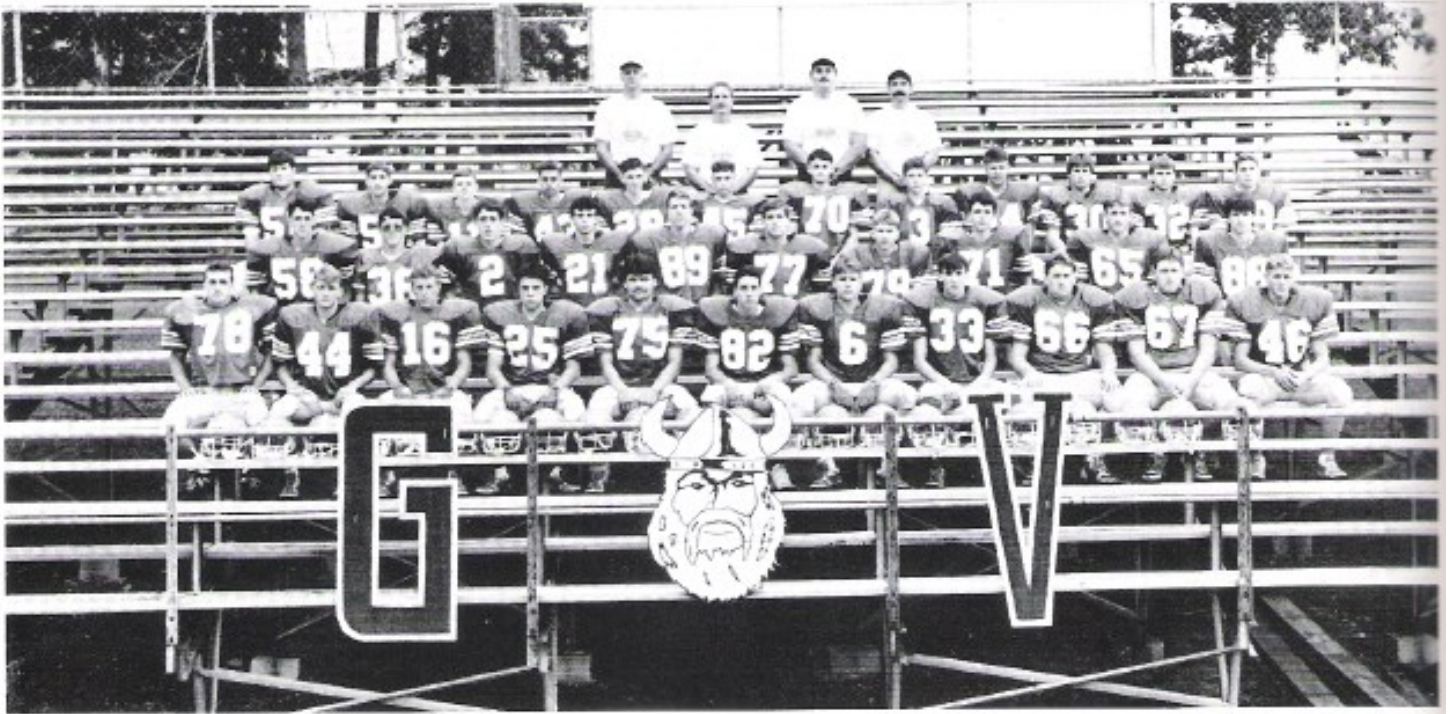

Williamsburg stifles Glendale

WILLIAMSBURG — Most of Coach Dave Baker's best football teams at Williamsburg have had a few characteristics in common.

A quick, aggressive, swarming defense. An ultra-productive running game marked by an ability to utilize a couple of backs successfully. A quarterback who can effectively run the option and throw to keep the defense honest.

It was that recipe — particularly heavy on the defense — that the Blue Pirates used to defeat visiting Glendale, 13-0, in the season and Inter-County Conference Mid-Penn Division lidlifter for both schools at Williamsburg Memorial Field, Friday night.

