Lady Vikings looking to turn things around in 2014-15

FLINTON — With five letterwinners back, the Glendale girls basketball team is hoping to improve on its 2-20 mark from last season.

But the Lady Vikings will have to fill the hole left by second leading scorer Courtney McMurray,

who was lost to graduation.

"Having five letterwinners back gives us experience," said head coach John Matchock. "All of them got a lot of playing time last year. We are looking for them to provide that experience to the younger girls at practice."

Matchock thinks his girls have what it takes to compete for the Moshannon Valley League title

again this year.

Seniors Kiana Johnston, Alisha Plummer and Shannon Ricketts, along with junior Anna Fowler and sophomore Amber Matier all return for another season in blue and gold.

Joining them will be one senior, one freshman

and seven sophomores.

"We will be using sophomores a lot this year," said Matchock. "Either starting the game or coming off the bench. We have four seniors and one junior. The sophomores will be used quite often and have to learn to play a quicker game than at the junior high level.

"We played in a fall league, and they showed

they are coming along. There is no way you can simulate a varsity game with the atmosphere and having to play a game that counts, and everybody that reads the paper will end up seeing that result.

"A good number of them will see varsity time without a doubt, and we will probably have a few of them starting. (Cierra) O'Shell and (Lauryn) Clarkson are two of the sophomores that will be used a lot. Both are capable of turning some heads in both the ICC and MVL. We also have a freshman Makenzie Lukehart that will see some time."

The group isn't as experienced as Matchock would like, but has worked hard in the offseason.

But Glendale will have to play its best basketball to compete in not only the MVL, but the Inter-County Conference as well.

Last season, the Lady Vikings went 2-6 in Mo Valley League play and 0-14 in the ICC. Glendale's

lone wins came over Harmony.

"We had a young and inexperienced team last year, and it showed on the scoreboard with some lopsided losses," Matchock said. "We are going to be playing hard for 32 minutes. We want to return the favor this year."

Glendale picked up its first win of the season in its second game, then went on a 12-game skid before picking up its final victory of the year.

Ricketts was the team's leading scorer last year, averaging 8.4 points per game. She played in all 22 games and scored in double digits 12 times. She was also second on the team in 3-pointers made with six.

Fowler led the team in treys, knocking down seven en route to a 3.3-point average as

a sophomore.

Matier was the team's third-leading scorer last season, with 3.2 ppg. She played in all 22 games as a freshman.

"Amber is no different than any of our returning girls," said Matchock. "As a freshman, she started most of our games. I'm hoping she uses that experience from last year and uses that this year to make herself and the team better.

"We have a lot of younger girls this year. I'm hoping she can provide them with some insight on what to expect at the varsity level. I'm expecting more from Amber, but also the rest of the returning girls.

"I think each returning girl has something to prove after last season. I'm expecting bigger things from Ricketts and Fowler both offensively and defensively. They both are capable of having a big season.'

Plummer (2.8 ppg) and Johnston (2.1) also return.

Even with five letterwinners back, the starting lineup still isn't set for the Lady

"The only spots for the first game that are decided are Ricketts, Fowler and Matier." Matchock said. "The other two spots are up for grabs between five or six girls, but we will be taking the starting lineup on a game-

by-game basis.
"I don't want any of the girls getting used to starting and then not trying as hard at practice. We have been preaching pushing each other hard at practice for two hours and trying to make each other better. And, it has been working.

"We have a nice mix of girls this year that have been working well together at practice so far. They are looking forward to getting the season started."

And, while the Lady Vikings pride themselves on defense, Matchock knows they are going to have to score points if they hope to compete.

"We don't have height again this year, so we will be relying on our speed and quickness to generate our offense," Matchock said.

"We have a deep, talented bench this year. We are going to be using 8-10 different girls a game. We want to be constantly on the ball and forcing turnovers to make up for our lack of height. We have been preaching defense and a good transition game."

Last season, Glendale averaged 30.5 points per game. That number will have to rise if it hopes to rack up wins in the ICC or the MVL.

