center sent a surprised Glendale team to the lockers for intermission.

However, the Vikings decided

to buy that bulldog in the window. "We asked aur kids at the half if they could overpower Marion Center, and they felt that they could," explained Glendale coach Gary Walstrom. "We decided to send two backs into the hole to clear it out for Peacock."

This change in strategy ultimately turned the game into a tail-wagger for the Vikings. As the third quarter began, the right side of the offensive line opened the holes, the lead backs picked off the Stinger linebackers, and Peacock carried the ball 11 consecutive times to a fourth-and-two at the MC-4. The Vikings again tried the quick trap play, but Stinger tackle Nathan Morgan stopped Peacock at the three.

The Vikings could have retreated, tails between their legs, but the defense kept the I faith. After Glendale forced

Marion Center to punt to the G-21 with 7:26 to play in the game, the Vikes growled again. A 15-yard pass from Rich Laing to Donnie Johnston prevented the drive from fizzling early, and a Marion Center personal foul pushed the ball into Stinger territory. Peacock legged out runs of 16 and 12 yards to the MC-2. Laing ran two quarterback sneaks for the score and calmly booted the extra point, making the Vikings were top dogs by a point with two minutes to play.

Marion Center still had enough scrap left in them for a last effort, and the Stingers tried the friendly skles once more. Shaffer appeared to make a nice grab of a Wilden aerial at the G-21, but the Stinger end was flagged for offensive pass interference, and 1-5 Marion Center was in the doghouse. "It was up to our offense, and

they woke up tonight," proclaim-ed Walstrom after the game, "I was pleased with our lead blocking from Burmeister, Jeff Doughty, and Dave Sanders. I had confidence in our defense, and felt if the offense came through, we could win.'

"We knew we needed a win tonight, and this game will make it easier for us to practice next week," concluded Walstrom.

Glendale, 3-3 and the only team with a chance at the Progress Bowl, will travel to West Branch Friday for a Bowl tilt that promises to be another dog-gone scrap.

October 11, 1985: Glendale 34 at West Branch 0 Peacock helps Glendale rout West Branch

ALLPORT — John Peacock gave all the credit to his line. Likewise, his line gave all the credit to Peacock.

But Glendale Coach Gary Walstrom says it was a total team effort that produced the Vikings' 34-0 shellacking of West Branch Friday night.

"This was a tremendous team effort." Walstrom said. "It was a combination of the offense and defense that gave us this win."

The offense was led by Peacock, a senior tailback who carried the ball 34 times for 116 tough yards, rushing for two touchdowns in the process. Peacock was very gracious towards his offensive line.

"Believe it or not, if it wasn't for the line, I wouldn't get half the yards that I have," Peacock said. "The line did it all tonight."

Glendale's offensive line controlled the line of scrimmage at will for most of the night. Senior center Todd Lewis explained it bluntly.

"We were just blowing them off the line of scrimmage and John (Peacock) took it from there," Lewis said. "John's just a fantastic guy to block for."

Glendale, now 4-3, had its first 27 points set up by its tenacious defense. Two fumble recoveries and an interception in West Branch territory was all the run-oriented Vikings' offense needed.

"Our defense has played well almost all year long and tonight they really jelled." Walstrom said. "I was really glad to see our running game come through for us because we had passed a lot earlier in the season and we had abandoned our running attack. Tonight our backs just did a great job."

West Branch, which dropped to 2-4-1, crossed mid-field only twice the entire night. The Warriors played their first game without four two-way starters who were dismissed from the team.

One of those players was standout running back Greg Hugney — who had rushed for over 700 yards in six games — but Walstrom cautioned his team.

"We had heard rumors of the dismissal but we weren't sure they were true," Walstrom said. "I told our guys to prepare for West Branch just as if (the dismissed players) would play. I'm sure it hurt them not to have him (Hugney) available but his replacement wasn't that bad and our defense shut him down."

Vikings' linebacker Chris Henry agreed.

"We practiced hard all week long as if all their starters would be there," Henry said. "Our defense did the job."

Glendale's points were spread around the Vikings' backfield. Quarterback Rich Laing scored two touchdowns on runs of one and three yards, while sophomore Dave

Burmeister scored the last touchdown of the night — a five-yard scamper up the middle.

Walstrom saw this victory as a positive set-up for the remainder of the season.