"That's basically our game," Baker said of Williamsburg's winning formula. "We played well as a team and that's what we strive for around here. We got contributions from a lot of guys."

Those contributions were most evident when Glendale had the ball. Williamsburg held the Viking offense to just four first downs and a mere 35 yards in total offense. The Blue Pirates also came up with three in

terceptions and a fumble.

The results could have been even more eye-popping, considering the fact that all of Glendale's 24 passing yards came on two deflections that resulted in completions.

"It was a good defensive win for us," Baker said. "We pretty much shut down their offense. Our line played better than we thought they might and our secondary played well most of the time."

But the key according to both coaches was the Williamsburg linebackers, Shawn Bookhammer and Mike Robley.

"We have good linebackers, there's no doubt about it. Our linebackers are experienced and they're good players," Baker said.

"Their linebackers played really tough," Glendale coach Frank Pehinec said. "I think you have to give credit to their defense. We executed with the ball as well as we could."

Bookhammer and Robley were also forces on offense, combining for 153 yards rushing and both touchdowns runs, while the option quarterback Brad Swinsburg ran for 34 yards and passed for 48 more

Glendale, for its part, was competitive, having a chance until it lost a fumble at its own 11-yard line late in

the game, which led to Robley's game-clinching touchdown.

Pehinec — though pleased with his team's overall play — felt that the Vikings' 10 penalties for 87 yards help squander the few scoring opportunities it had.

"I think every time we had a chance to move the ball we penalized ourselves," Pehinec said.

GAME NOTES: Swinsburg played the entire game despite sustaining a shoulder injury late in the first half that caused him difficulty breathing for the remainder of the game. "He's a really tough kid. He didn't say anything," Baker said, unsure of Swinsburg's condition ... Glendale's Ryan Andrews boomed five punts for a 40-yard average with a long of 59 yards. He also had a 42-yarder negated by a penalty ... Williamsburg travels to Claysburg-Kimmel next week. Glendale returns home to play Tussey Mountain.

Tussey romps over Glendale

FLINTON — Glendale played an ace running back Friday, but Tussey Mountain won the hand with a pair of its own.

Tussey backfield duo Greg Elder and Trent Brumbaugh combined for 272 yards rushing and four touchdowns to deal the Vikings (0-2) a 42-20 loss.

It took a pair to beat the ace — Viking tailback Chip Clarkson — who racked up over 300 all-purpose yards and three touchdowns.

The 5-foot-8, 150-pound senior crossed 183 stripes on 21 carries, notching a 69-yard touchdown run and an 85-yard kickoff return. He also caught a pair of passes, keyed the Viking defense at middle linebacker and maintained his aggressiveness to the very end, getting ejected with Tussey's J.D. Donaldson in a scuffle with 38 seconds to play.

It wasn't nearly enough.

"We gave up too many yards, too many points, too many big plays," Viking coach Frank Pehinec said. "They executed very well offensively and basically just blew us out of the trenches in the second half."

The first half was a different story, when Glendale led 7-0 and 14-8 before trailing 16-14 at the break. A Scott Misiura interception at Glendale's two-yard line stopped a Tussey drive just 34 seconds before intermission.

"Our equipment van was forty minutes late and we were out here warming up with the band," Tussey coach Don Donaldson said. "I think it had us out of sync for awhile, but Glendale woke us up by showing we couldn't walk all over them."

"I felt we had the momentum going into the second half, but they

came out, grabbed it back, and we just couldn't stop them," Pehinec said.

Tussey (1-0-1), which punted just once, scored on four of five second-half possessions and never looked back. The Titans scored 34 unanswered points in one stretch.

"We gave up too much yardage, but overall we're pleased," Donaldson said.

GAME NOTES: Glendale end-safety-kicker Ryan Andrews suffered a concussion in the second quarter ... Elder led Tussey with 161 yards on 17 carries and three catches ... Glendale debuted a fluorescent-striped football for increased visibility ... Tussey quarterback Kevin Steele went 5-for-5 for 55 yards in the first half and intercepted a pass.

