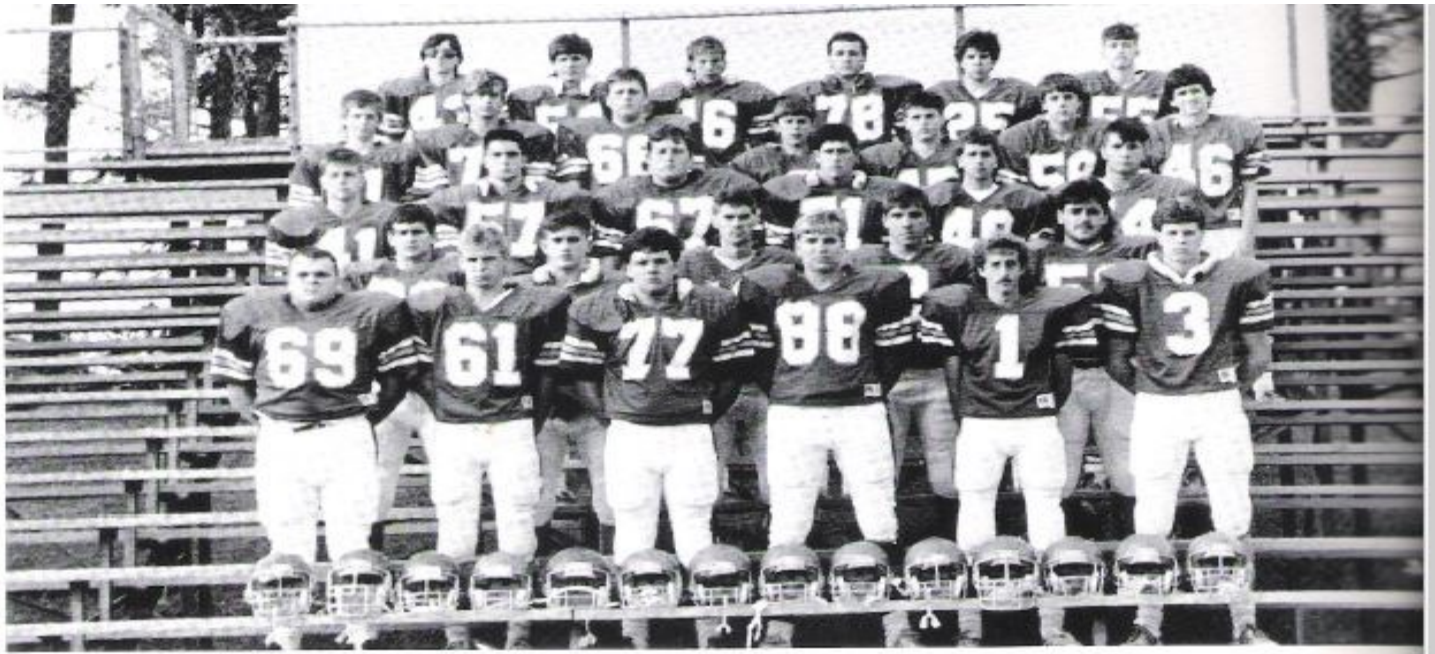

Shives, Foutz deliver for Williamsburg

FLINTON — Williamsburg's 1-2 punch of Doug Shives and Henry Foutz delivered the knockout blow to Glendale in the season opener Friday night.

Shives and Foutz churned out 329 yards between them and accounted for six of Williamsburg's seven touchdowns in the Blue Pirates' 46-26 pasting of Glendale.

Shives scored five touchdowns and a two-point conversion. He rushed for 132 yards on 25 carries.

Foutz raced for 197 yards on 15 carries and tallied one TD. He aided three Pirates' drives with runs of 46, 59 and 34 yards.

"We have never had two backs as big, strong and fast as Doug and Henry," assessed Williamsburg Coach Dave Baker. "In the past, we may have had one back in their

mold, but never two together in the same backfield."

Shives is a 6-1, 180-pound senior. Foutz, a powerful junior, packs 185-pounds on his 5-9 frame.

"Doug and Henry are good, hard runners, but a lot of the credit has to go to our offensive line which did an outstanding job of blocking, particularly the guys on the right side — Tom Ross and Jim Price," Baker said.

Williamsburg, coming off a 12-1 season, took command early. Shives scored on runs of 9, 16 and 1 yards, staking the Pirates to a 20-0 advantage at halftime.

Glendale got on the scoreboard in the third quarter when quarterback Matt Bordack flipped a 14-yard TD strike to Mike Jasper. Jason Pacewicz added the two-point conversion.

Both teams exploded in the fourth quarter, scoring a total of 44 points.

"This team showed me that it has

a lot of heart," noted Glendale Coach John Lloyd, Jr. "We were down by three touchdowns, but came back and I'm proud of that, even though we weren't a winner.

"Williamsburg has an excellent team," Lloyd continued. "We're an inexperienced team and I believe that may have been the reason we didn't do that much in the first half. We played a lot better in the second half."

Shives scored his fourth TD with 7:55 left in the game on a four-yard run and quarterback Denny Hammel flipped a pass to Nathan Appleman for the two-point conversion, putting Williamsburg ahead 26-8.

Baker started to clear his bench on the Pirates next possession, but Glendale didn't give up. Dan Holes bolstered the Vikings' faith by scooping a Williamsburg fumble and racing 40 yards for a score.

But Foutz responded by racing 59

yards on the first play following the Vikings on-sides kick.