"If we wanted a winning season, this was the game we needed and we got it," Walstrom said. "This will be something good for the kids to carry with them for the rest of the season."

Glendale returns home next week to host Penns Manor.

GAME NOTES: Out of 63 offensive plays, Glendale ran on 61 of them ... Henry recovered two fumbles while Burmeister had an interception ... Glendale held West Branch to five first downs for almost the entire game. West Branch's last two first downs came with under two minutes to play against a reserve-filled squad.

Glendale trims Penns Manor

After being shut out 10-0 in the first half last night, Glendale came up with 14 unanswered points to topple Penns Manors, 14-10, and boost the Vikings' record to 5-3.

Jody Rainey kicked a 26-yard field goal in the first quarter to cap a 63-yard drive by Penns Manor. Early in the second quarter, Glendale held when Penns Manor threatened to score again, and took over on its own five. But John Peacock fumbled on the next play and Penns Manor recovered on the two. This time the Comets pushed the ball in on a run by Guy Jackson.

Glendale coach Gary Walstram said his team wasn't getting off the ball as fast as Penns Manor in the first half.

"You have to credit them," Walstrom said. "They made things happen and we didn't. We (coaches) knew we weren't playing a slouch, but the kids were looking ahead and took them too lightly."

Although Walstrom said he didn't tell his team anything special at halftime, flanker Dave Burmeister, whose 43-yard run early in the second half sparked Glendale's comeback, said Walstrom got the team fired up.

"The coaches really got us up,"

Burmeister said. "They said this game was going to take our momentum into the Moshanon Valley game next week, and we better go out and stick it to them. So we did."

Burmeister's run followed a defensive surge, whick held Penns Manor inside the 20-yard line to start the first half.

"I thought our defense really came through when it had to," Waistrom said. And he said it was just a matter of coming off the ball faster in the second half. The early third quarter momentum lasted through the rest of the game.

The 43-yard touchdown run came on the 41 trap from the power I, the sophomore Burmeister said.

"The line just blew it open, and I took it from their," he said. "When you run that play you know if the cornerback sucks in it's going to be wide open."

He gave much of the credit for Glendale's 227 rushing yards to the linemen.

"Chris Henry and Jim Rostrosky were blowing them off the line in the second half."

John Peacock ran in the two-point conversion to make the score 10-8. Peacock finished with 80 yards on the night and Burmeister scrambled for 78. Peacock was coming off two consecutive 100 yard performances. The final Glendale score came early in the fourth quarter, when quarterback Rich Laing capped a 59-yard drive with a one yard keeper.

October 26, 1985: Glendale 11 at MoValley 9 Laing FG lifts Glendale over Mo Valley, 11-9

HOUTZDALE — Rich Laing booted an 18-yard field goal with 35 seconds left to lift Glendale to an 11-9 victory Friday night over Moshannon Valley.

Trailing 9-8, the Vikings started their game-winning march with 2:06 left from their own 23.

On the drive, Laing teamed with wingback Dave Burmeister for his only two completions of the night, good for a total of 60 yards. Burmeister's second reception set up the Vikings at the five with a first-and-goal. But three running plays netted only four yards against the Black Knight defense.

Laing then answered the call by

splitting the uprights with plenty of room to spare.

"All five coaches talked it over and decided that the kick was our best bet," said Glendale Coach Gary Walstrom. "We have a lot of confidence in Rich. He's an excellent kicker."

Glendale let nearly the entire game as tailback John Peacock scored from five yards out with 1:30 left in the first quarter. Burmeister passed to Jeff Doughty on the twopoint conversion on a fake kick to give Glendale an 8-0 lead.

Mo Valley cut the lead with just 10 seconds left in the first half on Jeff Vroman's 28-yard field goal. The Knights, who outgained Glendale 220-102 in rushing and 224-162 overall, took the lead with 6:37 left in the game on Vroman's two-yard run, four plays after Mo Valley had recovered a Viking fumble at the Glendale 19.

Peacock, Burmeister, Mike Barnett and Jim Orichosky recovered fumbles, for Glendale, while Chris Henry halted the final Mo Valley drive with an interception. Orichosky also blocked Vroman's second-quarter field-goal attempt of 33 yards.

"Our kids have come back a couple of times this year," said Walstrom, "but not in this fashion. We never gave up. We knew we had a chance to pull it out."

