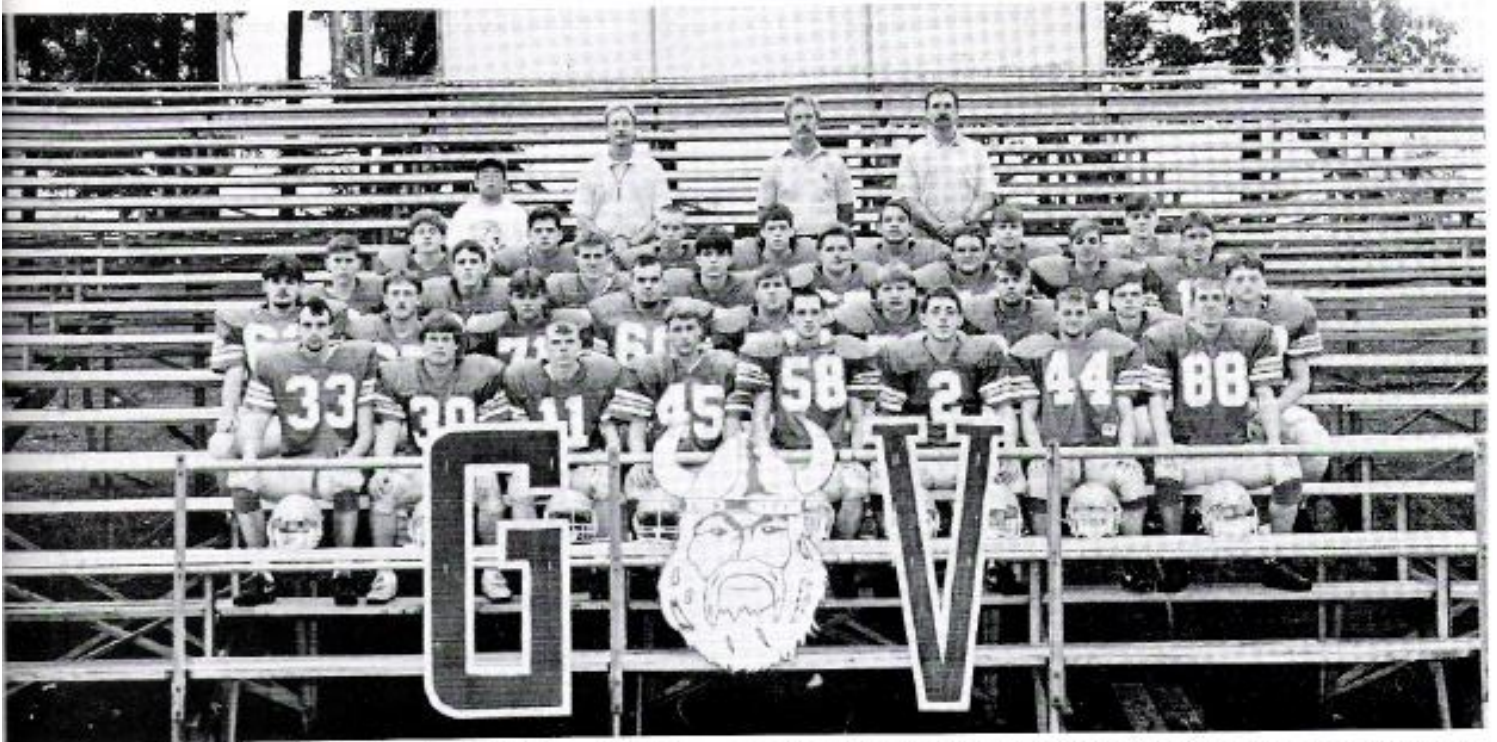

Williamsburg pulls out win over Glendale

FLINTON — The conditions were perfect for ending a drought.

Holding a six-point lead late in the fourth quarter in a steady drizzle, Glendale appeared poised to wash away a string of losses to Williamsburg dating back to the early 1980s.

Then the sun shone on coach Dave Baker's Blue Pirates, who capitalized on a bad punt snap with 4:29 to play to mount a 32-yard scoring drive and a 16-14 season-opening win.