Matchock will be assisted this year by Rick Stackhouse. Kelli McGarvey and Sara Tarr will be volunteer coaches.

Glendale opens the season on Dec. 9 hosting St. Joseph's Catholic Academy in a varsity-only game.

December 9, 2014: St. Joe's 7 at Glendale 53

FLINTON — In most cases, a big season-opening win is something that coaches love to see from their teams, but Glendale head coach John Matchock wasn't completely satisfied with everything from the Lady Vikings.

A total of 12 of the 13 Lady Vikings scored on the evening, while their defense pressured St. Joseph's Catholic Academy into 41 turnovers. Glendale also held the Lady Wolves to just two points in the second half on their way to a 53-7 victory on Tuesday.

There weren't many problems with the Lady Vikings' defensive efforts, but they had more problems with taking care of the ball than Matchock would like to see.

"I think we started out well, but then we started turning over the ball and not rebounding," he said. "If we're going to compete against bigger teams, those are things that we're going to have to do. In spurts, we played well, but I think we can play better."

All five Glendale starters put in at least one basket in the first quarter. Shannon Ricketts had four of her game-high 19 points in the opening eight minutes, while Cierra O'Shell, Amber Matier and Anna Fowler each had a bucket. Lauryn Clarkson also hit a 3-pointer in the opening stanza. It was the lone trey of the night.

The Glendale defense didn't allow St. Joseph's to get off many shot attempts and forced 12 turnovers in the first quarter.

"We've been really focusing on a lot of defense," said Matchock. "We're trying to make our defense generate our offense, so we can maybe get some easy layups. That was good to see that we were able to force a lot of turnovers. We're just hoping that we can do that the rest of the season."

The Lady Wolves' Courtney Gregory opened the first possession of the second quarter with a lay-in, but Glendale shut out St. Joseph's for the rest of the seven-plus minutes in the quarter. The Lady Vikings finished the period on a 16-0 run, with five reserves cracking the score sheet.

Glendale went to the locker room leading 29-5.

Ricketts, who scored just six points in the first half, ended the evening with 19.

"She could've had more, but that's the first-game jitters," said Matchock. "Hopefully we've got turnovers and jitters out of our system.

"(The upperclassmen) have improved. They're a little bit more mature now. They realize they're the leaders now. It's good to see that they're growing.

"We also have some good sophomores that came up. They're forcing the older kids to practice a lot harder and vice versa. Practice is kind of a challenge now because everybody is competing." Gregory, who led the Lady Wolves with six points, scored the last field goal of the night for her team late in the third quarter with a jumper. Ricketts led the Lady Vikings with seven points in the third quarter, which put Glendale up 41-7 entering the fourth quarter.

Ricketts put in another six points in the last period of play, while Fowler, Kiana Johnston

and Makenzie Lukehart each had a field goal.

Matier added six points and six rebounds for Glendale, while Lukehart brought down six boards.

Glendale (1-0) is back in action on Friday as it entertains Bellwood-Antis.

"We're going to get our eyes opened up on Friday against one of the best teams in the area," said Matchock. "We have to get our heads focused. We'll see how good we are."

Fowler's buzzer beater helps

Lady Vikings top Harmony in OT

WESTOVER - The girls basketball game between Glendale and Harmony on Wednesday night in Westover had a little bit of everything - torrid shooting, staunch defense and a buzzerbeating shot that permanently swung the momentum in the Lady Vikings' favor.

Glendale - despite starting 10-of-17 from the field to take a 25-11 lead through the first eight minutes of the contest - found itself trailing the host Lady Owls, 49-43, with 10 seconds to play and possession of the ball.

After a Shannon Ricketts 3point play, the Lady Viking defense didn't allow Harmony to inbound the ball and regained possession.

A missed 3-pointer wound up in Anna Fowler's hands and she calmly drilled the shot from the perimeter to force overtime.

The Lady Vikings didn't trail again, as they rebounded to deny the Lady Owls their first win of the season, 60-55.