Former Glendale High School football performer George "G.G." Moore is quarterbacking West Virginia Wesleyan College in record fashion.

West Virginia Wesleyan, located in Buckhannon, W. Va., takes a 1-6 record into today's game at Waynesburg, Pa.

West Virginia Wesleyan Coach Bill Struble said Moore has established three single-game records and one season mark.

Moore's single-game records include most yards, 334, bettering the previous high of 235; most passes attempted, 47 (old mark 34); and most completitions, 25 (previous high 17).

Struble said Moore has thrown for 1.234 yards — a single season high at WVW. The previous best was 920 yards.

While going over the 1,200 yard mark, Struber said Moore has completed just a shade under 50 percent of his passes — 97 of 196 and five touchdowns.

In his record 334-yard output against Georgia Southwestern, Moore completed 24 of 35 passes.

"We're real pleased with his progress," said Struble of Moore, a junior who came to WVW from Potomac State College in Keyser, W Va. "He's doing a good job of reading coverages and finding receivers.

"We watched him on film when he was at Potomac State. We were real impressed with his play."

With Moore and a good receiving corps. Struble said West Virginia Wesleyan abandoned its run-oriented offense for a passing game.

"We ran a wishbone, but decided to go to a throwing game," said Struble. "We went to a offense that suited our personnel better."

Concerning West Virginia Wesleyan's 1-6 record. Struble said his team lost some close games with young personnel.

"We've lost two games by 17-16 scores," said Struble. "Offensively, we're playing eight sophomores and three juniors."

Devils bury Vikes, 52-0; eye playoffs

FLINTON — "Every coach dreams of that one perfect season." The Bellwood-Antis Blue Devils

made that dream a reality for Coach John Hayes as they crushed Glendale 52-0 Friday to finish the regular season with a 10-0 record.

The loss gave Glendale a 6-4 record and eliminated the Vikings from the District 6 playoffs.

"This is a once in a lifetime opportunity," said Hayes. "I feel extremely happy. This has been a dream come true."

"I never thought when I was a sophomore that we'd be an undefeated team," said senior halfback Adam Claar. "But it feels great now."

"It has been 20 years since this has happened at Bellwood," said Hayes. "It takes a lot of good fortune to happen and we've been fortunate this year."

Along with its good fortune, the Blue Devils mixed in some talent.

Included in that talent is senior halfback Don "Booker" Moore.

Moore, who finished the regular season with 1,381 total yards, scored three touchdowns on runs of four and eight yards, and an 84-yard punt return. In the game Moore gained 149 yards on 22 carries.

"You don't get to be 10-0 without outstanding people." said Hayes. "Our depth in the backfield is just excellent."

Joining Moore in the backfield is Adam Claar.

Claar carried the ball seven times for 189 yards. Most of that yardage came on a 70-yard sweep midway through the second quarter with Bellwood on top 7-0. The play took the ball from the Blue Devils' 21 to the Glendale 9. It marked a turning point in the ballgame.

"Tonight we found that we could get to the outside," said Hayes. "Adam (Claar) got it out of the hole and changed the course of the game as far as field position and momentum. Although we didn't score, you could see the confidence build with the turn of events." Another important ingredient in the Blue Devils' backfield is the depth at the fullback position.

"Our fullbacks (Bob Noye, Scott Clapper and Dave Claar) don't get a lot of attention," said Hayes. "If they don't block, then our runners won't get their yardage."

On the night the Blue Devils chunked out 525 yards rushing while limiting the Vikings to just 56 yards on the ground.

"We seemed to play tough for a while," said Walstrom. "Once they pushed a few in, then it seemed to steamroll and they picked up momentum and we lost momentum."

"It's nice to put points on the board for the shutout," said Hayes referring to the lopsided score. "But the win was what we wanted.

"Next week starts our second season," said Hayes. "We've accomplished our first goal and we are going into Districts with the idea to do our best and hopefully we can win it."

GAME NOTES: The last Bellwood-Antis team to go undefeated was in 1965 with that team turning in a 9-0-1 record ... The last perfect season was turned in by the 1963 Blue Devils who went 10-0 ... This marks the third time the Blue Devils shut out an opponent this season

... Glendale closed out the season with one more win than last year's squad ... Next Friday Bellwood-Antis entertains Northern Bedford in the Mid-Penn Conference Championship game.
