Foutz powers Williamsburg over Glendale

FLINTON — First glance at Williamsburg's Henry Foutz and you think he's playing the wrong position.

After all, he packs 205 pounds on a 5-9 frame. Perhaps he should be a tackle.

But Foutz doesn't play the interior line. Foutz lines up in the Blue Pirates' backfield and its not until he is given the football that you realize that's he playing right where he belongs.

Foutz powered his way for three touchdowns Friday night, igniting Williamsburg's 28-6 rout of Glendale in the season opener.

"Henry is big, powerful and shifty," noted Williamsburg coach

Dave Baker. "He is hard to tackle."

Foutz, who rushed for 92 yards on 18 carries, scored on runs of 5, 2, and 1 yards. He also added a two-point conversion.

Foutz, a senior and two-time letterwinner, got off to a slow start, netting just 26 yards in the first half. He turned it on during in his limited action in the second half.

In the second half, Foutz churned out 66 yards before exiting following his 5-yard TD run with 8:48 left in the fourth quarter.

"One of Henry's assets is his great stamina," Baker said. "While the other guys are in the huddle huffing and puffing, he isn't, but is ready to keep going."

Foutz also contributed to the Williamsburg victory in other ways. He helped anchor the Pirates' defense

and recovered a fumble. Foutz also handled the Pirates' placekicking and kickoffs. His 28-yard field goal attempt in the waning seconds of the first half fell short of its mark.

"Foutz is a tough player," said first-year Glendale coach Frank Pehines. "As a linebacker and running back, he is outstanding."

Williamsburg took control early by scoring a pair of touchdowns in the opening quarter. Linebacker Mike Robley got the Pirates started by intercepting a Steve Wagner pass and returning it 22 yards for a touchdown with 6:27 left in the first quarter.

The Pirates moved 55 yards in seven plays during their next possession with Foutz plunging from the one with :21 left in the first quarter. Foutz ran for the two-point conversion, staking Williamsburg to a 14-0 advantage.

"Falling behind 14-0 took an effect on our young team," Pehinec said. "But we showed a lot of character and didn't quit."

Williamsburg turned back-to-back possessions into touchdowns in the second half. Foutz scored a pair of touchdowns and end Nathan Appleman grabbed a two-point conversion pass from quarterback Brad Swinsburg to put the Pirates ahead 28-0.

When Foutz hammered the final nail in the Vikings coffin early in the fourth quarter, Baker started clearing his bench.

Glendale avoided a shutout when Mike Clarkson raced seven yards for a touchdown with 5:42 left in the game. Clarkson also tacked on the two-point conversion.

"We played solidly on both sides of the ball," Baker asserted. "Our defense played well and we were able to sustain an offense. We got stronger in the second half and did the job physically."

GAME NOTES: Williamsburg halfback Shawn Bookhammer had a big second half, gaining 54 of his 72 yards ... Jaison Pacewicz led Glendale with 63 yards rushing while Clarkson finished with 54 yards ... Robley, who saw limited action because he was ill, and Andy Baker had interceptions for Williamsburg.

SAXTON — When your offensive can control the ball on the ground and your defense doesn't bend, you usually win. That is exactly what Tussey Mountain did Friday in rolling to a 20-0 victory over visiting Glendale.

The Titans picked up 277 yards rushing and were led by senior half-back Richard Taylor, who carried the ball 17 times for 143 yards.

Tussey's defense would occasionally bend, but not break as the Vikings were stopped three times inside the 10-yard line.

"I thought we had the opportunities to win the game," Glendale coach Frank Perehnic said. "We

were inside the 10-yard line too many times not to score. There was no reason we shouldn't have won."

It was the season opener for Tussey, and coach Don Donaldson was extremely pleased to get an early win.

"Give credit to the kids," Donaldson said. "They lined up one-on-one and played hard. It was a long preseason and it's nice to be 1-0. We have good kids who want to play football, our line did a super job and Taylor had some big runs. On defense, J.D. (Donaldson) and Tyson (Rodgers) had some big hits."

Hartman leads Claysburg rout

FLINTON — It took less than an hour for Claysburg-Kimmel to ruin its reputation as a running team.

That's what will happen when a previously unheralded passing attack explodes for 153 yards and three touchdowns in a mere 14 minutes.