"They had us on the ropes. Fortunately, they made the last mistake, and we took advantage of it," Baker said.

"I thought we had them," Glendale coach Frank Pehinec said.

"We had the lead and our running game was working, but you have to give credit to Williamsburg. They did it when they had to."

There was an abundance of heroes for Williamsburg in the waning moments, but none stood taller than 6-foot-4, 220-pound junior quarterback Ryan Gorsuch.

Gorsuch opened the winning drive by hitting junior split end Larry McCall for eight yards, then found senior wide receiver Adam Hileman open for 13 yards and a first down at the Glendale 5 on a crucial fourth and 11.

Williamsburg senior halfback Barry England punched it in from a yard out to tie the score.

"We don't really have a kicker," Baker said, explaining the ensuing two-point conversion try in which Gorsuch threaded the needle to McCall in the left corner of the end zone.

"I had butterflies," McCall said. "I was a little bit nervous for them to rely on me to win the game. I just got outside my man, ... and Ryan threw a great pass."

The comeback stole the glory from Glendale senior tailback Rick

Snyder, who scored twice and rushed for 166 yards on 27 tries.

"Rick ran hard, and Tom McGary, Mike Ninosky and Mark Kruse did a great job opening holes. Our whole (offensive) line did a great job," Pehinec said.

There was no shortage of mistakes on either side. Glendale's touchdowns came on 14- and 34-yard drives preceded by a fumble and a bad punt snap respectively, while both Williamsburg scores followed faulty snaps. A second quarter interception by McCall at the Williamsburg 11 also snuffed a Glendale drive.

"There were a lot of mistakes by both sides, but hey, it's the first game, and in our case we're an inexperienced team," Baker said.

GAME NOTES: England rushed for 80 stripes on 17 carries to pace the Williamsburg ground game ... Gorsuch threw for 132 stripes, while McCall had five catches for 66 yards and Hileman snared four for 54 yards ... Tom McGary and Mike Ninosky recovered fumbles for Glendale, while Ed Loose scooped up a loose ball for Williamsburg ... Glendale's Ryan Andrews had two catches for 52 yards, and kicked a pair of extra points.

Zembower helps Bulldogs control Glendale, 21-0

FLINTON — The Claysburg-Kimmel offense made up for lost playing time in advance Friday.

On the heels of the announcement this week that its Oct. 9 home date with Allegheny Academy has been cancelled, Claysburg used a ball-control offense to wear down Glendale, 21-0.

According to Glendale coach Frank Pehinec, you can't score with what you don't have; namely the football. Claysburg ran 55 plays from scrimmage compared to Glendale's 28, and held the ball for nearly 32 minutes out of 48.

"When they control the ball like that, there's not a lot you can do offensively," Pehinec said.

On the flip-side, when you carry the ball 28 times like Bulldog running back Chad Zembower, you can do plenty.

The Bulldogs went to their featured back often, and the 5-foot-10, 170-pound senior responded with 216 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

"He's the guy whose got to get it done for us. He did the job tonight," Claysburg coach Jeff Lingenfelter said of Zembower.

Pehinec was equally impressed. "He's a class back. His slashing ability is amazing."

Zembower credited his linemen, and so did Lingenfelter. "You have to do it up front," Lingenfelter said. "When we do, we win."

At the start, Claysburg was covering a lot of ground with little to show for it.

"We ate up almost all of the first quarter with a single drive, we get to the one (yard line), and we don't get in. That usually signals a long night," Lingenfelter said.

The Bulldogs put Lingenfelter's fears to rest in the second quarter, cashing in on drives of 47 and 51

yards. Bulldog senior quarterback David Berkheimer opened the scoring with a one-yard touchdown run, while Zembower lit up the board from four yards out with 2:07 to play.

"We kept them away from the big play and stayed within striking distance," Pehinec said. "That was our goal."

Claysburg put it out of reach with a 50-yard Zembower touchdown scamper in the fourth stanza, while a swarming Bulldog defense held Glendale at bay, limiting the Vikes to a mere three first downs and 63 total yards.

Lingenfelter said he was "extremely pleased" with his defense, which held Viking star tailback Rick Snyder to 38 yards. "We had a few breakdowns, but not many."

