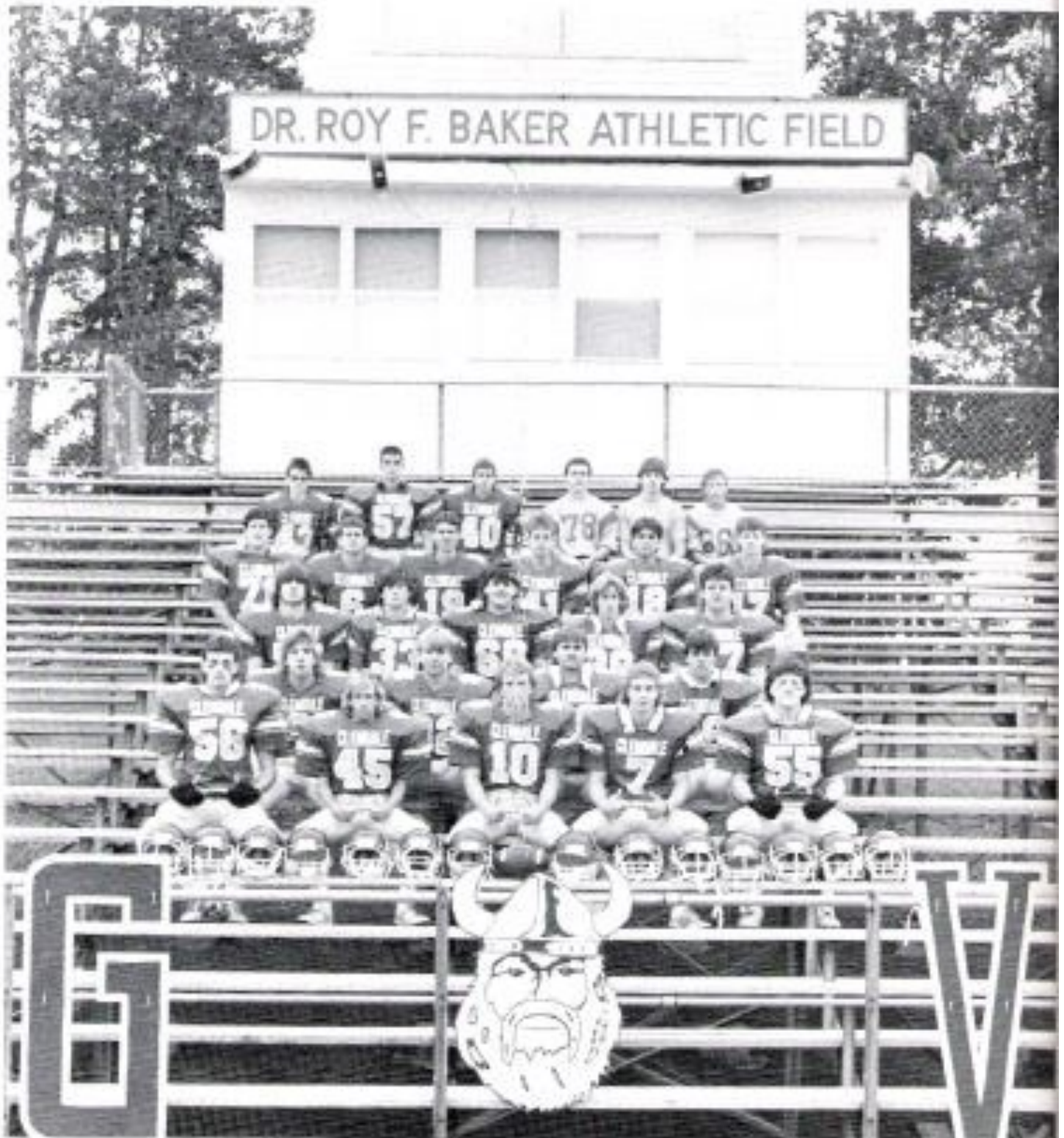

Williamsburg cashes in on Glendale mistakes

WILLIAMSBURG — Glendale and Williamsburg ushered in a new football season Friday night, but the outcome remained an old tale.

Williamsburg continued its dominance of Glendale by taking advantage of the Vikings' mistakes en route to a 36-7 victory.

"The last time we beat them was my senior year in 1981," lamented Glendale Coach John Lloyd Jr. "It's eight years now since we've beaten them. That's a long time."

The Vikings put together an impressive opening drive that culminated in a touchdown, but the Blue Pirates responded with five scores and controlled the remainder of the game.

Turnovers opened the door to four of the Pirates' touchdowns. Williams-

burg gained possessions at Glendale's 19 on an interception; Glendale's 17 on a fumble recovery; and Glendale's 10 following a bad snap on a punt.

The Pirates also added six-points on a 17-yard interception return by end Jason Ashman. Williamsburg's longest advancement covered 65 yards.

