Glendale drops Williamsburg

FLINTON — Glendale's new coaching staff is trying to transfer its past success on the playing field to present day success on the sidelines. They took a tentative first step in the right direction Friday.

Despite absorbing 18 penalties for nearly 150 yards, Glendale handled visiting Williamsburg 27-6 in season-opening high school football action.

"We're excited that we won in a way, but we made way too many mistakes," said head coach Ron Kimberly, a captain on Glendale's last unbeaten and untied team in 1974. The staff includes three assistants who played during Glendale's football heydays in the 1970s.

Glendale used big plays most of them by junior running back/linebacker Paul McClellan — to overcome its drive-killing penalties.

McClellan recovered a fumble at the W-13 to set up the Vikings' first score, ripped off an 88-yard run to set up the second and returned another fumble 37 yards for a touchdown to stake Glendale to a 19-0 halftime lead.

Viking senior quarterback Jason Wagner and McClellan iced the cake, hooking up on a 16-yard fourth-quarter touchdown pass.

Kimberly — who is gunning for Glendale's first 500 season since 1985 — isn't ready to celebrate yet.

"We've got good talent, but we can't be making silly mistakes. We've got a tough schedule and we wouldn't beat a lot of teams playing like that."

Blue Pirate head coach Dave Baker, whose undermanned program is going through a down cycle, said "Give Glendale their due. They've been having their problems recently like we have, but Ron's got a good team. They'll win some games."

Williamsburg got on the board

against Glendale's second string on quarterback Bill Gunnett's 2-yard run with 2:59 to play.

The Blue Pirates had their chances earlier, ending three drives with incomplete fourth-down passes in the end zone. "When have you known my teams to do that," Baker asked.

"I'm in this for the duration. We'll be out there working every day and we'll keep trying to get better."

GAME NOTES: The win was Glendale's second in a row over Williamsburg, which had won 11 straight season-openers over the Vikings . . . Williamsburg was held to just 41 total yards in the first half, with four of its six first downs coming via Viking penalties . . . Williamsburg's Jesse Wyland and Glendale's Doug Belgin recovered fumbles . . . Glendale's travels to Tussey Mountain Friday while Williamsburg hosts Claysburg-Kimmel.

Glendale upends Claysburg, 20-6

FLINTON — It hasn't been a typical high school football season for either Claysburg-Kimmel or Glendale. That's bad for Claysburg-Kimmel and good for Glendale.

The trend continued Friday as Glendale (2-1) put a leash on the Bulldogs' offense in a 20-6 win. "We've got over that one win a year hump," said first-year Glendale coach Ron Kimberly, who inherited a program that won two games in a season just once in the past seven years. "It's good for the kids."

In contrast, Claysburg-Kimmel (1-2), winners of 40 games in the past five years, appears to be in a down cycle.

"We can't play the game," Bulldog coach Jeff Lingenfelter said.

"We've hem-hawed around for three weeks now and I've seen very little improvement. We've been doing everything wrong."

Lingenfelter may not have been overreacting. The Bulldogs had six turnovers, were outgained 155-20 in the first half and had nearly as many penalty yards (66) as they had total yards (73).

While Glendale dominated statistically, the crowd had to stick around for the finish. After scoring twice in the first 16 minutes — senior running back Mark Smyers raced 53 yards for the opening score and senior quarterback Jason Wagner capped a 64-yard drive with a 5-yard run — the Glendale offense checked out for the night.

"We got a little dead in the second half on offense," Kimberly said. "Our kids have to realize that they have to come out and play a second half."

Claysburg cut the margin to eight when senior running back Wade Smith scored from 13 yards out with 8:10 to play after sophomore Chris Hileman recovered a fumble at the Glendale 33.

"It could have been a spark," Lingenfelter said. "But we needed a two-point conversion and we just didn't execute."

Claysburg fumbled away its next two possessions and never threatened. Glendale set the final tally on a 24-yard Wagner touchdown run with 26 seconds to play.

Panthers blow past Glendale

ROARING SPRING — If a television camera crew had been at the Roaring Spring Athletic Field Saturday, they could have left at halftime.

Northern Bedford tailback Travis Brown would have already provided all the highlight footage they would need.

The 5-foot-11, 182-pound senior carried for 157 yards, scored four touchdowns, intercepted a pass and returned a kickoff 44 yards all in the first half.

Northern led 28-7 at the break, and went on to a 48-13 win. The Panthers improved to 3-1 under veteran coach Joe Nastasi, while first-year coach Ron Kimberly's Vikings slipped to 2-2.

"Brownie is proof that hard work pays off," Nastasi said. "He's intelligent, determined and he gives 100 percent on every play."

As impressive as Northern Bedford's first-half offensive display was, the Panther defense wasn't upstaged. Glendale had minus-four net yards in the first half, and didn't pick up a first down until 6:48 remained in the third quarter.

"Our defense isn't big, but they play with confidence and pride," Nastasi said. "We thought this was a pretty good offensive team we were playing tonight."

Kimberly agreed. "We knew coming in that they had a real tough team, but we're a better team than we showed here tonight. When things go bad, boy do they go bad."

Surprisingly, Nastasi wasn't entirely happy either. "There's always room for improvement. It wasn't flawless."

Maybe the coffee at the concession stand wasn't hot enough to suit Nastasi. On paper, the Panthers did everything right.

Northern, which scored on its first three possessions and forced the Vikings to punt on their first five, racked up 415 yards offense on the night compared to just 100 for Glendale.

A 39-yard interception return for a touchdown by Bill Dubler put the Vikes back in it at 21-7 late in the second quarter. But Northern responded with a 35-yard Josh Martin to Brown touchdown connection in the final minute of the half and scored three times in a seven minute span early in the second half to put the game out of reach.

Juniata Valley puts clamps on Glendale, 28-8

FLINTON — It was Glendale's homecoming, but it was Juniata Valley doing the celebrating Saturday.

The Hornets (3-2) crashed the Vikings' party by taking advantage of six Glendale turnovers and limiting the hosts to just 89 offensive yards for a 28-8 win.

"I have to credit most of this win to our defense today," Juniata Valley coach Jim Foster said. "Our defense played tough in the big situations and gave us the breaks we needed."

If you doubt Foster's word,

just look at the list of how Glendale possessions ended in the second half: fumble lost, downs, 22-yard punt, interception, interception and interception.

"Turnovers are where it's at and ours came at critical times," Glendale coach Ron Kimberly said.

Like with 1:06 to play in the first half when Juniata Valley's Nick Payne sacked Glendale senior quarterback Jason Wagner in the end zone and his brother, sophomore Josh Payne, recovered for a Valley touchdown and a 13-0 lead.

Glendale answered on the

ensuing kickoff when Viking junior Bill Dubler ran the reverse 86-yards for a score, but the Vikings couldn't keep pace with their mistakes in the second half.

In addition to holding onto the ball, the Hornets were also able to move it at times. Juniata Valley outgained Glendale (2-3) 214-89, and put together an 11-play, 80-yard touchdown drive to open the scoring with 6:01 to play in the first half.

"We could only run the ball between the thirties most of the day," Foster said. "Our defense came through for us."

Valley's second half scores came a lot quicker. After a 22-yard Glendale punt set the Hornets up at the Glendale 35, senior running back Nick Payne broke free from 21 yards out with 6:11 to play.

The clincher came 35 seconds later when Juniata Valley junior Jeff Boyd picked off Wagner and went 28 yards for the score.

Kimberly attributed the lackluster performance to a lack of intensity. "They wanted it more than we did," he said.
