

# Williamsburg puts its best foot forward, tops Vikings

FLINTON — Where a team begins a drive usually dictates where it will end. Just ask Glendale Viking Coach John Lloyd Jr.

Pinned in their own territory all night by a superior Williamsburg kicking game, the Vikes dropped a mutual season opener 19-6 to the Blue Pirates at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field Friday.

"It seemed like we were always starting from our end of the field," said Lloyd, who saw Pirate junior punter Matt Baker average 42 yards per kick, including one in the coffin corner. "The biggest factor was field position."

The Pirates were forced to start just two drives inside their own 30, while the Vikes took control on Williamsburg turf just once.

"Field position was important," Williamsburg mentor Dave Baker agreed. "Our offense and kicking game put them in the hole, and our defense kept them there. The only time we gave them the ball in our territory, they scored."

The Pirates struck first, with junior signalcaller Louie Lang capping a 57-yard, nine-play drive by pounding over from two yards out with 4:36 remaining in the first quarter. Baker added the PAT.

Glendale battled back minutes later, with sophomore quarterback Bill Lloyd finding senior split end Tom Terza open down the right sideline for 43 yards and a first down at the Williamsburg five. Lloyd bulled over from a yard out for the score.

quarter. Lang hit Baker on a 35-yard pass play to key the drive, with senior fullback Tom Henderson getting the honors from two yards out.

After a scoreless third stanza, the Pirates' senior tackle Keith Carper took the wind out of the Vikings' sails 46 seconds into the final quarter.

Carper stripped Viking fullback Dan Dudurich of the ball on a routine running play and carted it 23 yards to paydirt.

"That was the turning point," Baker said. "He just ripped the ball right out of his hands. That's the kind of play that wins games."

While he cited his squad for being inconsistent at times, Baker said he was more than pleased with the win. "We're inexperienced and made some mistakes, but I thought we played pretty well over all," he said.

Lloyd found praise for his defense, which snuffed out a trio of Pirate drives with two interceptions and a fumble recovery, but blamed himself for an inconsistent offense. "I didn't expect them to blitz as much on defense as they did, and we weren't prepared for it," he explained.

Tussey wins big

SAXTON - Tussey Mountain scored 27 second-half points and turned a tight game into a rout Friday night.

The Titans played Glendale to a scoreless tie throughout the first half before erupting en route to a 27-0 victory over the Vikings.

"We're still an immature club, but we're sticking together," said Tus-sey Coach Don Donaldson, who watched the Titans post their first 2-0 start since 1975. "We played more aggressive in the second half, especially on defense. We combined maneuverabilty with finesse. However, we still need a lot of improvement in the secondary. We're just not getting good positioning." Rookie Glendale Coach John

Lloyd Jr. was pleased with his club's first-half performance, but was disappointed with the effort in the second half. He credited Tussey with making things miserable for the Vikings (0-2)

"Overall, Tussey is a good team," said Lloyd. "We expected them to be tough. We played a good first half, but might have let down some in the second. I saw some improvement in the defensive line. We have to get over letting down after the opposing team scores. We have a tough road ahead.'

Tussey took the second-half kickoff and marched 63 yards on nine plays to break the ice as Joe Morrow, who gained 145 yards on 18 carries, bulled his way into the end zone from three yards out. Morrow's extra point gave Tussey a 7-0 lead.

Tussey, which committed four first-half turnovers, began causing havoc of its own in the second half.

First, senior Keith Carberry intercepted Glendale quarterback Bill Lloyd's pass on Glendale's first possession in the second half and raced 33 yards for the touchdown. Morrow's PAT upped the lead to 14-

Later, Tussey junior John Cirko intercepted Lloyd's pass on the Glendale 35, and 10 plays later, fullback Matt Foor scored from the 2 to make it 20-0.

Tussey's final score was set up when Carberry picked off his second pass of the game at the Titan 47, setting up junior halfback Chris Miller's two-yard plunge. Morrow's kick set the final score.

# Claysburg tops Glendale, maintains perfect record

CLAYSBURG — Only the sloppy weather conditions rivaled the sloppy play of the Claysburg-Kimmel Bulldogs and the Glendale Vikings Saturday night.

Claysburg-Kimmel had as many penalties as points, but the Bulldogs still sloshed their way to their third victory in as many starts, defeating Glendale 14-0.