Claysburg beats Glendale, 35-0

CLAYSBURG — Claysburg-Kimmel took a chapter from the annals of war Saturday, and redefined the term "blitzkrieg."

Combining a potent ground and air assault, the Bulldogs (2-1) scored four times in a twelve-minute span of the first half and went on to down winless Glendale (0-3) 35-0.

"We haven't been playing up to our potential lately, and we've been trying to get things going in the right direction as far as the fundamentals are concerned," C-K coach Jeff Lingenfelter said. "We succeeded in doing that in the first half tonight."

Claysburg's early dominance was simply the result of good field position, as the Bulldogs defense chained the Vikes to the wall and kept them there.

Glendale gained just five total yards and one first down in the first half, was forced to punt on their first five possessions, and failed to get outside its own 40 yardline.

Lingenfelter credited his defense for his offensive success.

"We kicked off and were able to maintain that field position," Lingenfelter said. "It makes it a lot easier to score when you don't have to go very far."

Claysburg's touchdown drives covered 17, 25, 46, 60 and 66 yards, and included scores on four straight possessions between the 4:34 mark of the first quarter and 4:41 of the second.

There were a lot of first half heroes.

Junior tailback Chad Zembower picked up 61 yards and a four yard score, senior fullback Steve Miller scored on runs of four and two yards and junior quarterback David Berkheimer hit 4 of 8 passes for 57 stripes and a 7-yard score to senior wideout Kris Claycomb in the half.

"We played the whole first half with our backs to the end zone," Viking coach Frank Pehinec said. "We fixed some things and played a lot better in the second half."

NBC remains focused, 26-6

FLINTON — If overcoming adversity is the sign of a good football team, Northern Bedford's got one.

The Panthers (3-1) beat the rain, tragedy on the homefront and the Glendale Vikings (0-4) 26-6 Friday in an Inter-County Conference Mid-Penn Division bout.

"These guys need to be commended. They've been through a lot the last few days," Northern Bedford coach Joe Nastasi said, referring to the deaths of a classmate and a former team member's father during the week.

Glendale didn't make things any easier, playing to a 6-6 draw in the first half before Northern scored on its first three possessions of the second.

"We got after the kids at halftime because they weren't playing with emotion. We told them to turn up the intensity, and they did," Nastasi explained.

Panther senior tailback Dan Koontz, who kept on pace for a 1,000-yard rushing season with 124 stripes on 21 carries, broke the tie with a 10-yard run to cap a 60-yard, eight-play drive early in the third quarter.

Northern junior halfback Joe Nastasi put it away, capitalizing on a botched Glendale punt snap with a five-yard scoring run. He iced it by hooking up with senior quarterback Jason Drenning for a 35-yard touchdown catch to crown a 13-play, 84-yard drive.

"They're a well-seasoned team and they beat us in the end, but I thought we contained them fairly well," Viking coach Frank Perehinec said. "They can be very explosive."

Nastasi said the wet field took the big-play pop out of the Panther offense. "When it rains, you have to be

able to run the ball well. We did that tonight," he said.

In fact, three of the Panthers' four scores came on drives that featured the run exclusively. Northern racked up 219 yards on the ground to go with Drenning's 5-of-9, 107-yard passing night.

Northern had taken a 6-0 lead with an eight-play, 95-yard jaunt capped by Nastasi's 31-yard scoring scamper. Glendale got on the board moments later when senior running back Chip Clarkson grabbed a deflected Brian McGarvey pass for a 31-yard score.

Southern Huntingdon squeaks by Glendale

FLINTON — When Eric Scott's mother holds out his breakfast this morning, he'll probably grab it and bolt through the doorway.

It would be an understandable reaction, after the Southern Huntingdon tailback took a whopping 51 handoffs and set a school rushing record in a 16-6 win over Glendale (0-6) Friday.

"He's our workhorse. He's big and rugged and he'll give you the second and third effort all night long," Southern Huntingdon coach Doak Hoenstine said.

