Glendale rolls over Williamsburg

WHLIAMSBURG — Glendale opened the 1994 high school football season with an impressive 27-0 win over Williamsburg Friday night.

Glendale took charge in the first half, building a 21-0 lead.

The Vikings displayed a productive running attack, spearheaded by sophomore Paul McClellan; an aggressive defense that intercepted two passes, one of which Gary Clarkson returned 29 yards for a score; and a passing game that featured just two passes, one a 53-yard TD toss from junior Jason Wagner to senior split end Jason Spanik.

Glendale netted 194 of its 313 yards in the first half, compared to just 65 for the Blue Pirates, who finished with 142.

Glendale head coach Fran Perehinec was delighted with his team's performance.

"We're a young, hungry team,"
Perehinec said. "I think tonight's
performance was the result of
hard work from a dedicated
group of kids that have hung in
there since getting beat up in our
first scrimmage."

Williamsburg coach Dave Baker said the Blue Pirates have had their share of wins over

"But, tonight, Glendale came to play and did a nice job," he said. "They ran the ball on us and they never allowed us to get a consis-

tent game going."

Wagner and Spinak teamed up for the Vikings' first score in the first quarter. A determined Spinak caught a short pass, cut to the outside and before getting into the end zone, broke a couple of tackles inside the 10.

Following an interception by

Ted McCulley, Glendale drove 70 yards for its second score — a 1-yard plunge by Wagner.

Clarkson scored after coming up with a ball that was tipped in the air by a Williamsburg receiv-

Glendale drove 75 yards for its fourth quarter score, a 1-yard plunge by McClellan. Glendale was ready to add a fifth score in the final seconds, but instead of running what would have been the last play of the game, Wagner took the snap and immediately hit the ground.

Perehinec said McClellan came

"He was on the team last year but didn't get to run the ball too often," he said. "He's very durable and has good lateral movement."

McClellan said it was nice getting off to the good start following the Vikings' 2-8 season a year

"I think the team has a real good attitude," he said. "Everyone was doing their job. I know the line did a real good job blocking for me."

Tussey upends Glendale

FLINTON — When it comes to winning streaks, chalk up Friday as an opportunity lost for the

Glendale Vikings.

Attempting to record back-toback wins for the first time since 1986, Glendale saw its chances slip away as Tussey Mountain scored twice in a six-minute span of the second half to log a 21-8 win.

"We hurt ourselves with penalties and mistakes," Glendale coach Frank Perehinec said. "It comes down to our inexperience, and it showed tonight. We'll learn from it."

With nine penalties, two turnovers and just 29 total yards in the first 45 minutes, the learning experience could have been a lot worse.

"Last week we gave up less than 60 yards and lost. For awhile it looked like it could happen again," second-year Tussey Mountain coach Bill Rodgers said.

Despite a 166-12 total yardage advantage in the first half, Tussey led just 7-0 until late in the third quarter as the Vikings stopped four Titan drives in Glendale territory. Tussey senior tackle Jason Miller set off the chain of events that burst the Vikings' bubble by smothering a Paul McClellan fumble at the Glendale 23. Three plays later, Titan senior running back Tommy Lazor scored on an 11-yard run, and junior quarterback Jeremy Molosky hit wideout David Decker with a 25-yard scoring strike on Tussey's next possession to put it out of reach with 8:37 to play.

Glendale made the final tally more respectable with a lastminute touchdown. McClellan took a Jason Wagner screen pass

57 yards for the score.

"We made a few adjustments at halftime and were able to move the ball some in the second half, but we weren't consistent," Perehinec said. "We'd have a good play, then a bad play."

Perehinec credited Rodgers

with doing his homework.

"They really scouted us thoroughly," he said and noted a size disadvantage in the trenches allowed Molosky (5-10-1-175) ample time to pick his secondary apart.

"We couldn't get the pressure on the quarterback like we did last week (in a 27-0 win over Williamsburg)," Perehinec said.

Claysburg-Kimmel shellacks Glendale, 35-6

CLAYSBURG — The Claysburg-Kimmel football team set the tone for its game with visiting

Glendale very early.

Senior fullback Aaron Burket ran 57 yards for a touchdown just 1:46 into the game, sending Claysburg-Kimmel on its way to a convincing 35-6 win, Saturday night at Bulldog Stadium.

Claysburg-Kimmel ran its record to 3-0. Glendale dropped

to 1-2.

In an effort to slow down a Claysburg running attack that came into the game averaging over 277 yards per outing, Glendale opened in almost a goal-line defense, with 10 defenders within three yards of the line of scrimmage.

But the strategy backfired on the third play from scrimmage, as Burket shot through the line and found no one between him-

self and paydirt.

"They made some adjustments and took some chances with their defense to try to stop the run," Claysburg-Kimmel coach Jeff Lingenfelter said. "Anytime you take chances it's high risk. They had as many people as they could up to stop the run and we happened to get a block and then there is nobody (to stop the runner)."

Burket's ramble proved to be a foreshadowing of things to come. Burket finished the game with 120 yards rushing and added another touchdown on a 5-yard run in the third quarter to make

the score 35-0.

As a team, Claysburg rushed

for 254 yards and five scores two by senior tailback Brad Weise and one by reserve junior fullback Ross Lingenfelter.

And the Bulldogs were just as dominating on the defensive side. Glendale could not get a first down until 3:53 remained in the third quarter and had been mired in negative yardage for most of the game until that point.

The Vikings finally got on the scoreboard on Paul McClellan's 71-yard TD run early in the

fourth period.

