Vikettes Need Victory

FLINTON — With five returning letterwinners, including last season's top four scorers, Glendale girls basketball coach Sherry Slaterbeck is hoping to get the Vikettes turned in the right direction after last year's 0-14 campaign.

The Vikettes are off to an 0-2 start this season, however, losing to Moshannon Valley 52-29 and to Curwensville 30-26.

Glendale, which has lost 28 in-a-row dating back to the 1978 season, is in its second year under Slaterbeck.

The returning veterans from last season's squad are seniors Sherry Gabrielson, Patty Fleming and Tammy Ford, a two-year letterwinner, and juniors Diane Vincent and Melanie Ford.

Other players that will be seeing plenty of action throughout the season are juniors Amy Wobb, Dawn Greenaway, Laurie Bloom, Barb Noel and Bobbie Kerr.

Despite the long losing streak, the interest in the program is still alive. A total of 25 players are listed on the roster, including 20 underclassmen.

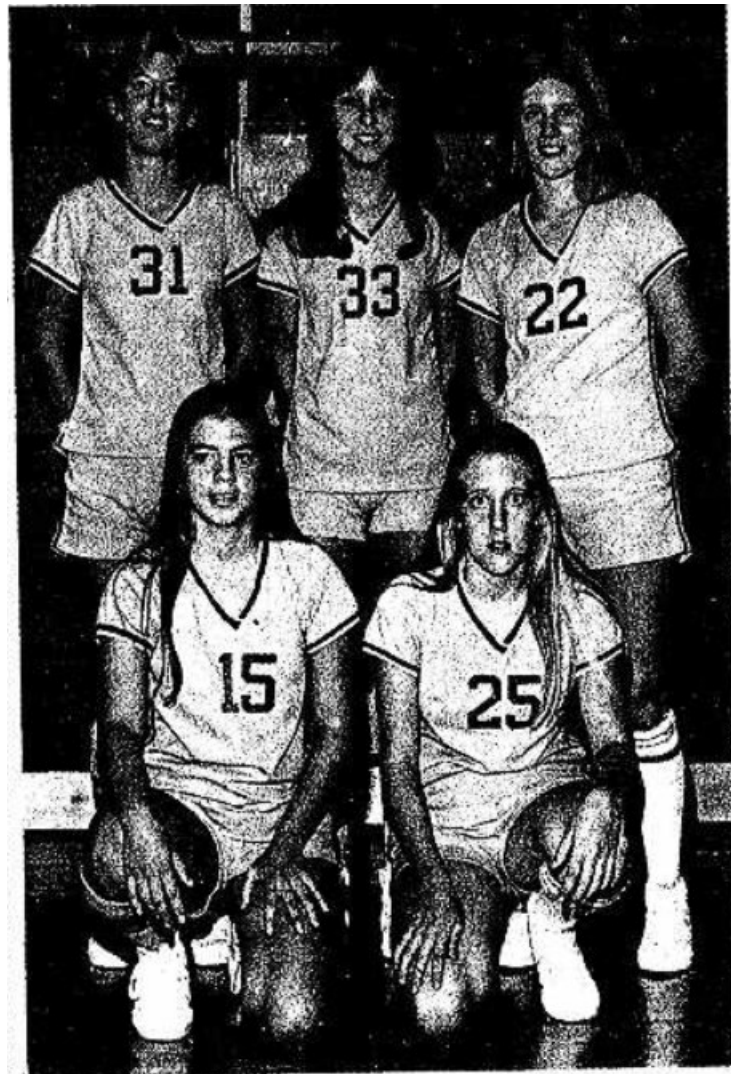

Fillies Score School Record 66 Points

It's rare that any type of scholastic athletic event leaves both coaches with smiles on their faces after it ends.

But both John Lazor of Clearfield St. Francis and Sherry Slaterbeck of Glendale seemed rather happy after

Lazor's Fillies earned a 66-43 win over the Vikings last night.

"It was a good win," claimed Lazor. "Our passing looked a lot better, and the people we're counting on for offense came through. It was good to see Rachel (Riley), Cynthia (Belin) and Caroline (another Belin) come through."

Cynthia, the younger of the Belin sisters, was the game's high scorer with 17 points while Riley added 16 points and Caroline Belin pumped in 14.

St. Francis' 66-point effort, made possible because of 46 Glendale turnovers and the Fillies' 39-28 edge on the boards, is a new single-game scoring record for the winners.

But none of those numbers seemed to discourage Slaterbeck, who watched her team lose its 29th straight game.

"I'm pleased with the way the girls are playing," Slaterbeck said. "We've still got a lot of work to do, but our progress is showing."

"I was definitely pleased with our shooting tonight, and our defense has been much tighter in recent games," she added. "We're getting more aggressive, but we still need more movement to the ball."

Glendale's 43 points is the most it has scored in a single game since a 43-25 win over Curwensville in the second game of 1978, its last win.

So it's no wonder some of the Vikings claimed "This is the best game we've ever played!" as they walked off the floor.

It was certainly one of the best games junior guard Melanie Ford has played. She scored 15 points and grabbed seven rebounds in a hustling effort.

"We have a team of hustlers," noted Slaterbeck. "They never give up, and they were fighting right down to the final buzzer tonight."

While in the end it really wasn't much of a game, the Vikings stayed fairly close in the first quarter with some pretty nice shooting by the Ford sisters, Melanie and senior Tammy, who had nine points.

The Fillies had all sorts of statistical edges after eight minutes, but they led just 13-7.

But they blew the game open with the first minute-and-a-half of the second quarter, using their off-and-on full-court press to score 10 unanswered points.

Caroline Belin reeled off the first six points of the second quarter, and Riley was omnipresent when a missed shot came down.

The Fillies kept up their pressure, opening a 33-11 lead that was eventually whittled to 35-17 by halftime.

The second half was, surprisingly, an offensive show for both teams. Glendale, limited to just 13 shots in the first half, put up one more than that in the third quarter alone and ended up sinking 12-of-29 second half field goal attempts.

That pleased Slaterbeck. Her team had not managed to score more than 29 points in any of 14 games last year; the Vikings scored 26 points in the second half last night.

"Glendale has improved from last year," noted Lazor. "They really hustled and never gave up, even when we had a big lead."

"I hope this game will give us the shot in the arm we so badly needed on offense," he added. "With two important games next week, we have more hard work to do."

The win was St. Francis' first in the Moshannon Valley Girls Basketball League after losses to DuBois Central Christian and West Branch. The Fillies, considered one of the favorites to win the league, will travel to Northern Cambria Monday and host Moshannon Valley Thursday.

Glendale is idle Monday, but will host West Branch on Thursday.

Overall, St. Francis is now 4-4. Glendale dropped to 0-3, all in the league.

FLINTON — The West Branch Warriors barely got out of Glendale High School with a Moshannon Valley Girls Basketball League win last night, nipping the revitalized Vikings 25-23 last night.