"Williamsburg is a good team, but we handed them the game by giving them three quick touchdowns," Lloyd said. "We made some crucial mistakes and it cost us the game."

"I'll admit that I panicked following the three quick touchdowns and didn't stick to our game plan," Lloyd continued. "Our offense showed that it could move the ball on the opening drive, but our inexperience showed and we made some stupid mistakes."

Williamsburg quarterback Louie Lang ran for two touchdowns and threw for another score. He also

scored a pair of two-point conversions.

Lang scored on a 12-yard run and 1-yard plunge and tossed a 15-yard scoring strike to Sean Lower. Lower set up Williamsburg's final touchdown, which came with 3:23 left in the third quarter, by intercepting a pass at the Glendale 19.

"Louie played a good game and so did Doug Shives," Williamsburg Coach Dave Baker said. "We were hoping to do more offensively, but weren't able to do so because we got the ball so close to the goal."

"We wanted to throw more," Baker related. "Offensively we wanted to see if we could move the ball consistently in a drive, but their turnovers and our special teams kept giving us good field position."

Lang only threw six passes, completing three for 41 yards. The Williamsburg quarterback rushed for 46 yards. Shives was the game's top rusher with 58 yards.

Matt Baker chipped in with 29 yards rushing and tallied a Pirate touchdown on a three-yard run. Baker also tacked on two PATs and kept the Vikings in a hole with his punting. One of Baker's punts traveled 53 yards.

"Offensively we were able to spread things around and let different guys do some things" Coach Baker said. "Defensively we settled down after their opening drive and played a good game."

Glendale's 13-play, 69-yard opening drive was climaxed when quarterback Bill Lloyd flipped a three-yard pass to end Dan Holes. Mike Franks added the PAT, staking the Vikings to a 7-0 advantage.

"Glendale looked real good in their first drive," Baker noted. "But, I'm sure it was demoralizing for them by giving up the three touchdowns so close."

"I was able to play everyone,

something I haven's been able to do in many years," Baker chuckled. "Lately we've been on the other end of blowouts. It was a good first game for us."

GAME NOTES: Baker started clearing his bench with three minutes left in the third quarter ... After their opening drive, the Vikings crossed midfield just one time with that coming in the closing seconds of the game ... Pirates' special teams did a good job with Rob Hileman returning a kickoff 32 yards and Baker bringing a punt back 38 yards, only to have it nullified by a penalty ... Mike Jasper stopped a Williamsburg drive with an interception at the Vikings' 5 ... Glendale turned the ball over four times — two fumbles and two interceptions ... Next Friday night Williamsburg hosts Claysburg-Kimmel while Glendale entertains Tussey Mountain (0-1).

Tussey dumps Glendale

FLINTON — Tussey Mountain Coach Don Donaldson, who cited the need for a one thousand percent improvement last week as a prerequisite for a Titan victory, tucked win No. 1 away Friday with an 18-6 triumph over Glendale.

Senior tailback Joe Morrow shouldered the brunt of the Titan ground burden, grinding out 176 yards on 32 carries. Morrow spearheaded a pair of second-half drives that allowed Tussey Mountain to even its record at 1-1. Glendale slipped to 0-2.

"Morrow ran exceptionally well, and (senior quarterback Jerry) Rasmussen proved that he's underrated as a throwing quarterback by hitting five in a row in the second half," Donaldson said. "We really came on in the second half. We had enough depth to wear them down."

Glendale held the Titan offense at bay in the first half, after spotting the visitors a quick six on Titan linebacker Scott Clark's fumble return for a touchdown.

The Vikes knotted the score two possessions later when senior tailback Mark McMillen capped a 13-play, 70-yard drive with a five-yard burst over right end.

In the second half, Tussey's defense thwarted a pair of Viking ventures into Titan territory, while

the Tussey offense managed to mount a pair of scoring drives.

Rasmussen scored the game-winner, barreling over from two yards out at the 6:53 mark of the third quarter to end an eight-play, 45-yard drive. Titan junior split end Scott Raley clinched the game at the 7:21 mark of the final stanza, making a sliding catch of a Rasmussen pass from seven yards out.

"They were beating us off the line all night," Viking mentor John Lloyd, Jr. said. "We're physically strong and capable. We just don't have the mental attitude it takes to play this game."

"We didn't do anything real pretty, but with the group of young kids we have, we'll take a win however we can," Tussey coach Donaldson commented.

Claysburg blanks Glendale

FLINTON — Claysburg Kimmel's Bulldogs aren't ones to look a gift horse in the mouth.

Coach Jeff Lingenfelter's squad cashed in on a pair of presents, compliments of Glendale's Vikings Friday to notch a 15-0 win.

"We felt going in that we could pressure them defensively, and we were able to create some opportunities for our offense," said Lingenfelter, whose squad improved to 2-1. Coach John Lloyd Jr.'s Vikings slipped to 0-3.