Scott picked up 258 yards, eclipsing Fred Foster's 1986 mark of 254, and scored all of Southern's points, including two- and four-yard touchdown runs.

"We knew Scott was tough. He's a big, strong runner ... and we couldn't stop him," Viking coach Frank Pehinec said.

While Scott was piling up the yardage, a bend-but-not-break Glendale defense kept him from piling up the points.

Southern scored from 40 yards out on their first possession following a Chip Clarkson fumble, but the Viking senior tailback redeemed himself with a 76-yard touchdown scamper in the second quarter to cut the lead to 8-6 at the half.

Southern chewed almost ten min-

utes off the clock with a 74-yard, 16-play touchdown drive to open the second half and set the final tally.

The Rockets (3-3) ran 71 plays from scrimmage compared to just 24 for Glendale. "We controlled the ball, and they can't score if they don't have it," Hoenstine explained.

Glendale ends drought, 26-14

FLINTON — It's over.

After two years, 17 days and six hours, two head coaches and 21 fruitless outings, Glendale won a football game.

The confetti was flying once again at Dr. Roy F. Baker Field as the Vikings (1-6) got the monkey off their backs with a 26-14 triumph over winless West Branch (0-6).

"It's overwhelming," said Viking second-year mentor Frank Perehinec, who was spared the Gatorade bath after his first head coaching win on a cold, windy night. "This is something we've all been working for for a long, long time."

It took a furious fourth-quarter comeback to put the win in the books.

Trailing 14-6 with the wind at their backs, the Vikes went to work. Less than seven minutes and three touchdown drives later, the winless skein was broken.

Junior quarterback Brian McGarvey blasted over from the WB one-yard line to cap a 73-yard, 17-play march, with senior tailback Chip Clarkson rushing for two key fourth-and-one first downs to sustain the drive.

Then Rick Snyder, who led all rushers with 152 yards on 15 carries, took his turn. The junior fullback, who had a 68-yard touchdown run in the first half, repeated the trick from 23 yards out for the game-winner on a 52-yard, eight-play drive with 4:24 to play after West Branch was stopped on downs.

"It was fourth down, but the way the wind was blowing, there was no point in trying to kick into it," Warrior coach Bill Vroman said, explaining the lack of a punt on fourth-and-two at the Glendale 50.

Glendale sealed it on a one-yard

Clarkson touchdown dive that followed a Mike Ninosky fumble recovery.

Curwensville dodges Glendale scare

CURWENSVILLE — If the term "good loss" is in the dictionary, Glendale's 16-14 defeat to favored Curwensville Friday should be listed as an example.

"I know we lost, but I think we played an outstanding game in all aspects," Glendale coach Frank Pehinec said. "The kids played with a lot of emotion and a lot of confidence."

The gust of wind that blew through the stadium when time expired was actually Curwensville coach Lyle Domico's sigh of relief.

"It was a backyard dogfight. A lot of people didn't expect much from Glendale tonight, but I'm relieved to see them getting back on the bus," Domico said.

What Glendale (1-7) did was win on the stat sheets, and come within a mistake or two of winning on the scoreboard as well.

If not for a bad punt snap that resulted in a safety, or a dropped touchdown pass, or a blocking-below-the-waste penalty that negated a two-point conversion, Glendale beats more than the point spread.

Curwensville (3-4) went up 8-0 on the safety and a 23-yard Scott Irwin-to-Chris Bailor touchdown pass in the first quarter, but Glendale pulled even before the half, with senior tailback Chip Clarkson skirting the left end from 10 yards out to cap a 51-

yard, 11-play drive with 1:06 to play. Clarkson repeated the trick on the two-point conversion.

Curwensville made some halftime adjustments and finally managed to spring star tailback Jedd Hess loose for some third quarter yardage, including an 11-yard touchdown run. Hess cleared the 1,000-yard mark with 122 yards on 27 carries, including 112 in the second half.

Irwin hooked up with Bailor again on a two-point conversion that provided the winning margin.
