District 6 suspends Glendale girls coach

Glendale girls' basketball coach Rick Stackhouse pleaded a crime of passion — or in this case, compassion — but it fell on deaf ears

Thursday.

In a hearing at the Hollidaysburg Area
Senior High School, the 11-man District 6 committee suspended Stackhouse for the remainder of the basketball season as a consequence of the third-year coach ordering his players to leave the floor during the fourth quarter of Monday night's game at Penns Manor.

The decision resulted in a 2-0 forfeit victory The decision resulted in a 2-0 forfeit victory for Penns Manor, which had held a 41-39 lead when Stackhouse called his players off the floor 30 seconds into the fourth period. Stackhouse was upset that officials Paul Tatarok and Jim Racchine saw fit to call 34

fouls against his team in the second and third periods, while whistling host Penns Manor for just five the entire game.

But he maintained Thursday that his primary concern—and the reason that he asked his team to leave the floor—was the welfare and safety of his players.

"This is my ninth season of coaching at one level or another," Stackhouse said Thursday night. "I've seen and experienced bad officiating before this. I didn't leave the floor, the season of the season of the floor.

ficiating before this. I didn't leave the floor, and I didn't have my players leave the floor, because of poor officiating. I did so because I was worried about one or more of my kids getting hurt."

The game turned into a rough-and-tumble affair that reached a head late in the third quarter, when Glendale senior Brenda Orrick squared off in fisticuffs against a Penns Manor

"I just did what I thought was best for the kids at the time," said Stackhouse. "Now I could say that I wish I wouldn't have, but

that's a hard thing to say. At the time, I did what I thought I had to, and I didn't care about

the consequences.

"We've gone through some injuries this year, and two of our players got hurt in games that were real loose like Monday night's, said Stackhouse. "We have some big games coming up, and I think this team has the potential to advance to the inter-districts.

District 6 committee chairman Stan Bem refused immediate comment when reached at his home late Thursday night and Glendale

his home late Thursday night and Glendale principal Dan Ceccoli was equally mum.

Ceccoli, who had already suspended Stackhouse from Wednesday night's Moshanon Valley League semifinal playoff game with Curwensville, refused to comment on the situation Thursday night, other than to say that "we (the school) are going to abide by whatever penalty the District 6 committee chooses to hand out — nothing more and nothing less."

If Monday's forfeit loss is taken into account, Glendale has a 16-7 record heading into tonight's Moshannon Valley League cham-

pionship game with DuBois Central Christian, Glendale opens District 6-A tournament play Monday, and the top three girls' teams in District 6-A will advance to the inter-districts. But Stackhouse, who said that he was informed of the District 6 committee's decision by Ceccoli and Glendale Athletic Director Duane Bordack Thursday evening, will be in abstentia.