"I thought we'd give them a better game than we did, but they're tough. They're powerful, strong and fast," Glendale coach Frank Perehinec said. "The score was kind of lopsided but our kids kept their heads up. We made a lot of mistakes, but we're such a young team that we're going to make

mistakes.

Lingenfelter, who had been cautious in assessing his team's performance up to this point in the year, seemed to feel more secure about how his team was playing.

"It's difficult to tell, but I think we're improved," Lingenfelter said. "We're going to find out, because we're getting into some

tougher teams now."

Northern pounds Glendale

FLINTON — Glendale was responsible for putting a lot of points on the board Friday. Unfortunately for coach Frank Perehinec's Vikings, most of them counted for Northern Bedford.

The Panthers blocked a pair of punts and recovered a fumble to set up a trio of touchdowns from point blank range en route to a 44-14 win over the hard luck Vikings.

"It seems like every time we make a mistake, it costs us eight points," Perehinec said. "We just didn't execute on special teams."

Northern Bedford did.

"We have a nice punt blocking scheme," Panther head coach Joe Nastasi Sr. said. "Those blocked punts changed the complexion of the game."

Panther senior Rick Zimmerman took advantage of a blocking breakdown to stuff Viking punter Steve Rydbom on his first attempt at the Glendale 8. Zimmerman, who led all rushers with 116 yards on 17 carries, scored the first of his three touchdowns from a yard out two plays later.

After a legitimate touchdown drive of 53 yards on seven plays on their next possession, the Panthers upped the margin to 22-0 when junior Zach Sorrells set Northern Bedford up at the Glendale 3 with another punt block. Junior halfback Mike Heck scored on the next play.

"Overall we had a much better performance, but we hit a lull once we got the 22-0 lead," Nastasi said. "We have to learn to play with consistency for the entire game or it's going to hurt us down the road."

Glendale got on the board with a 6-yard Paul McClellan touchdown run with 1:53 to play in the first half, but gave it back when Panther junior Mitch Miller pounced on a fumbled punt at the Glendale 12 late in the third stanza. Zimmerman scored on the next play to put the game out of reach 30-6. "Physically, the kids are playing tough football, but the mistakes are killing us. How long can you keep attributing it to being a young team?" Perehinec asked.

Nastasi criticized his club for being "a little bit careless defensively," but found praise for a running game that netted 247 yards. "Our backs ran hard and the line blocked well," he said.

Boyer scored again before

The game was marred by 12 penalties for 127 yards.

FLINTON — When Glendale alumni think back to Homecoming 1994, they'll remember the flaming foliage. Lori Beers being crowned queen and perhaps the big dance afterwards. They'll try to forget the football game.

West Branch (4-2-1) rained on the Vikings' parade, using a swarming defense to corral Glen-

dale 20-0.

Glendale managed just four first downs and 93 total yards for their lowest offensive output to date in a 1-6 season.

"Our defense didn't surprise me. They've kept us in ballgames all year," Warrior coach Gary Hubler said.

"We couldn't get the run going," Glendale mentor Frank Perehinec said. "Their nose guard, (Terry) Smeal, gave us fits. We double-teamed him and still couldn't contain him."

The Viking defense was also on top of its game, but surrendered a 47-yard pass play that led to the Warriors' initial score before giving up 52 and 9 yard drives in the second half.

"Glendale was scrappy. I can't believe they came in here 1-5," Hubler said. "It was a battle from the kickoff to the last whistle."

Perehinec also couldn't fault the Vikings' effort. "It was a physical, hard-hitting game, and our kids were up for it. In the second half, they pulled away from us a little bit. Maybe they were us down."

The Glendale offense, which featured 72 yards rushing on 22 carries by sophomore tailback Paul McClellan, squandered several op-

portunities.

The Vikings advanced to the West Branch 23 after a 3-yard West Branch punt in the second quarter, but gave up the ball on downs. Another short punt (14 yards) set Glendale up at the West Branch 42 early in the fourth quarter, but the Vikes netted just 2 yards in the next four plays.

Moshannon Valley blanks Glendale

FLINTON — Moshannon Valley's offense can do more than put you to sleep. It can put you away.

Glendale learned that the hard way Friday, as Mo Valley kept it between the tackles to pound out a 14-0 Inter-County Conference Northern Division win.

The Black Knights went to the air just six times, doing their damage on the ground as sophomore quarterback J.R. Baughman ran for a pair of scores and senior running backs Scott Latosky and Jim Keith combined for 195 rushing yards.

"J.R. ran the running offense very well ... and Keith compliments Latosky very well," Mo Valley coach Harold Camberg said. "The running game was very important."

"They blocked well, and their backs hit the holes hard and quick," Viking mentor Frank Perehinec said. "They've got a big line."

For awhile, it appeared Mo Valley's combination of size and power would result in a blow out, as the Black Knights scored on two of their first three drives from 35 and 80 yards out.

Mo Valley would start six of its next eight posessions in Viking territory, only to come up empty. Glendale twice forced punts on its own side of the fifty yard line, and watched as Latosky was widu on a pair of 37-yard field goal tries.

On the flip side, Glendale started all nine of its drives in its own territory, and reached Mo Valley turf just three times. The Vikings drove as deep as the MV-4 but could not score late in the fourth quarter.

"We got a little sloppy at the end, but other than that we played a nice football game," Camberg said.

"We never got untracked tonight," Perehinec said. "They stuck to their game plan, and took us out of ours."

GAME NOTES: The win was Mo Valley's ninth straight over Glendale, which still leads the alltime series 15-14-1 ... Mo Valley hosts Claysburg-Kimmel Friday, while Glendale will entertain Southern Huntingdon.
