# Glendale extends Blue Pirates' losing streak

WILLIAMSBURG — A new football season was ushered in Friday night, but it was the same old result for the Williamsburg Blue Pirates.

Glendale extended Williamsburg's winless streak to 23 games by pounding out a 20-6 victory.

Williamsburg led 6-0 at halftime, but Glendale put the Pirates away by scoring all of its points in the third quarter.

"Disappointing is the only way I can describe it," said Williamsburg coach Dave Baker.

The third quarter doomed the Pirates. The Vikings scored all of their touchdowns in less than five minutes in the third quarter.

Williamsburg attempted an onside kick to start the second half, but the ball went out of bounds at the Pirates' 44. Twelve plays later the Vikings were on the scoreboard and on their way to victory.

Why the onside kick?

"We hadn't stopped them in the first half and I thought that if we would get the ball at the start of the second half and score, we would be in a good position," explained Baker. "It didn't turn out that way, though."

Versatile Paul McClellan, who played both quarterback and half-

back, scored on a 2-yard run on a quarterback keep, then put the Vikings ahead to stay by kicking the extra point.

Glendale capitalized on two Williamsburg mistakes in scoring its other two touchdowns. Mark Harpster intercepted a Kyle Davis pass and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown and backup quarterback Chad Bickford covered the final yard of a 5-play, 35-yard drive that was set up by a fumble recovery by Jared Andrews.

"Mental toughness was the key for us," said Glendale coach Ron Kimberly. "We were down 6-0 at halftime, but I told the kids to hang in there and stay mentally tough and it paid off."

"We played much better the second half, particularly on defense," Kimberly added. "We have some good talent and were able to use it."

Glendale went with a ground attack with fullback Bill Dubler rushing for 78 yards and McClellan adding 57. The Vikings attempted just seven passes, all in the first half.

A nifty 98-yard punt return by Davis staked Williamsburg to a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. Taking the ball near the sideline, Davis received some crisp blocking and outraced the Glendale defenders.

"We didn't have a return on be-

cause we weren't sure that they were going to kick it," Baker explained. "Kyle just made a great run."

## Glendale improves mark to 2-0 by blanking Tussey

FLINTON — Monday night football just may catch on at Glendale High School.

The Vikings got to stay up late on a school night and made the most of it, hammering Tussey Mountain 20-0 in a make-up game necessitated by last Friday's storm.

Glendale moved to 2-0 for the first time since 1981, and could become the first Viking squad to win three in a season in the 1990s.

"We're showing more mental toughness week after week," Glendale coach Ron Kimberly said. "Glendale football has been down so long, they have to get it back in their minds that we can do it."

The power of positive thinking was most apparent in the running game as Glendale ground out 240 yards, including 102 stripes and a touchdown from senior quarterback Paul McClellan.

Bill Dubler added 72 yards rushing and scored Glendale's first touchdown on a 2-yard run with 48 seconds to play in the first half af-

ter the first of two Jared Andrews interceptions.

Glendale frustrated Tussey quarterback Jason Horton, as Chuck Oshall added an interception and Terry Gavin recovered a fumble.

"We have quick kids in the secondary," Kimberly said. "They play heads up ball."

Tussey coach Bill Rodgers said Glendale doesn't get all of the credit for the win. The Titans, with four turnovers, 65 yards worth of penalties and barely 100 yards of total offense, helped.

"We're way too good a team to be making mistakes like this," Rodgers said of his 0-2 squad, which has yet to score. "We did not play very well."

Rodgers said Tussey's first drive was a prime example of the Titans' lack of concentration. Tussey took the opening kickoff and drove to the Glendale 20 before three penalties and a bad snap set them back 40 yards.

"We came out with a good drive, and then four mistakes in a row. We're just not keeping our heads in the game," Rodgers said.

Tussey held its own in the first half, but Glendale dominated the second, scoring on a pair of 60-plus yard drives.

McClellan capped a 66-yard affair with a 45-yard touchdown run with 2:38 to play in the third. Andrews intercepted a pass three plays later, and snared a 14-yard touchdown pass on the ensuing drive to seal the win.

## Claysburg grounds down Glendale

CLAYSBURG — The Claysburg-Kimmel scoreboard experienced a power surge Saturday. So did the Bulldogs.

While the scoreboard recovered, Glendale didn't, a 39-26 victim of Claysburg's electrifying running game.

Senior halfback Matt Kelley and senior fullback Joe Miller combined for more than 200 yards and three touchdowns for the second straight week as Claysburg handed Glendale (2-1) its first loss of the year.

"Our running backs do a good job, and you have to give credit to our offensive line for making things happen," said Claysburg-Kimmel coach Jeff Lingenfelter.

Kelley rushed for 126 yards on 27 carries to go with a touchdown and a pair of two-point conversion catches, while Miller added 98 yards on 16 totes and two scores. Junior quarterback Chris Hileman was also busy, running for 46 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

The Bulldogs needed every one of them, as Glendale battled back from a 30-13 deficit in the second half via the big play.

Sophomore quarterback Jeff Best provided the second-half spark for the Vikings, throwing a pair of touchdown passes in a five-minute span.