"We had some letdowns, we played sloppy, but I'll take the win," Claysburg-Kimmel Coach Mark Woodring said. "Glendale played a strong game, particularly defensively, but we hurt ourselves at times, too."

The game certainly wasn't a thing of beauty. In all, Claysburg was penalized 14 times for 130 yards, while Glendale was flagged nine times for 70 yards. Claysburg turned the ball over three times and Glendale four.

Both teams passing games were subpar. Claysburg's Jim Garver, who was ranked as Blair County's leading passer entering the game with 24 completions in 40 attempts, connected on just 15 of his 35 tosses.

Glendale QB Bill Lloyd did a better job on the ground than in the air, rushing for 49 yards and throwing

for just 13 on 3-of-12 passing.

"The defenses played well," Woodring said. "I'm reasonably satisfied with our performance defensively. The offense has to click more than it did tonight, though."

All the scoring happened in the first half. Claysburg held an 8-0 lead after the first quarter and upped that to 14-0 on a beautifully orchestrated two-minute offense to close the first half.

Claysburg utilized excellent field position on both scoring drives. Chad Klotz capped a 19-yard march with a one-yard leap into the endzone with 1:47 left in the first quarter and Garver hit Brian Helsel with a twopoint conversion pass for the 8-0 lead. Claysburg took the ball 36 yards in the final two minutes of the first half and score on a great grab by tightend Bruce Reilly in the right corner of the end zone.

Garver lofted the ball high into the corner and Reilly reached over his shoulder to snare the ball just inside the endline and the sideline.

Despite being down 14-0, Glendale was fortunate in the first half. Claysburg was inside the Glendale 30-yard line three times and inside the 10 twice, but failed to score.

"We didn't execute in a couple of those situations, but Glendale

played well defensively," Woodring said.

"I was very pleased with the way the defense played," said Glendale Coach John Lloyd, who watched his team slip to 0-3. "To hold a team like Claysburg, with the offense they have, to 14 points is a good accomplishment."

In fact, Lloyd was pleased with his team's overall performance.

"I felt this was one of our better played games," Lloyd said. "When you consider how well Claysburg has played this year, I don't think losing 14-0 is so bad."

The closest either team penetrated into enemy territory in the second half was Glendale moving to Claysburg's 29 on its final possession.

"We came out in the second half and played with them a little better," Lloyd said. "We played with a lot more emotion and a lot more heart tonight. I'm pleased with that, although we're still having trouble generating any offense."

Indeed, Claysburg dominated the game of statistics. The Bulldogs amassed 288 net yards while holding Glendale to just 69.

Now, Claysburg will concentrate on erasing the mistakes for next week's big showdown at undefeated West Branch.

"We have to play a lot better if we wish to win next week," Woodring said. "We moved the ball well, but we have to eliminate the mistakes." GAME NOTES: Helsel led Claysburg with eight receptions for 93 yards ... Darian Feather led the rushing attack with 57 yards ... Glen-

## Northern Bedford bumps Vikes, 19-6

GLENDALE — Some high school football teams live and die by the big play. Glendale's Vikings just seem to die from them.

Northern Bedford capitalized on a blocked punt and a bad snap on another punt attempt to upend homestanding Glendale 19-6 Friday.

"We weren't sharp tonight, but we were fortunate to come up with some big plays," said Panther coach Joe Nastasi, whose Panthers upped their log to 2-2. "I still prefer an ugly win to a pretty loss."

"Little break downs are killing us. It's so frustrating, because we could be 2-2," said Glendale mentor John Lloyd Jr., who cited a need for special teams work to turn the 0-4 Vikings around.

After a scoreless first stanza, Panther tackle Scott Knee got his paws on a Mike Henry punt attempt, paving the way for a 7-play, 30-yard Northern Bedford touchdown drive. Panther juniot quarterback David McIlnay found junior tightend Todd Eckenrode open for the 24-yard scoring strike.

The Panthers took the wind out of the Viking's sails with a pair of quick third quarter scores.

Senior tailback Brad McFarland, who splashed his way to 136 yards on 33 totes, set up the first with a 35-yard romp from scrimmage. Junior fullback Robert Snider got the honors from a yard out at the 7:31 mark. After an errant snap on a punt gave the Panthers the ball at the Viking 13-yard line, McFarland dove over from the one-yard line just two minutes later.

