Lady Vikings Encourage Coach

TYRONE — Last night's game with Tyrone brought Glendale girls basketball fans the same old news — almost.

Yes, the Lady Vikings lost. But no, Glendale's 1981 season might not be another exercise in futility.

Despite his team's 42-24 loss to Tyrone, Glendale coach Pat Pino — who this year inherited a 42-game losing streak — said he was pleased with the Lady Vikings' overall performance.

"I thought we did fairly well for the first game," Pino said. "We played defense well and ran our offenses. Of course, there's a lot of room for improvement, but I was

pleased with our effort — the girls didn't quit."

Glendale (0-1) stayed close to Tyrone (2-0) throughout the first half. The Lady Vikings were down by just three points after one quarter and seven at the half.

"We stayed with them in the first half," Pino said, "but our only problem was we couldn't put the ball in the basket. They were making their shots and we weren't."

Barb Miller notched 10 field goals to lead the Golden Eaglettes' attack with 21 points. Bonnie Miller finished with 13 points for the winners.

Lisa Tiesi topped the Lady

Vikings with six points.

The Lady Viking junior varsity fared better, clobbering Tyrone 43-14.

Glendale will host Moshannon Valley tomorrow night in the Moshannon Valley League opener for both clubs.

Lady Vikings Shed 44-Game Losing Streak

FLINTON — It might seem difficult to get excited about a 27-25 girls basketball game.

The Glendale Lady Vikings had no such trouble, because they had the 27.

And that meant their first win in 44 games, snapping a losing streak that dated back to 1978.

The result were screams and hugs and tears from the players, and a huge sigh of relief from first-year head coach Pat Pino following his team's Moshannon Valley League opener with Moshannon Valley.

"Now we can get down to playing basketball without the burden of that darn losing streak," said Pino. "I'm happy for these girls. They've been playing with a lot of pressure on them because of that streak."

It was pressure which gave the Lady Vikings their win.

Glendale trailed 17-10 with three minutes left in the third quarter, the Vikings apparently headed for their 44th straight loss.

But Pino called the full-court press, and the

Damsels started turning over the ball, allowing the Lady Vikings to cut the gap to 19-15 by the end of the quarter.

The press seemed a good idea, and Pino stuck with it through the early portion of the fourth quarter, and his Lady Vikes caught up.

"They didn't quit," Pino said. "They could have packed it up when we were down 17-10 with three minutes to go in the third quarter."

The lead see-sawed right to final seconds. With the score tied 25-25, the Lady Vikings brought the ball in from under their basket against a full-court press ordered by Mo Valley head

coach Frank Beella.

From the bench, Pino screamed for a timeout, but his players missed his message, instead working the ball up the floor for a final shot, a 15-foot jumper by Barb Noel.

The ball sailed through the hoop with three seconds left (Noel's only points of the night), and Mo Valley was unable to call time out or get the ball in play.

"The way things worked out, it's a good thing they didn't call that timeout," said Pino.

"We still played sloppy," Pino added, referring to his team's 44 turnovers. "We turned the ball over way too much, we forced shots, and we weren't patient trying to set up good shots."

The Vikes were 11 of 66 from the floor (17 percent) while Mo Valley was 11 of 42 (26 percent). Glendale outrebounded Mo Valley 29-20, and the Damsels had 32 turnovers.

Neither team had a double-figure scorer. Lisa Tiesi scored eight for Glendale while Polly Reese scored a like amount for Mo Valley, which was playing its season opener.

The win put Glendale in an extremely unfamiliar position: tied for first in the Moshannon Valley Girls Basketball League.

The Lady Vikings are scheduled to visit Currensville Monday while Mo Valley, is scheduled to visit Harmony, currently on strike, next Thursday.

Glendale won the junior varsity game.

CURWENSVILLE — It's pretty tough to win a basketball game if you don't score for the first eight minutes and thirty-three seconds. That's what happened to the Glendale girls team last night, as Curwensville downed the Lady Vikings 33-26 in Patton Hall.

The Golden Tide grabbed an 8-0 lead after one period of the Moshannon Valley League game, getting buckets from Betsy Brown, Barb McGee, Wendy Bloom, and Tammy Tubbs. In the meantime, the Lady Vikings couldn't get their shots to drop.

"We were getting open shots," said Glendale coach Pat Pino, "but they just didn't fall. The first quarter did it; we out-scored them 26-25 the rest of the game."

The Vikings' shots started to fall for them in the second quarter, when,

as Pino noted after the game, Glendale started hauling down some rebounds.

"We weren't getting any rebounds in the first quarter. We were just standing around. When we began to rebound, we began to score."

The Golden Tide had its eight-point first quarter lead whittled in half by the end of the second period, going into the locker room up 14-10.