Best hit Paul McClellan for a 42-yard score to end the third quarter, then found Jared Andrews with a 33-yard toss to cut Claysburg's lead to 30-26 with 7:17 to play.

"We definately came to play the entire 48 minutes," Lingenfelter said, after watching his squad respond to the challenge on both

sides of the ball.

The Bulldog offense drove to the Glendale 23 before giving up the ball on downs, and the defense took it the rest of the way, burying Best in the endzone for a safety.

After Tony Cavender recovered the ensuing onside kick, Hileman covered the remaining 35 yards on two plays to put the game out of reach.

Glendale coach Ron Kimberly said the Vikings, who are looking for their first three-win season in the 1990s, are better than they appeared.

"We had too many costly penalties, and we just didn't come to play defense," Kimberly said.

## Juniata Valley runs rampant over Glendale, 51-0

ALEXANDRIA — Juniata Valley High School football fans, or at least the ones who stay to the end of a blowout in a driving rain, are very hard to please.

"Come on, defense, tighten up," one fan bellowed Saturday, as visiting Glendale notched just its second first down of the game with three minutes to play.

The Hornet defense did in fact stiffen, preserving a 51-0 shutout and leaving Glendale with negative yardage for the day as Juniata Valley improved to 4-1.

So lopsided was the game that

both coaches agreed to allow the clock to run continuously through the fourth quarter.

"I didn't know you could do that. I had no problem with it at all," said Valley coach Jim Foster, trying to dry out in the locker room after the game.

After watching his defense keep Glendale on the far side of the 50-yard line all afternoon while his offense racked up nearly 400 yards total offense, Foster found it difficult to hand out the game ball.

"It was a good team effort. It's hard to single any one out in a game like this," Foster said.

Valley junior slot back Andy Simpson and senior quarterback

Andy Showalter would have been good candidates.

Simpson rushed for 144 yards on just five carries and scored two touchdowns, while Showalter threw for 113 yards and two scores.

"We came out early to establish the passing game. Showalter was focused today," Foster said.

Showalter was 6-for-9 for 89 yards in the first quarter alone, and gave Juniata Valley a 19-0 lead with his second touchdown pass just one play into the second stanza.

Simpson took advantage of every carry, and started a 23-point Hornet third quarter with a 39-

yard touchdown run. He added 44 yards receiving with four catches, including a 19-yard touchdown reception.

Glendale coach Ron Kimberly, who watched his Vikings fall to 2-3 after a 2-0 start, was far from pleased.

"We don't have to practice to get beat like this," Kimberly said. "We've got kids who don't want to be here. We've got to weed them out."

## West Branch thumps Glendale

FLINTON — It was Glendale's homecoming, but the West Branch High School football team did the dancing Saturday.

The Warriors (5-1) waltzed to a 38-0 win and recorded their fifth shutout of the year, as Glendale (2-4) got out-of-step after a solid first half.

"We just didn't put it all together. We didn't play 48 minutes," said Glendale coach Ron Kimberly, whose Vikings trailed just 10-0 at halftime.

The potential for a comeback was there. Glendale had held the ball for eight minutes and drove to the West Branch 16 late in the second quarter, and Warrior standout running back Kyle Hubler (81 yards rushing) had left the game with a shoulder injury.

"I felt the door was open at halftime," Kimberly said.

West Branch slammed it shut by scoring on its first four possessions of the second half with fullback Matt Petrof carrying the offense in Hubler's absence.

"Matt's a quality back too," West Branch coach Gary Hubler said. "We had to give him the football more and change the blocking schemes."

It worked. Petrof scored twice and gained 89 of his game-high 125 yards in the second half. That, combined with 108 yards passing from Warrior quarterback D.J. Clark, was enough to unglue Glendale.

"We let down in the fourth quarter after they'd gotten a couple

touchdowns," Kimberly said. "It's been a tough three weeks for us."

The Vikings have been outscored 135-0 and outgained 1,062-242 in their last three games, while their ranks have been thinned by injuries to several key starters.

"A lot of those scores wouldn't be as bad. We've been getting a lot of young kids in to gain experience. We're looking to build a program," Kimberly said.

Glendale's offense did show signs of life, netting 130 yards and reaching Warrior territory on three occasions behind 102 yards rushing from senior tailback Bill Dubler. "He played a good game for all the more room he had (to run)," Kimberly said.

# Curwensville rips Glendale, 68-0

CURWENSVILLE — The Glendale High School football team traveled only 30 miles to play Curwensville Friday, though the ride home may have seemed a lot longer.

Glendale (2-6) suffered its sixth straight loss — one of the most lopsided in school history — 68-0.

Curwensville is heading the other way, evening its record at 4-4 with a fourth straight win, its most dominating since 1945.

While six Golden Tide running backs scored and teamed for 443 yards rushing in the rain, senior tailback Josh McBride carried most of the load.

McBride ran for 251 yards and five touchdowns — four in the first half — as Curwensville scored on its first five possessions to lead 40-0.

"We had some injuries early this year but the kids hung in there and took their lumps and turned things around," Golden Tide coach Lyle Domico said.