Glendale comes up short against Northern Bedford

ROARING SPRING — Glendale saved its best for last, but still came up short.

After Viking tailback Rick Snyder scored a touchdown from four yards out with 3:15 remaining, capping a 14-play, 94-yard drive, Glendale's two-point conversion attempt was thwarted, and Northern Bedford held on for a 14-13 win Friday night at the Roaring Spring Athletic Field.

"We play to win, that's what it's all about," Glendale coach Frank Pehinec said. "We don't play to tie. There was never any doubt that we would go for two."

Snyder, who rushed for a game-high 196 yards on 29 carries including 83 yards on 11 attempts on Glendale's 94-yard drive, was stopped while attempting to run in the conversion. Snyder was hit immediately in the backfield by Joe Nastasi, Rick Zimmerman and Mitch Miller upon taking the pitch from Brian McGarvey.

"It (the conversion) wasn't close," Northern Bedford coach Joe Nastasi said. "I was glad to see we got in there and got penetration."

Glendale scored the lone touchdown of the second half, despite only having possession of the football twice.

"We made the most out of them

(the two possessions)," Pehinec said. "We drove it down the field, but came up short. Then we got the ball back and took it right in. We played a much smarter game in the second half after mistakes hurt us in the first half."

Northern Bedford recovered three Glendale fumbles in the first half.

"We played with more intensity on defense in the first half," Coach Nastasi said. "We led the area in turnover ratio last year and we need to come up with more turnovers this year. With our type of team we need to rely on take-aways and field position."

Young Nastasi got the Panthers out of the blocks quickly when he accepted a screen pass from backup quarterback Travis Brown and cut back across the field, out-running everyone for a 69-yard touchdown run. It was Northern Bedford's second play from scrimmage.

"Joe's a game-breaker," Nastasi said. "There is so much attention put on Joe when he touches the ball, and we want to make the defense aware that he is one step away from the big play."

Nastasi showed that he was a jack of all trades, by taking a turn at running the offense from the quarterback position. Nastasi and Brown filled in for Chris Sipes, who sprained his ankle in last week's game against Tussey

Mountain.

A fumble gave the Panthers the ball at the Glendale 30 and Brown scored from four yards out to put Northern in front, 12-7. Nastasi then rolled out and found Zimmerman at the last second in the endzone for the two-point conversion.

"It was a great play (the conversion)," Nastasi said. "We timed it just right and it turns out it won the game for us."

Juniata Valley denies Glendale PAT, wins 14-13

FLINTON — Glendale coach Frank Pehinec may want to reconsider his "no ties" policy. It's starting to add up in the loss column.

For the second week in a row, Glendale suffered a 14-13 loss by failing to convert a two-point conversion in the waning seconds.

This time, Juniata Valley (2-3) was given the chance to earn the win, and its defense came through, stopping Glendale star tailback Rick Snyder on a sweep to preserve the lead with 40 seconds to play.

"We have a kid (Ryan Andrews) who can kick the extra point every time, but the thought never really entered our minds," Pehinec said. "If you're not out there to win, what's the use of playing."

Not surprisingly, Juniata Valley coach Bill Clouse agreed. "I'd do the same thing. We welcomed the challenge. There are no bowls in high school football, so there's

nothing for anyone to gain from a tie."

For awhile, it looked like there'd be no need for a soul-searching decision. Glendale carried a 7-6 lead into the fourth quarter, and Juniata Valley hadn't mustered a first down since their first possession of the game.

Then Clouse pushed the right button, and the Hornet offense sputtered to life, churning out a 9-play, 68-yard scoring drive, with senior running back Ian Taylor picking up 48 yards on six carries. JV senior quarterback Jason Isett scored from a yard out, and Taylor rushed for what turned out to be the game-winning two-point conversion.

"We just kept trying different formations until we got the blocking angles we wanted. It finally worked," Clouse said.

Pehinec said fatigue among his two-way starters may have also played a role, as Glendale (1-4) failed to hold a fourth-quarter lead for the third time this season.

"I think (fatigue) has been a

problem," Pehinec said. "Some of our younger kids are starting to come on so we've been trying to substitute a little more to keep our starters fresh."