After battling to a standoff until the final minute of the second quarter, Claysburg junior Mike Knisely helped put the Bulldogs on the board by pouncing on a mishandled punt at the Glendale 13.

Bulldog junior halfback Dave Cowher punched it over from two yards out five plays later, then rushed for the PAT to stake Claysburg to a 8-0 lead.

In the third quarter, Knisely grabbed a 22-yard Tim Oakes pass to close the scoring, completing a 6-play, 44-yard drive that began after Glendale surrendered the ball on downs following a fake punt.

Lingenfelter praised the appearance of his passing game, but blasted his offense for lacking consistency. Oakes hit on 6-10 attempts for 98 yards, but 85 penalty yards helped the Vikes keep the Bulldogs penned.

"We had way too many penalties, and we were more inconsistent than I'd like, but with our inexperience, anything that we do right at this point is a step forward," Lingenfelter said.

Lloyd, while pleased with his passing game and an improving defense, said: "We're still making the same stupid mistakes that cost us games. We literally gave them that first touchdown."

After watching three first-half Viking drives falter in Claysburg territory, including one at the Bulldog one.

"We're lacking the knockout punch on offense," Lloyd said. "We'll move the ball for a couple of first downs, then fall apart."

ROARING SPRING — Glendale gave Northern Bedford fits in the first half Saturday. The Panthers, 3-1, gave Glendale "Heck" in the second.

Specifically, Frank Heck. The Northern Bedford senior halfback rushed for 17 and 18 yard second-half scores as the Panthers vanquished the Vikes, 30-7.

"In the first half we were penned in our own territory and that limited our offense," Panther coach Joe Nastasi said. "In the second half, we spread the offense around and opened things up a little."

Glendale, 3-4, got on the board first. Senior tailback Mark McMillen cashed in from 15 yards out to cap a five-play, 37-yard first-quarter drive.

Heck got in to the act at the 1:16 mark of the second quarter, pounding it over from the one to end a five-play, 57-yard drive highlighted by quarterback Dave McInay's 39-yard bomb to Chris Bowman. McInay rushed for the conversion as NB went to the locker room leading 8-7.

Glendale's lack of depth began to show in the third quarter. With two-way starters McMillen, Mike Franks and Bill Twigg sidelined with injuries, the Vikings surrendered a pair of quick scores.

Panther fullback Robert Snider scored from a yard out and Heck followed from the 17 to shellshock Glendale. McInay rushed for one two-point conversion and passed to split end Todd Eckenrode for the other for a 24-7 Panther lead midway through the third quarter.

"Our depth really hurt us tonight," commented Viking coach John Lloyd Jr. "We played well early, but we lost some key players with injuries and things went downhill."

"The kids just weren't with it mentally at first, and the cold may have been a factor, but we ran and threw the ball with authority in the second half," Nastasi said.

NB rushed for 180 yards, with Heck gaining 95 on 22 carries and Snider adding 50 on ten tries. McInay was five out of ten for 108 yards.

Northern Bedford travels to Southern Huntingdon at 8 p.m. Friday, while Glendale entertains Juniata Valley at 7:30 p.m.

ALLPORT — Neither a full moon, a Friday the 13th nor the Glendale Viking defense could keep the West Branch Warriors from their appointed rounds last night.

"I'm not at all superstitious," said West Branch Coach Bill Vroman, after watching his squad dismantle the visiting Vikes 51-12.

"It was a nightmare for me tonight," Viking Coach John Lloyd Jr. said. "Everything we did was wrong. We know we have a lot better football team than we showed tonight."

Penns Manor bops Glendale

GLENDALE — The Glendale Vikings were frozen solid by the weather and by Penns Manor as the Vikings dropped to 1-7 with a 24-0 loss to the Comets Friday night.

The Vikings had two fumbles and three interceptions to add to their woes. The lone Glendale bright spot was John VanScoyoc who rushed 12 times for 119 yards, becoming the first Glendale rusher to gain over 100 yards this season.

The scoring began in the first quarter as Penns Manor recovered a Viking fumble and marched 83 yards in 13 plays. Ted Cochran scored the touchdown with a two-yard run.

A Comet interception led to their next score. The drive covered 67 yards and was culminated by an Oakes to Chris Zayachak nine yard pass. The pass for two fell short but the Comets now held a 12-0 lead.

Just seven plays before the Comets extended their lead, Cochran scored his second touchdown of the night with a 50-yard scamper. But the PAT pass fell incomplete to give Penns Manor a 18-0 halftime lead.

Three Viking penalties aided the last Penns Manor score as Glendale gave the Comets 40 of

their 75 yards. Rich Krinin bowled his way over from nine yards out to set the final score at 24-0.

"I said all along that Penns Manor would be one of the better teams we play this year," noted Viking head coach John Lloyd Jr. "I thought we improved quite a bit over last week, but we still killed ourselves."