Claysburg senior quarterback Mark Hartman made sure this Friday the 13th was a gorey one for Glendale, now 0-3, shredding the Viking defense on three successive drives for a 30-0 half-time lead on its way to a 30-8 win.

"We don't like to be known as strictly a running team," said Claysburg coach Jeff Lingenfelter, whose Bulldogs improved to 3-0. "We can throw the ball when the opportunity arises."

And throw it well. After misfiring on his first pass, the 5-foot-11, 190-pound Hartman connected on six straight.

"(Hartman) was missing his receivers last week, but he was threading the needle tonight," Viking coach Frank Pehinec said. "It would have taken fantastic defensive plays to break them up, and we just didn't make them."

Lingenfelter said Glendale may have been gunning for standout Bulldog tailback Jason Hinkledire, and got burned.

"Jason's been 90 percent of our offense so far, so you have to expect someone to try to take that away," Lingenfelter said. "They were packed in to stop the run, and bit on the fake."

"We did what we wanted to by

controlling the run, but they hurt us with the pass. We knew they could throw the ball, but we just got caught flat-footed," Pehinec said.

Glendale was already behind 8-0 when the aerial barrage began, compliments of a mishandled snap on a punt that led to a three-yard Jason Hinkledire touchdown run at the 7:47 mark of the first quarter.

Following a Viking punt, Hartman cranked it up for a 77-yard touchdown bomb to senior wideout Britton Mauk down the left sideline.

While the Bulldog defense was chaining Glendale — the Vikings managed just one first down in the first half — Hartman made the scoreboard click twice more with touchdown tosses of 8 yards to Mauk and 14 yards to Bill Cunningham.

"We dug ourselves a big hole again. 30-0 is just too much to overcome. But we showed a lot of poise by holding our own in the second half," Pehinec said.

Glendale broke a seven-quarter touchdown drought when senior quarterback Steve Wagner hit sophomore receiver Ryan Andrews with a 14-yard touchdown strike.

Northern batters Glendale

ROARING SPRING — Northern Bedford Coach Joe Nastasi took a chapter from Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf's playbook Saturday.

In true stormin' Norman fashion, the Panthers (3-1) opened up with a relentless aerial bombardment, then sent in the ground troops to mop up winless Glendale, 40-6.

Glendale coach Frank Pehinec said he didn't need to hear air raid sirens to know what was coming.

"We knew what they were going to do," he said. "There were no surprises. They just executed."

Panther junior quarterback Jason Drenning, sophomore wingback Joe Nastasi, and junior split end Shawn Scott comprised the Northern Bedford airforce, which flew three second-quarter touchdown sorties. When the smoke cleared, the Panthers, led 31-6 at the half.

Drenning was nine of 13 for 129 yards in the first half, including touchdown strikes of 22 and 23 yards to Nastasi and 11 yards to Scott.

"He's very accurate. We expect him to be above 50 percent every night, and that's great for throwing the ball long like we do," Nastasi said. "But the key to any passing game is to have time to throw, and our line gave us that again tonight."

Another key to the Panther of-

fense was the Panther defense, which kept Glendale mired inside its own 20 for much of the night. The Vikings managed just 26 yards on the ground, and needed a 54-yard Steve Wagner to Rob Burmeister bomb to dent the scoreboard.

"You couldn't have asked for any better field position," said Nastasi, whose squad started eight possessions inside Glendale territory. "Keeping them buried inside the 20 takes a lot of options away from their offense."

"We were in the hole all night," Pehinec concurred.

Another disruption in the Glendale offensive was a sprained ankle that took senior tailback Jaison Pacewicz out of the game in the first quarter.

"We had to shuffle people around due to the injury. It put us out of sync," Pehinec said.

With the big lead in hand, Nastasi stuck to the ground in the second half, allowing tailback Dan Koontz to rack up a game-high 78 yards on 14 carries. Senior fullback Dusty Douglas and Nastasi added 48 and 44 yards rushing, respectively.

GAME NOTES: Panther place-kicker Thor Veigarsson, a soccer-playing exchange student from Iceland, drilled a 35-yard field goal and 5 of 5 PATs ... Viking running back Chip Clarkson, who drew raves from Pehinec for his play, saw a spar-