The Glendale offense was nearly up to the challenge as senior quarterback Brian McGarvey engineered an 11-play, 57-yard scoring march, with Snyder reach-

ing the left corner on a pitchout on fourth and goal from the JV 6.

McGarvey had the best day of his career, hitting 13 of 17 tries for 147 yards and no interceptions. His favorite target, Andrews, had 120 yards receiving on eight catches, including several of the circus variety.

"Brian did a nice job picking up when the run wasn't working, and Ryan is a multi-talented person who we've come to expect the spectacular from," Pehinec said.

Clouse praised senior two-way lineman J.D. Sheesley, who led the Hornets in tackles, and also singled out Taylor for a hard-earned 70 yards rushing and a 77-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to start the second half.

"(Sheesley) has been pretty much a force to be reckoned with and Taylor is a good, strong runner with good speed," Clouse said.

Glendale edges West Branch

ALLPORT — Glendale coach Frank Pehinec won't be getting a gift from his team at the athletic banquet this year. They've already given him his first multiple-win season, and a healthy crop of gray hair.

The Vikings (2-5), who have lost three games at crunch time by a combined five points, solved their fourth quarter jinx Friday by turning back West Branch, 13-10.

"We were down and we came back to win, and that's nice after those close losses," Pehinec said. "The boys never quit."

Neither did West Branch, which mounted a pair of fourth-quarter forays into Glendale territory that fell victim to a hard-charging Viking defense.

"They gambled and played three deep with no coverage underneath, but our offensive line couldn't buy us enough time to throw the ball," West Branch coach Bill Vroman said.

Warrior quarterback Doug Lucas won't be buying steaks for his offensive linemen. The West Branch senior was sacked four times, including a pair by Viking end Gene Snyder, and completed more passes to Viking defender Steve Ponish than he did his own receivers thanks to the continual pressure.

Ponish's pair of picks in the fourth quarter helped preserve the win, which Snyder made possible with a third-quarter punt block that led to Glendale's 25-yard game-winning touchdown drive.

"Gene Snyder's blocked punt was the key ... and Mark Kruise and Mike Ninosky picked us up defensively all night long," Pehinec said.

Glendale had its share of offensive heroes as well. Viking quarterback Brian McGarvey hit 6 of 11 passes for 173 yards, standout wideout Ryan Andrews caught five

passes for 154 and a touchdown, and tailback Rick Snyder hit the century mark for the fourth time with 107 yards and a score on 25 carries.

"We're a better team than our record indicates," Pehinec said. "We've been in every game. You just have to learn how to win."

Glendale beaten by Golden Tide

FLINTON — Linemen are a very important if often overlooked part of a football team.

But it was impossible to overlook the absence of Glendale's 6-foot-0, 220-pound two-way tackle Mike Ninosky in the Vikings' game Friday night with Curwensville at Dr. Roy F. Baker Athletic Field.

Ninosky left the field early in the second quarter with a shoulder injury with Glendale up 2-0. Following Ninosky's departure Curwensville scored 19 second-quarter points, which helped the Tide to a 25-10 victory.

"When you lose a man of Michael's caliber — he's our leader offensively and defensively on the line — it's tough," Glendale coach Frank Pehinec, whose team dropped to 2-6, said of Ninosky, who came into the game with over 100 tackles and helped the Glendale offense to nearly 150 rushing yards a game. "It definitely throws you out of sync."

Curwensville dominated the second quarter, outgaining Glendale 105 yards to 26. The Golden Tide scored on all three of its possessions, reaching the end zone on runs of 1 and 8 yards by Jeremiah Kuntz, sandwiched around a 68-yard Jason Miknis punt return.

Miknis then scored on a 37-yard run on Curwensville's first possession of the third quarter to put the Tide up 25-2.

Only the Glendale defense could dent the scoreboard until the final moments of the game. The Vikings took the early lead when Gene Snyder tackled Curwensville punter Randy Royer in the end zone after a bad snap. Midway through the fourth quarter, Curwensville quarterback Scott Irwin was also tackled for a two-point.

But both safeties were the product of Glendale drives that stalled, a fact that left Pehinec beside himself.

"We had the opportunites, we jsut couldn't get the ball over the goal line," Pehinec said.