In the third quarter, the Vikings hit another dry spell, and Curwensville built its margin to 10 points, 25-15, as Tubbs and McGee led the attack.

With a 10-point lead in the final quarter, the Golden Tide looked to be in command, but then it seemed to adopt a policy of "shoot first, worry about holding the lead later."

"The team has to learn to work the ball around," said Curwensville coach Joni Bartell. "They did start to work it toward the end of the fourth quarter. They're not afraid to shoot."

"I really didn't feel that we had the game wrapped up until the last 20 seconds. Glendale kept coming back."

While both teams missed 11 foul shots (Glendale shot 8-for-19, Curwensville

9-for-20), the Golden Tide connected on its attempts in the late stages of the game.

Tubbs scored a game-high 12 points to lead the Golden Tide offense, while McGee canned eight, six of which came in the second half. Amy Wobb came off the bench for the Vikings to tally nine points, and Melanie Ford notched seven, all in the second half.

Both teams now sport 1-1 records in the MVL. Curwensville is 2-2 overall, and Glendale is 1-2. The Lady Vikings have a home game against Clearfield

St. Francis Thursday.

FLINTON — A fourth-quarter surge enabled Clearfield St. Francis to pull away from Glendale and post a 47-25 Moshannon Valley Girls Basketball League win last night.

"I was very worried about this game," said St. Francis head coach John Lazor. "I was afraid the kids would be looking ahead to Saturday night (cross-town rival Clearfield)."

The Fillies weren't looking at anything but the Lady Vikings in the first half, taking off to a 29-14 lead, but the Lady Vikings recovered, outscoring St. Francis 10-4 to put a scare into the Fillies.

But St. Francis blew apart the Lady Vikings

14-1 in the fourth quarter when Glendale's man press failed to stop the Fillies.

"They broke the game open in the fourth quarter when we went to a man-to-man, which is something we can't do," said Glendale coach Pat Pino.

"We missed 23 foul shots, and that was the

difference," said Pino. "We wouldn't have been forced to press if we had made even half of those."

"It seems every time we play Glendale up there we don't shoot well on that floor," said Lazor, whose team connected just 22 percent from the floor.

"I think Glendale has improved tremendously under Pat," he added.

"We did a good job defensively," said Pino. "We shut off their inside game. They made almost all of their shots from the outside."

Just which team won the rebounding battle is still up in the air. St. Francis' charts had the Fillies out-rebounding the Lady Vikings 40-28 with Rachel Riley pulling down 15 and Chris Pallo grabbing 10.

Glendale's charts had the Lady Vikings with more rebounds.

No one disputed the number of turnovers. Glendale had 30; St. Francis had 29.

DUBOIS — According to Glendale head coach Pat Pino, the Lady Vikings played their best all around game of the year, but they had their troubles in the second and fourth quarters against Dubois Central last night and, as a result, suffered a 34-18 loss.

Lady Vikings Surprise Fillies 37-32

Wanted: One Clearfield St. Francis High School girls basketball team.

Fillie head coach John Lazor would like to replace the group of "imposters" that lost to Glendale in a Moshannon Valley League game last night.

"We stunk out the place," declared Lazor, in reference to the Fillies' 37-32 loss at Glynn Hall. "There is no excuse for playing like we did. These girls are totally unprepared. They have lost their desire to win and that's all there is to it."

"This team gives less effort than any other team I've had."

Lazor is in his sixth season at the helm.

Glendale head coach Pat Pino had nothing but praise for his team.

"By far," he said, "this is the best game Glendale has ever played."

One might differ with Pino, but consider the fact that the Lady Vikings came into this season riding an unattractive 42-game losing streak. They were 0-14 last year.

"We didn't try to force the ball," continued Pino, "and we didn't get rattled. Our defense did a super job of containing them."

In defeating St. Francis, Glendale won its second straight game, improving its overall record to 3-7 with a 3-5 MVL mark.

St. Francis is now 9-3 and, coupled with West Branch's loss to DuBois Central Christian last night, remains a game ahead of the Warriors in the league with a 5-3 chart.

Neither team excited the fans in the early going. In fact, Glendale played the part of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, scoring one point in the third quarter, but exploding for 18 in the fourth.

"The only difference between tonight and the last time we played St. Francis was that we made our foul shots tonight." Pino pointed out.

Glendale converted only five of 27 in its 47-25 loss Sept. 17 at home, but the Lady Vikings hit 17 of 31 in the rematch.

St. Francis held a slim margin at the outset, but Glendale went on top 9-6 after one quarter and increased its lead to 18-13 at the half.

Probably the biggest drawback to the Fillies came in the third quarter when they failed to capitalize on Glendale's poor shooting (0-for-11). St. Francis scored only four points in that quarter (2 of 15 from the floor) and still trailed by two entering the final frame.