Glendale then struck for two quick touchdowns, pulling to within eight points (34-26) of the Pirates. John VanScoyoc plunged from the one and Dan Holes later grabbed a pass from Bordack and dashed 50 yards for another six points. The Vikings' final TD was set up by the recovery of an on-sides kick.

GAME NOTES: It was the 100th victory for Baker, now in his 20th season. "People are probably saying 100 victories, but it took him 20 years to get them," Baker remarked with a smile. "When I was younger I never dreamed about 100 victories. It's no big deal. I'm just happy we won the game."

Cowher helps Claysburg defeat Glendale, 18-0

CLAYSBURG — It took Claysburg-Kimmel coach Jeff Lingenfelter about two seconds to point out the bright spots in the Bulldogs' 18-0 win over Glendale Saturday night.

"We won. That's about all we did right all night," Lingenfelter said after witnessing his squad stumble and fumble to its second win in three outings.

Despite losing three fumbles and an interception, the Bulldog offense capitalized on a pair of Glendale errors for short scoring drives while the Claysburg defense pitched its second shutout of the young season.

Claysburg fullback Dave Cowher scored on a pair of 1-yard runs to cap drives of 24 and 20 yards, while Glendale's carelessness in the end zone resulted in a pair of safeties to set the final tally.

While Lingenfelter talked like a coach whose team had lost, Glendale coach John Lloyd Jr. found hope for the future in defeat.

"Coming in, I thought Claysburg would be the best team we faced all season," he said. "We didn't allow any long drives, we got our running game going and we forced some mistakes. I think the kids gained a lot of confidence tonight."

Neither coach could rave about the first quarter: Claysburg's first

three possessions ended with an interception, a fumble and a punt, while Glendale's output amounted to minus-12 yards.

The Bulldogs got on the board on the first play of the second stanza after junior guard Adam Claycomb smothered a Glendale fumble at the Glendale 20.

The Vikings followed with the longest drive of the night, an 83-yard jaunt that ended on downs at the Claysburg 3. Junior tailback Jason Pacewicz picked up 68 yards on the drive.

"I was real happy with the way we moved the ball," Lloyd said. "Jason is turning into a real explosive runner, and (senior fullback) Dan Holes did a great job, especially considering that we didn't turn him into a running back until Wednesday night."

"We managed to shut them out, but we gave up way too many yards," Lingenfelter said. "We did manage to put a lot of pressure on the quarterback and take the pass away. It's one of the few things that worked out the way we wanted it to."

Cowher cracked the end zone for the second time midway through the second quarter after Bulldog quarterback Tim Oakes kept the drive alive with a seven-yard, fourth-down bootleg to the Glendale 7.

"We did just enough to win," Lingenfelter said.

Northern Bedford escapes Glendale

FLINTON — Northern Bedford lived by the big play Friday, and nearly died by it.

It took a deflected two-point conversion pass after a 53-yard Glendale scoring strike in the waning moments for the Panthers (3-1) to escape with their hides intact 20-19.

"They came after us, and kept coming after us. I'm just glad to get out of here with a win," Northern Bedford coach Joe Nastasi said, after watching scoring plays of 44, 52 and 53 yards nearly go for naught.

Winless Glendale scored its first touchdown in eight quarters on their initial possession, hammering away on a 13-play, 77-yard jaunt. Junior tailback Jason Pacewicz got the first of his two touchdowns on a one-yard run.

Northern Bedford then gave the Vikings heck, specifically Frank Heck. The Panther's senior tailback broke free off tackle for a 44-yard score, capping a six-play, 61-yard drive.

The Panthers pounced again from long-range on their next possession, with quarterback Jason Drenning connecting with freshman Joe Nastasi from 52-yards out on a deflected pass.

The pair would hook-up again for the game-winner — a fake-punt pass play that covered 53-yards to end the third quarter.

But Glendale wasn't finished.

With just 1:12 remaining, Viking QB Matt Bordack found junior split-end Rob Burmeister open underneath the Panther zone on a pass-

play that covered 53-yards following some fine open-field running. But Bordack's conversion pass was tipped, falling short of Viking receiver Dan Jasper.

"You can't spot a team like Northern Bedford 14 points and expect to win," Viking coach John Lloyd Jr. said. "We gave up touchdowns on a tipped pass we could have caught and a fake punt that we were expecting. We beat ourselves."

Glendale drops 26-8 decision

KENWOOD — The Glendale Vikings football team suffered from slippery fingers and swift feet Saturday.

The fingers belonged to the Viking backs and the feet were attached to Penns Manor tailbacks Rich Krimin, who bolted for 157 and three touchdowns in a 26-8 win.

Krimin broke free for first half scoring runs of 43 and 53 yards, as Penns Manor iced the game before the steam wore off the fans first cup of hot chocolate. A pair of scores followed two of the Vikings' six turnovers, as the hosts led 26-0 at the half.

Glendale had its chances, crossing the Penns Manor 20 three times before averting a shutout on a 28-yard Brian Belgin touchdown run with 2:42 to play.

"You've got to be hungry when you get inside the 20, and we weren't," Viking coach John Lloyd Jr. said. "We played good aggressive football in the second half and kept them off the board, but you don't score points for that."

Coach Tim Sedgwick's comments, who remained in the hunt for a District 6, Class A playoff spot, credited his line for the win.

"We got good pressure on their quarterback (7 sacks), shut their run down and gave Rich (Krimin) good holes," Sedgwick said.

Lloyd said the elements of surprise also played a key role.

"We worked all week on playing a 6-3 defense with man coverage, but I made the mistake of going to the zone in passing situations, and that's when they hurt us with the run," Lloyd said.