Curwensville kept Glendale's offensive weapons of Rick Snyder and Ryan Andrews under wraps for most of the night. Snyder finished with just 39 yards rushing, and Andrews didn't catch a pass until just 11:51 was left in the game.

"We knew we had to take Snyder and Andrews out of the ball game," said Curwensville coach Lyle Domico, whose squad improved to 2-6. "Andrews really scares me."

Domico's concerns were well-founded, as Andrews ended up with six catches for 109 yards and helped set up quarterback Brian McGarvey's 16-yard touchdown scramble that capped the scoring.

Mo Valley turns back Glendale

HOUTZDALE — Moshannon Valley knows how to throw its weight around.

The Black Knights used their superior size in the trenches to grind out a 28-12 win over arch-rival Glendale Friday.

"I was pleased with our offensive line," Mo Valley coach Howie Camberg said. "We came off the ball pretty well. We were able to run the ball with quite a bit of consistency."

"They have some big linemen and a couple of good running backs," Glendale coach Frank Pehinec said. "It's tough when you're outmanned in the pits."

While the Vikings were pushed around, they were hard to knock out.

Glendale (2-7) trailed Mo Valley (6-3) just 13-6 at the half, and averted a blow out with a fourth-quarter scoring drive.

"Every time we were on the verge of putting them away, they'd do something to stay in the game," Camberg said.

"The kids showed character. They hung in there," Pehinec said. "We had to make a lot of adjustments (due to injuries), and we played a lot of young kids."

Injuries were almost as much of a thorn in the Vikings' side as Mo Valley senior tailback Cory Jarrett, who ran for 121 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries and moved within 130 yards of the school's all-time rushing record.

Glendale star receiver Ryan Andrews (ankle) and two-way stand-out lineman Mike Ninosky (knee) went down with first-half injuries.

"When you're a small school and you lose key players, it hurts. We had a lot of kids out of position," Pehinec said.

Mo Valley lineman Jim Gossar (dislocated kneecap) also went down in the fray. "Every time rivals play, it's a hard-hitting game, and tonight was no exception," Camberg said.

Mo Valley's control of the trenches was evident on defense as well. The Knights held Glendale to just 49 yards on the ground, and left Glendale senior tailback Rick Snyder (17-51) 71 yards short of the 1,000-yard mark with one game remaining.

Everett slips past Glendale

FLINTON — Everett was looking for a simple tune-up for next week's District 5 playoffs, but got a true workout instead.

It took a 192-yard rushing effort by junior tailback Jamie Eichelberger and a series of third quarter Glendale mistakes for the Warriors to escape with a 22-14 win.

The Glendale offense broke an 8-8 halftime tie by driving 69 yards to open the third quarter, then took a seat until the 10:48 mark of the fourth.

In the nine-plus minutes in between, Everett amassed a 22-14 lead by mounting touchdown drives of 57 and 42 yards while recovering Glendale fumbles on two consecutive kickoffs. The snake-bit Glendale offense never touched the ball.

"The wind was blowing pretty hard into our face, so we decided to squib the kickoffs and we were fortunate enough to recover two in a row," Everett coach Brian Koontz said.

"That's the way the ball bounces," Viking coach Frank Perehinec said of his special teams' inability to handle Everett. "The fumbles were the turning point. We had the wind in the third quarter, but we didn't have the ball."

Everett's first touchdown was also a special team's affair, with senior Barry Weaver blocking a punt and returning it 10 yards for a touchdown.

Despite adverse conditions, Viking senior quarterback Brian McGarvey exceeded the 1,000-yard passing mark for the season by going 9-of-22 for 176 yards. Senior receiver Ryan Andrews had six catches for 115 yards and a touchdown.

Eichelberger eclipsed the 1,000-yard rushing plateau with his 192 yards on 33 carries, but Glendale senior tailback Rick Snyder fell short of the mark. Snyder needed 71 yards for 1,000, and had it briefly

before a 34-yard touchdown run was eclipsed by a clipping call.

Everett improved to 6-4 and faces Bedford in the District 5 playoffs next week. Glendale, which lost four games by a touchdown or less, finished at 2-8.