Glendale didn't pierce the end zone until the 3:17 mark of the final quarter, when junior signalcaller Bill Lloyd hit senior tight-end John Ninosky for a 13-yard score to cap a 14-play, 67-yard drive.

# Valley shuts out winless Glendale

ALEXANDRIA — It took the Juniata Valley Green Hornets about half a football game to straighten out their offense.

The Glendale Vikings could never get theirs' squared away.

Consequently, Juniata Valley broke away for a 29-0 victory over winless Glendale Saturday afternoon.

Ahead only 8-0 as the second half began, Valley mounted impressive scoring drives of 64 and 68 yards to pull away to its fourth win in five starts.

"We had a very frustrating first half," said Valley Coach Bill Clouse. "There were a lot of tangled blocking assignments on offense that we didn't get straightened out until halftime. And once we did that, things started going our way."

Junior Rich Lawler capped the tide-turning 64-yard drive midway through the second quarter with a 6-yard touchdown run.

Glendale sabotaged itself all day with four costly turnovers. One of the Vikings' two fumbles stalled a Glendale drive at the Valley 25 with 85 seconds left in the third quarter, and for all intents and purposes, sealed the outcome. Valley proceeded to go 68 yards before running back Jim Wagner's second effort allowed him to score from four yards away with 8:19 left in the game.

Another Glendale fumble paved the way for Valley's final touchdown, a 2-yard run by quarterback Jim Foster. A promising drive in the first half ended when Glendale quarterback Bill Lloyd was intercepted by Foster.

"We hurt ourselves today," said Glendale Coach John Lloyd, whose team dropped to 0-5. "All of a sudden, in the second half, we had the breakdowns and little mistakes that have hurt us all year."

Glendale managed a moral victory in holding the region's leading scorer, explosive Valley scatback David Hensor, to just 62 yards on 12 carries.

Hensor, however, did manage to return the game's opening kickoff 85 yards for Valley's first touchdown.

"Anytime you get the ball to Hensor, he can score," said Lloyd. "I thought we slowed him down today, but on that opening kickoff, we just tried to arm-tackle him. You can't do that with him. You also can't assume, like some of our players did, that just because there are five (defenders) in the area, somebody else will make the tackle."

GAME NOTES: Valley got two points at the outset of the second quarter when Mike Henry's punt was blocked and the Hornets recovered in the Glendale end zone ... Juniata Valley's Jerry Butler recovered a fumble, while Larry Claar registered an interception. Glendale's Mike Parks came up with a fumble recovery for the Vikings, who travel to Curwensville next Friday night. Juniata Valley visits Williamsburg Friday night.

## October 29, 1988: MoValley 32 at Glendale 12 Dipko rushes for 207 yards; Mo Valley crushes Vikings

FLINTON — Paul Dipko ran away from a shadow Friday night.

The Moshannon Valley senior tailback, who had planned to play second fiddle to standout Knight running back Damon Mazoff again this season, came into his own light in a 32-12 thrashing of backyard rival Glendale.

Dipko rushed for 207 yards in 31 tries, scored a pair of touchdowns and smashed the 1,000 yard rushing barrier, setting his season total at 1,199 yards.

"I owe it all to my linemen and a good blocking back (senior Mike Smith). I couldn't have done it without them," an elated Dipko said afterward. "Coming into this year, I never dreamed this would happen."

But Mazoff transferred to Clearfield high school in August, leaving Dipko as the top gun in coach Harold Camberg's backfield. Camberg, whose squad improved to 5-3, had no complaints.

"He's worked very hard to get to this point," Camberg said. "He doesn't have a lot of size, but he runs so low to the ground that he generates a lot of power. He's always fighting for that extra yard."

"He's a tough runner. We couldn't keep him down," said Glendale mentor John Lloyd Jr., whose Vikings slipped to 1-8.

In the early going, Glendale made a game of it, going to the locker room trailing just 14-12 a' the half.

Dipko got the Knights on the board first, driving over from

two yards out, but Glendale countered with a 28-yard Bill Lloyd interception return to paydirt late in the first stanza.

The Knights answered back with a 17-yard Dipko touchdown romp to cap a 5-play, 56 yard drive on their next possession, but Viking senior guard Mike Franks scooped up a Glendale fumble and scampered 15 yards to the endzone to narrow the gap.