"We got it down to two possessions," said Glendale head coach John Matchock, "and you can't give up hope. Shannon drove to the basket and got fouled, which helped, and Anna knocked down the big 3 as time expired.

"We've been weary about going man-to-man (defense) ... but when we went to it, the girls played phenomenal defense. I

can't even describe it because I wasn't even planning on playing any man. We got a lot of turnovers and that's what we needed. I told them in the locker room, 'defense got us back in the game."

After turning away the Lady Owl offense, Ricketts knifed through the Harmony defense with time winding down and was fouled going in for a layup. Ricketts' shot fell and so did her ensuing free throw.

Once the Lady Viking defense forced the turnover on the inbounds play, Ricketts had a good look at a 3-pointer with time winding down. The shot didn't drop and ended up finding its way into the hands of Fowler, who forced overtime as the ball swished through the net.

The shot atoned for all of Fowler's points in the contest.

"It was huge because she has been in a slump lately in practice and in games," Matchock said. "She doesn't really want to shoot, but she stepped up and hit that shot. We carried that momentum into overtime and, luckily, we pulled it off."

For the Lady Owls, it was another near miss despite a solid

Harmony fell behind early against West Branch in a 50-42 defeat on Monday and the same held true against Glendale. The Lady Owls trailed by 14 with 7:19 remaining in the opening half,

but dominated the middle two quarters and led 40-32 heading into the fourth quarter.

While Harmony's defense forced 12 Glendale turnovers in helping outscore the visitors 18-3 in the third, the Lady Owls weren't able to hang on when the Lady Vikings utilized a full-court man-to-man defense.

The result was Harmony's 20th straight defeat.

"The resiliency was impeccable early," said Lady Owls head coach Doug Martz, "because they never put their heads down. We never lost confidence, even though we dug ourselves a big hole early. The defense was our offense in the third quarter, and I don't think it was anything Glendale was mismanaging or doing bad. I think our girls just really put forth a really good third quarter. They denied the passes and they didn't allow second-chance opportunities on the boards.

"We're making our runs now, more than we have in the past, but we just can't keep those leads. We need to be patient when we have the lead and work for the layups instead of settling for off-balance jumpers. ... There was a momentum swing (with Fowler's 3-pointer), but I think it becomes a momentum swing if you let it. (Glendale) wanted to ride that, and I'm not

sure how well our girls responded to that.'

Aside from the late heroics of Fowler and Ricketts, each team had their fair share of standout performances in the contest.

Harmony's resurgence hinged largely on the play of senior Joleen Brink and sophomore Tarra Hauser.

Hauser, who pulled in nine boards and had three steals, spearheaded the Lady Owls' stingy defensive effort in the middle two quarters, as she netted all of her team-high 17 points in the middle stanzas.

Brink, on the other hand, was a force inside, ripping down a team-high 12 rebounds and adding 13 points to her credit. Brink's bucket in the third quarter at the 2:34 mark completed Harmony's comeback and gave it the lead until Fowler's game-tying shot.

"Joleen Brink, I kind of felt like she was the heart-and-soul of things tonight because of her determination," Martz said. "She helped spark our big run going into the half to make us feel better. She came to play and she played very hard, and I think she was inspirational to the other girls out there. The girls really respect her a lot, and there's a reason why."

While Ricketts scored a game-high 21 points and sopho-more Cierra O'Shell added double figures (16), the play of Amber Matier allowed the Lady Vikings to mount a counterattack to Brink and company under the hoop.

Matier had six points in the

first half, but didn't crack the scoreboard again until opening the scoring in the extra period. Matier ended the night with 11 points and a game-high 13 rebounds.

"She was kind of silent and didn't seem like she was in the game," said Matchock, "but when we needed her most she stepped up and hit some foul shots at the end. She did the dirty stuff and got a lot of rebounds, which we have problems with.

The Lady Vikings improved to 2-2 on the season, while the Lady Owls dipped to 0-5.

"Harmony came out (in the second half) and they were hitting everything," Matchock said.
